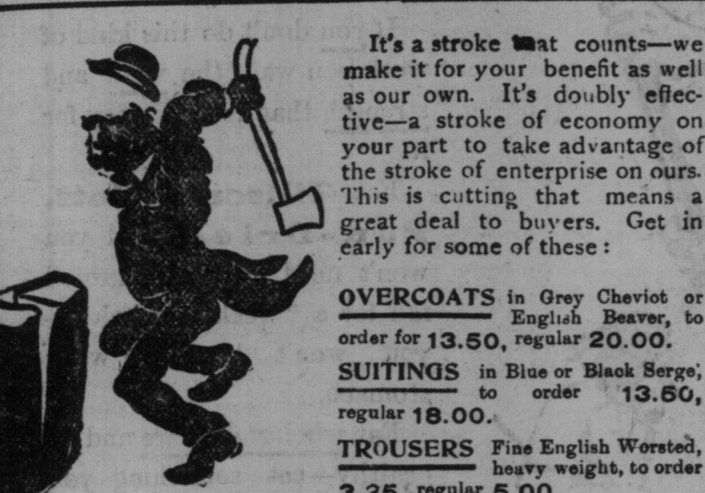

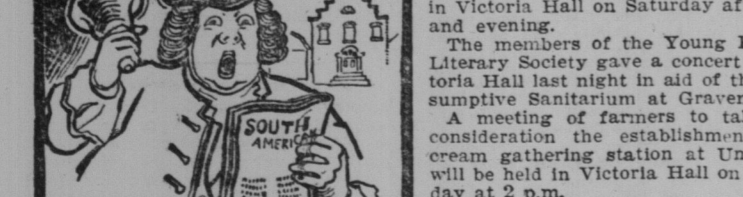

If such a ridiculous custom could be abolished it would be a great relief. It would be a splendid thing if common sense could only prevail in the matter of treating and a custom adopted whereby a man would not feel mean by declining to accept offers of hospitality. The treating system does seem to rest upon a mistaken idea of a social obligation.

FLUM PUDDINGS FOR ALL.

English Makers Sending Out Tons of Their Product.

London, Dec. 8.—With the approach of Christmas, the plum pudding industry of England—which so far has not been called upon to repel any American invasion other than that made up of consumers—is in its glory. From London tons of festive pudding find their way all over the world. The Oxford-street shop of the best known makers of plum pudding has orders for the sending of pudding to every quarter. Many are ordered as Christmas presents for friends in the United States. The puddings are packed in tins and sent by parcel post as a rule. Rout and a camping party in East Gwillimbury on July 9 last. Frederick Lloyd, who is said to have been Nezar's accomplice in the theft, has pleaded guilty and is now serving a term. Nezar, when accused of stealing the tackle, it is said, offered \$10 as restitution. The case will be concluded to-day with the Judge's charge.

The balance goes to Dr. Natives. Thomas Bates, a shoemaker, died last month, having willed 177 Bleecker-street to his son, Charles William Bates. The property is valued at \$2475, with a mortgage of \$100 on it. The will of Susanna Coffee of Newmarket leaves \$100 to St. John's Church, Tecumseth Township. The balance of the estate, aggregating \$200,000, is divided among her near relatives.

TWO BRAVE ONES RETURN.

Wilkinson and Shelton of 2nd C.M.R. Arrive at Halifax.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 8.—Among the returning passengers from Liverpool were Wilkinson and Shelton, two 2nd C.M.R. men, who made a name for themselves in South Africa. Wilkinson, cornered with a party, used his rifle until his ammunition was all gone, and then he broke the rifle, so that it would be no good to the Boers. Shelton also saw hot service, and was wounded in the leg. Wilkinson lost an eye and had one of his arms disabled. Sergt. Malr. Mallin, 2nd C.M.R., and Ptes. Holmes, Webb, Davis and Mitchell, 5th C.M.R., who remained in Africa after their regiment set off for home, also came by the Cornhillian, having found that South Africa offered no inducements to them.

HARRY MCGALMONT, M.P., DEAD.

Leaves a Fortune of \$20,000,000—Drops Dead Suddenly.

London, Dec. 8.—Harry McCalmont, the well-known sportsman and Conservative member of parliament for Newmarket, dropped dead to-day as he was leaving his residence, No. 11 St. James' Square, S.W. Mr. McCalmont apparently was in his usual health as he passed out of the door, but before he reached the sidewalk he fell, and died almost instantaneously, supposedly of heart disease.

DEPUTIES' SECONDS CONFERRED.

Refused to Reveal Nature of Their Decision—Not Was Lamentable.

Paris, Dec. 8.—The seconds of Deputy Sauton and Minister of Justice Valle (who exchanged heated remarks in the Chamber of Deputies on Saturday) met to-day in the Chamber of Deputies, and after a conference lasting an hour, separated to confer with their principals. They refused to disclose the nature of their decision. Saturday's riotous scene in the chamber continues to occupy the attention of the public and press here. Sober second thought is treating the incident as a lamentable reflection on the parliamentary institution of the republic, which is certain to discredit and which may possibly overthrow the present parliament system.

Blondin Trial Goes On.

On Day of Wife's Murder He Left Work Earlier Than Usual.

Boston, Dec. 8.—The Blondin wife murder trial was resumed to-day. George B. Farrington, cashier of the establishment where Blondin was employed, showed slips from the time register indicating that Blondin left just before 4 o'clock on April 27, 1901, the day on which Mrs. Blondin is believed to have been killed. He usually left at 5.30 p.m. Frank M. Burnett, a self-workman, testified to inquiring about Mrs. Blondin on May 5, and was told she had gone to nurse a sister. After the government had introduced certified copy of the marriage certificate of Wilfrid Blondin and Emma Riley, Mrs. Lucia Blondin was called. She was married to the defendant in 1890, she said, and lived with him about 10 years. He left her about two years ago.

His First Public Act.

Coroner Malcolm Crawford, 22 Cottingham-street, the latest appointee to the city's staff of coroners, issued his first warrant for an inquest on Monday. The warrant, which was subsequently withdrawn, was for an inquiry into the death of Julius Kamm, who died in St. Michael's from a bullet wound inflicted by himself at his home, 18 Davenport-road, on Saturday.

Five Deaths in Chicago.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—About three inches of snow and zero weather rule here. Five fatalities have been reported, and numerous cases of desatiation, incidental to the sudden drop, have been relieved.

CANADA IN THE REAR.

British Exports Small—Involuntary Laws Are Feared.

London, Dec. 8.—The St. James' Gazette publishes an article on the subject of commercial Americanization of Canada. Once graduated, they would be equipped for the service of the government, of individuals owning timber limits, of pulp companies, and of farmers and others desirous of beautifying or re-timbering their lands.

If \$5000 will enable the University of Toronto to establish a school of forestry, the government should hasten its legislation in making the appropriation. ENLARGING THE CITY LIMITS. A CHAIR OF FORESTRY. The scheme includes the foundation of a school of forestry along the general lines of that at Yale, and would, for the present, entail an outlay of only \$5000 a year on the part of the University. The instruction given would include a regular winter course in Toronto, a short summer session at the Guelph Agricultural College, and practical work in a tract of forest set apart for the purpose by the government.

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WINTER FAIR AT GUELPH Great Activity at the Buildings in Preparation of an Auspicious Opening.

More Accommodation This Year. Consequently the Field of Entries is Much Larger Than Previous Years.

Guelph, Dec. 8.—All is in readiness for the opening of the Winter Fair. The accommodation of the large building will be fully taxed. In the poultry department alone the entries exceed by 400 those of last year.

The extra space afforded by the recent enlargement of the building was very necessary. The extension of the show ring, and the new galleries in the lecture room, and the cut in the south side of the building add appreciably to the facilities for the fair.

Over 300 couples of poultry were unloaded by one of the express companies today. Many sheep have been placed in their quarters, and all the dairy cattle are in place. Beef cattle and hogs have been coming in all day.

As usual, the show ring will be most in evidence. Nearly all the old familiar names are to be found in the catalogue, and there are many new ones. There is a big field in the various classes.

A lively competition is promised in the dressed carcasses, pure bred and grade or cross.

Sheep Entries Large. The entries in sheep are very large and comprise exhibits from some of the most noted flocks in Canada. The Ontario breed, as usual, well represented. In the ewe class under one year there are alone sixteen entries. There are also entries in Lincoln and Oxford, as well as in Shropshires and Southdowns and the miscellaneous classes.

An unusually good exhibition of swine will be one of the features of the show. It will include the best Berkshire, Yorkshire, Chester White, Poland, China, Essex, Tamworth and other classes.

Activity at Building. The fair building is the scene of unprecedented activity. Already many exhibitors are arriving, and there is promise that the attendance will eclipse all previous records. The trains to-day brought many visitors to attend the meetings of the Ontario Experimental Union, which opened at the Ontario Agricultural College this afternoon. The union has a long program of subjects to discuss at sessions which will continue till Thursday night.

Among those who have already arrived are T. G. Raynor, president of the union; F. W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, and A. McNeill, Fruit Inspector.

W. E. Skinner, manager of the International Live Stock Exposition at Chicago, and Samuel T. White, also of Chicago, a very prominent American authority on cattle and sheep carcasses, will be present at the opening of the fair. Mr. White will be judge of the two classes named.

The church and social problems. Address of Rev. Alex. Sutherland before Political Science Club.

Rev. Alexander Sutherland delivered an address on Monday afternoon before the Political Science Club of Toronto University. Dr. S. Morley Wickham was in the chair. The subject of Dr. Sutherland's address was the church of to-day and social problems.

He expressed the firm conviction that the present-day church should deal rather less with the subject of theology and more with the ethics of the New Testament. Ministers should preach in season and out of season the gospel of charity and become close students of economics, and thus be able to speak with authority on that subject.

Dr. Sutherland thought, was one of the greatest. If not the greatest barrier to the settlement of social problems, Prof. Sutherland moved a vote of thanks to the speaker.

EXPORT DUTY ON PULPWOOD. E. B. Eddy will interview Quebec Government Next Week.

E. B. Eddy of the Eddy Company was in town yesterday attending the quarterly meeting of the Manufacturers of Paper Bags and Wooden Ware. Mr. Eddy is chairman of a committee appointed to wait on the Quebec and Federal governments asking that an export duty of \$4 a cord be placed on pulpwood.

Mr. Eddy will do a great deal for Canada in increasing the production and sale of pulpwood. He is a settler with a large tract of land on the north shore of the Ottawa river, and he is a member of the Ottawa Pulpwood Association.

In the last 14 years there has been a net export of 1,000,000 cords of pulpwood from the Ottawa valley. This is a large amount, and it is the opinion of the committee that if the export duty were increased to \$4 a cord, it would be the means of bringing thousands of dollars into the treasury of the Ottawa valley.
