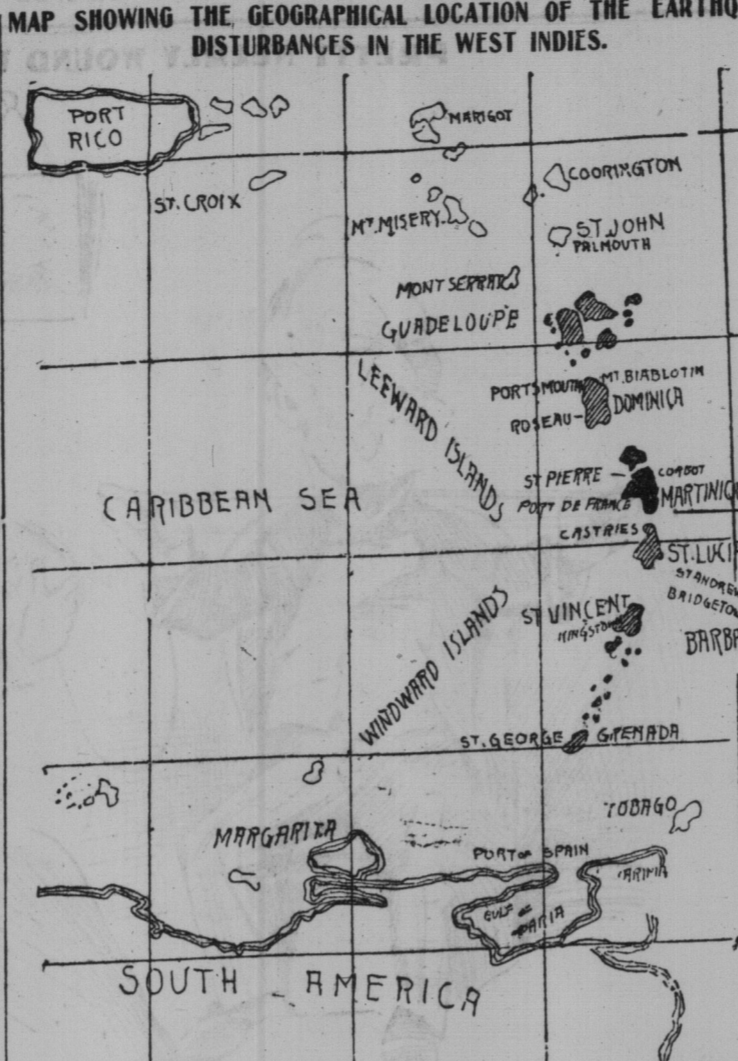

50,000 AMERICANS COMING

Winnipeg Land Owner Declares United States' Population is Overflowing.

BUT THEY DO NOT BECOME CITIZENS

J. H. Haslam Predicts Greater Increase in Immigration From the Dakotas.

Chicago, May 11.—"Fifty thousand Americans will move from the United States this year to northwest Canada," says J. H. Haslam of Winnipeg, who has been here several days on business. "They will do this not because they dislike the United States, but because an extraordinary land movement is taking place and it is affecting our farming population living between the one hundredth parallel and the State of Ohio."

"Your overflow population is after our good Canadian farming lands, and to effect this movement may have in Americanizing northwest Canada promises to be far-reaching."

Mr. Haslam is the largest individual land owner, probably of Canada. "I will admit," says Mr. Haslam, "that we Canadians have been a little slow. Our development has not been markedly fast until recently. We have not cordially welcomed Englishmen, but the American we like to take in and make one of us."

"For years in the region west of Winnipeg the American farming implements, machinery and other manufactures have been rapidly taken by our people. Your trade with us last year was \$110,000,000 and ours \$45,000,000. "Northern Illinois farmers, Iowa farmers, farmers from Southern Minnesota, are buying our unimproved lands at \$4 to \$8 an acre or taking improved lands at \$25 and \$40 an acre."

"They are bringing American push and ingenuity to Canadian soil, and the heavy influx is likely to change not only the physical features of the Canadian Northwest, but political conditions and economic conditions."

"These new settlers are not becoming Canadian citizens at present. That will come to a certain extent after a while. But they are bringing American money and courage and brains to join with the courage and brains of the pioneers of our country, and the movement is literally by train loads without any particular encouragement from the railway companies."

"It ought to bring about a closer bond of sympathy between this country and Canada and lead to reciprocity. The balance of trade is in your favor. It must remain so, and the interests of the two lands, while under different governments, are much the same."

"Winnipeg is to become the St. Petersburg of this continent—the great city of the North. It is modern in every sense of the word and growing rapidly. Even the we lack railway competition and the railways have been slow in grasping the situation, our growth has been healthy and little short of phenomenal."

"The country surrounding us is as large as Austria, France and Germany, and practically in the same latitude, and our winters are not severe, our summers delightful. We raise magnificent

potatoes, the best wheat on earth, and experiments with corn at Fargo indicate that we may yet have that cereal."

"We can grow apples, we have the best timber, as much iron as there is in Northern Minnesota and soft coal of excellent quality. Our growing lands are also rich and we export cattle to England."

AMERICANS IN CANADA.

New York Tribune: The present influx of Americans into Western Canada has raised the question in Canada, whether such a movement should be welcomed. Here and there in Eastern Canada, the fear is expressed that the new settlers may make trouble by raising the cry of annexation to the United States. In the Province of Quebec, American immigration is deprecated for another reason. For some years it has been the hope of the French-Canadians finally to outnumber the English-speaking Canadians, and thus wrest the scepter of political leadership from them. But that hope, of course, will be doomed to disappointment if any large number of Americans settle in Western Canada.

In Western Canada itself, however, which has the most vital interest in the question, there is only one opinion in regard to American immigration. It is welcomed by everybody and by all parties. A correspondent of the Toronto Globe, writing from Regina, the capital of the Northwest Territories, says that the whole of the great territory between Regina and its boundary will undoubtedly be occupied by immigrants from the United States. But this fact does not at all disturb the territorial government or the people. On the contrary, they are decidedly cheerful over the prospect. "For the present," says the Hon. F. W. G. Haultain, the Premier of the Northwest Territories, "we welcome all the Americans who wish to find homes in the Canadian West, and regard them as most desirable settlers." "For the future," he says, "I believe that the government of the country in which they have chosen to make their homes, the Winnipeg Free Press takes the same view, and ridicules the idea that they will take out naturalization papers before they are long in the country, so that they may have some voice in the government of the country. It is not their own principles by conspiring to raise a foreign flag."
