## current trade conditions.

## ontakto.

Wie have simply to repeat what we said last week as to conditions and prospects in this province. The hulidays are stall with us, and so is the mild weather, and tull both ate things of the past there will be little change. Some of the mos: extensive operators have withdratun a large propertion of their men from the woods, Cilmour $\mathbb{S}$ Co. and McLachlin bros. having each called in about one lundred. Work in the woods commenced carly, and already a large number of logs have been cut, but until cold weather and snow cume nothon' wan be dune turarals drawing them out from where they were cut. In the meantunc operators are taking stock to ascertain the result of the years work, and to judge what course to pursue in the future.

ULE:HEL ANL NEW HRUNSWICK.
Business here as elsewhere partakes of the holiday quiet. The demand for the castern miarket has kept up weil towards the new year, but the favorable outlook heretofore noted for next season has receivec a damper from the threatened reimposition of a duty on lumber by the United States. The action of Congress is watched with some anxicty. The scason is not favorable for operitions in the woods, and work has been cliecked to some extent by the muld weather.
ukitish columbia.
There is no change to note in conditions on the Pacific coast. luasiness continues yuict and prices are nommal, but there will be an advance after the combination rates come into force, the date of which has been postponed till 1st February. Messrs. R. l'. Rithet's circular, covering November, the last to hand, states that durins that month vessels were more in demand for coas!wise trade, and rates better than for years. The bottom has fallen out of the shingle trade completely. Two months igo dealers were begging for shingles from the manufacturers, now there is no demand whatever, and prices are being cut below the cost of production, to try and futce sales. Eastern dealcis will only buy on margins sufficient to warrant them in holding for spring trade, and most of the mills have shot du:un. Altention is called to the injurious effect of over-drying, which is practiced to reduce weights. If persisted in it wall seriously hurt the demand for British Columbia shingles.

## united states.

The passing of a bill through the House at liashington, re-imposing a duty on
lumber, is the chief feature of the week. It has to pass the Senate and receive the sanction of the l'resident before it become: lan, and before it can go through these stapes it will meet with strong opposition. But there seems to be a probability of its passing. Revenue is waned and this scems to be the most approved method of secturn' it. It will doubtless check to some small debree lumber exportations from Canada, but the consumer in the United States may have to pay the duts, and it is likely the Canadian parliament will re-impose an export duty on logs. The r.tte provided for by the bill is 60 per cent. of at: du:y imposed by the act of Oct. 1,1890 , and it will go into effect if possible on ist January, and remain in force till ist August, 1898 , being considered only a temporary measure. The only business doing the past week is in special lines. Large bills are in order, for the railuay companies. Hard wood for the consuming factories is also in demand, especially oak, which is scarce. High grade white pine is in meagre supply. luut generally speaking the future is very indeterminate, a condition aggravated by the uncertainty in the national finances and the present relations towards Great britain on the Venczuelan question.

## foremis:

There is in England a decided feeling in favor of buying and agents are receiving inquiries fromall parts of the country, though thansactions seem to have been largely confined to the east coast, where a number of contracts for Swedish and White Sea soode have been made. The first auction sale of the year will take place in London, Jan. ind, and this will indicate what disposition there is to buy and how prices are likely to run. Five cangoes from New Lrunswick and one from the St. Lawrence are reported afluat for British ports, also two from Puget Sound, one for Liverpool and one for Queensiown Hardwood is in demand and there seems to be a field here for Canadian hardwood dealess to cultisate. A correspondent of the Canada Llumbrman has suggested that the government should send one or "wo commissioners to England to inquite anto the possibilities of the matake, and muth migt be a good de., but the probability is that the government would say it was the business of the dealers to find a market. At all events $1 t$ is a matter for the Dommonand nut the Onatio soremment to deal with, as it comes under the head ol trade and commerce. Doubtless much more Canadian hadwood might be sold in Great Britain, France and
other foreign countries, if the trade was properly cultivated. Fraser \& Co,'s last Australian circular states that stocks in tha: colony are sufficient for some time, and there is not likely to be any change in prices. An exception may be made in spruce deals, for which there is a good prospective demand.

## STOCKS AND PRICES.

The mills of Miller \& Woodman, at Spar Cove, and Charles Miller, at Pokiok, have closed for the season.

The lumber cut on Salmon siver, $N$ B., this winter, will fall short of the usual cut by about two and-a-half millions of feet.
Mr. Wn. Barnes, of Kings Co., N. B., has $100,000 \mathrm{ft}$. of spuce lumber, which he intends shipping to St. John as soon as hauling will permit.
The portable mill of White, Fownes \& White, St. Martins, N. B., is getting a new boiler and will saw during the winter for Mr. Joseph H. Bradshaw.

Lumbering operations will be conducted by Alderman Mc Mfulkin back of South Bay, Que. A gany of 10 ol 12 will be sent out shortly to get out cedar timber.

The new millin the Eastern Townships, owned by Mr. Ceo. Van Dyke, Hon. W. B. Ives and Hon. K. H. Pope, will be ready to turn out lumber when the season opens.
Messrs. Seale ind Boyle have a contract to get out a mialion feet of logs for G. O. Buchanan at Lardo, B. C. The steamer made a special trip from Kalso to take over their supplies and men.
The Rathbun Co.'s cut of ties and posts for the season was 100,000 . When shipping from their mill they loaded at the rate of over 5,000 ties per day, and during the week about 100 carloads were sent out. Three timber berths were sold at the crown lands office at Fredericton, N. B., lin: week. Competition for two of them was quite sharp. A berth on Little River, Sunbury count; went to John Young at $\$ 78$ per mile, and another on Canaan river, to Randolph \& Baker, for $\$ 76$ per mile. Fred Hale secured a berth at Newburg at the upset price.
A very large business is expected on the DuMoine this winter. There are a number of shanties in operation at Big Lake which require a large amount of supplies to be teamed in. The Hawkesbury Lumber Co. have three shanties and quite a number of jobbers on their extensive limits. Bronson \& Weston, Booth, Eddy, and Mason \& Son, also have shaptins.
Gilmour \& Hughson, lumbermen, of Hull, are said to have already withdrawn more than one hundred employees from their camps in the Upper Gatineasu. Reports from the sh.unties say that the cut so far has been unusually large, and that already enough. logs are taken out to keep the mills running next season, as their cut is likely to be even smaller than this year unkess market conditions take a turn for the better. Operations in the woods began very early this year, and to this fact is due the present advanced state of the work up the river.

Messrs Schultz Bros., who do the largest planing mill, retail and wholesale lumber business in $13 r a n t$ ford, tell us that they have had one of the most successful seasons in years. They do a contracting business and have supplied and built some large buildings this year, among the largest being the new Expositor building
and Mr. Wim. Schultz's resulence Prices and Mr. Wim. Schultz's resilence. Prices have been low both for lumber and contracts, as the smaller contractors have a
mania for cutting prices to secure a job mania for cutting prices to secure a job. They think it a little early to predict what spring will bring forth, but hope for the
best.
E. Todd, manufacturer of and dealer in lumber of all kinds, reports the past season good. Prices, though not high, were fair. He has shipped 300,000 feet of choice white and red oak, pine and bass. wood lately to American nuarkets. Pine is in good demand. Choice rock elm for bicycle rims has a good marke:. Red birch brings a good pice. Mr. Todd will put in a large stock of hardwood logs if the winter proves suitable.
Wm. Edwards reports that business has been very sood in the retail department and fair in the wholesale trade. He bas the city contract for lumber for sidewalks and supplied $400,000 \mathrm{ft}$. this year. He supplied the dyke last year with heavy timbers. Prices have teen very fair. Trade is quiet now. Cood pine sells at $\$ 15$. Mr. Edwards buys standing timber, sends portable mills into the woods and cuts the lumber there, and ships it in car lots to American dealers. His business is increasing every year. Spring trade will be brisk.
J. R. Van Fleet reports prices good, trade a little slow now, but his business increasing yearly. The season's trade has been guod, mostly in pine and hem. lock. He has just made a very lange sale to one of his regular customers outside the city. Spring trade will open as well as last year and much building is talked cr.
The Waterous Engine Works Co.'s new buildings are being rapidly completed under the direction of Mr. Brick, supt. of construction. The firm will move into their new quarters in January. The buildings will azcommodate 500 men and can be easily enlarged.

## A duty on luyana.

On Thursday last, as a temporary measure, to provide revenue, the House of Representatives at Washingion passed a bill, fathered by Hon. Geo. M. Curtis, of Iowa, a sash and doormaker, re-imposing a duty on lumber. If the Senate passes it and the President gives it his sanction, it will become law at once. It provides that there shall be levied and paid on lumber and other articles desipnated in
paragraphs 67410683 of the act paragraphs 674 to 683 of the act of 1894 ,
a duty equivalent to 60 per cent of a duty equivalent to 60 per cent. of the duties imposed by the act of 1890 , and subject to all the conditions and limitations of said last named act, but pulp any country imposing an export duty on any country imposing an export duty on
logs, save boks, pulp mod, etc., the full
duties provided by the act of 18 gn shall be levied. Wool shares with wood this re-imposition of dutv.
As will be seen, the duty is lower than that under the McKinley act, but if Cana da, in retaliation, imposes an export duty on lons, the full duties provided for by the McKinley act will be put on.

## the great lumarr comerna.
