SEVEN GIG VALUES AT A LUMP

Within 400 Miles of Toronto There is a "Poor Man's" Mining Area Which is Attracting Prospectors From all Parts of the Continent.

Just a trifle over 400 miles from Toronto, there appears to be developing a mining boom south of Ontario, perhaps the most ever known in Canada. 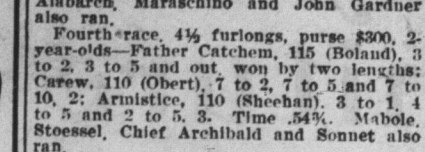

On taxes payable on the 10th of July, if paid before the 10th of August, one-half of one per cent. After 10th August five per cent. will be added. On taxes payable on the 11th of September, if paid before the 11th of October, one-half of one per cent. After 11th October five per cent. will be added.

Failure to pay such instalment or tax as it becomes due not only forfeits the right to a reduction of taxes, but brings the parties under the penalty of the Assessment Law, which enacts that, in case any party fails to pay the same on or before the day specified, he shall be liable to the payment of the same, together with the said percentage charge of five per cent. to be paid on or before the 11th of October, or on the 10th day of November, and not paid on or before the day or days herein fixed for payment, the following percentages only shall be charged and payable:

On taxes payable on the 10th of July, if paid before the 10th of August, one-half of one per cent. After 10th August five per cent. will be added. On taxes payable on the 11th of September, if paid before the 11th of October, one-half of one per cent. After 11th October five per cent. will be added.

The exports of domestic merchandise were valued at \$598,448,487, as compared with \$495,889,298, those of foreign merchandise being \$131,619,588, as compared with \$131,027,304.

Editor World: I have been much interested in the futile efforts of the Toronto council to compel the Toronto Street Railway Company to accept the instructions of the city engineer.

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Will Not Be Satisfied With a Lower Fare Only. "Metropolitan" Must Be Prepared to Contribute to the Maintenance of the Roadway.

The World presents a number of interviews with those directly interested in the proposal of the Radial Railway Co. to double track a portion of the Metropolitan road.

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Metropolitan did arise, but changed when they expected to join with the C.P.R. at North Toronto; therefore the present and at all times in the future until settled is, "change your gauge, Metropolitan, back to that which originally had and which the Toronto Street Railway always will likely have, and work up a contract to build a radial railway business suitable for the localities through which it runs."

New Conditions Necessary. "As a citizen of North Toronto," said Councillor B. J. Douglas, "I do not want to oppose any progressive movement, but if the proposal to lay another track on Yonge-street is carried out, it must be under different conditions."

Councillor Brownlow, North Toronto, said: "One thing is certain in the event of the Metropolitan obtaining any concessions. The Town of North Toronto will demand some equivalent."

W. J. Thompson, principal of Deer Park public school, and an active member of the Ratepayers' Association, said: "The traffic at the southern end of the road demands a double track. Of this there can be no doubt."

Councillor George Henry said: "The proposal can scarcely fail of one object, namely, the bringing of Deer Park into the city. The question has never been brought officially before the York Township council, and until this is done I can only express my own views on the project as it means a double track in the centre of the road and a flange rail. A feature to greatly relieve the congestion on Yonge-street is the opening of new roads to the east and west."

City Solicitor Chisholm, speaking of the fears expressed that the granting of a right to lay double tracks within the city limits, as desired by them, would endanger the city's position, said that he could not see it in that light, as the city would be able to control the matter by considering would give the controllers the right to terminate it at any time, so that the city need not apprehend being trapped into any undesirable position.

BRAINED OFFICER WITH HAMMER.

How Russian Sailor Upheld Honor of His Country.

Astoria, Ore., June 30.—Capt. Robertson of the steamer Sandhurst, which arrived here to-day from Tsingtau, China, states that while he was there he was anchored a short distance from the disabled battleship Carewvitch. Captain Robertson states that when the news of the Russian defeat was received there the captain of the Carewvitch committed suicide.

One of the Carewvitch's officers, while reading an account of the battle off the sea of Japan, which blamed defeat on the sailors, was overheard by a sailor on the Carewvitch, who picked up a hammer and saying, "It is such men as you who are to blame," brained the officer.

Both dead officers were buried the following day.

POLICE COME OFF THE WAGONS.

After Monday, Chicago Teamsters' Strike Will Be Ignored.

Chicago, June 30.—Whether the teamsters' strike is officially ended by next Monday or not, the police guards are to be taken off the wagons of strike-affected firms in the business district of the city. The policemen thus released will be returned to their customary stations.

Mayor Daley made this decision to-day, believing that danger of rioting in the streets is practically over, and that a system of "guarding routes" to freight depots and other centres of trade will prove sufficient to preserve order.

MORSE DENIES.

Says That There is No Hitch in G.R.P. Negotiations.

Montreal, June 30.—F. W. Morse, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, returned from the west to-day, where he had been in connection with the affairs of the new trans-continental line.

GIFT OF TEN MILLIONS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

Rockefeller Will Contribute That Amount on October 1 in Cash or in A.I. Securities.

New York, June 30.—Ten million dollars as an endowment for higher education in the United States has been given the general education board by John D. Rockefeller. The announcement was made by Dr. Wallace Buttrick of the board at a meeting to-day. The following letter to the secretary and executive officers of the board from F. T. Gates, Mr. Rockefeller's representative, was given out:

"I am authorized by John D. Rockefeller to say that he will contribute to the general education board the sum of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000), to be paid Oct. 1, next, in cash, or at his option, in income-producing securities at their market value, the principal to be held in perpetuity, as a foundation for education, the income above expenses and administration to be distributed to the various departments of such institutions of learning, at such times, in such amounts, for such purposes and under such conditions as he may deem best adapted to promote a comprehensive system of higher education in the United States."

ON WAY TO COURT, KILLS WOMAN

J. J. Hill's Chauffeur is a Victim of Misfortune.

New York, June 30.—Frank C. Foot, a chauffeur for James J. Hill of the Great Northern Railroad, to-day ran over with his automobile and fatally injured a woman.

Such is the nature of the discovery.

NEW LOOP LINE SUGGESTED TO MITIGATE CONGESTION

City and T. R. C. Have Lines in View to Improve the Service.

Along Richmond-street, from York-street to Victoria-street, thence up Victoria-street to Shuter-street, with extensions to Yonge and Church-streets; this is the new street railway loop line which the city works committee will recommend to council as a means of mitigating the congestion of traffic around the corner of Queen and Yonge-streets. The plan as adopted by the committee does not exactly jibe with the General Manager Fleming's suggestion in a letter presented by Mr. Rust. Mr. Fleming's idea was for double tracks on Bay-street from Queen to Richmond, thence along Richmond to Church, with a line up Victoria-street, branching out, meeting tracks extending from Yonge-street to Church-street.

NO TRACKS ON BAY.

The committee was strongly opposed to tracks on Bay-street, since that thoroughfare is the only driveway up town from the Union Station.

The street railway manager held out tempting bait. Seventy large double track cars were being rushed to completion, but could not be used unless there were more tracks in the centre of the city. The public were greatly inconvenienced by the present jogs along Front and Church-streets to Queen-street, with Front and Station-streets, with a handicapped rapid moving, and obstructed general traffic.

The object of laying down these auxiliary lines is to enable the company to more conveniently deposit passengers during all hours of the day, to remove the unnecessarily large number of empty cars that travel down Yonge-street, south of Queen, at all hours, and to facilitate the quick handling of the public during the hours of heavy traffic.

Splitting King St. Service.

The company also desire to lay down a double track on the north side of Court-street, and south from that street along Toronto-street to connect with King. With the granting of this permission the King-street service will be split, the western section to run as far as Church-street and loop along Parkdale. This change will cut out the large number of unavailability and unsatisfactory delays, which have been caused to the West King-street service in the past.
