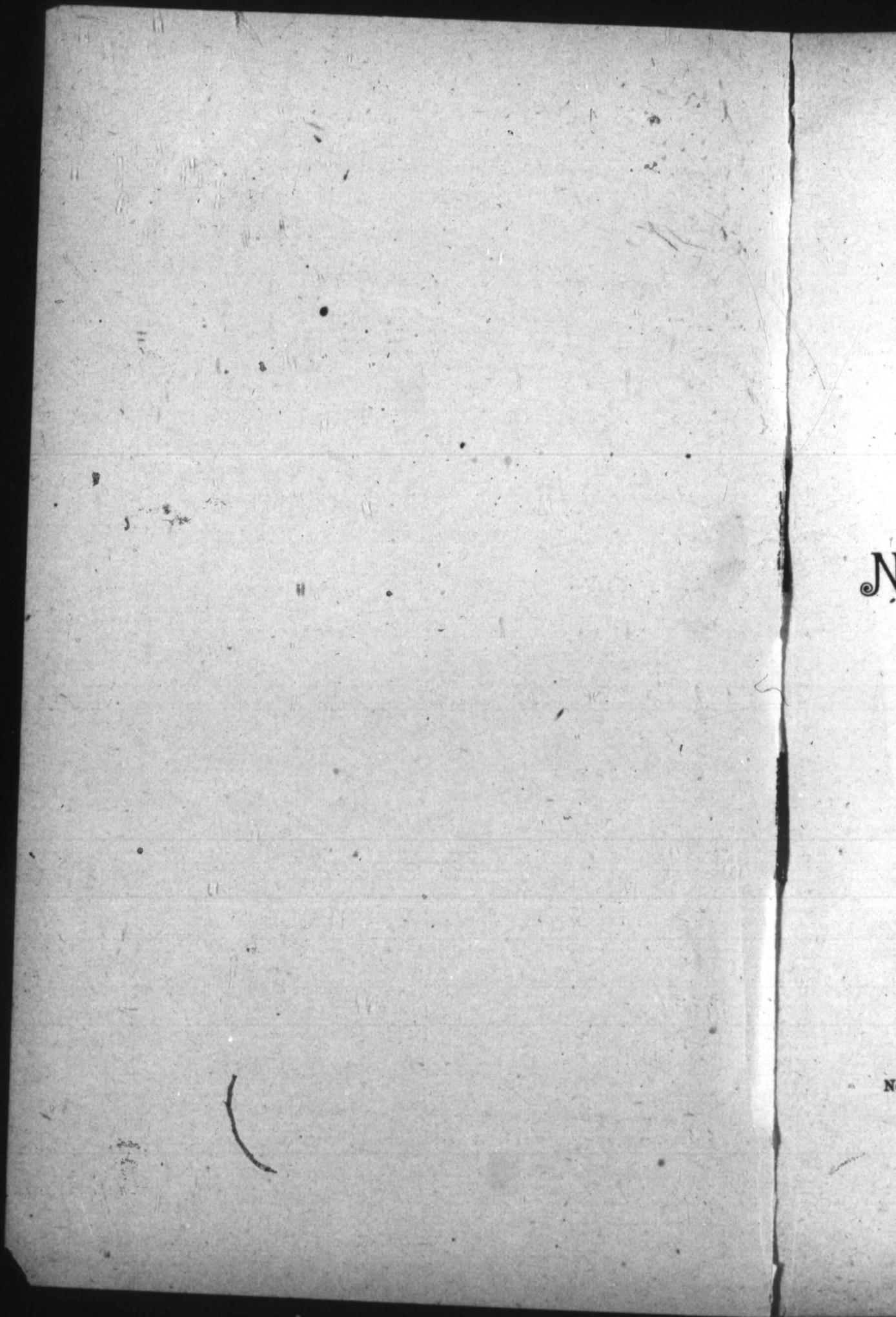

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Twenty-five Guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six

of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity ; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XII. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee ; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present ; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in
1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Nova Scotia Bible Society.

- I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES : the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz. : to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.
- V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH which, in the past, has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz.: *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*) the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims and earnestly interested in the work*: for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belongs the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during that month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and previous to the collector's canvass the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collectors' call.
5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time; whereas the *loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.
6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are closed on the *last working day* of December, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.
7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The Depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depository should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*
8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a *few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

OF THE

Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN

ARGYLE HALL,

Monday, 26th January, 1891.

THE Seventy-Seventh Anniversary of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society was held on the 26th January, in the Argyle Hall. PETER LYNCH, Esq., occupied the Chair, and the attendance of citizens was fully better than on former occasions. The meeting was opened by the REV. DR. BURNS, who gave out the 19th Psalm, read the Scriptures and engaged in prayer.

The CHAIRMAN reviewed the past history of the Auxiliary, called attention to the progress of Christian unity as shewn by reason of reports made by Christian men working in this Society, and referring to the wonderful work of the parent Society in all parts of the globe.

REV. J. A. ROGERS moved

"That the report now read be adopted, printed and circulated with the usual appendages, under the direction of the Committee."

In moving this resolution MR. ROGERS referred specially to the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society on the continent of Europe, and followed in a pleasant way the colporteurs in their travels, especially in France and Italy, giving statistics which were made interesting by the manner in which they were presented.

JAMES C. MACKINTOSH seconded the resolution in a telling speech, with reference to the subscriptions in the City of Halifax in the previously published report. He intimated that he had analyzed the lists, and found that there were several of the churches in the city which were not represented there, making several suggestions for the future collections, also suggesting that the city clergymen might be solicited to preach on and to interest themselves in this department of Christian work, to which all the churches are so much under obligation for translation work.

REV. DYSON HAGUE moved

"Thanks to the various Branches throughout the province, by whose contributions and zeal the Auxiliary had been able, not only to disseminate the word of God in this province, but also in some humble degree to assist the parent Society in its noble work."

The rev. gentleman deplored the apathy which had so marked the city of Halifax in this connection. He thought the subscriptions from the city should exceed a thousand dollars when the magnitude of the work of the parent Society was considered, and the claims of

that institution upon the Christian churches, and the fact that the great nations that possessed the Bible were the leading nations of the world. Great Britain, the United States and Germany were so much ahead of all the others in all the blessings of civilization and culture.

R. J. SWEET seconded this resolution in an appropriate speech. He stated that the previous speakers had made himself ashamed of his own subscription to the funds, and agreed that he would double it, and also thought it would be the resolution of many in the meeting, but what effect it would have upon those who gave nothing he left them to determine, as such neglect may have proceeded from a want of thought. He also made several practical recommendations to the meeting.

REV. E. B. MOORE, in a very effective speech, moved the last resolution,

REPORT.

THE Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society have pleasure in again meeting members and friends of the Auxiliary. Until lately they were congratulating themselves that for the first time in many years they would meet with unbroken ranks, for death had not then entered among them. But in this they were disappointed, for the grave has now closed upon the mortal remains of their late associate, Hon. John W. Ritchie, Ex-Judge in Equity, who for thirty-eight years was a member of this Committee, and who in former years was diligent in attendance at the meetings, ever taking a lively interest in the several questions connected with the progress of the Messiah's kingdom. But during recent years, age and infirmity prevented him from taking part in active duties of public life, which he was once so well qualified to discharge. And now his name will be dropped from the list of members of Committee, upon which it has held a place so long. It is a matter of regret, that while so many have been added to the members lists since 1852, so few of the younger members have been fired with the zeal which animated the deceased Judge. And with the same regret we notice the removal of the name from the subscription list, on which it has held a place for the past forty years, among the most liberal of the sub-

scribers in the city, hence his removal will cause diminution in the revenue of the Society.

We regret to notice the removal of other subscribers of long standing, among whom we mention the late Mrs. John Naylor, who has contributed for the last thirty years, and whose late husband left a substantial mark of his appreciation of the objects of the Auxiliary by devising a certain portion of his estate to be invested by Trustees, for the purpose of giving the "Scriptures to indigent persons in the community." This legacy will soon be available, as it was, with the other bequests, subject to the life interest of the widow, now deceased.

There is something different in this bequest from many of the previous ones, almost all of which were bequeathed to the parent Society, and were immediately remitted to that institution, excepting the "Gorham Bequest," which had a special local application to Liverpool, N. S., and that one of a hundred dollars to the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association, which was devised by the late Mrs. Binney, for the special purpose of assisting to maintain the Bible woman.

The Naylor bequest, when available, will we trust, materially lessen the charges on our free distribution account.

The Treasurer's account is herewith submitted—a total of \$4669.54, which, however, includes a balance of \$1730.37 from previous year, which balance was duly forwarded to the parent Society, and being the first entry of the next. The total sum as made up from the following sources :

Minute calculations or lengthy remarks on the above would be out of place here, but we notice that the Halifax subscriptions have increased ten dollars over the previous year, and the Ladies' account twelve dollars over the like period. Even this small increase is encouraging, when we remember the number of very old and liberal members who have been removed by death, and whose places have so seldom been filled by their nearest representatives. But with all the increase Halifax makes a poor show compared with other places of smaller pretensions. To the various branches in the country much commendation is deserved, especially to the several collectors, many of whom have performed this not very pleasant duty for the past twenty years.

Herewith is submitted your Agent's Report, which will show his work, and that it is duly appreciated by the persons among whom he labours. And here we notice that much valuable time might be saved by bands of young persons undertaking the collections, as is done in some places to great advantage, yielding good fruit, both to collectors and donors, in the valuable Bible Society literature distributed and the information thereby communicated. Your Committee again bespeak your encouragement to Mr. MacKelvie in his visits. His work is laborious and deserves much encouragement from all friends of the Society.

The Halifax Ladies' Bible Association still continue to prosecute their work faithfully, and herewith the substance of their report is submitted.

A grant of Scriptures has been made by your Committee to the Victoria General Hospital, and other public institutions have been attended to when their wants were made known to the Committee.

In reference to the parent Society's operations, we quote from its report of May, 1890, as follows:—

The FINANCIAL accounts show that the total of the Society's income and outlay is, in both items, close on that of last year: But there was then a deficit of some thirteen thousand pounds; and there is a similar deficit now. There has also been an increase on the expenditure; but, considering the whole sum, it is very slight. The Legacies are less than before by some five thousand pounds, but it is pleasant to know that the Free Contributions from Auxiliaries are gradually but steadily rising. The Home Sales are less; but this is more than counterbalanced by a considerable increase in sales abroad.

Looking broadly at the financial position, no one can be content with it: the Society's work has constantly moved forwards, but the normal income has not equally advanced. Behind the Society's splendid opportunities and its achievements there must be a heart just as strong and generous as these are great, and a power which strides, pace by pace, alongside the demands of the task. Until this equilibrium of powerful forces is attained, the friends of the Bible must not, and they cannot rest.¹

¹The figures are: Total receipts, £212,077 10s. 2d. [of which £113,773 6s. 0d. was Free Income, and £98,189 19s. 10d. the sum received for Scriptures sold]; payments £227,566 0s. 8d.; deficit, £15,488 10s. 6d. Last year also there was a deficit of £13,508 18s. 10d.; but in 1888 there was a credit balance, after meeting the deficit of the previous year, of £15,537 3s. 6d. The Free Contributions from England and Wales have, during 1889-90, increased by £1,022 11s. 5d.

The ISSUES of the year have again been large—they rise to a total of over THREE MILLION SEVEN HUNDRED AND NINETY THOUSAND COPIES. This is an advance on those of last year by one hundred and fifteen thousand, and on those of ten years ago of a million of copies. The figures of recent years have been swollen by the special and temporary returns of the 'Penny Testament'; but when these are withdrawn the normal issues show strong and rapid progress, and gives striking evidence of the immense and ever-widening tide of this river of the water of life.

But from these statistics—so practical, so definite, so suggestive of something great which has been accomplished, yet, in another sense, so vague, so insufficient—let us turn to the actual details and the picture of the work to which they refer—a picture full of movement and colour, full also of human reality, and varied as the races and the countries which are seen by glimpses, as in a panorama, passing before the eye. Nothing can be more interesting than the simple narratives of the colporteurs; we travel again with them through the streets of European cities and crowded bazaars of the East—by sheep-paths which lead over the hills of Italy or France—across the wastes of Siberia—along the rivers of China. We listen to them as they converse—ever on the all-absorbing subject—now with Hungarian peasants, then with Persians, with Jews, with Arabs of the Desert, with the Fellahin of the Nile, with Malays, with Koreans. We catch glimpses—in the endless world-wide journeyings—here of the glens of Norway, again of the white roofs of Nazareth and Jerusalem, then of the palm-trees and the bungalows of some district of Hindustan. So graphic are they, so endlessly varied; and yet—like everything which deals with the human spirit, and with the unseen—they suggest immensely more than they describe.

The narrative begins with FRANCE, and in this, its earliest chapter, there is a brightness of tone which is happily preserved—with more or less of interval—onwards to the close. It is not that the circulation has risen to a total which nearly trebles that of the year before—this is accounted for by the Free Distribution at the Exhibition,

and the colportage sales are even less—but there are evidences of a deeper and more substantial kind. ‘It is my strong conviction,’ says M. Monod, ‘that the current of popular thought and life is very apparently less irreligious than it was a few years ago.’ The same hope touches the colporteurs’ journals—often otherwise weary enough—with a pleasant light. ‘It is impossible,’ one writes, ‘to deny that the public religious mind is better in this part of Brittany than ever it was before.’ ‘Here in the Pays Basque, considering the actual state of the people, what is sold now is *certainly* good seed in good ground, living water fertilising the desert.’ It seems to me that in these districts of the Loire and the Rhone superstition is not so general as it was, and that what people call “the Protestant faith” is honoured by many who ten years ago felt nothing but a bitter hatred against the Gospel and the Scriptures which we circulate. Blessed be the Lord for that! Those times are gone, and the light of the Gospel seems to spread. These words are adopted by M. Monod as his own: ‘I like,’ he says, ‘to finish under the impression which they give.’ But, whatever opinion may be ventured as to the signs of general advance, there can be no doubt as to the instances of individual good which constantly appear. As the pages are turned over in the long record of the year, we see the men at work everywhere—they are found in the old towns of the north, in the seaports, among the shepherds of the Adour and of the Alps: we watch them conversing with the reapers in the harvest-fields of Central France: pressing along the crowded thoroughfares of Paris: itinerating among the villages of Auvergne. ‘These little Gospels,’ as one of them calls the Portions, ‘are a great blessing,’ and many impressive stories are told of the way in which they are constantly proving messengers of peace. Nothing can lessen the value of this quiet ministry—or of these instances of individual good. For, after all, each soul is itself a world, and each person the central figure in a history which shall have no end.

M. Monod’s account of the Exhibition—in many ways the central event of the year—is equally pleasant. Over a quarter of a million of Portions of Scripture passed into the hands of visitors, and the nature and work of the

Society were made known perhaps more widely than ever before. It should be added that there are occasional but distinct evidences that the influence of Lasserre's work is by no means exhausted. On the whole, the past year in France has been one of exceptional importance, and much will be expected from the future.

From SPAIN the report of the year is strikingly hopeful: the same slowly liberalising influences which are touching France seem to be also at work beyond the Pyrenees. The copious accounts of Mr. Jameson's colporteurs have left on his mind a strong and distinct threefold impression—'first, that the power of the priesthood is rapidly lessening; next, that rationalism in a crude form is extending; and lastly, that the Scriptures are gradually but increasingly getting into the hands of the people, and influencing their lives.' Beyond these conclusions he does not go. The history of Spanish evangelization has been full of surprises, and many of these have been painful. But it is impossible to ignore the consensus of facts which, in the simple narratives of the journals, become articulate and eloquent. In the meantime, with a care which is expectant as well as prudent, the colportage system has been reorganised 'so that no village may, if possible, be left unvisited: so that no hamlet, no farmhouse may be passed without having the Word of Life offered at the door.' The men have loyally accepted the new and often difficult conditions: they are found climbing almost inaccessible mountain passes, sleeping in the open air, braving all weathers, and, much harder to brave, all discouragements, so that their noble work may be done. If the actual sales are but slightly in advance of those of last year, it is only from the initial difficulties of the new system; and the total circulation of the year has increased. The tone which Mr. Jameson finds in his summary is one of 'hope and expectation'; it has been a year of 'foundation work, where much is unseen, but nothing lost'; and, remembering to how large a degree in Spain this Society is the only agent and messenger of evangelical truth, he reaffirms his assurance that, if ever the Peninsula becomes evangelical, it is to the Bible Society the debt and the honour will to a large extent be due.

From Spain, thus but half awakened from its mediæval sleep, with its languid suppressed life, its lingering traditions, its touches of Oriental manner, the transition is great to ITALY. For in Italy everything is instinct with the movement of modern life—everything is in transition, everything is aspiring and expectant. The accomplishment of political unity is not a final but a first step. 'We have made Italy,' said Massimo D'Azeglio, 'we have now to make the Italians.' Of all this eager motion and hope Signor Meille's annual letter is full: he also would see a new era, and he justly believes that the forces which are—often blindly—feeling their way to a great future can have no safer ally than the Society which would do for Italy what has been done for England, and make the Bible the companion of every fireside. It is in this connection he quotes the words of Professor Teza, of Padua, from whom the Annual Report of last year received an appreciative review, in which he called attention to 'the vastness of our field, the importance of our work, both in its missionary and its linguistic aspects, and the success which has been attained.' In a more recent lecture Professor Teza claimed for the English and the German literatures 'an undeniable superiority to all others, whether ancient or modern, in richness, in variety, in high moral tone, and attributed this to the fact that in both countries the Bible has been the book of the people.' He adds, sorrowfully, that Diodati's version, 'with its brief and pithy style, in which one feels the results of painting and of sculpture, which speaks and comments at the same time,' was quite equal to have rendered in Italy the same noble service which Luther's and our English Bible have in their northern spheres, 'if religious tolerance in former times and religious prejudice at the present day had not made it a forbidden book for the great majority of the Italian people.' These times are surely passing. It is with special interest that Signor Meille notes 'that the variance between the civil Government and the Vatican is wider than ever; that every year the colporteurs visit hundreds of places where the voice of the evangelical preacher is never heard, leaving behind them many copies of the Word of salvation'; that the circulation they have effected is the highest ever known;

that the Society's efforts 'to make the Scriptures a household book from the Alps to Sicily are every year more and more successful ; and that, in spite of an opposition, which is constantly growing more bitter, 'could we only know in how many homes and how many hearts a Bible, a Testament, and even a single Gospel has shed light and consolation, we would have ample confirmation of the Divine promises on which we rely, and also ample encouragement to persevere to the end.'

In leaving Italy we leave also the great Latin peoples of the West ; the Romance tongues are heard no longer ; we are on the confines of the Teutonic races—especially we are on the confines of Germany.

To GERMANY, indeed, one must turn early, and with special attention. Perhaps no chapter of the year is more important than that which refers to the early home of the Reformation. So much of the brain-work of Europe—one may say so much of the brain-work of the world—is done there ; so much power is folded and waiting for its hour of action ; so wide are the influences either of the strength and soundness, or of the decay of the nation's spiritual temper, that one cannot easily overstate the interest of the subject.

For all these, as well as for other reasons, the favourable—almost the triumphant—tone of the annual letter will be doubly welcome. To use Mr. Watt's words, 'the year stands forward as that in which, for an ordinary year, the spread of the Word of God, as a printed volume, reached the highest point ever yet attained in Germany. The circulation of all the Bible Societies, native and foreign, taken together, exceeded six hundred thousand copies. The figures of the German Societies have of late years gone up by leaps and bounds. What is more remarkable is that our own direct circulation has not, as might have been expected, gone back in consequence. On the contrary, with only twenty-seven colporteurs, compared with fifty-eight in 1881, the increase on that year is more than twenty-five thousand copies.' It adds to the suggestiveness of these figures to quote the words in which Mr. Watt sketches the ideal of colportage work, which his own men, as well as others in every field, are nobly realising in actual life. 'Every effort is made to

secure the right kind of work. . . . We wish to think of each Bible, each New Testament and Portion, sold by the colporteur, as an outward and visible sign of a victory gained over hostility or indifference to the Word of God. Viewed thus, the colporteur's work is grand ; nor can its worth and the measure of blessing attending it be gauged by the number of copies disposed of. . . . It is in this spirit we have tried to work during the past year, and our circulation of fifty-five thousand copies by colportage represents to a greater extent than perhaps, on any previous occasion, solid work of this kind done.'

The narratives of the German staff of colporteurs add the substance and actual touch of circumstance which often escapes from general statements like this. Everywhere—from Posen, on the eastern frontier, where one hears the Polish tongue and notices the Slav features, in Silesia, in Bavaria, in Eastern and Western Prussia—to Baden and the Rhine, the men urge their inspiring but often difficult work. There are respects in which it is more difficult in Germany than elsewhere. When one passes from the influence of Catholic intolerance it is often to meet a more fatal power—the 'Free Thought,' which chills spirituality at its heart and scorns every form of religion, and one not infrequently catches a more weary cry of pain from conflict with this featureless power, than from strife with any other foe. But there is nothing more admirable in these simple men than their patience in such tests, their quiet persistence, their gentleness, their faith. Again and again their words awaken old sensibilities ; a sense of better things returns, the forgotten Gospel is opened afresh, and they go on their way rejoicing. It should be added that one of the most characteristic sections of Bible-work in Germany is that devoted to the army ; and Mr. Watt, in noting a circulation of some thirty-five thousand copies, mentions two interesting things ; one, 'the participation in the work of an ever-increasing number of Bible Societies'; the other, 'the warm support of many of the officers in command, some of whom pay for copies to be given to their men.'

What is true of Germany may be found in altered circumstances, but in similar forms, in Switzerland, Holland, Denmark, Belgium, and Norway. These lesser members

of the Teutonic group reproduce within their own boundaries many of the aspects of the work seen in a wider or busier field. In SWITZERLAND there are ten centres of Bible distribution: one of them the recently-formed 'Bible Union,' with which the Society is specially associated, and the records of the year are singularly vivid and encouraging. In HOLLAND, and in view of the proposed withdrawal of this Society, a new Auxiliary, full of purpose and energy, has been formed, and the Netherlands Society is pursuing its course with increased vigour. From the work in DENMARK the sure and skilful hand of Pastor Plenge has been suddenly withdrawn; but the place of that devoted man has been filled by his friend, Colonel I. Ravn, and the work progresses with many signs of encouragement.

BELGIUM lies partly within the Latin, partly within the Teutonic limits; it represents the difficulties of both, and is one of the least rewarding fields; but the circulation of the year has again advanced, and Mr. Kirkpatrick's men have worked with commendable resolution and with success. In the report from NORWAY one seems to pass from scenes of conflict to those of repose: its quiet fjords and mountain parishes lie outside the maelström of less happy life: it is like a return to the old homes of piety: the colporteur passes, amidst the welcomes of the people, from stage to stage of his journey, treated everywhere and honoured as a friend.

At this point the course of the survey sweeps southwards, and draws us again within the whirl of religious and political life. Scarcely any Agency of the Bible Society is more varied in race and language than AUSTRIA-HUNGARY, and few have had a more varied history. Within the wide Hungarian plain, and among the populations which spread themselves along and over the mountain ranges, or beside the levels of the Danube, one may see the East meeting the West, and the past of the Middle Ages and their nomad peoples shaping itself into the future. How sensitive Mr. Millard is to the spiritual interests of his Agency all readers of his reports know, and they will welcome the pleasant message which this year he is able to send. In both the important avenues of issues there has been increase; and, conscious

as he is of the immeasurable difficulties of the field, he is surprised that there has been any advance at all. But, what is far better, there are evidences that a spirit of serious inquiry is in many places being awakened, and that many anxious minds have been led to find peace in the study of the Word of God. These instances come from every part of the Empire, and Mr. Millard 'thankfully lays stress on the fact that this is the case in places in which, up till now, few such happy results have been observed' He adds that the colporteurs' licenses, where these were necessary, have been readily renewed by the authorities, and that the Protestant Churches of the Empire, when meeting in Congress in Vienna, passed a cordial vote in favour of colportage. The survey which his report furnishes of the various provinces of his Agency, is everywhere full of that deep interest which belongs to the history of the soul; and occasionally it becomes warm with expressions of thankfulness for unusual or unexpected advance. 'The accounts from Bohemia,' he writes, 'are most cheering: the circulation has again increased, in spite of great opposition. In Hungary our issues are the largest on record; in Croatia they have again surpassed those of the previous year. Galicia and Bukowina are a difficult field in every respect, yet we find to our joy that our circulation is increased. In Servia, Poland, and Roumania we are permitted to see many evidences of the blessing of our work. From Bosnia, where the first Protestant Church was consecrated last summer, Mr. Millard was delighted to receive a donation from a poor widow in aid of the Bible Society, and from a number of soldiers in Poland a vote of thanks for 'such precious books at so low a price.' No summary of the year can, perhaps, be better than his own. 'Clouds have been dispelled, numerous cares removed, much opposition had to be encountered, not all hopes were realized: but God's abundant blessing has followed our work. May He grant us to spend and be spent in His service, impelled by the power of a Redeemer's love!'

These words may linger in the mind as we pass into the territory of Islam, and feel the touch of its chill and oppressive shadow. Across the south-eastern barriers of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy stretch less the territories

than the influences of the Turkish spirit and its Government; they sweep eastward and southward to Persia and the Indian Ocean. In this empire of Muhammad two famous cities are at the same time the two headquarters of the Society—the one the centre of the new spirit in the Old World, the other of the old and barbaric spirit in the New—Alexandria and Constantinople. The TURKISH and EGYPTIAN Agencies which they represent may suitably be considered together, for both are included in the region which they unitedly occupy. In this survey Greece is included, though politically and religiously it stands apart. The reports of the past year are, perhaps, less cheerful than those which precede them; there are frequent references to the increasing poverty of the people, and the circulation has only maintained itself. From Constantinople, indeed, the real circulation is less, though the total issues are slightly more; from Alexandria there is a genuine increase, but it is slight. Even this, however, is perhaps to be taken as advance rather than loss of ground. To Dr. Thomson's eye three causes amply explain any lessening of the work. One, the prevalence of influenza and kindred disorders; another, the hostile action of the Greek Church in Bulgaria; the third, the rising in Crete. Mr. Weakley's staff has also been touched by the prevalent epidemic, and he has had to work for some time with but a fraction of his force. But in spite of all such qualifications the story of the year is irresistibly vivid and interesting. In the Northern Agency the centres of movement are, perhaps, Albania and GREECE; and from these, as well as, indeed, from the other provinces, there are too many evidences of successful work to allow any sense of disappointment. 'In Greece,' to quote from Dr. Kalopothakes, 'the colporteurs have visited almost all the Cyclades and the Ionian groups, and most of the larger towns and villages on the mainland, and with one or two exceptions they have been gladly received; after a second visit they are received as familiar friends.' It is the modern Greek Bible, adds Dr. Thomson, which is proving the means of awakening the nation from the sleep of centuries; and he emphasises the interesting news that the Patriarchate, conscious, no doubt, of the new spirit of inquiry, has announced the approaching publication of a fresh edition of the New Testament. The

coast of Asia Minor and the famous Ægean Islands have been carefully visited by the colporteurs, and with very general—sometimes with very special—success, and considerable advance has been made in opening up new districts in Macedonia and Albania, as well as in Bulgaria. In Cyprus opposition to Bible-work has almost disappeared, and the returns are in advance of the previous year; in Crete, the work, though largely limited to the cities, and naturally dangerous, has been carried on with admirable courage, and Dr. Thomson believes 'the good leaven' is evidently at work.' Altogether the yearly accounts are 'full of labour,' and it may be added, of conflict, though no striking or brilliant results appear.

The accounts from Alexandria are, perhaps, more varied and they carry more appearance of present success. Alexandria itself has, indeed, had its colporteur force almost entirely withdrawn, but there has been an enlarged circulation at Cario, and good work is being done there. At Port Said the issues have also increased, and a friendly feeling seems to be establishing itself between the colporteur and the sailors whom he visits on their rapid passage. At Aden the circulation has doubled itself, and some tentative journeys have been made to the interior; at Massowah, where the Swedish Mission is at work, the doors have been re-opened at last, and a mule's load of Scriptures, sent to the Tigré country on the road to Khartoum, is the vanguard of the new Christian advance. From Palestine the account are less favourable; but Mr. Letheby still occupies 'Kir of Moab,' and from this 'centre of future work for the interior of Arabia' he already foresees the annexation of the peninsula for Christ.

From the steep of this wild fortress the eye, turning to the north-west, notes the solitary glen which leads, ten miles away, to the shores of the Dead Sea, and beyond to the Mediterranean and the populous spaces of Europe. But should the view be turned eastwards, and the thought pass across the masses of barrier mountains, and again onwards towards the north, it will visit first, the valleys and the cities of PERSIA, where Mr. Douglas is now receiving from the hands of Dr. Bruce the charge of his successful work, and then enter, across the northern fron-

tier, the vast spaces of European and Asiatic RUSSIA. And if, from this limit, the view still sweeps northwards and onwards, at once towards both east and west, it will pause only at the ice of the Arctic Ocean, and in the silence of its deserted shores. It must always be a deep joy to the Society that nowhere are its messengers more generally welcome than among the populations of the great empire to which belongs so much of both east and west—so much of the past and also of the future.

From the St. Petersburg centre Mr. Nicolson is able to send accounts of colportage which has gone actively forward—of a circulation which has broadened its issues by twenty thousand copies, and reached a total of over three hundred and eleven thousand ; of a new sub-agency at Jekaterineburg which breaks the almost endless line of view across northern Siberia, and ‘places the coping-stone on the organisation of the Agency’ and from which within six months, eighteen thousand copies have already been distributed, almost doubling the issues during the whole year before ; of the receipt of the seventh Hundred Thousand, within six years, of the People’s Russ Testament ; of the progress of new versions or new editions for the Kalmuks, the Uzbek Turkis and the Kazan Tatars ; and in one brief, and in itself almost sufficient sentence, of ‘work which has steadily and continually advanced from year to year.’ From the south, Mr. Morrison’s report is equally favourable. ‘The year,’ he writes, ‘has passed without any of those special troubles and anxieties which marked former years ; the circumstances and surroundings of our work are becoming more hopeful, and its simple and holy character has become more generally appreciated in all parts of the country.’ The circulation has increased, in some districts at a very rapid rate, and this in spite of a season during which alternate droughts and floods wasted the lingering harvests. In the case of neither the Southern nor the Northern Agency can details of their various work be given here ; the survey is too rapid, the limits are too confined. One hears of the colporteur plunging painfully from village to village through miles of deep snow, again along swampy roads, almost waist deep in mud and water, but distributing, with unconquerable patience, some two thousand copies during the year. This was in the Kiev district. The same physical difficulties,

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borne with equal fortitude, reappear elsewhere. In the district east of the Black Sea, near Batoum and Kutais, we hear of the moist malarial atmosphere, the brooding fever, the indescribably bad accommodation ; but the men, themselves Orientals bear with these too common conditions, and seven of them, among the fanatical and half-civilised people of these wild mountain districts, sell during the year fourteen thousand copies. This is in Transcaucasia, within the shadows of Ararat. In Turkestan, and in the localities associated with the name of Alexander, where three hundred years before Christ he 'flung the net of Greek civilisation across the East,' we read of similarly successful and, if possible, more interesting work. Tcharjui on the Oxus had last year eight hundred and thirty copies ; Askhabad, five hundred and sixty ; Merv, the 'Queen of the Desert,' four hundred and seventy ; Kerki, on the Afghan frontier, three hundred and sixteen ; Samarkand, two hundred and eighteen ; Bokhara, a hundred and forty-five ; and the work would have been better but for transport difficulties. It is delightful to meet in these journals the familiar statement that everywhere 'the Russian soldier is the colporteur's best friend.' The same thing is noticed by Mr. Millard when speaking of Russian Poland. 'I cannot refrain from repeating,' says one of the colporteurs there, with what evident joy the Scriptures are purchased by the Russians as a people. 'Very often soldiers tell me with what fervent desire they have been wishing to obtain a copy of the Word of God. It is touching to see how they kiss the volume, and press it to their hearts.' Instances of a similar kind are found in every part of the Empire.

From CHINA the reports of the year are less inspiring than these—'the dark lines,' to use Mr. Kenmure's phrase, 'seem more numerous and prominent,' and the total of actual issues in each of the three Agencies is less than those of last year ; but all together they exceed a quarter of a million copies, and this very favorably compares with the circulation of 1887. The tone of the account from the Northern Agency is saddened by allusions to famines and pestilences which have 'reigned'—the expression is Mr. Bryant's—and 'with dire sway,' across the levels of Shantung and Manchuria. The European staff has also been

reduced in the Southern as well as in the Northern Agency, or weakened by temporary illness or absence. Yet each report is pronounced in its favourable estimate of the past and in its outlook—as in many cases where less favorable outer results emphasise the importance of those which are spiritual. These, happily, are far from being rare. Even across the pages of the most disheartened journals lies a ray of light—a thread of gold; it is the light which ever accompanies the history of the individual soul as it moves through confusions of thought and sense to the light which is rising in China with the approach, in these later days of Christ. In out-of-the-way hamlets, in obscure mountain tracks, one hears of copies of the Gospel which have come—one cannot say how, or whence—but as messengers of life and of a new world. The same general statement is true of China's island sister, JAPAN; there also the issues are less; the warm breath of evangelical revival which introduced a new word to the language and a new and happy conception to the mind has for the time subsided, and political movements seem to have absorbed the national thought. But there also the river has sunk only to reappear, for the legend of Arethusa is a reality in the spiritual history of nations and of the soul. Perhaps for both peoples no summary of the year can be more just than that of Mr. Kenmure: 'The great matter is preparedness of heart—good soil for good seed—and this we can see, in China, being realized. There is a movement of the dry bones. New influences are at work; new experiences are being passed through; new light is coming in. There is a demand for railways and telegraphs and electric lights. Material things!—but with them will come knowledge, and with it the knowledge of Christ.

The comparative quiet, the pause in spiritual motion—if indeed there be a pause—which seems to touch the accounts from China, is strongly contrasted by the vigour of those from INDIA. In these the ear seems addressed as well as the mind; we seem to catch the sounds of a conflict which has come from the very advance and victories of Christianity, and which proves how deep and how shattering of the old order these victories are. It is

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as if one heard, in their ancient and famous temples, the voice of the old gods as they alarm each other and go out to battle—as if, in India, the era had come again when the divinities of classic Greece and Rome were fighting with early Christianity for their lives. 'Never,' says one account, 'have the powers of evil been so active in Southern India as now'; and the same report, with a voice more or less emphasised, arrives from other parts of the country. And—just as in the second and third centuries— it is along the great roads, in the cities, wherever active political or intellectual life centres itself, that the force, and almost the despair of the assault of idolatry is seen. In the country districts and up among the mountains one still finds in India—and will find for long—the *Pagani*, the village people who peacefully worship the old deities ; or, hearing of Christ, wonder whether this is not Krishna again in a new incarnation. We have come, it is increasingly evident, to 'the last great battle': to the mutiny, not of the people, but of the powers and tributaries of the vast pantheon of the East, which is to precede the wail—which some believe they have already heard in India, sobbing itself away—'Great Pan is dead.' So far the reports of the year seem to be articulate and significant ; they are equally articulate as to the spirit in which the assault is being hailed, and the way in which it is already being met. Never were the sales of the Madras Auxiliary so high as during last year ; those in the Bangalore territory have also advanced ; in the Panjab they have risen by one-half, and added fifteen thousand to the issues of the previous year. Even more important than this may prove the quiet influence of the two hundred and sixty-six Bible-women who in India and Ceylon have been subsidised by the Society, and by whose means, in the Zenanas and among their native sisters, the circulation of seven thousand Scriptures in 1888 has risen to ten thousand six hundred in 1889. For, again, as in the early centuries, and in the East, as once before in the West, it cannot but be that Christian women, winning back their old place of sweet supremacy, shall develop their unique influence, and tend, as they alone can tend it, the infant Church of their people as it slowly strengthens towards its prime.

Beyond the shores of India and of Asia lie other immense fields occupied by the Society, the island-world of MALAYSIA, of OCEANIA, of AUSTRALASIA, the ever-extending continent of AFRICA, the Dominion of CANADA, the Republics of SOUTH AMERICA. To these hardly a glance can be given here, but their importance is perhaps scarcely less than that of those great peoples whose reports have been reviewed. From Singapore Mr. Haffenden announces a circulation which, from the thirty-three thousand of last Report, now passes forty-eight thousand; and within this total the purely Malay issue have increased a hundred per cent. He speaks of disarmed Muhammadan prejudices, of growing thoughtfulness among the native races; and adds, 'hundreds upon hundreds of towns and villages have been visited and so many registered conversions that, for fear of exaggeration, I must not mention their number.' From NEW ZEALAND and AUSTRALIA the messages of the year are unusually bright; it is evident that the Greater Britain of the southern seas will emulate—it must be hoped will yet surpass—the highest Christian enterprise of the old land. The reports, which barely touch the new world of AFRICA, Morocco and Algiers in the north—and to Egypt reference has already been made—and the group of Auxiliaries of the South, seem all to show the expansion and advance which has elsewhere in this rapid survey been so evident; but the Dark Continent is only as yet touched by the dawn of its approaching day. In the Dominion of CANADA the conflict of race and faith seems to deepen; in the South American Republics the influence of secular life and a low morality is fatal present; but Brazil has received, without bloodshed or political shock, the conditions of religious equality and freedom which have so often proved favourable to the advance of the Kingdom of God.

It is at the close of a survey like this that one may be asked to recollect again some of the figures which were given when it began. It has been said that within the year almost four millions of copies of the Scriptures—whole or part—have been put into circulation. Is it possible still to think of these numbers as they may have

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AGENTS REPORT.

To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia
Auxiliary Bible Society.

GENTLEMEN:

Having left New Brunswick on March 17th to visit the Nova Scotia branches, I began my work as usual in the Stewiacke valley. The meeting places there, as also in the Musquodoboit valley, are not far apart, and as the spring seems to come in there earlier than in some other parts, I take advantage of such, for the shortest distances and choicest roads in spring are none too easily travelled, either by foot or wheel in Nova Scotia. When on the road I felt keenly the debilitating effects of *la grippe*, but my strength increased daily by exercise on road and rostrum, although the weather was often so rough as to seriously interfere with my meetings and projected plans.

At the close of our meeting in MIDDLE STEWIAKKE, the treasurer of that Branch handed me \$13.05 and stated that some of the collectors had not then finished their canvass. On July 4th, the sum of \$4.15 was sent to Halifax.

Owing to a very severe storm we had no meeting at UPPER STEWIAKKE VILLAGE. The contribution of \$17 for the preceding year had been remitted to Halifax only a short time previous to my visit, hence too late for last years report. At South Branch meeting I received from Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Dunlap their annual contribution of \$1, and I notice that your secretary received per Rev. Mr. Grant, \$4.25, being a collection

in South Branch, and also \$1 as his own contribution, also on January 6th, \$3. I hope that the full returns of the UPPER STEWIAKKE Village Branch will be received before the issue of our annual report.

The meeting at SPRINGSIDE was fairly well attended, and the annual gift of \$22.00 for 1889 handed to me, shows quite an advance of previous years, and on January 8th you have received \$23.39.

Through the kindness of Mr. Wm. Johnson I was conveyed to his house near DEAN SETTLEMENT, at which church on the following Sabbath morning I addressed a meeting; and from there I was also kindly conveyed by Mr. Alex. Redmond to UPPER MUSQUODOBOIT church in time for another meeting. At the same place I held a meeting on Monday night, at which the Branch was re-organized; the returns from which are shown on our lists. Now that this old Branch has been revived I hope for its healthy and steady growth, and that every contributor may enjoy the blessing promised to a liberal soul.

The meeting on Tuesday night at ELMSVALE (a section of MIDDLE MUSQUODOBOIT) was well attended. I was glad at having the privilege of addressing our kind friends there, as on two previous visits storms had prevented our meetings, but on the following night my spirits fell, as it stormed so heavily that none dared go out. At the present writing the sum of \$16.55 has been received by your secretary, but as that is only about half of Middle Musquodoboit's usual gift, I suppose that all the collectors have not yet finished their work.

Next day I walked out to LITTLE RIVER, LOWER MUSQUODOBOIT, where I held a small meeting, and received \$4, to which Rev. Mr. Murray added \$1.50

At SHUBENACADIE the meeting was fairly attended, I got the collection of \$2.29, and was assured that collectors would as usual be sent out.

At ELMSDALE I addressed a young people's meeting on Saturday night, and on Sabbath held two meetings there, and another at NINE MILE RIVER. The collection at the latter place was \$1.17, and at the former \$6, to which Rev. Mr. Layton added \$1, making in all \$8.17.

My next meeting was at BROOKFIELD, where I endeavored to organize a Branch, but although ably assisted by a Reverend friend, I failed to arouse the audience to responsive action. The good people there were building a manse and had just assumed the responsibilities of a new congregation; and when I urged them to advance a step higher in christian life,—intimating that if they would be perfect in that respect, they must join the Bible Society ranks,—some, *a la francais*, dubiously shrugged their shoulders, while others stated that on a more convenient season they would gladly enter that blessed state.

The following afternoon, on my arrival at SOUTH MAITLAND, I learned that no meeting had been arranged for, I walked down to MAITLAND, collecting a few dollars by the way, but as the roads were in a fearful condition, and the night dark, I could not visit all our subscribers in that quarter. Our meeting in MAITLAND hall was again a failure, there being another meeting in the town at the same hour, but the following night I had a large audience at SELMA in the Methodist church, where I got a collection of \$4.06. During my canvass of the Maitland district I succeeded in collecting \$40.81, being about 50% better than that of the preceding year.

In the NOEL Branch I held four meetings: one on Friday night at LOWER SELMA, and on Sabbath at EAST

NOEL, NOEL and MOOSEBROOK. The collection at LOWER SELMA was 60 and that at Noel \$2.52. These meetings were fairly attended, but I deeply regret to see such a declension from the high position which NOEL once held as a tributary to the Bible Society, but perhaps, at the present writing, all the contributions have not yet reached your treasury. So far the receipts are \$18.77.

On the 7th I had a fair meeting at WALTON, and got the plate collection of \$1.73, but up to the present date I have had no report from that new Branch. I had to face a snow storm while walking from WALTON to CHEVAREE, but the night was fine and I held a small meeting at that village. Walking from Chevaree to Burlington I collected \$2.75.

The meeting at BURLINGTON was fairly attended, at which I received from the plate 97 cents. No further returns have yet reached us from these two places.

The meeting in the Methodist church BROOKLYN was well attended, notwithstanding the darkness of the night and the heavy roads. Our thanks are due to the Rev. Mr. Ashbury for his admirable speech, and to the church choirs, who kindly united for that occasion. Thanks are also due to the committee and collectors of this fine Branch for their thorough work. I am glad to say that its large contribution of \$55.15 shows an advance of its hitherto good record.

If the committee of NEWPORT Branch think that by extending its bounds, it might become still more efficient, your agent will gladly hold meetings in some other centres as well as in Brooklyn, provided due intimation of such is given him—say a month before his visit.

On Sabbath 13th, I held meetings at GAY'S RIVER and at MILFORD, at which I received respectively, \$5.11

and \$8.06, in all \$13.17, and at the latter place conducted religious service in the evening.

On the 14th April we had a fair meeting at Clifton, where I received \$2.30, being a balance of last year's collection.

This closed my spring trip among the Branches, and the following day I left Nova Scotia, to attend to the work in New Brunswick.

On June 18th I left home to resume work in Nova Scotia. My first meeting on this journey was at **SHERBROOKE**. My audience was very small but attentive and appreciative, for the collection plate returned me \$9.25, and that little band has since sent your treasurer \$10, in all \$19.25.

It rained heavily at **GLENELG** on Sabbath morning, and our meeting was small. The afternoon, however, was lovely, and I was kindly driven by Mr. Alex. Sutherland to East River church, where I had a full house and received the collection of \$7.27. Since then the Rev. Mr. Boyd has remitted your treasurer \$19, in all \$26.27 from that congregation. On Monday morning I was kindly conveyed by the venerable Mr. Gunn to Lochaber Lake.

I addressed meetings on Monday and Tuesday at Union Centre and Lochaber: at the latter place I received \$1.70, and your secretary has since received through Rev. Mr. McLean \$20, making in all \$21.70 as that congregation's gift.

On the 25th we had a very nice meeting at **ANTI-GONISH**, when a plate collection of \$2.56 was handed to me.

Proceeding from Antigonish to **NORTH SYDNEY, CAPE BRETON**, I collected during Friday and Saturday, \$43.50, and at **SYDNEY MINES**, \$15. I was privileged

to address a good audience in the Presbyterian church North Sydney, but my canvass was not so successful in that town as during the preceding year.

On July 1st the entertainment of the brass band interfered with our meeting at SYDNEY. There I succeeded in gathering \$44.50, although I failed to find some old subscribers.

Although there was a concert in COW BAY at the same hour as our meeting there, we had a fair gathering, and during my very short stay I received \$12.50 I had also good meetings at GLACE BAY and Bridgeport, where I received nearly \$26.00.

My visit to BADDECK was again discouraging. The meeting was small, no collection, and only three persons in the village responded to my appeal for contributions. I left collectors cards with the secretary, but at the present date no returns have reached our treasury.

My visit to WHYCOCOMAGH was more successful than in the past. There I received \$12.65, and was assured of better success still in the future.

At PORT HOOD I was paid \$6 for Bibles, which had been sold in our depository there, and at MABOU I held a meeting, at the close of which some ladies promised to solicit subscriptions for the Society; and just as I am writing of MABOU the mail informs me that their efforts realized \$15.75. That was my first visit to Mabou, and I was charmed with its picturesque scenery and the genial hospitality of its people.

I also visited ST. PETERS and WEST BAY for the first time, where I was most hospitably received wherever I went, while financially my visit was very gratifying. On Saturday night I addressed a meeting at ST. PETERS. On Sabbath morning I had a large congregation at the POINTS; and in the evening in the

school house at WEST BAY. In these places I received \$23.66, and thanks for such success are due to a gentleman whose acquaintance I have not yet had the pleasure of making—the Rev. Donald McDougall, who knowing of my intended visit to his parish, before leaving his home on professional duties elsewhere, made every arrangement for my meetings and conveyance from place to place. Such was, indeed, more than a Highland welcome,—it was solicitous prevision; for my every desire was most judiciously anticipated, and plans arranged for their gratification. One friend drove me quite a distance to church in the morning; another to his house for dinner, and afterwards conveyed me about ten miles to the place for the evening meeting. While nearing my destination, another gentleman called my driver to a halt, and addressing me said, if you, sir, are Mr. Mackelvie, please proceed no farther, but come into my house and place yourself under my care. And then at the close of my address a venerable gentleman stepped to the platform and shook my hand as if he had been an old acquaintance, at the same time offering to drive me to PORT HASTINGS next morning,—the place of my next meeting, some twelve miles distant. Verily, were your agent treated so kindly and considerately everywhere in his travels through Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as in Cape Breton, travelling expenses would be small and comforts abundant.

Circumstances of a local character interfered with my meetings at PORT HASTINGS and HAWKESBURY, but at both of these places my canvass was fairly successful. If spared to continue in this work I intend to visit some other parts of Cape Breton, with a view of gaining new tributaries to our cause. And now, as the recipient of so many kindnesses, I cannot close my report on CAPE BRETON without expressing my deep thanks to all who so freely conferred such to myself and to the cause.

And again do I record my gratitude to Captain Burchell for his continued friendliness towards our Society, and for a free pass on his commodious steamers from port to port, on its most lovely lakes and charming coast lines. But I must curb my pen when my subject is CAPE BRETON, or it will run my intended business report into a pæan of praise, for who has ever travelled through that most picturesque Isle, and not gazed with rapture on its lakes resplendant with the sheen of richest jewel, framed and fringed with beaches of lovely pebble and shrubbery, with cliff and mountain range of varied form and hue.

Our meeting at TRURO on July 16th, was fairly attended. By the death of Mr. Blanchard, who for the past three years was president of the Branch, the Bible Society has lost a life long friend. This Branch has again at its head a gentleman who formerly guided its course with success, while it retains as secretary one whose whole heart is in the work, and who cheerfully devotes his energies to the cause. I am glad that Truro's annual contribution has somewhat increased. True, the total receipts were greater on the previous year, but such included \$20—the half of MRS. D. F. CREELMAN'S donation as LIFE MEMBER.

I held meetings at ECONOMY, BASS RIVER, PORTAUPIQUE, FOLLY and MASSTOWN, but failed to get a gathering at GREAT VILLAGE, and made arrangements for a visit there on a subsequent Sabbath. This finished my midsummer course among the Branches. I am sorry to see a slight falling off in the contributions of Bass River and Portaupique; and that at the present writing we have no report from Economy.

On October the 4th I renewed work in Nova Scotia, addressing meetings at GREAT VILLAGE, ACADIA MINES, OXFORD and WALLACE. A very severe storm prevented

me from reaching RIVER HEBERT on that trip, but I attended to that Branch near the close of the year. I failed again to get a meeting in PUGWASH, or the slightest encouragement to our cause; but WALLACE has again done exploits, and merits our deepest thanks.

When at AVONDALE, the night was so dark and stormy, that with difficulty I found my way to the appointed place of meeting, and as I anticipated, none but myself was on the ground. The returns, however, have been made, which show only a small diminution from last years' good contribution.

On Sabbath morning I addressed the Presbyterian congregation at Lower Horton on our cause. I had intended to visit the place again on the following day, but was prevented from doing so by a very heavy storm, On Sabbath evening I was greatly encouraged with my reception at WOLFVILLE. Arrangements were made for our meeting at eight o'clock in the Presbyterian church, and the services in the other churches were shortened to give the worshippers an opportunity of attending. The Rev. Dr. Higgins opened our meeting with appropriate prayer, and I had the privilege of addressing a crowded house, as also the pleasure of seeing a Branch organized. The collection, added to my canvass, amounted to \$20.46.

The night of our meeting at WINDSOR was dark and drizzly, and the audience in the Methodist church consequently small; it, however, was the more select, and we had quite a pleasant meeting. No returns from that Branch up to the present writing have been made, but Windsor has often been late in remitting.

I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Axford at our small meeting at CHURCH STREET, where I received a plate collection of \$5.50 and \$3 from annual contributors.

Our meeting at KENTVILLE in the Methodist church was less hopeful than on previous occasions. Since the last annual meeting of the Branch, its venerable president, Judge Blanchard, had been called to his rest and reward, and in the interim none had been chosen to fill the vacated chair, nor collectors appointed to canvass the town, while other rather inauspicious circumstances affecting the Society tended to increase the solicitude of its friends. At the close of the meeting, the Hon. Judge J. P. Chipman was elected president, who I trust will lead on this Branch to continued prosperity, for in such a course he has the able assistance of a worthy secretary. By the death of Judge Blanchard the Bible Society has lost a life long supporter, and your agent a most hospitable friend.

I addressed meetings at CANARD and CANNING, and at both places received some collections and special contributions, and when on my way there obtained some subscriptions at Port Williams.

On Sabbath the 26th, I held three meetings; in the morning I addressed the Reformed Presbyterian Congregation near GRAFTON; in the afternoon, held a meeting in the Methodist Church, BERWICK, and in the evening at SOMERSET HALL. At the close of the morning service a few friends handed me their liberal gifts. At BERWICK I received from the treasurer of that Branch the gatherings of the lady collector, and at SOMERSET on Monday morning my kind host and family handed me their most liberal contributions. Since my previous visit the SOMERSET Branch has lost a life long and liberal contributor by the death of SILAS BISHOP, Esq. His annual contribution of \$5.00 helped to make Somerset conspicuous, considering its position, as the Banner Branch of Nova Scotia. The loss, however, of one old and valued friend is already compensated by the acquisition of several new ones,

who, to the manner born, will ever maintain the good name of Somerset in Bible Society annals: for, that the very youngest of the family may have a share in this evangelistic work, wee Charlie cheerfully places to his still smaller brothers' credit on our sheet part of the proceeds of his hard earnings in the berry garden.

The heaviest storm of the season occurred on the night appointed for our meeting at AYLESFORD. I had called at the Methodist parsonage at the beginning of the storm, and remained there until the following morning, grateful for the genial hospitality and society of Mr. and Mrs. Gee, to whom in past years I have been often indebted for similar favors.

My hopes of organizing a new branch at MIDDLETON were again disappointed; another meeting of a mere local nature having precluded ours. I trust, however, that my desire may yet be consummated.

For the first time my visit to LAWRENCETOWN was rewarded by a fair meeting. On this occasion it was held in the Methodist Church, and was enjoyed by all present. That little branch, conspicuous for its liberality, still shines amid a region chilled with the apathy of stoics towards our cause. Let us hope that our philanthropic friends there will yet arouse the adjoining districts from their lethargy.

The meeting in the Presbyterian Church, BRIDGETOWN was well attended, and admirably addressed by the Anglican and Methodist ministers. It was certainly the pleasantest and most hopeful meeting held in that town, under the auspices of the Bible Society, for several years past; and I rejoice to record a marked advance in that Branch's contributions. The gift of the previous year was good, but this year's is 50% better; and I am confident that were a canvass extended to the North, South, East and West of that rich district the

future of Bridgetown Branch would become famous in our Auxiliary's annals.

Our meeting at ROUND HILL was held, as before, in the Baptist church, and though small was quite encouraging. During my visit there I had the sad privilege of uniting with many others in paying the last respects to the remains of the venerable Elias Tupper, who two years ago had rendered valuable aid in the organization of that new Branch.

At ANNAPOLIS the meeting was held on Sabbath evening, November 2nd, in the Methodist church. I had the privilege of addressing a full house and received the collection, \$4.97. I have not yet been informed of the result of the collectors canvass. In that town the whole burden of the work rests upon Mrs. Campbell whom none excels in zeal.

We had a good meeting the following night in the Methodist church, DIGBY, where we had the assistance of Rev. Mr. Fisher, who always well pleads the Society's cause. I am glad to see an advance in Digby's contribution, and I am sure such also cheers the heart of the president there.

The night of our meeting at WEYMOUTH was very dark and blustering, still the gathering in the Methodist church was fair, and propitious of continued success to our cause there. The returns show about 25 % advance of the previous years, and the zeal of this new branch evokes our gratitude. I deeply regretted the shortness of my visit to this pretty village, having arrived there in the evening and left at daybreak, and that I could not avail myself of the pleasure drive down the shore, which the courteous president of the Branch had so kindly projected for my benefit; for there was heavy work ahead of me in Yarmouth, the time for which being abbreviated by the thanksgiving day which intervened during my stay in this town.

The meeting at YARMOUTH was held in the Temple on the 6th and fairly well attended. As some of the ministers of the town were elsewhere on duty, our cause on that occasion had not the full benefit of the clergy. The F. C. Baptist minister, however, in a forcible and comprehensive speech rendered our Society effective service. My canvass among the merchants and professional gentlemen of YARMOUTH netted \$71 63; but too much praise cannot be awarded to the ladies of that Auxiliary for their christian zeal and liberality annually manifested towards our cause,—\$168.90 is *their* special contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

On Sabbath, November 9th, I held three meetings in the BARRINGTON BRANCH: these being in the Methodist, Presbyterian and F. C. Baptist churches. The president of the Branch, Rev. Mr. Weston, having removed to Yarmouth, a new committee was elected, and doubtless returns of their work will soon be in your treasury. The plate collections received by me were \$6.07 from the Methodist church, and \$2 from the F. C. Baptist.

On arriving at SHELBURNE I learned that no arrangements had been made for my meeting. Although the notice of meeting at LOCKEPORT was necessarily very short I had a fair audience in the Presbyterian church, but at LIVERPOOL the gathering was unbecomingly small in a cause, which that town more than any other in Nova Scotia would be expected to take a deep interest: for is it not the chief town of a county over which a large number of Bibles are annually distributed free in accordance with a bequest of a former resident. Surely such provision in perpetuity to the poor, should remind others of their duty in forwarding our Bible Society's cause.

It always gives me pleasure to visit MILTON, for there the interest in the cause is deep, and I always

receive a hearty welcome. The meeting was small but the contribution most generous. Would that some other places would follow Milton's example.

Although the *notice* of our meeting at LAHAVE had been *unaccountably short and most unfortunately imperfect*, nearly a hundred people had gathered in the Presbyterian church on Saturday night, November 15th, whom I addressed about an hour. The meeting was of a too sectional character for the business purposes of the Branch, which embraces Methodists, Presbyterians and Lutherans in about equal numbers, and a subsequent meeting was determined upon for the election of officers, of which the Branch then stood sorely in need. On the following Sabbath I preached in the Presbyterian church at the Cross Roads, morning and evening, and lectured on the Bible Society work in the Union church at MIDDLE LAHAVE in the afternoon. I had also the privilege of addressing the Methodist church at Cross Roads, at the close of Mr. Batty's sermon. The returns from this good Branch for the *previous* year reached Halifax after the issue of the report, but appears in this number along with the contributions just now received, which I am delighted to see is much in advance of those in the past. Judging from the long lists, the collectors have made a thorough canvass and merit our warmest thanks.

Owing chiefly to a disagreeable storm on a dark night the meeting in the Temperance Hall, LUNENBURG, was very small,—perhaps the smallest ever held in that fine town under the auspices of the Bible Society; the collections however, although made under unfavorable circumstances, are very good, for which our deep thanks are due to collectors and contributors.

We had a good meeting in the Presbyterian church, MAHONE BAY, when I was ably assisted by the Revs.

Messrs. MAURER and CRAWFORD. There as in Lunenburg, contributions were made separately by the churches, and such were handed me by the treasurer. As yet, however, all the churches have not responded to our appeal, but that branch is young, and I trust, will in due time be sustained by every congregation in that beautiful town.

The following night our meeting in BRIDGEWATER was fairly attended, and was addressed by three ministers of the town, and also by Hon. Judge Desbrisay, to whom three years ago, I was greatly indebted for invaluable assistance in the formation of that LADIES' BRANCH, which has ever since shewn its sympathy with our cause by its annual munificent contributions. Again I tender these ladies' my sincerest thanks, while congratulating them on the great success which has followed their christian activity.

My next meeting was at DARTMOUTH, on November 20th, in the Methodist church, and was far from being satisfactory in point of numbers present. I regretted the absence of some ministers, and that other meetings in the town were held at the same hour. The meeting was well presided over by the Rev. Mr. Johnson, and addressed by the Rev. Mr. George, and I think that all present enjoyed the rehearsal of the Society's success in the diffusion of God's saving light over a dark world. You will be equally pleased with your agent at seeing the handsome contribution which the good ladies of Dartmouth have passed into your treasury, and I am sure they have also your hearty thanks.

On Sabbath, 23rd, I addressed the Presbyterian congregation at ONSLOW and BELMONT, where I received the plate collections of \$7.33 and \$10.30 respectively, and at the close of the Onslow service Mr. John Dickson handed me his contribution of \$5.00, thus making the handsome gift of \$22.67 from that congregation.

On the 24th we had a fair meeting in the Presbyterian church, PARRSBORO, and the day following I canvassed the town with fair success.

Our meeting at SPRINGHILL, was in the Methodist church at the close of the prayer meeting. As yet, no returns from there have reached us, which may be due to losses through the great strike at the coal mines.

Our meeting in the Methodist church at RIVER HEBERT, was quite pleasant, and the contribution from that new branch very good.

As in former years our meetings at AMHERST had been poorly attended, no attempt was made to procure a special meeting during my visit on this occasion. I succeeded however, in getting a hearing at the Sabbath services in the Methodist and Baptist churches, and also at the usual afternoon services in Y. M. C. A. rooms, and on Wednesday of the following week at the Presbyterian prayer-meeting. The committees of the AMHERST BRANCH, finding it difficult to obtain lady collectors, advised me to make a canvass of the town, and during my two days stay I succeeded in gathering \$73.55, a list of which I left there, also some collector's cards, with the view of having my work supplemented, if possible, by lady collectors. At the present writing I am notified that Miss E. Moffat kindly undertook to do part of that work, and collected from members of the Episcopal church \$8.70, and I hope that more will follow from other sources.

On the 13th December I met with the committee of the HALIFAX LADIES' ASSOCIATION, to consider ways and means of advancing the cause in your city. The day however was extremely cold, and that, with other causes, prevented a full meeting of its members. Plans for reducing the outlay of Bible women's work in the

city were entertained, and suggestions made for a thorough canvass of Halifax in support of our Society. And permit me to say that it is to the Ladies' Association rather than to your committee, that I look for that advance along our lines, which will not only retrieve the position which Halifax ever held in our annals, but will place on our columns as supporters worthy of their means, the names of every merchant and professional gentleman in Halifax; which will arouse enthusiasm in every family and besiege the mammon fortified estates until they yield due tribute to our cause; and which will not cease to importune the churches until every congregation consecrates one Sunday in the year with its golden offerings to the British and Foreign Bible Society's world wide mission.

On Sabbath evening, December 14th, through the courtesy of the Rev. Mr. Ackman, I preached to his congregation and addressed them briefly on our cause; and with that service my work in Nova Scotia during 1890 came to a close.

When the full returns for the year will be in, such may, in some measure, certify to my fidelity in carrying on this laborious but honorable work; but in too many places the cry of hard times drowned my own words of appeal. Doubtless the cry in some cases was too true, but in others the *day will declare* such unjustified by facts, and that those who have hidden and withheld the Lord's money will meet the reward of their avarice and ingratitude. But preferring to contemplate the bright side of our cause with its christian supporters, we would cheer on our friends with the assuring words of the Master that the merciful shall be recompensed at the

RESURRECTION of the Just.

It becomes me in closing this report to record my indebtedness to the ministers of every Protestant church

for their invaluable assistance at meetings, and for their efforts otherwise to aid our cause: and to them, to the officers of Branches and collectors I now render my warmest thanks; deeply too am I grateful to HIM, who is the source of all blessings, for health and strength granted me in the prosecution of the work, and for my travelling mercies, and that I have still the honor of subscribing myself,
