THE REV. ALEX. MACGILLIVRAY,

HIGH CHIEF RANGER OF ONTARIO.

In this number, the Forester has very great pleasure in giving to its multitude of readers a sketch and portrait of our worthy brother, the High Chief Ranger of Ontario. The writer, who will not have an opportunity of seeing the portrait before it is printed, hopes photographer and engraver will do their work well, and give us a picture worthy of the original. Bro. Macgillivray hails from the north, whence most strong, progressive men come. He was born in the township of Nottawasaga, county of Simcoe, somewhere about the middle of the century, though to look at him one would think he was no more than thirtyfive. His parents, both of whom have passed away, were Scotch, but came to Canada from North Carolina late in the forties. Simcoe was sparsely inhabited then, especially in the porthern part. A lot was bought and a home started a few miles from where the present enterprising town of Collingwood stands.

The early home of the H. C. R. was not without something of the picturesque as to situation. Every morning the door opened to the eastern sun, and overlooked the Georgian Bay. To the west was the Blue mountain, (now cleared up to the very crest, but then covered with a magnificent forest of pine, and oak, and other hardwoods). Amid such surroundings Bro. Macgillivray spent his earlier years, and not having much to do, for some time at least, but grow, he did that well, as anyone can see who looks at his feet and inches. He could speak well when a year old, a habit which he has kept up ever since; and at twelve he could handle "figgers" better than his schoolmaster, as the traditions of the school long afterwards declared. From the common school he went to the Collingwood Grammar school, then under the rectorship of the Rev. Robert Rogers. The master and the pupil liked each other, and the results were in every way advantageous to the pupil, and creditable to the master. At seventeen young Macgillivray qualified as a first-class teacher, and at eighteen was appointed to the mastership of the home school, which he facetiously baptized the "Academy." After three years' successful teaching, he read classics at the Collingwood high school under Mr. Nichols, precollege, Kingston, October, 1870. During his college career he was a good student (though at times suffering from turns of ill-health), and popu-At the Alma Mater Society lar with his fellows. debates he kept himself in practice as a speak r, and never shrank from crossing lances with an opponent. He edited the College Journal for a session, and wrote largely for its columns as well, and spicier pages the Journal certainly has not had since. The advantages of this journalistic experience are now enjoyed by the readers of the Forester. During this theological course he was for one year president of the Missionary Association, and one of the most sanguine and successful student missionaries of his day. He completed his college studies in 1877, and was forthwith called to the old historic congregation of St. Andrew's,

Williamstown, and ordained and inducted, on Sept. 21st of that year, and made all things new, and left them one of the best equipped and organ-

ized congregations in eastern Ontario.

The year 1885 Bro. Macgillivray spent in the United Kingdom as the agent of the General Assembly in presenting to British Presbyterianism the Christian necessities and claims of the French Canadian people, and his energy and address well fitted him for the work. In 1887 he was called to the congregation of St. John's, Brockville, and during the four years of his incumbency there duplicated his Williamstown record, and aft the charge with the membership doubled, a heavy church debt all but extinguished, and the people united, harmonious, and active in Christian work. He accepted, in April, 1891, a call from Bonar church, Toronto, to become their pastor, and was inducted on May 1st, the first minister of the young congregation, a sense of duty alone constraining him to sever the strong tie that united him to Brockville, and to accept, for a time at least, a less stipend than he was receiving. The affection of his former congregations for Ontaria. Chief Ranger was practically manifested in the liberal contributions they had last summer towards the building fund of his present church.

Bro. Macgillivray's first appearance at High Court was at the Kingston Session, in 1889. His preeminent abilities were at once recognized by the High Court, and he was appointed High Chaplain. In 1891, he was elected to the second highest office in the gift of the High Court. As Vice High Chief Ranger he rendered most valuable services to Forestry, and helped very materially to spread the Order still more in Can. a. At the next Session, viz., the last Session held a Barrie, he was elected by acclamation to the higher office in the gift of his brethren. Such rapid promot in is not the usual rule in the mother High Court. In Bro. Macgillivray's case, however, we thought at the time that the High Court had made no mistake in recognizing such commanding talents as he possesses, and the great success which the Order has enjoyed, especially in Ontario, since his election, attests the wisdom of the High Court in having placed Bro. Macgillivray in the High Chief Ranger's chair. We shall be very much mistaken if Ontario does not make the best record yet made, notwithstanding the Supreme Organizers have been sent to other jurisdictions where assistance is more needed. But it is not only as High Chief Ranger that he is serving the Order, but as associate or working editor of THE INDE-PENDENT FORESTER, he is giving most valuable aid to our whole work. We understand also that "The Chief," with that foresight and wisdom for which he is noted, before undertaking any important step, always consults not only his constitutional advisers, but also with his associate editor.

Endowed as he is with a fine business and organizing faculty, a terse and graceful speaker, and most genial in his manner, he frequently relieves "The Chief" of duties in connection with outside appointments at public meetings and other Forestricdemonstrations.

When Bro. Macgillivray joined the Order four years ago, the membership was only some 12,000, and the surplus \$120,000. To-day the membership is over 44,000, and the surplus \$607,000. In the High Court of Ontario the them membership was but a little over 7000; to-day it is close on to 20,-000, and the increase for the last three months greater than at any period in the history of the Order. The High Chief Ranger assures me that there is not a single court to his knowledge out of the 500 in Ontario where unity and harmony do not prevail. Not a single court has disbanded, and the new ones organized average over one a week. It may be noted in passing that three brothers of the H. C. R. are Foresters—Rev. M. Macgillivray, of Chalmers' Church, Kingston; Prof. Macgillivray, of Queen's University, and Capt. Macgillivray, of the 48th Highlanders. Bro. MacGillivray is a member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, the Sons of Scotland and the Independent Order of Good Templars. An ardent temperance advocate, he has contributed with voice and pen to the cause of temperance reform. In 1878 he was married to Miss Alice Glassup, of Kingston, an excellent lady, who has been to her husband a real help-meet in every department of his work, and for this reason, among others, that she is most capable in her own.

Bro. Macgilliviay is a Presbyterian, and is as enthusiastic and capable in the work of his church as in the work of Forestry, and brings to bear upon it the same clear administrative faculty. A former fellow Presbyter was once heard to remark that when a tangled question came before the Presbytery he always felt relieved when Macgillivray got on his feet. As to his politics, the writer is not quite sure. On some matters he has been pronounced "a violent Tory," and on others "an extreme Radical." The truth probably lies midway. When D'Alton McCarthy becomes leader of the party that is ready to follow him, the H.C.R. will probably be found among his staunchest supporters. I close with the words of the elder to the well beloved Gaius, "May our chief prosper, and be in health as his soul prospereth."

Bro. Marshall has completed and instituted in Glasgow his first court for bonnie Scotland—The Scottish Pioneer. His next court is well under weigh, and some of his friends are busy in other parts of Scotland. He writes under date 21st inst: "I had exactly 63 callers about the Order yesterday." On the 23rd he wrote: "My son had to sit up with me until half-past two this morning to assist me to finish up answering letters of inquiry."

We had a capital meeting of Court England's Standard Bearer on the 20th, and received three new members. In this court there are 9 members taking £600 policies, and one taking £400. Some of these would have been £1000, the constitution permitting. There are three other courts in process of formation in London, in addition to those which Bro. Thompson has on the way.

Summing up our present position, we have now five really good courts in active operation, the members of which for the most pari occupy good positions, and about a dozen courts in process of formation. have also aroused public attention most effectively, and our work will be very much easier in extending the Order than it has been to plant it. The formidable difficulties which stood in the way of getting members for a totally unknown organization are beginning to disappear, as our positive exist-ence is being demonstrated. Very many of our newspapers have given favorable comments upon the advent of the Order, and its aims and principles, though some of the Insurance Journals are the opposite of friendly, as might be expected.

Given a dozen men, loyal to the Order, mindful of their official obligations, Rooms when occupied by two will cost from \$1.25 and judicious in their efforts, and the membership of most courts will be doubled in the next six months. Some courts will double their membership in that time. What will be done by some might be done by nearly all. In this connection it is worth remembering that we are able to give Insurance at rates so much lower than the Stock Companies, because our expenses are so much less, and members are secured, in the majority of instances, through the unpaid efforts of the membership, rather than by the salaried organizers. It is a part of the contract between the I.O.F. and every member, that the members will do all in their power "to spread the principles of the Order, and to secure good and worthy men for membership therein." In laboring successfully for this end, three things are attained - the contract with the Order is being kept, the security of the individual member is being increased by the additions of new members, and the benefits of the Order are being conferred on a large number of persons. Another point, but a minor one, that we would press on our subordinate court officer, is the mastering of the ritual. It does not look or sound well to see an officer tied to his manual, and stumbling somewhat painfully over his part. As a matter of comfort to himself, and duty to his court, every officer will thoroughly master his part of the Further, be prompt in your attendritual. Sometimes the absence of a single officer delays the opening of the court. Don't be absent or late when you can avoid it. Let every subordinate court officer enter upon his duties resolved to give Independent Forestry the most prosperous six months in its history.

Our Supreme Court Officers.

World's Fair Notes

The British section of the World's Fair will be decorated in part by some seventy banners bearing respectively the arms of different municipal corporations in the kingdom, such as Londo Dublin, Ayr, Canterbury, etc. The dinburgh, tish Royal Commission invited the corporations to furnish the banners, and some loaned those they possessed, while others had their official insignia reproduced for the occasion

The "White City," as the World's Fair grounds and buildings are termed, has the equipment of a model municipality. It has a combined water capacity of 54,000,000 gallons a day, and will soon have 100,000,000. It has 25 miles of water mains and 291 hydrants. A hundred more will provided. There are 3 steam fire engines, 4 chemical engines, a ladder truck, water tower, 40 hose carts, 26,750 feet of hose, 1,050 hand fire extingnishers, 2,500 fire pails, a steam fire boat, 65 firemen, 150 alarm boxes, 150 patrol telephones, 500 guards, complete electric light and sewerage systems, etc., etc. By the time the Fair opens many of these facilities and equipments will be greatly increased and perfected.

Special days are to be a great feature at the World's Fair. Nearly, if not quite, every state of the Union will have its day, upon which special ex-ercises will be held, and its governor and staff, other state officers, militia and thousands of its distinguished and other citizens will be in attendance. Receptions will be held at the state buildings, respectively, and the governors and others will make speeches. Many musical, civic and secret societies also have made application for a special day upon which to hold exercises peculiar to themselves. Among them are the Masons, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias and Foresters. The We'sh Eistedfodd will have an antire week for a musical celebration. It is believed these special features will draw many additional thousands of visitors to the Fair. Arrangements for these special days are being made by Col. Culp, Secretary of the Ceremonies Committee, which had the Dedication Day exercises in charge.


