A BROAD POLICY

The Liberal government at Ottawa continues to pursue a progressive policy to encourage the development of all parts of the country. In the east the Intercolonial Railway is to be made a stronger factor in development, by adding branch lines.

In connection also with the Canadian Northern the Intercolonial is to become a more important factor in through business. The aid given to the Canadian Northern will make it a more powerful agency for the development of the west and east and west trade from coast to coast.

The growth of Canada makes it need for the government to undertake new works and open up additional avenues of trade. The interests of the whole country must be considered, and large expenditures are involved. So great is the prosperity of the country, however, that these expenditures do not rest as a burden upon the people.

One of the most striking illustrations of the growth of the country is found in the immigration figures. With the population of a new town landing on our shores nearly every day, and these people bringing millions of new capital, there must be an increase in trade, and an opening up of new fields of enterprise.

The government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier recognizes its duty in the matter and pursues a progressive policy on broad lines, recognizing the needs of all sections of the country.

DR. DANIEL AND ST. JOHN There was an interesting discussion in parliament yesterday over the subsidy for the St. John and Cuba steamer service. Mr. Percival, the chief Conservative, opposed a renewal of the subsidy. Mr. Croby of Halifax was even more bitterly opposed. He charged that the subsidy was secured through the efforts of Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Carvell, and was not the result of a demand from the farmers of this province. Dr. Daniel took part in the discussion, but does not appear to have said very much in favor of the subsidy.

THE POWER SCHEME St. John wants cheaper power, but it also expects the city council to safeguard the public interest in relation to franchises granted to companies. It ought to be possible to come to terms with the New Brunswick Electric Company, but this should only be done on terms such as would neither sacrifice present interests nor injuriously affect those of the future.

**POLICE TRAP  
GANG IN BARN**

Get Express Matter Worth \$20,000—Big Van Followed by Detectives Packed Into Small Wagons

New York, May 11.—No ordinary citizen who saw two small delivery wagons trailing a ponderous van through East Side streets Monday realized that the procession was a police chase after \$20,000 worth of stolen property.

The delivery wagons contained 20 detectives in charge of Lieut. Yachris and assisted by chief special agent Joseph Mayo of the U. S. Express company. They were packed into the small carts like sardines in a box.

The van, heavily loaded with express matter, was followed on each side of the street by men sauntering singly or in pairs. These were the men whom the police had marked for arrest.

The "chase" led from the branch office of the U. S. Express company, 33 West 3rd street through West Broadway, Spring street and the Bowery, to a stable in Rivington street, between the Bowery and Chrystie street.

The stable in the rear of a big tenement and is reached through an alley from the street. The van turned in. So did the men who had been following on foot.

A block or two back the detectives left their delivery carts and most of them went into a dry goods store to examine shirts and cravats.

Half an hour later a signal rang out from the direction of the stable. Detective Paschi had been informed by last station until the van was unloaded before calling his comrades.

The detectives on the run advanced through the alley, and before the alleged robbers knew what was happening ten were under arrest and express company headquarters charged with grand larceny.

It was about two weeks ago that Lieut. Yachris got his information that a big express robbery was being planned. It was expected that the attempt would be last Thursday, but nothing happened then. Ever since then the neighborhood of the express company's branch offices have been constantly covered by detectives, disguised as laborers and drivers.

Late on Monday afternoon a van of the Department was loaded up with all sorts of valuable express matter, cut glass, clothing, furs, books, etc., which had been shipped for New York and western points. It was to go to the Liberty street ferry and across to Communipaw.

As it started a group of eight men was seen to separate and follow it. At the same moment a young fellow clucked to a boy who drove after the van. The young fellow was Detective Upton of the central office.

The other cart, filled with private deliveries, got into the stable a little farther down the line of march.

The alleged robbers seemed to have no idea of the conspiracy. They had themselves trapped in the stable.

The men under arrest are Charles B. Miller, Michael Palmer, Herman Green, Rudolph Turner, Joseph Ross, Isador Bolina, Morris Berger, Harry Miller, Samuel Fischer and the driver, Harry Miller. Two were in the stable when the van arrived. They denied any connection with the robbery.

The police would not say which prisoner was the driver of the van. They said that Green, Palmer, Ross, Harry Miller and Berger were represented in the rogues' gallery.

There have been several serious express robberies within a few months. About a month ago a van containing \$50,000 worth of goods disappeared and was found empty at 1st avenue and 22nd street.

**MAY ADJOURN HOUSE UNTIL AUGUST 1**

Ottawa, May 10.—Parliament will adjourn, as previously intimated, not later than May 23, probably on May 19, and reassemble for the concluding portion of the session not earlier than July 18.

The arrangements in that effect, concluded by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and R. L. Borden during their recent conferences, was confirmed by formal announcement of the cabinet this afternoon. The possibility of delaying the reassembling until Aug. 1 was discussed. Sir Wilfrid frankly stated that it was in the hands of the house in the matter, but to ensure the later date he believed it would be necessary to make some special supply for a longer period than Sept. 1.

E. N. Lewis and Dr. Sprague took strong ground against the banking regulations that prevented bank clerks marrying. The former said that he found on last Tuesday that many overworked youths were paid but \$20 and \$30 a year.

Hopkins, paying teller of the First National Bank of Cleveland, Ohio, was placed under arrest there on Tuesday charged with theft. It is said he confessed that he had embezzled more than \$14,000.

At a preliminary congregational meeting of the members of St. David's church, held last evening in consequence of a notice having been received citing representatives of the church to appear before the St. John Presbytery with reference to the resignation of the pastor, Rev. A. A. Graham, resolutions were passed expressing regret at the departure of the pastor and seven commissioners were appointed to attend a meeting of the presbytery at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The following were chosen: P. Chisholm, James South, A. R. Melrose, R. B. Paterson, Charles Robinson, J. T. McGowan and T. H. Somerville. As Mr. Graham has accepted the principalship of the new Saskatchewan College, under the direction of the Saskatchewan Presbytery, and has asked the church to acquiesce in his request to be relieved of the pastorate of St. David's, the commissioners were instructed to so report to the presbytery today. Mr. Graham will leave for his new charge about June 1. The congregation last evening unanimously instructed the trustees to issue a check for \$200 as a free gift to the retiring pastor. A committee was also appointed to arrange for a congregational farewell to Rev. Mr. Graham and Mrs. Graham, when an address will be presented. Peter Chisholm presided at the session, presided at the meeting. Mr. Graham is leaving St. David's church at a time when it was never in better condition, either financially or numerically, and he will carry with him to his western charge the best wishes of the people here, not only in his own church but in the city generally. As the pulpit has not yet been declared vacant, the church is not in a position to extend a call to a new pastor, and a statement in one of the papers a few days ago that Rev. Dr. Smith, of Fredericton, had declined a call was therefore incorrect. PROBATE COURT An Interesting Point in Loch Lomond Case Before Judge Armstrong Today

The matter of the estate of Edward Nelson, farmer, of Loch Lomond road came up in the probate court today. He died on January 2, 1883, a week after he had made his will, on which he placed his executor, the late Mr. J. McArthur, of the late Alexander Ballentine, barrister-at-law, and the late Edmund Lawton, who kept the Hart House on the Loch Lomond Road. Both witnesses had died when in 1884 application was made to the probate court to prove the will. The application was refused on the ground that the probate court act provided that, when all the witnesses to an will are dead, the probate court grant probate on proof of the handwriting of the testator, and of the testator together with the fact of his death, the court holding that the testator, subsequently stated that he had executed the same, and the whereabouts of the will during the meantime having been accounted for, the will was today admitted to probate and the executors named therein, namely, the widow, Mary Ann Nelson, and a daughter, Catherine Elizabeth Nelson, were sworn. The real estate is \$1,800, subject to a mortgage for \$800; personal estate, \$775. Stephen B. Bislin is probator. The court also took up the matter of the estate of Mary Ann Bardeley, deceased, wife of John Bardeley of St. John, latter, she died in April, 1888 leaving her husband, who subsequently died, and two sons, Joseph P. Bardeley and Robert Bardeley. The latter has also since died leaving a wife and nine children. On the petition of the surviving son, Joseph P. Bardeley, he was appointed administrator. There is no real estate; personal estate \$600. Homer D. Forbes is probator.
