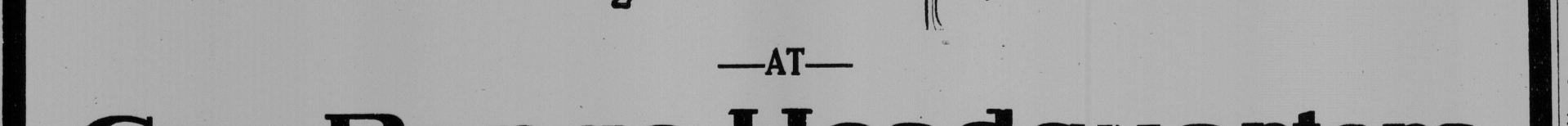

IN CASE OF SUNSTROKE  
IN case of sunstroke give the patient cool drinks of water or cold black tea or coffee, if the patient is able to drink.  
When the skin is hot and dry sponge or pour cold water over the body and limbs and apply to the head pounded ice, wrapped in a towel or other cloth.  
Often no ice will be at hand. When this is the case pour cold water on the head and body.  
Ammonia, inhaled, is good when the person is faint or the pulse feeble.  
Keep patient in a shady, cool place.  
Many persons place green foliage, preferably sassafras leaves, in the hat crown to prevent sunstroke.  
A shirt of orange yellow color is effective against the sun's rays. Lining of the coat and hat also may be of this color cloth.  
Plenty of perspiration is almost a sure preventive of sunstroke.

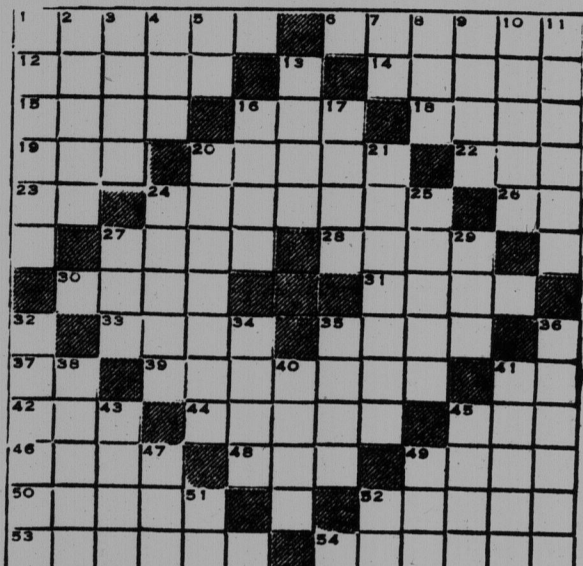

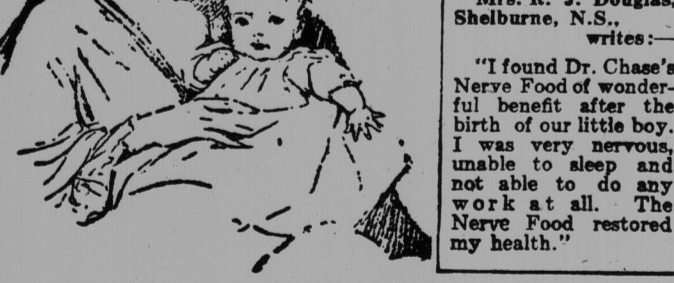

**THE BILL**

AN ACT TO AMEND THE "SAINT JOHN CITY ASSESSMENT ACT, 1918."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE HONOURABLE GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY AS FOLLOWS:

1. Subsection 1 of Section 4 of the Saint John City Assessment Act, 1918, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following paragraphs:

(a) Provided that during the year in which they are made, and for the five calendar years next succeeding, the value of any alterations and improvements made in any dwelling, store or building of any kind or description shall not be included as a part of such true and real value;

(b) Further provided, that during the year in which they are constructed, and for the two calendar years next succeeding, the value of any new buildings constructed and used for the purpose of dwelling houses shall not be included as a part of such true and real value.



### WHAT THE BILL MEANS TO PROPERTY OWNERS

EVERY property owner should take advantage of the bill exempting improvements to property in Saint John from taxation for a period of five years. If owners do not take advantage, and have necessary work done, the purpose of the bill is defeated.

The object of Mayor Potts, in having this bill presented, was to give the property owner a chance to have necessary work done without fear of additional taxation, and at the same time create work for both skilled and unskilled labor.

Now that the bill has been passed, it means that the merchant can install new store fixtures, sprinkler systems, display windows or store fronts without additional taxation, and, no matter what the value of the improvements may be, it is not added to the assessable value of the property.

The manufacturer can remodel his plant, build additions, etc., without adding to the assessable value.

To the man or woman owning a home, especially in the case of those of limited means. Under past conditions in many cases, the revenue from rents did not allow sufficient for any extensive repairs, and the increased taxation following improvements.

Now, the owner can increase the value of property, obtain a rent in proportion to the added value, but still pay the old rate of taxation.

This consideration alone should be a great incentive to carry out improvements.

Electric fittings can be installed, plumbing modernized, new wings built, but the tax bill remains the same as formerly.

But what is perhaps one of the best features of all, the new act allows a home to be built, and for two years remain exempt from taxation. This means a sum of from \$500 to \$1,000, absolutely in the pocket of the owner, according to the value of the property. As this is in force for two years, the owner has a chance to recuperate from his expenditures, and the money has saved from tax exemption goes a long way to finance another investment.

As the mayor says, citizens have a great chance to better conditions in Saint John. Work can be created for hundreds. A market can be created for thousands of dollars' worth of building material, in fact a little action on the part of property owners can create an era of prosperity in the city. So the bill, as well as benefiting the property owner, can be a boon to every citizen.

**HISTORIC SITES ARE GREAT ASSET**

Dr. Wm. McIntosh Speaks of Them in Relation to N. B. Tourist Travel.

A strong plea that more practical interest be taken by the people of New Brunswick, particularly the citizens of Saint John, in preserving its historic sites to develop tourist traffic was made by Dr. William McIntosh, curator of the Natural History Society museum here, before the members of the "Y-M" Men's Club at their weekly luncheon yesterday.

Dr. McIntosh declared that tourists did not come to Saint John for the express purpose of seeing the city and its buildings, but that they were deeply interested in our climate and our wonderfully romantic history.

Concerning Saint John, he said, tourists would be greatly interested in the Martello Tower, the remains of the Indian stockade on Navy Island, where Samuel de Champlain camped when he visited the city 300 years ago, and the site of the LaTour fort. Regarding this fort, Dr. McIntosh said there was little doubt that its exact site was where the mill factory now stands in the North End. Some confusion, he said, existed for a time that the fort was located on the west side of the harbor but he pointed out that after the brave Madame LaTour's death, her husband married Charmis's widow and they lived on the western side of the harbor.

Dr. McIntosh also spoke briefly of Fort Howe and its historic associations, and also mentioned several interesting places at Fredericton, Bathurst and Campbellton, where the last naval engagement between the French and English was fought 100 years ago.

A hearty vote of thanks was extended by Dr. McIntosh at the conclusion of his address.

**Red Cross Workers Organize Class**

Miss S. Barrington, organizer of home nursing classes for the Red Cross Society, and Miss Jessie Lawson, Junior Red Cross supervisor, returned to the city yesterday from a successful three-day tour in the province. The direct result of the tour has been the formation of a home nursing class in Newtown and Smith's Creek, which will be held its first meeting on May 27 with prospects of a large enrollment.

Yesterday afternoon the two Red Cross workers addressed a meeting of the Women's Institute at Apohaqui, when it was decided to form a home nursing class as soon as a teacher could be obtained.

Miss Lawson visited eight Junior Red Cross branches in Rockville, Jeffrey's Corner, Sussex and Apohaqui.

Is Near McAvity Plant and on C. N. R. Property—Railway Approval Awaited.

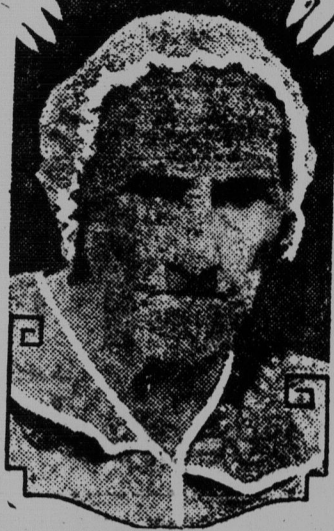

NEPISGUIT POOLS TO BE REPLENISHED

450,000 Salmon Spawn Will be Deposited in River This Year.

BATHURST, May 15.—Last fall just prior to the spawning season the Department of Marine and Fisheries caught with nets about 280 salmon from the pools of the Nepisiguit Angling Club on the Nepisiguit river. Spawn was taken from about 200 and 250 of these salmon were tagged and allowed to go. The total spawn taken were 450,000 and these were removed to the Restigouche hatchery to mature, after which they were returned to the Nepisiguit hatchery and will be released in their native waters.

They are among the best spawn ever taken and a repetition of this experiment for a period of four or five years in succession would wonderfully assist in replenishing the river and the coast water as well. The Nepisiguit Angling Club is willing to co-operate for a repetition of this experiment and it is hoped the department may see fit to continue the scheme for a few years at least.

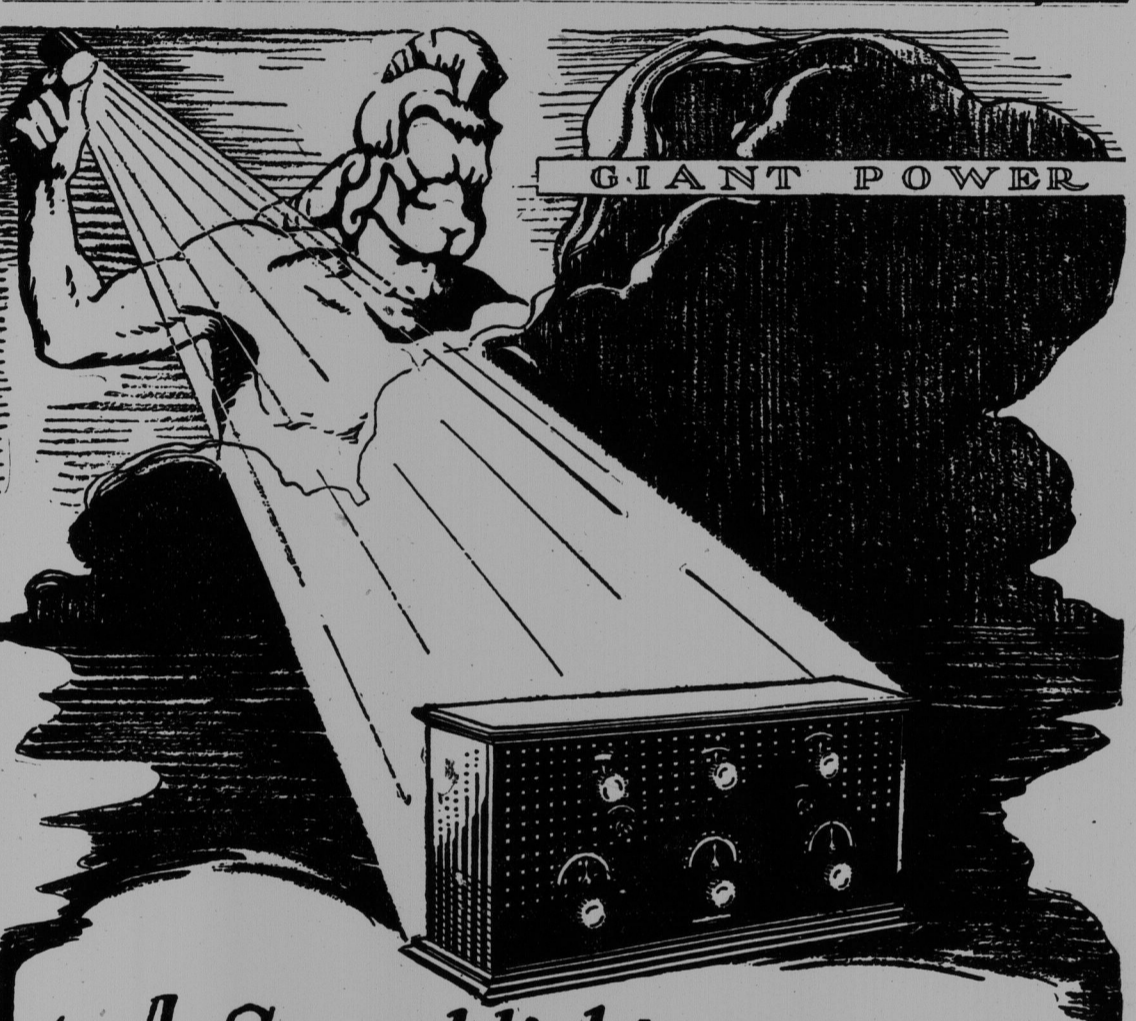

### SERVICE WILL START EVEN IF NO HELP GIVEN

Kirkwood Line Steamship Here May 26 for Sugar Cargo

### LINK MARITIMES AND UPPER CANADA

Sir Thomas Wilson, in City Again, Speaks of Possible Rate War.

The freight steamer service between Saint John, Halifax and other Maritime ports and Central Canada for which a federal subsidy is being asked by the Kirkwood Steamship Company will be run for a time at least, whether the subsidy is granted or not, Sir Thomas Wilson, of Belfast, prominent shipping man who accompanied T. R. Kirkwood, of Montreal, on his tour asking for backing for the Dominion subsidy, said yesterday afternoon.

The line could not guarantee that the service would be permanent, however, unless the subsidy were given, he declared. The first ship would arrive here about May 26 for a cargo from the Atlantic Sugar Refineries and other possible freight, and this service would be continued for as long as it was possible.

### RATE WAR POSSIBLE

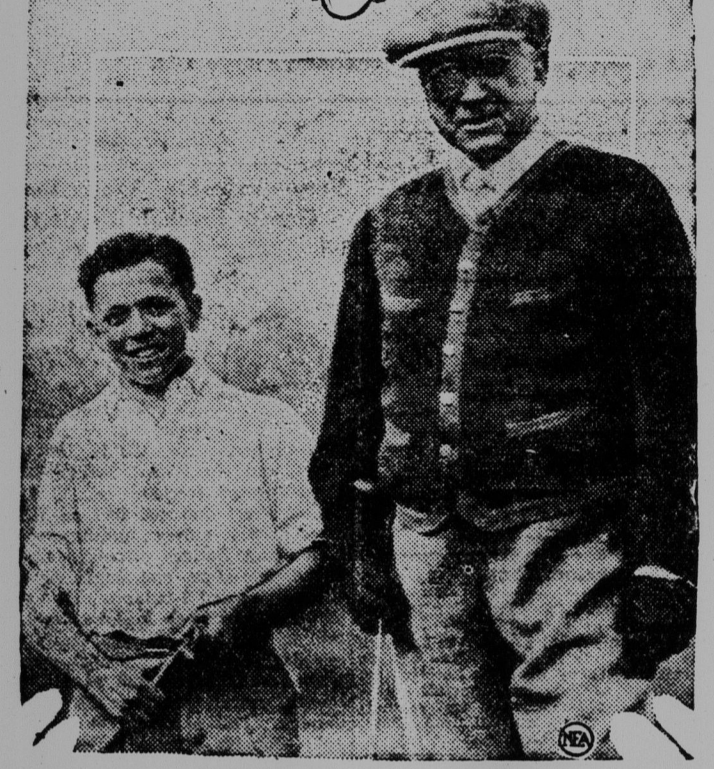
Sir Thomas said he expected that, with the steamship company offering rates considerably lower than those in force on the railways, the latter would take action to hold the business, even if it meant lowering of their tariffs.

It was to guarantee against such an occurrence that the subsidy was asked for, he declared. The company would guarantee to run one ship between Saint John, Halifax and other Maritime ports, and Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton and other points in Central Canada if a yearly subsidy of \$30,000 were granted by the federal parliament and to operate two vessels if a \$50,000 subsidy were given.

The rates on these ships would be about 25 per cent. lower than rail freight rates between the same points, according to the agreement they offer to make.

Sir Thomas declared yesterday that they had been given a very sympathetic hearing in Halifax, and hoped that action would be taken there following the meeting of the Board of Trade council next Tuesday. They had also been well received in Saint John and were confident that their project would be given careful consideration at the special meeting to be held to discuss it.

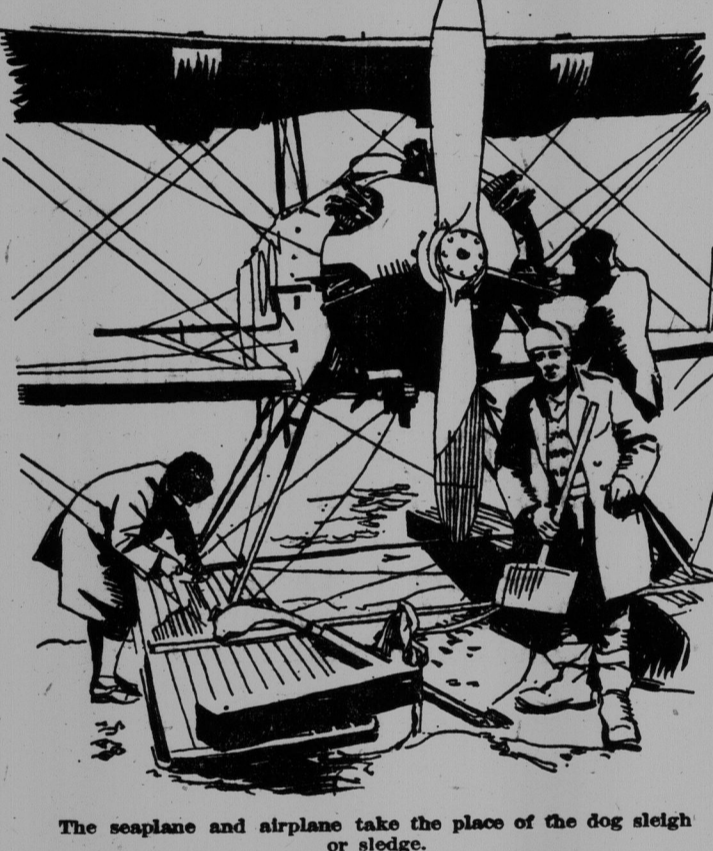

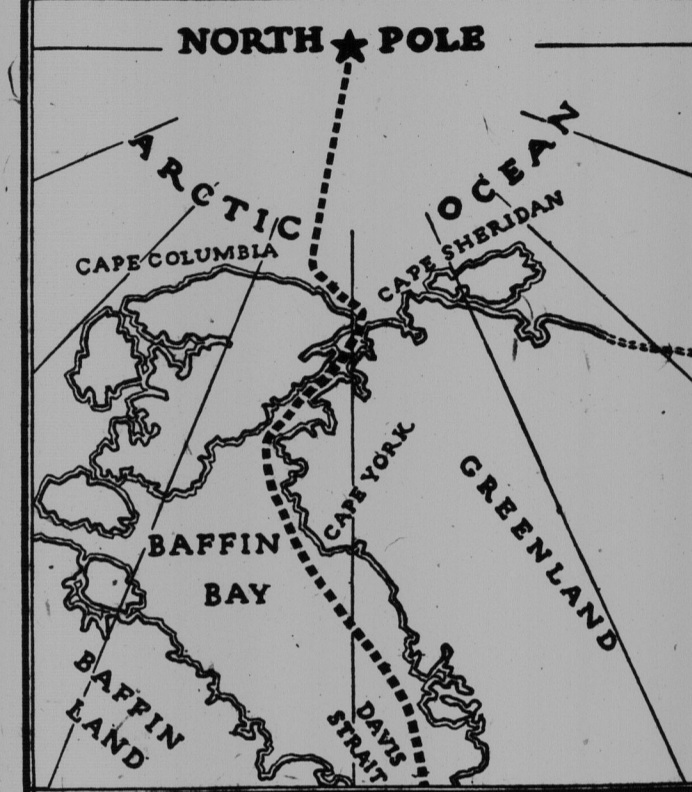

Announcement was made here that the Chevrier amendments to the Copyright Act, which had been introduced as a private member's bill, would take in performances at moving picture theatres. One of the proposed provisions of the act defines the penalty for every infringement, consisting of the presentation of copyrighted music for which no arrangement has been made with the composer in the form of a royalty. This penalty is placed at \$50 for each offence.
