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**The Provincial Farm.**  
It is announced by this morning's Globe that an Honorary Commission is about to be issued by Government to a number of well-known gentlemen deeply interested in Agricultural and Educational matters, inviting them to consider the whole subject of the future organization and management of the institution, and report without delay. We understand that among the gentlemen composing the Commission will be found the names of the Commissioner of Agriculture; the President of the Provincial Agricultural Association; two ex-Presidents of the Provincial Agricultural Association (Hon. Messrs. Christie and Skead, we believe); Hon. George Brown; the President of University College, Toronto; the Professor of Agriculture in University College, Toronto; the Senior Inspector of Grammar Schools for Ontario; and the Secretary of the Provincial Horticultural Society, Dr. Beadle, of St. Catharines.

The opponents of the Stratford and Lake Huron road are greatly disgusted at the result of the voting upon the by-law granting a bonus to the road. The Mitchell Advocate and St. Mary's Argus openly accuse the railway supporters in Stratford, Listowel and Mornington of fraudulent voting. Instances are given in proof of these assertions, one of which we quote from the Advocate:—

"The little village of Listowel has perhaps not more than one hundred actual freeholders. At the general election of last year, householders as well as freeholders, assessed in the sum of \$200 or over, were entitled to vote, only 182 votes were given in that municipality. Now we find that no less than 257 freeholders actually voted for the by-law." "Let us compare Mitchell with those places. It is well known that to-day the population of our village is at least 200 more than it was last year. Yet, at the Parliamentary election of 1872, a total vote of 331 was cast. On the by-law, notwithstanding that nearly all who were entitled to vote did so, only 182 votes were polled."

This is certainly making out a strong case. We shall see what the Stratford and Listowel papers have to say on the subject.

Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Gillies, that the sum of \$2 be paid to Joseph Anderson, having paid the amount to James McIntosh, P.L.S., for surveying the line of road, between the 5th and 6th Con., opposite lots 12 and 13.—Carried. Mr. Easterbrook moved, seconded by Mr. Gillies, that the Collector be instructed to collect the taxes due on part of West half of lot 8, 4th Con., containing 39½ acres, for the years 1872 and 1873.—Carried. Mr. Easterbrook moved, seconded by Mr. Kean, that the sum of \$20 be paid to Wm. Buck, for the care and attendance on William Masters during his sickness.—Carried. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Gillies, that the sum of \$12 be granted to William Easterbrook, in aid of Widow Job and five children, they being in indigent circumstances.—Carried. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Easterbrook, that the following sums be paid to the undermentioned parties, for sheep killed by dogs, viz: William Cusick, \$24 for 8 sheep; Thomas M. Taylor, \$1.66 for 1 do.; Jeremiah Fletcher, \$4 for 1 do.; John McEdward, \$4.34 for 9 do.; Wm. Reed, \$10.07 for 1 do.; John Cottrill, \$16.63 for 7 do.; Lambert Barberre, \$4.34 for 1 do.; and James Napper, \$9.34 for 1 do., said claims having been duly certified.—Carried. 
