



Tracts Accessible and That Means More Mills

That there is a good opening in New Brunswick for industrial development from its here good forests is the opinion expressed by an engineer who has been over the line of the Transcontinental Railway. The new railroad, he said, will tap a portion of the province where an abundance of hardwood—birch and maple—can be cut. There are immense areas of these trees, some tracts being about twenty miles square. It is pointed out that while this hardwood could not be floated out in the streams, it could be marketed quite cheaply after the railroad is built.

Owing to the expense of narketing, this wood has been of no immediate value, but the building of the railway will change all this, so that several mills are likely to be exceted to manufacture this lumber into such mills should result in a boom for New Brunswick in this direction.
