

As it stands to-day it is one of the most conserva-tive mining propositions that has been placed before the investing public and has been cordially received. In view of this wondercordially received. In view of this wonderful development, which is probably unique in mining, and the fact that there are other properties in Slocan which are to-day where the Freddie Lee was eight months ago, it is easy to see that the outlook for this new company in Canada is most brilliant. It is the opinion of some mining men who have followed the silver mining interest very closely that within the short space of two or three years there will be more silver and closely that within the short space of two or three years there will be more silver and lead produced in Canada than in the United States. It will be impossible for the Ameri-can mines to continue to work with silver at its present price or slight shade lower. On the other hand it is difficult to conceive of the price of silver falling to a point so low as to prevent the working of the Slocan mines of the grade of the Freddie Lee. This makes the silver question and the opening up of the great silver region of Kootenay a matter of exceeding importance to all Cana-dians.


