

Dublin, March 15.—The bravery of a national soldier averted a railway accident between Thomastown and Athlone, County West Meath, yesterday. Deportations.

London, March 15.—The uneasiness that has followed last Sunday's Irish arrests in Great Britain has induced Sir Kingley Wood, member of the House of Commons for Woolwich West, to draft a bill which he will introduce on next Tuesday amending the Restoration of Order in Ireland Act. It proposes that in the event of fur deportations under the act, the Home Secretary be obliged to inform the advisory committee established by the act, and that within a week this committee must consider whether the deportation is just and reasonable. The person affected would have the right

Members of Parliament do not believe that the bill will have the least chance of passing the House, but its introduction will give the Government an opportunity to make clear its position, which is now rather obscure.
