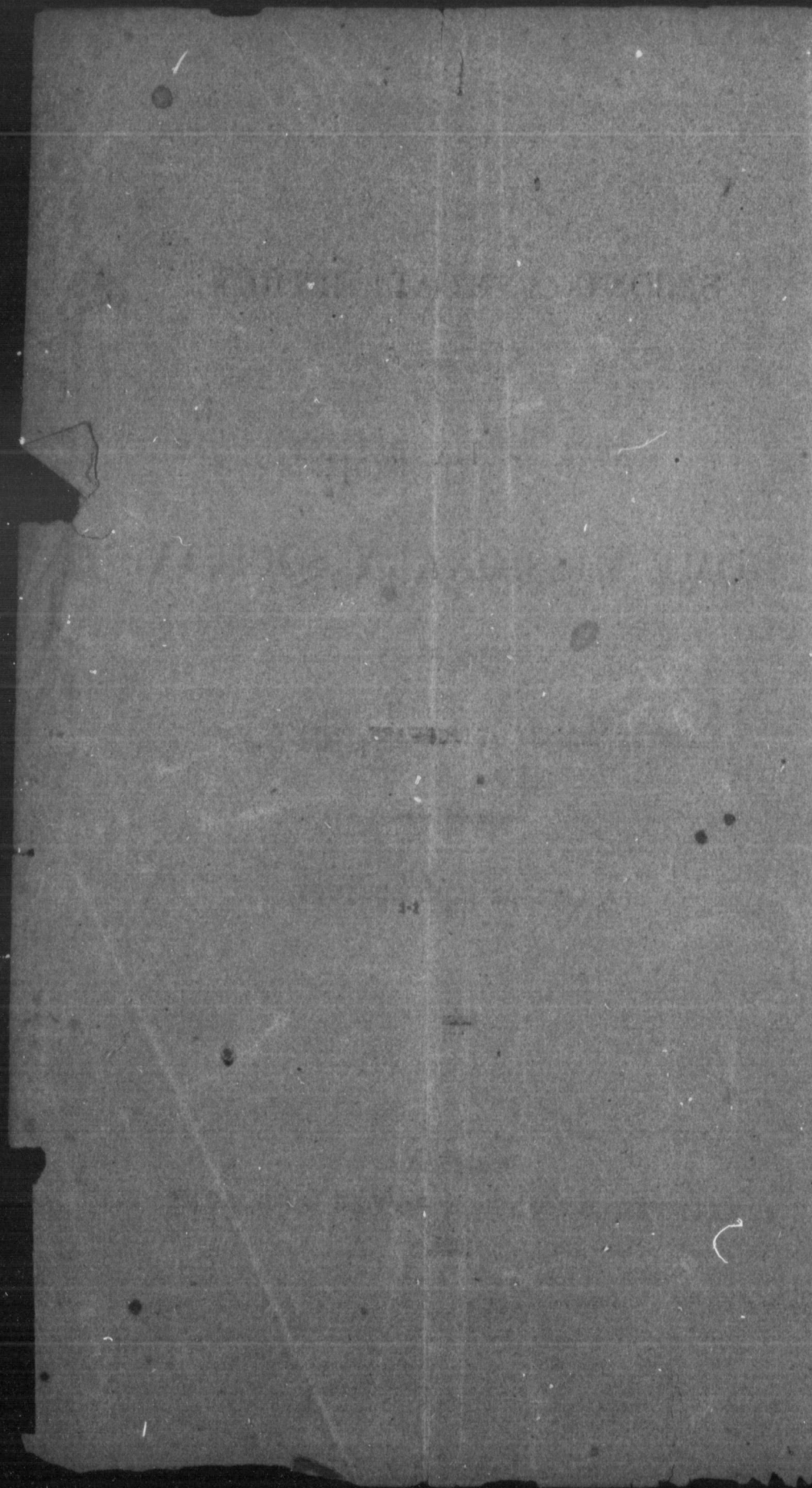

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CONSTITUTION
OF THE
NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST
HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called "The Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society."

II. The object of this Society shall be the preaching of the Gospel throughout Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, the assistance of feeble Churches, and the planting of new ones.

III. Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing five shillings and upwards, annually, to its funds. Any person contributing five pounds at one time, shall be a life member. Any person contributing twenty pounds at one time, or whose contributions shall amount to that sum, shall be a Life Director. Every Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate for every five pounds so contributed; and every Baptist Church contributing annually to the funds of the Society shall also have the privilege of sending a Delegate. Should the funds so contributed exceed five pounds, such church shall be entitled to send one delegate for every five pounds contributed.—*Provided*: That no Association, Auxiliary, or Church shall be entitled to send more than five Delegates at one time.

IV. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society from among its members.

V. The Society shall annually appoint a Board of Management, consisting of twenty-four members, seven of whom shall reside in the place designated from year to year as the location of the Board, or in its neighborhood, and seven shall constitute a quorum. The officers above named shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board. The following shall be the duties of the Board, viz.:—To meet from time to time for the despatch of business, due notice of such meeting being given; to appoint Missionaries, and assign their respective spheres of labor; to expend the funds for the objects of the Society, provided that all amounts contributed for any specific purpose shall be faithfully applied, as far as possible, in accordance with the wishes of the donors; to employ agents for the collection of funds, and for the general advancement of the interests of the Society; and to furnish a report of the proceedings of the past year at the Annual meeting.

VI. Every Auxiliary Society which shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of this Society, shall be entitled to receive Missionary labor in such field as it may designate, to an amount at least equal to its contribution; provided that such designation be intimated at the time of payment.

VII. The members of Auxiliary Societies shall be members of this Society. Life Directors shall be entitled to attend and vote at meetings of the Board.

VIII. The Annual meeting of the Society shall be held at such time and place as shall be determined upon at a previous Annual meeting. At that meeting the officers of the Society, for the ensuing year shall be appointed, and such other business transacted as the members then present shall deem expedient.

IX. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present at an Annual meeting.

PUGWASH, July 4, 1859.

THE Second Anniversary of the Society was held this evening, at 6 o'clock, in the Baptist Meeting House, Pugwash,—Rev. D. W. C. Dimock in the chair. After singing, and reading the Scriptures by the chairman, bro. S. Spencer engaged in prayer. The chairman then introduced the object of the meeting by appropriate remarks. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved; whereupon it was unanimously

Resolved, That the Board and Officers of last year, with the exception of substituting Rev. J. E. Balcom for Rev. D. McKeen, removed to New Brunswick, be continued; that the Board be located at Halifax; and that the next meeting be held with the Central Baptist Association at Windsor.

The report for the year was then read and adopted, and ordered to be printed.

Brethren J. Davis, R. D. Porter, S. T. Rand, B. Christmas, D. Freeman, J. Rowe, and E. Clay, next ably addressed the meeting in connection with appropriate resolutions.

Much interest was manifested in the Society's operations.

The collection having been taken up, and prayer offered by Rev. J. Davis, the meeting adjourned.

REPORT.

WITH grateful joy your Board present this, their second Annual Report. Through the kindness of our Heavenly Father we have, during the year, regularly attended to the business of the Society, and we trust have enjoyed divine direction in our humble efforts. The Missionaries have been greatly aided in their work, and rich blessings have descended upon the mission fields. In view of these happy results we would gladly forget the anxieties of the bygone months and celebrate the praises of our merciful and faithful Redeemer.

Let us follow the Missionaries to the spots where they have toiled:—

P. E. ISLAND.

Rev. J. Davis has prosecuted his labors at Charlottetown, under the arrangement of April, 1858, having spent six weeks in the service of the Board in other places on the Island. He usually "preaches three times on the Sabbath and once during the week in town, besides frequent engagements of the latter kind in the country. He has baptized six in town, and six others have been added from other churches. The congregations keep together well, and the prayer meeting is faithfully sustained." He says: "We are hopeful for the future, though we do not expect any rapid increase. The attendance in the country, and especially at St. Peter's Road, is highly encouraging. The brethren in town are few, but they behave nobly in money matters. I have derived aid, too, from Lot 49 and St. Peter's Road. Much as we have wanted laborers in this Island in times past, we want them now more than ever." The Charlottetown Church requests aid from the Board to the amount of £33 6s. 8d. for the coming year.

Rev. John Shaw, having been appointed a two months'

mission, preached at Uigg, Belfast, Point Prim, West River, Grand River, Long Creek, Dog River, Bedeque and Charlottetown." In general he preached to large and attentive audiences. A self-sustaining mission."

Rev. Malcolm Ross reports seven weeks labor performed. He visited Grand River, Lot 49, Three Rivers, &c.; preached thirty sermons, and co-operated with fellow laborers in various other meetings. He speaks of large congregations, and deep interest in some; of the urgent need of Gaelic preaching, and of his growing love for the work.

CAPE BRETON.

Rev. George Richardson early last winter, performed eight weeks Missionary labor at the Strait of Canso and Tracadie. He preached forty-one sermons, and baptized two persons. He is appointed other five weeks to the same places. Brother R. has welcomed several to the fellowship of the Sydney Church. The revival is to him a precious joy.

Rev. D. P. McQuillen has been greatly encouraged in his field of labor. A meeting house has been erected at Mire Bay which has greatly served the cause. Early in the winter a glorious work of grace commenced and spread to the surrounding places. There have been fifty-three baptized. At Salmon River, Grand Mire, a Church of 14 members has been organized. Urgent appeals for another laborer have been received. The revival has made more work for ministers. A large field invites cultivation, and invites it now.

Rev. A. Shiels, under arrangement May 5, 1858, has visited Port Hood and Ship Harbor, spending three months there, and at Mabau and Margaree. He reports forty-four sermons preached, and one baptized.

Rev. Ronald McDonald under date April 29, reports his mission of two months performed. He visited some seven places on Boulardrie Island, and met much hospitality and readiness to hear the word. "The people were glad to see him, and wish to see him again."

Rev. Hugh Ross has continued in the service of the Board during the year. May 30th, 1859, he reports 207 sermons preached, 400 visits made, 8 conference meetings attended, and 18 persons baptized. He says: "I feel it a privilege to travel about and preach the word of God. He has given me

great joy amid all my trials. We are now in the midst of a most precious work of grace. Parents rejoice to hear their children sing the song of salvation. We are encouraged to labor and pray that God would give us still greater blessings."

Rev. R. D. Porter on account of an urgent call for help from the North Sydney Church, and the recommendation of the Board, has labored at North Sydney during the Spring months. God has greatly blessed his visit. The Holy Spirit was being largely poured out upon the people, and forty-seven were baptized by him during his stay.

Thus Cape Breton, so often visited by our Ministers and Missionaries, is at length yielding a bountiful harvest. Stations are multiplying, the work increases on our hands, while the older Churches are "putting on strength."

ANTIGONISH AND MERIGOMISH.

Rev. Albert F. Porter commenced his labors in these places August 10, 1858, with a guarantee of salary for one year from the Board. He has numerous stations, and the churches he supplies are small and far apart. His preaching is generally well attended, and in the midst of opposing influences he is much encouraged. He reports ten months labor performed, 150 sermons preached, 68 prayer, conference, and other religious meetings attended, 400 pastoral visits, 2,700 miles travelled, 2,000 pages tracts distributed, one Sunday school and two prayer meetings established, and five baptisms. "If two men were on the ground great good might be done." The brother has *not* labored in vain. The "seed will spring up."

CUMBERLAND COUNTY.

Rev. Nelson Baker, under appointment of August 10, 1858, performed a mission of thirteen weeks and one day in this County and vicinity. He visited Parrsboro', Lakeland, Half-way River, West Brook, Maccan, The Forks, Economy, Five Islands, Spring Hill and Maccan Mountain. He preached 63 sermons, and visited 160 families. He "was well received by the people."

Daniel Farnham, at the recommendation of brethren D. Freeman and J. E. Balcom, was guaranteed October 6, 1858, £20 for one year, to labor at Little River, River Philip, West Chester, &c. At River Philip a Church has been organized.

Baptized 29. A useful, pious brother has been licensed by the Little River Church. The mission has been discontinued.

HANTS COUNTY.

Rev. B. Scott has continued to labor here. He reports nine weeks labor. The meeting house at Walton is progressing.

Rev. Benj. Vaughan was assigned a mission of six weeks here, July 5, 1858. He reports the mission performed.

Brother D. F. Higgins is now fulfilling a mission of eight weeks there.

SHERBROOKE EAST.

Bro. Jas. F. Kempton, licentiate, appointed November 3, 1858, paid an interesting visit of two weeks to this Church. Preached twelve sermons, and visited some twenty-five families. Some of the youth professed hope in Christ.

DALHOUSIE.

Bro. Robert Walker has labored four weeks here by appointment of June 22, 1858. No report.

LUNENBURG.

Bro. M. P. Freeman, licentiate, June 22, 1858, received a mission of two months in this County. He labored seven weeks, visited New Cornwall, North West Branch, and the Corkum Settlement, preached 32 sermons, visited 104 families and 4 Sunday schools, and circulated 3,222 pages tracts. He regards this field as a most interesting place for Evangelical labor. Much religious conversation was had.

BAY OF ISLANDS.

Rev. J. Whidden, July 5, 1858, was assigned a six weeks mission here. May 24, 1859, he reports (in *Christian Messenger*) having visited Indian Harbor, Mary Joseph, Liscomb, and the Islands. During his first visit he baptized seven, preached sixteen sermons, and prayed with thirty-seven families. On a second visit two professed conversion. (See also report of D. F. Higgins.)

HALIFAX COUNTY.

Rev. R. D. Porter has continued to labor during the year as our Missionary. At Dartmouth, Truro Road, Preston, and

Jeddore, he has been favored with much encouragement and success. He reports having reached North Sydney.—(See under Cape Breton.) March 11th. He says: "Here I found on my arrival a cloud of mercy overhanging the place, some drops from which had already descended. We immediately commenced holding nightly meetings, and the Lord granted us a refreshing rain. I remained in Sydney nearly three months, during which time I attended religious meetings every day except two. The work seemed progressing when I left. During the year I have preached 202 sermons, attended 74 prayer and conference meetings, made 841 ministerial visits, and baptized 79 persons, of whom 5 were at Dartmouth, 2 at Margaret's Bay, 3 at Truro Road, 4 at Jeddore, 18 at Preston, and 47 at North Sydney. The meeting house at Truro Road has been opened for worship. Both myself and the Mission are much indebted to brother R. McLearn for his valuable services. While I was absent at Sydney, brother C. H. Corey's labors at Jeddore were greatly blessed. In an exchange with him brethren Humphrey and Bentley of Halifax baptized 16 at this place."

Bro. John Moser, licentiate, in August last, by appointment, visited Hammond Plains, the Cross Road, Windsor Road and Cow Bay. He spent three weeks, preached thirteen sermons and visited some twenty-five families. For the first named places he recommends a religious literature. Of their progress in some respects he speaks encouragingly. The people require more attention. Mr. M. has generously refunded for their benefit the sum of £4 voted him by the Board.

Bro. Samuel Bell, licentiate, July 21, 1858, was appointed a mission of three months at Indian Harbor and Margaret's Bay, with a pledge from the Board of £10 towards his support, in accordance with application made by the Churches in those places. He preached 52 sermons, attended 11 conferences and prayer meetings, distributed 664 tracts, and visited 70 families. Three were baptized by Rev. J. C. Hurd of Chester. Three Sunday schools were in operation at the Bay. His visit resulted in much good. His labors were resumed 15th May last, and now he is at Tancook Island in the midst of a solemn awakening.

Bro. D. F. Higgins, licentiate, by appointment May 5, 1858, visited Dartmouth, Jeddore, Bay of Islands, India

Harbor, St. Mary's, Liscomb, Sheet Harbor, &c. He spent eleven weeks, preached forty sermons, and attended five prayer and conference meetings. At Jeddore four were received for baptism. He spent much time in conversation and prayer. At the Bay of Islands the Church was much scattered. At Sheet Harbor there was the nucleus of a rising cause, if cultivated. The Presbyterian house of worship was open for preaching by our Missionaries.

Bro. Charles H. Corey, licentiate, by appointment April 6, 1859, has labored ten weeks and five days in Halifax County, chiefly in the absence of brother Porter. He reports fifty sermons preached, twenty-three other religious meetings attended, more than 220 families visited, 400 miles travelled, 2,000 pages tracts distributed, a Sunday school and a female prayer meeting organized.

SUMMARY.

No. of Missionaries employed 22, of whom 6 were licentiates; labor performed, 310 weeks; sermons reported, 990; estimated 247; total 1237; visits, for prayer, reading the Scriptures and conversation, reported by ten Missionaries, 2282; miles travelled by three of them, 3650; pages tracts distributed by four, 11,206; baptisms reported by eleven laborers, 219; besides visits to Sabbath schools, and a large number of conference, prayer, and temperance meetings attended.

Two meeting houses were opened and two churches organized.

Received by the Treasurer up to June 27th, including balance on hand from last year, £428 5s. 0½d.; disbursed to same date, £406 2s. 9d. Collected by the Missionaries, £272 18s. 11d. (this latter sum not passing through the Treasurer's hands). Total income, £701 3s. 11d. Balance on hand, £22 2s. 3½d.

The financial year of the Society, by vote of the Board, will hereafter close on the first day of June.

According to request of your Board, Bro. Richard McLearn has prepared for insertion, in this report, the following statement:—"The Board at the beginning of the year found it absolutely needful to engage the services of a Secretary at a limited salary, the duties of the office having become so numerous that no one could be expected any longer to dis-

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charge them gratis, and therefore the Board engaged the services of brother Bentley at a salary of £25 per annum, relying upon the Associations, with the whole Society, to sustain them."

Of the last Annual Report of the Society there have been printed and circulated 1,500 copies.

Your Board have strong convictions of the utility of the Society. The sheaves already gathered are but the first instalment of the fruits yet to result from the labor performed. Deep impressions have been made, and numerous conversions have occurred, which find no record here. Our dear brethren the Missionaries have, we doubt not, labored faithfully. Their approach is hailed by the people with joyful interest. They are the honored instruments of dissipating much of ignorance, scepticism and formalism in regard to Evangelical truth.

Your Board estimate that at least £800 will be required to meet the outlays of the coming year. The people of color in the counties of Halifax, Sydney, and other parts of the Province, urgently require the whole of one man's labors. They have been long and sadly neglected. Stations already occupied require to be better supplied, and, month by month, new ones are becoming accessible, while abandoned ones should be re-occupied. Seven appointments of brethren not hitherto employed by the Board have just been made, while nine others have unfinished missions, most of them now in process of fulfilment; thus leaving responsibilities on the Board for 100 weeks of labor.

We are happy in the thought that Christ the great Saviour toiled in this same work. No brighter example do we need, no better wages than he pays can we desire. We are cheered, too, by the sympathy of many brethren and sisters in the Lord, as evidenced during the past months of need by timely pecuniary contributions. We note here the sum of £30 from the Western Baptist Association.

Lovers of Jesus, this work must go on! Perishing sinners must be pointed to the cross of the Redeemer. New laborers must enter the vineyard. The Lord's treasury must be replenished by the widow's mite, by the child's penny, by the poor man's shilling, and the rich steward's five pounds. Instead of indifference and inaction in many of the churches, and a mere pitiful pittance reluctantly doled out in some wealthy districts, we may hope for zeal and generous bequests.

In the way of deeper declension and further retrogression we perceive the curse of God falling upon the covetous and the slothful. The rust, the blight, the canker-worm, and the mildew, both temporally and spiritually, will fall upon the disobedient. "There is that withholdeth more than is meet, but tendeth to poverty." We earnestly invite the attention of pastors, deacons, and members of our churches and congregations to the delightful privilege and solemn duty of "giving as the Lord hath prospered." The tide of blessings to the destitute must not be stayed.

What like the missionary work can bind together the otherwise dissevered elements in our denomination? God forbid that any differences should be permitted to divide our hearts, to distract our counsels, and weaken our strength in the cause of Christ! What like union here can bring blessings so abundant upon our families, our churches, our country? What more glorify our ascended Lord?

"Hitherto the Lord hath helped us" has been the experience of the past year; let the words, "Say unto the people that they go forward," be the motto of the coming one.

Note to Missionaries.—1. Please be *punctual in reporting*. Delay only on the part of a few, especially near the end of the year, when the report of the Board is being made up, causes much trouble. 2. Be *exact in statistics*. The number of weeks' service—number of sermons—number of visits—of miles travelled—pages of tracts distributed—of baptisms—visits to Sabbath schools—other meetings attended—churches, S. schools, temperance societies, and prayer meetings organized—accurate lists of monies received, with the donors' names, when practicable—are all required. 3. Finally, while you preach the Gospel faithfully, *collect* what you can. It will do the people good to pay for preaching, and the Society cannot work without money.
