



### UNCLE SAM AND MEXICO.

The recent American warning to Mexico is a reminder that diplomatic relations between Great Britain and Mexico have been unsatisfactory for more than two years, and that the British, in view of the Monroe doctrine and other considerations, have been leaving largely to the United States the obligation of protecting British interests in the peppery republic.

"Interest on the British debt at present is paid at the rate of 8 per cent. Supposing the settlement with France to be on a basis of 2½ per cent, there should then logically be a reduction of one-half of one per cent in the British debt. If, now, Italy settled on a two per cent basis, the debts of both France and England should be reduced. 


