IN ANNNAPOLIS

Result of Regular Session Held at Annapolis Royal Last Week

October term of the Supreme Cour opened in Annapolis on Tuesday,

October 5th. The grand jury met and after being addressed by the presiding judge retired and subsequently presented true Lawrence P. Patterson, Granville bills of indictment against the following parties charged with offences: The King vs Lewis Milbury, carnal

knowledge of a girl under fourteen rears-A true bill. The King vs Elwood Milbury, carnal knowledge as above-A true

The King vs Woodworth, charge of stealing a bicycle-A true bill. The King vs Feener, charge of receiving stolen goods-No bill. The King vs Isaiah Fancy, charge of incest under Code Section 204..

While the grand jury were considering the above cases the court proceeded to a second trial of the case of Maurice Wilkins, on a charge of carnal knowledge of two children under fourteen years. This cause had been tried previously at the June term at Bridgetown, but the trial at the June court resulted in a disagreement and had to be tried again. The second trial this term occupied two days and after many witnesses had been examined, the jury acquitted the defendant.

In the King vs Woodworth, on a defendant being arraigened he pleaded guilty. His counsel, Mr. W. G. Parsons, asked the court to exercis clemency and give him a suspended sentence. The Crown Prosecutor consented to the sentence being suspended but suggested that the court should make an order that addition to furnishing bail for good behavior, he should also pay the expense to which the owner had been subjected on receiving his property. To this the court agreed and ordered that the defendant should pay the prosecutor the sum of twenty

dollars. The last case tried was the King vs Fancy, which resulted in the prisoner being convicted and he was sentenced to serve two years in Dorchester.

A special session of the supreme court may be held on or about October 26th, to try the civil causes, a list of which appeared in our last

YOUR RAILWAYS AND THE COST OF LIVING

DEFORE the Privy Council at Ottawa, protest against the new railway rates has been made on the grounds that the giving of the new rates would raise the cost of living by a percentage many times higher than the percentage actually charged by the Canadian railways.

It was pointed out that the numerous middlemen who act as the distributors of goods would each add his percentage of profit to the freight rate, so that although the railways might only receive say 40 cents additional freight charge on a shipment the public would be forced by the distributing middlemen, to pay many times that amount.

The managements of the various Canadian Railways desire, through this, their assertion to draw the attention of newspaper readers to the highly significant fact that the recent increase in United States Railway Rates-an increase similiar to the increase in Canada—has actually been followed by a decrease in the cost of living in that

Furthermore:

GREAT Canadian Manufacturer recently made public-without any solicitation and without the previous knowledge of the railway managements -figures which proved that the retail selling price of a yard of plain white cloth in Winnipeg, after being hauled from Montreal to Toronto and Toronto to Winnipeg, would be increased only one half a cent, even after the wholesaler had added 20 per cent profit to the new freight rate and the retailers another 50 per cent.

He showed that these distributors, whether rightly or wrongly, added 15 cents to his millprice of 16 cents

TET the railways carried the raw cotton for this yard of goods from Texas to Montreal, and the finished goods from the mill to Toronto and Toronto to Winnipeg for one and one half cents.-

One and one half cents as against fifteen cents.

We venture to believe that, whatever the explanation or the justification may be, the same serious additions to cost by the distributing trades will be found in relation to almost every article of common household use.

This is not to attack distributors. They may themselves be victims of a bad system or of an overgrowded trade. But it is to point out that if they add whatever percentages they, as a trade, find convenient, the railways cannot help either themselves or the public.

The oppressive results of these practices should not be charged aginst the railway managements, nor cited as reasons for holding freight rates down-merely because railway rates can be held down-while other prices soar as the various trades find necessary.

AILWAY charges always must be a serious item in determining cost of production, but the managements of your railways urge upon your attention this fact; that antiquated, overloaded and wasteful system of distributing goods are much more properly a subject for public anxiety.

Beware of those who would restrict and even strangle the railways simply because control exists there, and is not so convenient in other departments of commercial

RUNNING WATER

Few Pointers on Farming (From the St Thomas, Ont., Times

Journal) E. A. Smith, Rosebery Place, who with Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Pauline Brackin and Edward Smith, has been on a month's visit to Nova Scotia an Prince Edward Island, has at the request of The Times-Journal, written his impressions gained on the trip. He writes:

As requested I am giving you a few outstanding facts that impressed themselves upon me while on my trip to Nova Scotia. About all we hear in this country is that in Nova Scotia they are about one hundred years behind us and live on fish. This I found had changed very much in the past twenty years and Nova Scotia is going ahead very fast and can certainly teach good old Ontario some good things on specializing the growing of fruit and vegetables, particularly potatoes.

The Annapolis Valley, which is especially adapted for the growing of apples, is a wonderful sight this time of the year, as all the orchards have been kept under cultivation: up till the first of July and no weeds or grass of any kind are found. Trees are all properly trimmed and sprayed. Rough buckwheat is sewn in the orchards about July I. It grows very rank and is left, in all cases, to drop down as a fertilizer. No attempt is made to produce any crop in the thousand barrels of apples.


