FIRST-YEAR FIREMEN FIND SALARY OBSTACLE

Department is Losing Good Men Who Find \$8.90 a Week Pretty Small Pay.

Now it's the fire department which is feeling the stress of the "good times" prevailing in the labor market. Within a week or so three "first 331. World Office, Hamilton. year" men, who have joined the department within a very short time, have dropped out to accept better pay-

And when you come to think of it, it does seem a pity that this city of 275,000 people doesn't pay more than \$450 a year for a "first year" fireman. With the 5 per cent. deducted for the benefit fund, it means that the fireman draws \$17.81 every fortnight. When, as in one case, a man has to support a wife and two children on that amount-well, it doesn't let one store up for himself riches where rust

and moth may corrupt.

At present there are five grades in the department, going by years, and paying \$450, \$550, \$650, \$750 and \$850. paying \$450. \$550, \$650, \$750 and \$850.
"I am strongly in favor of abolishing
the present first-grade salary, and letting a man start at \$550 a year," says



IMPORT SKILLED MEN AND FARM LABORERS II

C.M.A. Executive Says Government Agents Discourage This Class of Immigration.

"That the Dominion Government be respectfully urged to encourage, thru its present immigration officers, and by the appointment of special representatives for this purpose, the immigration, not only of mechanics, where opportunities are known to exist, and thus assist in building up our national industries.

This is the form of a resolution adopted by the executive of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at its meeting yesterday. The preamble of the resolution set out that, owing to the rapid growth of new settlements and industries, mining camps, enormous railway and other construction in progress and in prospect, a constantly creasing number of skilled and unskilled men from the older parts, who are being needed in the factories as well as on the farms, is being withdrawn, and the employers are prevented by the Alien Labor Act from bringing workmen from the United States, while the government immigration agents abroad not only do not encourage, but in effect discourage, the immigration of skilled artisans Trade With Japan.

Thru Harry Cockshutt of Brantford, who presided, the association has been favored with a communication from Earl Grey, calling attention to the valuable trade opportunities Canada is losing in Japan by reason of the failure of Canadian firms to keep competent agents on the ground to solicit orders. Earl Grey is convinced from a number of cases that have been brought to his attention that nearly all the business Canada gets comes thru United States houses, and then only because these houses are themselves short of stock and unable to fill their orders. The In some quarters it is believed the association is to investigate the subject very carefully.

Buenos Ayres Swindle. A confidential circular is being sent to all members, advising them of the scheme adopted by certain parties in Buenos Ayres to swindle Canadian manufacturers. Since the announcement appeared in the press some few days ago on this subject, a number of others have been heard from, indicating that plans were laid to work the scheme on a much larger scale than was originally supposed by the association.





IN AND AROUND LONDON SEEN BY A JOURNALIST

SATURDAY MORNING

Description of Places Which Will Be Visited by The World's Eleven Tourists.

M. Mourey, the French journalist, some of whose London impressions The World gave last week, spent part of a Sunday at Richmond, one of the charming suburban river resorts our party will visit. He says:

"Sunday, in the summer-time, among the ancient trees of Richmond Park, and by the sluggish waters of the Thames, waters which seem to reflect the grey of winter skies, reminds one of similar Sundays in suburban Paris; only at Richmond pleasure is taken more seriously, with less recklessness, less Bohemianism, more restraint. This intensely keen perception of the beau-ties of nature, this ever ready appreciation of fine scenery, are altogether wanting in the French character. That English love of the country is not as ours; but real and deep, a devotion, a religion, and to the enjoyment of which is added the sweetness of unlimited freedom. One understands their passion for the open air for simple joys and healthy tiredness.

"Nor is one disturbed by those noisy, rollicking idlers who, on Sunday, dese-crate the woods of Saint Germain, Compiegne, Fontainebleau, or the lovely banks of the Seine and Marne. A Parisian in the country either has a mocking, undevotional air about him, or he looks cynical and bored, out of his element, and indifferent, according to his class or position; but you will look in vain for such an expresison on the face of an Englishman. The weird beauty, the suggestion of sadness, the overwhelming power and grandeur of these vast stretches of prairie and forest, stretches that appear yet more vast thru veils of river mist and from which the curtain of mystery is never lifted—such are the scenes that touch hearts of Englishmen and women with feelings that know no satiety.

"And what better rest could man have after six days of strife and struggle, of excitement and labor and worry? No preparations are needed for this scenery. Human souls can communicate direct with the everlasting life of trees and sky and water. And in the pure, fresh air one is sensible of the pleasure derived from sound muscles and the healthy exercise of one's physical powers. Deer wander fearlessly among the bracken, and roes stop to peer at you from behind immense oak trunks. And so you hardly bestow a sigh of regret on Asnieres or Bougival.

Of Sunday in Hyde Park, he says: "Above the noise of the numerous vehicles that roll by, the voice of the Sunday preacher rings forth in high, vibrating inspired on the Marble Arch side of Hyde Park. In the midst of the ttle country-side peopled with groups of pious or curious listeners, calls to one's mind the days of the early Christians. The simple beauties of nature are in harmony and sweetness, like unto those of our dear Puvis de Chavannes, with its meadows of rich, green grass, which the grey autumnal mists seem to transform into pale lakes. The voices of the singers, the ardent tones of the preacher, who seems to exercise over them a sort of sacred charm, harmonize perfectly with this work of animated art, this eternal beauty of tree and fruitful earth and changing sky."

Here is his description of the South Kensington Natural History Museum: 'This massive building, which contains one of the most wonderful natural history collections, resembles in its outward appearance a cathedral, a forti-fied castle, a station and an exhibition, The entrance is flanked by two gigantic towers, whence spring detachments crowned by similar towers, the decoraive appearance of the whole producing an impression of magnificent grotesque ness. 

BONDS AND GOLD FOUND

Former Proprietor Thought to Have Been Murdered - Court Holds Bonds for Relatives.

CLEVELAND, May 17 .- Erie Raiload bonds worth \$116,740 and \$575 in blackened gold coins were found yeserday when the rusted tin box which Contractor B. W. Hollingsworth re-Contractor B. W. Hollingsworth recently unearthed in the ruins of the century-old Ohio City Inn at 2811 Detroit-avenue, was forced open.

The original owner of the treasure was George C. Moran, who mysteriously disappeared in 1874. A heap of charred bones found several days before the box was dug up by Hollingsworth in a bricked in fireplace now

fore the box was dug up by Hollings-worth in a bricked in fireplace now seems to substantiate the theory then held that Moran was murdered.

The Erie Radiroad Co. made a systematic effort to locate the bonds between 1876 and 1879. Practically every newspaper in the country carried advertisements of the lost bonds, which were of the issue of 1859. Originally they had a par value of \$40,000. Accumulated interest, dividends and market rises brought their value up to \$116,740.

Because he was to have all the material in the building as compensation for tearing it down, Hollingsworth claimed the entire contents of the box. He finally compromised with the present owner of the property and divided the gold with him.

The bonds have been placed in the custody of United States Judge Taylor. The latter will hold them for five years. During that time a search will be made for Moran's heirs, if any are living. If none are found the bonds will revert to Hollingsworth.



In view of the situation as it exists and of the probability, which is almost a certainty, of the extraordinary in-crease in population of this city in the next ten years, it would be a mistake on the part of this board to attempt by its order to remedy the difficulty complained of, by ordering additional cars to be operated upon the existing lines. The only adequate remedy is more cars and more lines.


