The Governor-General's Movements.

Aug. 27.

Leaving Major Walker's residence this morning at ten o'clock, the party, escorted by cavalry, were driven through the city and to the new park, where the London Field Battery fired a salute of seventeen guns. A guard of honour and the Battalion band were also present, and an immense crowd of people. At a raised platform His Excellency was presented with an address asking him to give the park a name, and in his reply he named it "The Victoria." At the City Hall s luncheon was served and about five hundred persons sat down. In response to the toast of health to the Queen and Governor General, Lord Dufferin made a lengthy reply. Luncheon over, the party drove to the station and took the train for St. Thomas, where a guard of honour, a detachment of cavalry, the fire brigade, and two bands, as well as a large crowd of persons, were in waiting at the station. On landing, the Governor was presented with addresses on behalf of the town and county. A procession was then formed and passed through the principal streets, halting at the Central School, where the children sang "God Save the Queen," and driving under the Canada Southern Railway bridge, which is 90 feet high and half a mile long. At the Canada Southern station a reception was held and a luncheon served.

Shortly after five o'clock Simcoe was reached, and here, as in most of the other places visited, a guard of honor, and band awaited the arrival of the visitors. Here also the Governor was presented with an address, to which he replied in appropriate terms

Horrors of Famine.

TERRIBLE STATE OF THINGS IN CESAREA.

A series of interesting letters on the horrors of the famine have appeared in the Levant Herald. They are from Rev.

W. A. Farnsworth, attached to the American mission at Casarea. He takes a very gloomy view of the future. I make several extracts:

There is really a great deal of suffering from the lack of necessary food in Casarea and the large towns near that city. The same is true of Everek and of Nigde, but when we compare these places with the other regions above named we feel that, as yet, they have hardly been could be that, as yet, they have hardly been than one-half the population, are destitute of bread, and for many weeks have lived almost entirely on such will dherbs as they could gather in the fields and along the road sides. worst of the Persian famine. The Governor told me that the statistics which they had gathered showed some 5,000 deaths from starvation in that kaza. Were those included who have come in from other districts, Salman, Keskin, &c., and have died there, it would greatly swell, perhaps double, the list. In many cases hunger seems to have destroyed all the finer feelings of humanity. As I was assured by many of the inhabitants, bodies have been allowed to remain as many as four days in the streets, and the dogs have partially devoured them. While this seems too had to be true I can yet hardly doubt it, for while I sat conversing with the Governor I heard orders given for the burial of two bodies that had been lying at the edge of the town two days already awaiting interment.

Storing Wer Coal. — The London Medical Record says that people who store wet coal in their cellars expose themselves to the dangers of sore throats and other evils. Even the firedamp which escapes from coal mires arises from the slow decomposition of coal at temperatures but little above that of the atmosphere, but under augumented pressure. By wetting a mass of freshly broken coal, and putting it into a warm cellar, the heap is heated to such a degree that carburetted and sulphuretted hydrogen are given off for long periods of time, and pervade the whole house. The liability of wet coal to produce mischievous results under such circumstances, may be appreciated from the fact that there are several instances on record of the spontaneous combustion of wet coal when stowed in the bunkers or holds of ships. And from this cause doubtless many missing coal vessels have perished.

Weevil.—This pestiferous insect does not seem to have committed any ravages in this section of the country, though our exchanges of the eastern part of Ontario say it is doing considerable damage to the spring wheat there. In former years its ravages were confined almost entirely to the fall and winter wheat; this year it has scarcely appeared in the winter wheat, but it is seriously damaging the spring wheat.

A telegram from the famous Black Hills to the St. Paul Press contains authentic confirmation of reported gold discoveries. The despatch is dated the 22nd inst., and says: The command reached here yesterday in good health and spirits, by short marches and good camps from Custar's Valley, which place we left on the 6th. Gold and silver were found in several places in quantities, and game in abundance. Another despatch says: The expedition has completed the exploration of the Black Hills, which prove even richer than was before reported. Gold and silver are found in numerous places and in quantities so great that with a pick and pan a single miner may take out \$100 per day. The distance from Bismarck to the gold regions is about 250 miles over a practicable route. The citizens of Bismarck are greatly excited, and already expeditions are being organized. Gen. Custar, in his report of the expedition to the Black Hills, says: "I referred in a former despatch to the discovery of gold. Subsequent examinations at numerous points confirm and strengthen the fact of the existence of gold in the Black Hills, and some of the water courses. Almost every shovelful of earth produced gold in small yet paying quantities. Our brief halt and rapid marching prevented anything but a very hasty examination of the country in this respect; but in one place, and only one within my knowledge where so great a depth was reached, and the was due gight feet deep. The miners report they found gold among the roots of the grass, and from that point to lowest point reached, gold was found in paying quantities. It has needed no expert to find gold on the Black Hills, as men without former experience in mining have discovered it at expense of little time or labor.


