NOTHING BUT GOOD NEWS TO GIVE OUT PRESIDENT MCKINLEY STILL IMPROVES

Doctors All Say the Distinguished Patient is On the Road to Recovery—Stomach Performs Its Functions and There is No Sign of Inflammation or Other Trouble—Takes Freely of Nourishment and Relishes It—Change of Bed.

Milburn House, Buffalo, Sept. 11.—The following bulletin was issued by the President's physicians at 9 a.m.:
The President rested comfortably during the night. Dressed about the usual time. The dressing of the wound made last night. His stomach tolerates the beef juice well and it is taken with great satisfaction. His condition this morning is excellent. Pulse 116, temperature 100.2.

The following bulletin was issued at 3:30 p.m.:
The President continues to gain and the wound is becoming more healthy. The nourishment taken into the stomach is being gradually increased. Pulse 120, temperature 100.2.

The following was issued at 10 a.m.:
The President's condition continues favorable. Blood count corroborates clinical evidence of absence of any blood poisoning. He is able to take more nourishment and relishes it. Pulse 120, temperature 100.4.

ALL CONDITIONS FAVORABLE
Buffalo, Sept. 11.—The condition of the President continued favorable throughout the day, and nothing occurred to shake the faith of the attending surgeons and physicians who expressed that he will recover. Today two more doors were locked against the recovery of the President. The danger of blood poisoning was pronounced. The physicians are all agreed that no attempt should be made to take the President to Washington. The probability of an oppressive hot spell in the Capital City remains.

EMMA GOLDMAN, QUEEN OF ANARCHISTS, HAS A GLOAMING PROSPECT BEFORE HER

Network of Evidence Being Woven About Her Which Seems Likely to Connect Her With the Attempt on the President's Life—Nests of the Anarchists in Various Cities Unearthed by Detectives—Miss Isaak Tells of Emma's Visit to Chicago.

Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 11.—The police have taken the preliminary steps necessary to secure the extradition of Emma Goldman, the anarchist leader, under arrest at Chicago for alleged complicity in the plot to kill President McKinley, and it is understood an application for her will go forward to the Illinois authorities just as quickly as the formalities can be complied with. Other than signifying their intention the police kept silent as to the course they plan to follow, and the exact nature of the charges to be made against the world woman has not yet been disclosed.

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PLANNED BY EMMA GOLDMAN

That is the Opinion Now Shared by a Good Many People in the City of Buffalo.

THE WOMAN WAS THERE AUG. 31.

That Was the Day the Assassin Said He Arrived There—Plot Hatched in Buffalo.

Buffalo, Sept. 11.—The Evening Times says:

Why did Emma Goldman, once a sewing woman in Rochester, make such extensive trips about the country, on mere pleasure bent. Her own statement indicates that she had been in Buffalo twice since July 12. That date was about the time that President's Day at the Pan-American Exposition was fixed for Sept. 6. She says that, since July 12, she saw Czolgosz, and it was with Abram and Marie Isak. Local information points to the position that Goldman was in Buffalo on the Saturday before the President was shot. That was the day on which Czolgosz says he arrived in Buffalo.

Is it not reasonable to believe that Goldman planned the thing; that she saw Reds in St. Louis, and did not find the man to do the deed; that she turned to the Isaks, the one of whom is the editor of the organ of the Free Society, to find out who could be secured to commit the crime; that they produced Czolgosz; that, with Miss Isak, she came to Buffalo to look over the Red and the location of the buildings at the Exposition; that she saw Czolgosz here at the time of his arrival?

That is the theory the authorities are working on. They believe that the Goldman trips as a saleswoman were merely blind to cover up her plans to do away with the President.

CONSPIRACY HATCHED.

That the conspiracy to kill the President was hatched in Buffalo can be read between the lines of statements credited to Emma Goldman after her arrest in Chicago yesterday. Those same statements indicate that the incitator came from out of town. Here are excerpts from her talk in Chicago just after her arrest.

"I met the man they say shot the President in Chicago on July 12. I wouldn't know him if I saw him again. I did not learn his name, but I do remember afterward seeing his name published in Free Society's newspaper, which was being made of every sewer that underlies the city, for it is known that in one of the papers of the conspiracy, the details of the conspiracy, and the names of those concerned with Czolgosz upon the plot, together with an outline of its ramifications.

TRIED TO DESTROY PAPERS.

In his confession, Czolgosz has told of his attempt to destroy the written evidence of the conspiracy. He has said that time did not permit him to burn the papers, as he desired. Czolgosz knew that if he was to meet the President of the United States at the Temple Hotel, the Pan-American Exposition he had to be in line early.

SOME THINGS FOUND OUT.

Last night this much was authentically known regarding the plot to assassinate the President: (1) The conspiracy extends thru the following groups of anarchists: (a) Chicago—No. 615 Carroll-avenue, headquarters of the Isak family and its associates; (b) New York—No. 100 West 12th-street, headquarters of Emma Goldman while in that city; (c) Cleveland, O.—No. 12 Homer-street, home of Leon F. Czolgosz; (d) Buffalo, N.Y.—The scene of the attempt on the life of the President; (e) That since the 1st of July Emma Goldman has visited and lectured at all the above points with well-known anarchists.

A COMBINED ATTACK.

Washington, Sept. 11.—Minister Bowen at Caracas has reported to the Navy Department that it was rumored that the Colombian vessels in an attack on the Rio Hacha. SEARCHING IN THE SEWERS

Czolgosz Lets it Slip That He Threw a Bundle of Documents into an Opening.

SECRET SERVICE MEN ON A HUNT.

A Lot of Evidence to Show That Emma Goldman Was Not the Only Accomplice.

Buffalo, Sept. 11.—The Courier says: it was learned, upon reliable authority, last night, that the confession of Czolgosz mentions only one name, that of Emma Goldman, but embraces six headquarters of Anarchy in Chicago, Allegheny, Patterson, and several in Buffalo.

Several detectives, with the aid of laborers, were searching Buffalo sewers yesterday for papers which Czolgosz confesses that he threw away. Leon F. Czolgosz has confessed to the police that his attempt upon the life of President McKinley was the result of a conspiracy in which many besides himself had a part. So far as can be learned, Czolgosz has refused to mention any name except that of Emma Goldman, but papers of a confidential nature, which, if discovered, will lay bare the entire conspiracy, and will result in wholesale arrests and prosecutions.

Acting under instructions from Secretary Root, the police will refuse the details of the confession made by Czolgosz, but in Superintendent Bull's office, last night, it was stated that if the would-be assassin were not secured, a search for the organized secret society will be made, which would inevitably result in serious disorders. Chief Constable remains his show of bravado, and announces his determination of entering a plea of guilty when he is brought to court.

Lucky Restraint.

Society may well congratulate itself that the plot to assassinate the President was not stamped out by the frenzied mob that sought to kill him a moment after he had fired the second bullet at President McKinley. Had he then been put to death there would have been no way of bringing his accomplices to justice. It is now practically assured that at least a modicum of justice will be meted out to those who, with Czolgosz, sought the overthrow of law and order.
