OUR CHURCH knows no other place for the celebration of the Marriage Service than the House of God. This wholesome rule, in the early days of the Province, when the churches were few, it was, perhaps, impossible rigidly to observe. For a long time however, and over by far the greater part of the diocese, there has been no other reason for the practice of marrying in private houses than the inveterateness of the custom, which had grown out of the necessities of a sparsely settled country. Marriage is, indeed, a civil contract. And it so happens that the State, for its own convenience, empowers the ministers of religion to register that contract. t as a matter indifferent whether the contract be made in a private house or in a church. With all this we have nothing to do. But, besides this, marriage has another aspect for us. It is a religious rite—a contract made before God—and it little becomes us, as God's ministers, to lend ourselves to assist in the perpetuation of any custom of which the tendency is to sink this part of the ceremony, and to derogate from the sacredness—the religious character—of the marriage relation. Nor can it be a right or a seemly thing for the ministers of the Church, moved by no necessity, but only in gratification of a popular whim, to fly in the face of the Church.

The Cassock should always be worn under the Surplice; it should button down the front, and reach down to the feet; the Surplice should be about ten inches shorter.

The square cap, or else the Priest's cap, should always be used with cassock or surplice.

Epistle and Gospel.

Out of the 67 Minor Festivals in the English Calendar, 16 are of Eastern origin, 17 are British 15 French, 2 African, 1 Spanish, 16 Italian or Sicilian. Of these 31 commemorate persons or events before the first General Council in 325; 19 belong to the interval between the 1st and 6th Council in 680; 7 between that date and the schism between East and West in the 9th century; and 10 belong to the period subsequent to that division. Those of S. George, Lammas Day, S. Laurence, and S. Clement were restored to the Calendar in Queen Elizabeth's reign. These Festivals may well be commemorated by the use of special Hymns in the Service.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

The Anglican Church in this country, as in other Colonial essessions of Great Britain, traces her descent from the Apostles of r Blessed Lord through that branch of the Holy Catholic Church, hich, in the earlier ages of Christianity, was planted in the British des. To the Church of England, then, are we indebted, under God, r our first foundation and "for a long continuance of nursing care d protection." For many years the work of the Church in America s carried on under most unfavourable circumstances. resident Episcopal authority. Efforts had been made as early as 73 to obviate this very apparent difficulty, but the accomplishment the design was interfered with. In 1705, direct application was ade to the Mother Church to be supplied with a Suffragan Bishop, d the petition having met with the approbation of the Society for opagating the Gospel in Foreign Parts, they embodied it in a morial to the Crown in 1709. In 1715, the Society repeated their plication to the Crown, urging the necessity that existed for the inting the prayers of the petitioners. Difficulties arose, however, ich again prevented the appointment. After repeated efforts and ch discussion on both sides of the water, the long cherished desires the petitioners were crowned with success, and the Episcopal office as conferred on the American Church in the person of Dr. Seabury, I two years later, on the Canadian Church, in the person of Dr. harles Inglis, formerly Rector of Trinity Church, New York.

Dr. Inglis was consecrated in 1787 with the title of Bishop of ova Scotia, also having ecclesiastical jurisdiction over the Provinces Upper and Lower Canada, New Brunswick, and the Island of ewfoundland. The territory was vast and sparsely populated, here being but twenty clergy throughout the whole

As time wore on, and the population of the country increased, so d the demand on the Church's watchful care and attention. occessive reductions of the once vast Diocese were made; more shops were consecrated, and Priests and Deacons ordained, until what was but a comparatively short time since under the supervision of a single Bishop with a little band of twenty faithful followers, is now ruled and guided by eleven Right Reverend Fathers in God, assisted by upwards of five hundred earnest, self-denying Clergy. There are now fifteen Dioceses, each, with the exception of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, being governed by a Synod composed of Clerical and Lity representatives from each Parish, presided over by the Bishop. These various Synods deliberate and determine upon such matters as may appear necessary for the welfare of the Church in their own Diocese. Questions of more serious import, affecting the whole body, are determined by the Provincial Synod.

The following Dioceses are represented in the Provincial Synod: Montreal, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Toronto, Fredericton, Huron, Ontario.

An Act to enable Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to meet in Synod.

Proclaimed May 28th, 1857.

HEREAS doubts exist whether the members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province have the power of regulating the affairs of their Church, in matters relating to discipline, and necessary to order and good government, and it is just that such doubts should be removed, in order that they may be permitted to exercise the same rights of self-government that are enjoyed by other religious communities; therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:

I. The Bishops, Clergy and Laity, Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province, may meet in their several Dioceses, which are now, or may be hereafter constituted in this Province, and in such manner and by such proceedings as they shall adopt, frame constitutions and make regulations for enforcing

Synod in each Diocese, one or more delegates (not exceeding three in any case) may be elected at the annual Easter meetings in each parish, mission or cure within the Diocese, or in cases where there may be more than one congregation in any parish, mission, or cure. then in each such congregation, or at meetings to be specially called for the purpose by each Clergyman having a separate cure of souls; and all laymen within such parish, mission, or cure, or belonging to such congregation, of the full age of twenty-one years, who shall declare themselves, in writing, at such meetings to be members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and to belong to no other religious denomination, shall have the right of voting at such election, Each delegate shall receive from the Chairman of the meeting a certificate of his election, which he shall produce when called upon so to do at the Synod; and the first meeting of such Synod shall be called by the Bishop of the Diocese at such time and place as he shall think fit: provided always that no business shall be transacted by the Synod of any Diocese unless at least one fourth of the Clergy of such Diocese shall be present, and at least one-fourth of the congregations within the same be represented by at least one delegate.

II. All proceedings heretofore had in any Diocese under the aforesaid Act, which have been conformable to the provisions of this Act, shall be held to be valid, as if the same had taken place after

the passing of this Act.

DECLARATION.

We, the Bishops of the United Church of England and Irelam within the Province of Canada, together with the Delegates fron the Clergy and Laity of the Diocesan Synods, now assembled in the first Provincial Synod under Royal and constitutional authority, and intending, under God's blessing and guidance, to consider and determine upon such matters as shall appear necessary for the welfare of the Church in this Province, desire to express our most humble and hearty thanks to Almighty God, that it has pleased his in his Providence to set over us a Metropolitan, and thus to enable us, as in the arcient days, to assemble as one body, under the direction of his Holy Spirit, whose aid we now invoke, in the nam of his only begotten Son, for the consolidation and advancement this kingdom in this Province.

Before entering on the business for which we are at press assembled, we desire publicly to declare the principles upon which

we propose to proceed.

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As members of that Church, we recognize the true Canon of Holy Scripture as set forth by that Church, on the testimony of the Primitive Catholic Church, to be the rule and standard of Faith: we acknowledge the Book of Common Prayer and Sacraments, together with the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, to be a true and faithful declaration of the doctrnes contained in Holy Scripture; we maintain the form of Church government by Bishops, Priests and Deacons, as Scriptural and Apostolical; and we declare our firm and unanimous resolution, in dependence on Divine aid, to preserve those doctrines and that form of government, and to transmit them to our posterity.

In particular, we maintain the ancient doctrine of our Church, that the Queen is rightfully possessed of the chief government and supremacy over all persons within her dominions, whether ecclesiastical or civil, as set forth in the 37th of the Articles of Religion: and we desire that such supremacy should continue unimpaired.

It is our earnest desire and determination to confine our deliberations to matters of discipline, to the temporalities of the Church, and to such regulations of order, or modes of operation as may tend to her efficiency and extension: and we desire no control or authority over any but those who are or shall be members of the ame Church.

We conceive that the following, or such like objects, may fitly

ome under our consideration, and lead to action on our part:

1. To form a Constitution for this Synod, and to regulate the ime and place of the meetings, and the order and manner of its proceedings.

To provide for the proper exercise of Ecclesiastical Discipline, a regard to both Clergy and Laity, by modifying and enacting anons, and by establishing and ordering a Court of Appeal.

3. To provide, with consent of the Crown, (when needed) fit egulations for the Appointment of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, in coordance with the Canons of the Universal Church.

4. To provide, with the consent of the Crown, for the division of the Province into New Dioceses, as occasion may require.

5. To procure from the Colonial Legislature any Laws or modifications of laws, which the circumstances of the Church may require.

6. To promote the future consolidation and united action of the

whole of the Dioceses of British North America.

Proceeding upon these principles, which, as we humbly thank God, were, under His good guidance, first among the Colonial Churches, publicly set forth amongst ourselves, and have been sustained by the acceptance of our brethren through a large part of the Colonial Dominions of our beloved Queen, we firmly rely and depend upon His continued blessing and guidance; and we humbly pray that He, who is the God of unity and peace, may ever be with

us, and so chasten our affections, purify our motives, and guide our judgment, that we may be enabled to contribute to the efficiency, concord and stability of the Church in this land.

*CONSTITUTION OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

1. The Provincial Synod shall consist of the Bishops of the United Church of England and Ireland, having Sees within the Province of Canada, or executing by due authority the Episcopate as assistant or Missionary Bishops therein, and of Delegates chosen from the Clergy and from the Laity.

2. The Bishops shall deliberate in one House, and the Delegates from the Clergy and the Laity in another, and each House shall hold its sittings, either in public or in private, at its own discretion.

3. The Clerical and Lay Delegates shall consist of twelve of

each Order from each Dioceso.

4. The Synod shall meet on the second Wednesday of September in every third year, or oftener, at the discretion of the Metropolitan; or on the requisition of any two Bishops, or of the Bishop'and half the Delegates of each order in any Diocese.

5. In a Vacancy of the Metropolitan See, a meeting may be called at the appointed period, or en either of the above requisitions,

by the Senior Bishop of the Church in Canada.

6. A Quorum of the Synod shall consist of not less than a majority of the Bishops and not less than one fourth of the members of each Order of the Lower House.

7. The Metropolitan, or some Bishop appointed by him, shall be the President of the Upper House; and in the vacancy of the See the House of Bishops shall elect one of their own number to preside.

8. The Lower House shall be presided over by their Prolocutor,

to be chosen viva voce on motion of any member of that House. 9. Each House shall appoint a Secretary or Secretaries, who shall keep regular accounts of all proceedings in their own House, shall record them in books provided for the purpose, shall preserve memorials and other documents under the direction of the President and Prolocutor, shall attest all public Acts of the Synod, and deliver over all records and documents to their successors,

10. The Expenses of the Syncd shall be provided for, and its financial concerns managed by a Committee of the Lower House,

after a manner to be approved by both Houses.

11. Each House shall establish its own order of proceeding and Rules of order, and may publish such of its proceedings as may appear advisable.

12: The Upper House shall propose to the Lower any Business they may desire to have treated of or decided; and it shall be ncumbent on th usiness in prefer

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e Lower any Business ded; and it shall be neumbent on the Lower House to take up and dispose of such usiness in preference to any other.

13. The Upper House may direct the Lower to appoint a committee to report to the Upper on any subject on which they nay desire the judgment of the Lower, or to appoint their portion f a joint committee; or may summon the Lower to a conference.

14. Messages from the Upper House shall be delivered by an ficer of the Upper to the Secretary of the Lower, by whom they hall be communicated to the Prolocutor, who shall communicate

nem to the House.

15. The Lower House may present to the Upper any matter hich they conceive to be a grievance or to require amendment, en when they have no proposition to make on the same; and the pper House shall thereupon place it in order for consideration, it a view of providing a remedy; and shall, before the conclusion the session, declare to the Lower House the result.

16. The Prolocutor shall have the right of admission, personally by Committee, to the Upper House, to communicate the desire or ecisions of his House; and in such case he shall ascortain, by essage, when he or the Committee can conveniently be received in

e Upper House, and act accordingly.

17. It shall be competent to the Lower House to request a Joint mmittee or Conference on any special object, beyond those subtted to it by the Upper House, or to propose for discussion any seific measure; to which request an answer shall be given; but it all be at the option of the Upper House to accede to their request not.

18. When either House shall desire a Conterence with the other, a Joint Committee, the reason for either shall be agreed to by the use desiring it, and communicated in writing to the other; the docutor, personally or by committee, in either case proceeding to Upper House either to deliver or to receive such reasons.

19. When either House shall have come to a decision upon any bject in which the other House is concerned, it shall communicate

decision to the other.

20. If the Lower House should not concur in a decision of the pper, they shall, in stating their non-concurrence, state their ason; and may either propose an amendment, or request the pper House to suggest an amendment to meet their reason or quest a conference.

21. If the Upper House should not concur in a resolution or ecision of the Lower House, they may, in stating their non-neurrence, either state their reasons or not; and may either ropose an amendment or request the Lower House to prepare an mendment or appoint a conference, to which the Lower House hall always give attention.

22. The Conference may be either by deputation from both

Houses, or by deputation from the Lower House, or by open conference, as the Upper House may think fit; and the place shall be appointed by the President.

23. No proposition shall be considered as sanctioned by the Provincial Synod until it has received the separate sanction of both Houses, which shall be declared by the President in writing.

24. Committees, whether of either House, or of the two Houses, may hold their meetings either during recesses in the session, or during the prorogation of the Synod.

25. No alteration of the Constitution or Canons shall come into operation until it has been confirmed at a second session of the Provincial Synod.

26. Each meeting of the Synod shall be preceded or commenced by Morning Prayer and a Sermon, if so ordered by the Metropolitan, and on the first day of such meeting the Holy Communion shall be administered.

27. The business of each day shall be commenced by prayer for the Divine guidance and blessing, according to a form authorized by the House of Bishops.

28. The election of the Clerical and Lay Delegates shall be certified under the hand and seal of the Bishop of the Diocese which they represent, or, in the absence of the Bishop, the Chairman of the Synod, and such certificate shall be final and conclusive, which certificate shall be forwarded by the Secretaries of the Diocesan Synod to the Secretaries of the Lower House of the Provincial Synod within fourteen days after said election.

PERMANENT ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS, AS ADOPTED BY BOTH HOUSES.

1. The Provincial Synod shall meet at the place of deliberation (notice being previously given by the Metropolitan or his deputy, of the time and place of meeting); the Bishops attired in their proper robes, and the Clergy in their gowns, cassocks, bands, and hoods; and shall proceed in procession to the Cathedral for Divine service, on which occasion the Holy Communion shall always be administered. The Litany shall be said by the junior Bishop; the Preacher shall be appointed by the Metropolitan, and special prayer shall be made for the Synod. The collection shall be applied to the current expenses of the Synod, unless otherwise ordered by the Metropolitan.

2. At an appointed hour after Divine service the Members of the Synod shall re-assemble at the place of deliberation, where, after the President has taken his seat, he shall inform the Lower House with regard to the

3. When the Prolocutor has been elected, he shall be conducted to the Upper House by the Chairman, accompanied at discretion by any members of the Lower House, and his election announced to the President.

4. The President shall then state to him the business which the Upper House desire to engage the attention of the Lower House, specifying, when necessary, the order in which they desire it to be

taken up.

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5. On his return, the Prolocutor shall first nominate his own deputy (in case of his absence) and then introduce to the House the business on which the Upper House desire them to engage themselves.

6. On every day of meeting after the first, the Synod shall meet at 9 a.m., and shall proceed at once, before any business is announced, to Morning Prayers at the Cathedral, or the place appointed, and,

after Prayers, proceed to siness.
7. Before the conclusion of the Session, the President, with the consent of the House of Bishop, shall issue a Schedule, declaring the state in which each matter of Business now stands which has been brought before the Upper House, and promulgate it to the Lower House; reserving all unfinished Business to the next Session, and Proroguing the Synod.

8. The Prolocutor, in receiving the schedule of prorogation, shall, at the first opportunity, communicate it to his House, which

shall not prolong its sittings beyond that day.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE LOWER HOUSE.

1. After Prayer, the Clerical and Lay Secretaries shall call the

roll of their respective orders.

2. The election of the new Secretaries shall be made by the Clergy and Laity respectively. A Treasurer and two Auditors shall also be appointed, all of whom shall hold their offices until their successors shall be appointed.

3. After this the Order of Business shall be as follows:-

(1) Reading, correcting, and approving the Minutes of previous meeting.

Appointing Committees,

(8) Presenting, reading, and referring Memorials or Petitions. Presenting Reports of Committees, of Treasurer, or Auditors.

Giving Notices of Motion.

Taking up Unfinished Business.

(7) Consideration of Motions.

(8) Orders of the Day.

(9) Before the final adjournment of the Synod, reading, correcting, and approving the Minutes of the last day's Proceedings.

*RULES OF ORDER.

1. The Lower House shall meet on the day and at the hour and place appointed by the Metropolitan or President, unless otherwise ordered by the House, and on each succeeding day at ten o'clock; and the mid-day adjournment shall be from one o'clock to half-past two p.m.; and the business, except the work of Committees, shall conclude at six p.m., at which hour the House shall proceed to the Cathedral for Evensong. The Clergy shall appear in gowns and bands. When the Prolocutor has taken the chair, every member shall sit uncovered.

2. The Prolocutor shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, to be decided without debate; and when called upon to decide a point of order, he shall state the rule applicable to the case, without argument

or comment.

3. When any member wishes to speak, he shall arise and address the Chair.

4. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Prolocutor shall name the party first to speak.

5. A member called to order while speaking shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.

6 No motion or amendment shall be considered as before the

House, unless seconded and reduced to writing.

7. No member, save the mover of a resolution, who, as mover, is entitled to reply, shall speak more than once, except by permission of the House.

8. A member may rise to explain, if permitted by the Chair.

9. No original motion, except motions of course, shall be received

without notice, except by permission of the House.

10. When a resolution has been moved and seconded, any Member may require the previous question to be put, whether the motion so made shall be put or not, and that question shall be decided without debate.

11. When a motion has been read to the House by the Prolocutor, it cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the House.

12. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received by the Chair, unless to amend it or postpone it, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment, or for the previous question, and no more

19. When the Prolocutor is putting a question, no Member shall se from his seat; and every Member present, when a question is t, shall be required to vote on the same, unless excused by the

20. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, d then those who vote in the negative; and in case of an equality votes the question shall be decided by the casting vote of the olocutor, who may also vote on the motion.

21. When required by two Clerical and two Lay Delegates, the te of the House upon any question may be taken by orders voting arately; and in that case a majority of both orders shall be cessary to an affirmative vote.

22. On a division, the names of those who vote for or against uestion shall be recorded in the Minutes, if required by three embers.

23. A question being once determined shall not again be drawn to discussion in the same Session, without the unanimous consent

24. Committees shall not be appointed without notice, excepting anding Committees, Committees of the Prolocutor to the Upper ouse and Committees of course, such as those which follow upon ne adoption of a resolution, which requires a Committee.

25. When a separate Committee of this House has been named, hose function is deliberative, the Prolocator shall direct what umber of its members do form a quorum, unless the quorum be xed by the resolution under which the committee is appointed.

26. When a Committee is appointed, the Mover of the resoluon asking for the Committee shall be the Chairman of the Com-

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mittee, or when a resolution is referred to a Committee, the Mover of the resolution shall be Chairman, unless the Committee has already been organized.

27. Reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman, and shall be received in course, but a motion may be

made for re-committal.

28. Motions with reference to Reports from Committees shall

take precedence of other motions on the paper.

29. Whenever it shall happen that members appointed on Committees are not re-elected to the Provincial Synod, the Procolutor may appoint others from the same diocese or dioceses to fill their place; and in order thereto a copy of the certified lists of clerical and lay delegates sent to the Secretaries shall be sent by them to the Prolocutor.

30. It shall be the duty of the Secretaries to arrange a list of all unfinished business, and all notices of motions sent to them by members to be brought before the Provincial Synod, according to the order in which they are received; and under the direction of the Metropolitan, to cause a printed copy of the same to be sent to every member of the Synod twenty-one days before its meeting; which business and notices shall stand first on the order of the day.

31. A Standing Committee of one Clerical and one Lay Delegate from each Diocese shall be appointed on the first day of the meeting of the Synod, and such Committee shall arrange for each day the order of precedence of the several motions, of which notice

has been given, and have them printed.

32. In any unprovided case resort shall be had to the Rules of

Order of the House of Commons in Canada for guidance.

33. No Canon shall be enacted unless the same has been transmitted by the Secretaries of the Lower House to the Members of the Provincial Synod at least one month before the meeting of the Synod, or unless the same has been left over as unfinished business and printed in the journal of the previous Session.

UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE, TORONTO.

This University was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing te 16th July, 1852, and empowered to confer Degrees in Divinity, ets, Law, and Medicine.

The Convocation of the University consists of the Chancellor, Provost and Professors of Trinity College, and all persons mitted to the Degree of Master of Arts, or to any Degree in vinity, Law, or Medicine, in the University.

OXENDEN, THE MOST REVEREND ASHTON, D. D. BISHOP OF MONTREAL, AND METROPOLITAN OF CAN-ADA, fifth surviving son of the late Sir Henry Oxenden, Bt., was born at Broome Park, Kent, in 1808. In 1831 graduated B. A. at University College, Oxford, and two years later was ordsined Deacon by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, and by the same Prelate advanced in the following year to the Priesthood. He began his ministerial duties in the Parish of Barham, near Canterbury, while in Deacon's orders. In 1848 was removed to the Rectory of Pluckley-with-Pevington, in Kent, which charge he retained until 1869. Was also in 1864 appointed an Honorary Canon. of Canterbury Cathedral. In 1869 he was nominated by the Pro vincial Synod of Canada to the Metropolitical See of Montreal, and in August of the same year was Consecrated at Westminster Abbey by the Right Honourable and Most Rever-end Archibald Campbell Tait, D. C. L., Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Rochester and Ely. His first Episcopal act was the holding an Ordination in Christ Church Cathedral, Montreal, when the Revds. P. De Gruchy, B. B. Smith, and R. D. Mills were admitted to the Diaconste. Dr. Oxenden has written "Decision" (second edition); "Prayers for Private Use" (thirty second thousand); "Sermons on the Christian Life" (twelfth thousand); "God's Mossage to the Poor;" "Baptism Simply Explained;" "The Pastoral Office;" "The Pathway of Safety;" "A Plain History of the Christian Church;" and various

FEILD, THE RIGHT REVEREND EDWARD, D. D., BISHOP OF NEWFOUNDLAND, born in 1801; formerly Michel Fellow of Queen's College, Oxford, and Rector of English Bicknor, Gloucestershire. In 1843, the See of Newfoundland becoming vacant by the translation of Bishop Spencer to Jamaeia, Dr. Feild was nominated by the Crown as his successor. He was Consecrated at Lambeth en Sunday, the 28th of April, 1844, by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London and Worcester. The Bishop of Newfound-

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land also exercises Episcopal jurisdiction in the Bermudas. Dr. Feild is assisted in the work of his very extensive Diocese by a coadjutor Bishop.

MEDLEY, THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN, D. D., BISHOP OF FREDERICTON, born in London, Eng., 1804. In 1826 graduated B.A., in honours, at Wadham College, Oxford. He was admitted to Deacon's Orders in 1828, and Priest's the following year, by the Right Reverend the Bishop of Exeter, in Exeter Cathedral. for several years Vicar of S. Thomas's, Exeter, and Prebendary of Exeter Cathedral. On New Brunswick being erected into an independent Diocese, Dr. Medley was nominated by the Crown as first Bishop, under the title of Bishop of Fredericton, and in 1845 was Consecrated in Lambeth Chapel by the Most Reverend Archbishop Howley, assisted by the Bishops of Oxford, Lincoln, Winchester and London. Bishop Medley exercised his Episcopal authority for the first time in advancing two Deacons to the Priesthood. He has published "The Episcopal Form of Church Government, its Antiquity, &c.;" "The Reformation, its Nature, its Necessity, and its Benefits; "Sermon Preached before H. R. H. the Prince of Wales on His Visit to Fredericton, 1860, Christ Church Cathedral;" and several other volumes of Sermons.

BINNEY, THE RIGHT REVEREND HIBBERT, D. D., BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, son of the Reverend Dr. Binney, Rector of Newbury, Berks. Born in Nova Scotia, 1819. Educated in England; studied for some time at King's College, London. Subsequently he became Scholar and Fellow of Worcester College. Oxford, where he graduated in 1842 in Classical and Mathematical honours. Ordained Deacon in 1842; Priest 1843. Was appointed Tutor of his College in 1846, and Bursar 1848. In 1851 was nominated to the vacant See of Nova Scotia, and on the 25th of March of the same year was Consecrated in Lambeth Chapel by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Oxford and Chichester. Bishop Binney's first exercise of the Episcopal office was an Ordination in which six candidates were admitted to the Diaconate, and one to the Priesthood, Married in 1855, Mary, daughter of the Honourable W. B. Bliss, first Puisne Judge of Nova Scotia.

HILLS, THE RIGHT REVEREND GEORGE, D.D., BISHOP OF BRITISH COLUMBIA, eldest son of the late Rear-Admiral Hills, born at Egthorne, Kent, England, 1816. Was educated at the University of Durham, where he graduated B.A. and M.A., subsequently taking the degree of B.D., and in due course that of D.D. Was ordained Deacon in 1839, at S. James' Church, Piccadilly, by the Right Reverend Dr.

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GEORGE, D.D., st son of the Kent, England, Durham, where king the degree rdained Descon in ght Reverend Dr. Bowstead, Bishop of Lichfield, and Priest by the Right Reverend Dr. Maltby, Bishop of Durbam, at Auckland, Durham. Was successively Curate of North Shields, Northumberland; Lecturer and Curate of Leeds Parish Church; Incumbent of S. Mary's, Leeds; Incumbent of Great Yarmouth, Norfolk, and in 1850 appointed Honorary Canon of Norwich Cathedral. On British Columbia being created a Bishopric in 1859, Dr. Hills was nominated by the Crown as first Bishop, and on S. Matthias day of the same year, was Consecrated in Westminster Abbey by the Most Reverend The Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Oxford, Norwich, Newfoundland and Western New York. His first ordination was held in S. John's Church, Victoria, when the Rev. John Chittenden was advanced to the Priesthood. Dr. Hills married in 1865, Maria, Philadelphia, Louisa, eldest daughter of Admiral Sir Richard King, Bart., K. C. B.

LEWIS, THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN TRAVERS, D.D. LL.D., BISHOP OF ONTARIO, son of the Reverend John Lewis, Rector of S. Anne's, Shandon, Cork; born 1827; educated at Trinity College, Dublin, where he graduated as Senior Moderator in ethics and logic, and with honours, in Classics and Mathematics; was also Gold Medallist. Was admitted to Holy Orders in 1848, and was appointed to the Curacy of Newton-Butler. Came to Canada in 1850 and received from the Bishop of Toronto the Parochial charge of Hawkesbury, which he subsequently exchanged for the Rectory of Brockville. It having become necessary to divide the Diocese of Toronto, Dr. Lewis was chosen in 1862 as first Bishop of the new See, with the title of Bishop of Ontario, and the same year received Consecration. Married in 1851, Anne Henrietta Margaret, daughter of the Honourable Henry Sherwood, Attorney-General of Upper Canada. Has written "The Church of the New Testament;" "Does the Bible need Re-translating," published in the American Quarterly Church Review; "The Primitive Mode of Electing Bishops," published in the Journal of Sacred Literature, London, and several other articles.

WILLIAMS, THE RIGHT REVEREND JAMES WILLIAM, D.D., BISHOP OF QUEBEC, son of the late Reverend David Williams, Rector of Banghurst, Hants; born at Overton, Hants, 1825.—In 1851 graduated B.A. at Pombroke College, Oxford, with honours in Classics, proceeding in due course to M.A. and D.D. The following year, was admitted to Deacons Orders by the Lord Bishop of Coxford, and in 1856, to Priests Orders by the Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells. After filling various Curacies in England, came to Canada, and in 1857 was appointed Rector of the Grammar School, in connection with Bishop's College, Lennoxville; held at same time the Classical Professorship of that College. On the death of the

Right Reverend G. J. Mountain, D.D., Dr. Williams was appointed by Synod to the vacant See, and on S. Barnabas Day, 1863, was Consocrated at Quebec by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Toronto, Ontario, Huron and Vermont.— The new Bishop's first Episcopal act was the advancing three Deacons to the Priesthood.

MACHRAY, THE MOST REVEREND ROBERT, D. D., LL D. BISHOP OF RUPERTS LAND AND METROPOLI-TAN, son of Robert Machray, Esq., M. A., Advocate. Born at Aberdeen, Scotland, 1832. Educated first at Kings College, University of Aberdeen, where he graduated M. A. in 1851, and afterwards at Sidney College, Cambridge, where he graduated B. A. 1855, with Mathematical honours, proceeding in due course to M .A. and D. D. Elected Foundation Fellow of Sidney College 1855, and the same year was admitted to Deacon's Orders by the Lord Bishop of Ely, and by the same Prelate to Priest's Orders the year following. Elected Dean of his College in 1858, University Examiner in 1860-61, and Ramsden University Preacher in 1865. Was Vicar of Modingley, near Cambridge, for several years previous to his elevation to the Episcopate. In 1865, having been nominated by the Crown to the Bishopric of Ruperts Land, he was Consecrated at Lambeth by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Ely, and Aberdeen, and by the Right Reverend David Anderson, D. D., formerly Bishop of Ruperts Land. The new Bishop's first exercise of his Episcopal office was in holding an Ordination for the Bishop of London, ordaining as Priest the Reverend W. C. Bompas, now Bishop of Athabasca, in the Northwest. In 1874, on the sub-division of the Diocese, Dr. Machray was chosen Metropolitan, under the Primacy of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

BETHUNE, THE RIGHT REVEREND A. N., D. D., D. C. L., BISHOP OF TORONTO. Educated at the Cornwall Grammar School. Studied divinity under Dr. Stracham. Ordained Deacon 1823, and Priest the following year, by the Right Reverend Jacob Mountain, D. D., Bishop of Quebec. Entered upon his Ministerial duties in the Parish of Grimsby. Removed in 1827 to Coburg, which Parish he retained, in conjunction with the Archdeaconship of Toronto, until 1867, when he was elected Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto, with the title of Bishop of Niagara. He was consecrated in S. James' Cathedral, Toronto, on the Feast of the Conversion of S. Paul, 1867, the consecrating Bishops being the Right Reverend John Strachan, D. D., Bishop of Toronto, assisted by the Bishops of Huron, Ontario, Michigan, U. S., and Western New York, U. S.

KELLY, THE RIGHT REVEREND JAMES B., D. D., D. C. L., COADJUTOR BISHOP OF NEWFOUNDLAND. Born in England, 1832. In 1854 graduated B. A. at Clare College, Cambridge, proceeding in due course to M. A. and D. D. — Was ordained Deacon in 1855, and Priest the following year, by the Bishop of Peterborough. Was Curato of Abington, Northants, 1855; Domestic Chaplain to the Bishop of Sodor and Man 1856; Vicar of Kirk Michael, Isle of Man, 1860, and Episcopal Registrar of the Diocesé. In 1864 was appointed to the Incumbency of S. Johns, Newfoundland, and the following year was nominated by the Bishop as Archdeacon of Newfoundland and Labrador. In 1867 he was nominated by the Crown as Coadjutor Bishop of Newfoundland; and 1872 the Synod of that Diocese extended to him the right of succession. Consecrated at Croydon, 1867, by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of Rochester and Gibraltar.

HELLMUTH, THE RIGHT REVEREND ISAAC, D.D., I.L.D., BISHOP OF HURON, was born in Poland, 1817, and is of Jewish extraction. Educated at the University of Breelau. In 1841 he made a public profession of Christianity, and, three years later, came to Canada, bearing the highest commendations from many eminent men, including the late Most Rev. Dr. Sumner, Archbishop of Canterbury. In 1846 was ordained Deacon, and same year Priest, by the Bishop of Quebec. For eight years ho was one of the Professors of the University of Bishops' College, Lennoxville, and Incumbent of S. Peter's, Sherbrooke. Was afterwards General Superintendent for the Colonial and Continental Church Society in British North America. Was successively Archdeacon and Dean of Huron and Rector of S. Paul's Cathedral, London. In 1871 was elected, by Synod, as Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of Huron, with the title of Bishop of Norfolk, and was Consecrated in London, Ont., by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Toronto, Ontario, Ohio and Michigan. On the decease, in the same year, of the Right Reverend Dr. Cronyn, he became Bishop of Huron. Dr. Hellmuth's name will over be remembered in 'The Diocese of

Huron, associated as it is with such substantial proofs of his zeal and untiring industry. He is the founder of the Hellmuth Colleges (Boys' College and Ladies' College), over both of which institutions he presides. He has written, among several other publications, "The Divine Dispensations," a course of sermons delivered in Huron College Chapel, 1865, on the genuineness and authenticity of the Pentateuch.

FAUQUIER, THE RIGHT REVEREND, F.D., D.C.L., MISSIONARY BISHOP OF ALGOMA. Born 1817. Educated in England. Came to Canada, and prepared for the Holy Ministry under Dr. Bethune, now Lord Bishop of Toronto. Is a D.C.L., of Trinity College, Toronto. Was admitted to Deacons' Orders in 1845 by the Right Rev. John Strachan, D.D., First Bishop of Toronto, and the following year to Priests' Orders by the same Bishop. First and only Parochial charge was the Mission of East Zorra, in the Diocese of Huron, which he held for twenty-eight years. Was also Rural Dean and Archdeacon of Brant. It having been decided to send a Missionary Bishop to that more distant portion of the Diocese of Toronto in which the great bulk of the population is composed of Indians, the Venerable Archdeacon Fauquier was elected to fill the Episcopal office for the new Diocese. He was Consecrated on the Feast of SS. Simon and Jude, 1873, in S. James' Cathedral, Toronto, by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Quebec, Toronto, Ontario, Huron and Western New York, U.S. The new Bishop's first exercise of the Episcopal office was in advancing three Deacons to the Priesthood and admitting one Candidate to the Diaconate.

HORDEN, THE RIGHT REVEREND J., D.D., BISHOP OF MOOSONEE, NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES. Consecrated, 1878.

BOMPAS, THE RIGHT REVEREND, J.C., D.D., BISHOP OF ATHABASCA, NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES. Consecrated 1874.

McLEAN, THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN., D. D., D. C. L., BISHOP OF SASKATCHEWAN, NORTHWEST TERRITORIES. Born in Scotland, 1828; took the degree of M. A. at Aberdeen, and that of D. C. L. at Trinity College, Toronto. Was appointed Curate of S. Paul's, London, Ontario, 1853; Archdeacon of Manitoba and Professor of Divinity in S. John's College, 1866. On the sub-division of the Diocese of Ruperts Land, Manitoba, in 1874, Archdeacon McLean was nominated to the See of Saskatchewan, and was duly consecrated.

FULLER, THE RIGHT REVEREND THOMAS BROCK, D. D. C. L., BISHOP OF NIAGARA. Born at Kingston, Ont., 1810. Educated at Theological Seminar, 1833 by the Bishop Bishop. Thomas' Church, Hamilton, by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Toronto, Huron, Michigan, U.S., and Western New York, U.S.

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INGLIS, THE RIGHT REVEREND CHARLES, D.D., FIRST BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA; Consecrated in 1787; formerly Rector of Trinity Church, New York; died, 1816.

MOUNTAIN, THE RIGHT REVEREND JACOB, D.D., FIRST BISHOP OF QUEBEC; educated at Caius College, Cambridge; admitted to Holy Orders, and was appointed to the living of S. Andrew's, Norwich. Was subsequently chosen by Dr. Tomline, then Bishop of Lincoln, as his Lordship's Examining Chaplain, and also nominated to the living of Buckden, in Huntingdonshire, near by his Lordship's Palace. On the 7th July, 1793, Dr. Mountain was consecrated as the First Bishop of Quebec. It was during his Episcopate that the University of McGill College, Montreal, was established, and his son, the future Bishop of Quebec (Dr. G. J. Mountain), was nominated Honorary Professor of Divinity and Principal of the College. Bishop Mountain died on the 18th June, 1825, having laboured for thirty-two years in the Episcopate.

STANSER, THE RIGHT REVEREND ROBERT, D.D., BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA; nominated as Successor to Bishop Inglis; consecrated in 1816; was formerly Rector of S. Paul's. Halifax; died, 1824.

INGLIS, THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN, D.D., BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, was, during the Episcopate of his Predecessor, Ecclesiastical Commissary of Nova Scotia, and succeeded to the Bishopric in 1825. Died, 1850.

STEWART, THE HONOURABLE AND RIGHT REVEREND CHARLES JAMES, D.D., BISHOP OF QUEBEC, fifth son of John, seventh Earl of Galloway; born, 1775. He was privately educated at home till he entered Oxford. Was elected a Fellow of All Souls' College, and, on being admitted to Holy Orders, was presented, by the late Countess of Aboyne, to the Vicarage of Orton

In 1807 he commenced his missionary career in Canada, settling first at St. Armand, where, by his untiring zoal and industry, he soon formed the first congregation in that part of Lower Canada Was consecrated to the See of Quebec in 1826, it having become vacant by the death of Bishop Mountain the previous year. After ten years of unwearying labour, fraught with many and great difficulties and anxieties, Bishop Stewart returned to England, to lay his bones in the land of his fathers. He died on the 13th of July, 1837. The following excellent sketch is from "The Colonial Churchman," of February 25th, 1836, a paper edited by a Society of Gentlemen, and published at Lunenburg, Nova Scotia. It is here given, verbatim, as a slight tribute to the memory of one whose Apostolic Labours will ever be gratefully and affectionately remembered by Canadian Churchmen:—

"A Saint unspotted of the world, full of alms-deeds, full of humanity, and all the examples of a virtuous life."—Isaac Walton.

Though the name of Bishop Stewart be not so widely known as that of Middleton, James, Heber, or Turner, bright lights of the Indian Hierarchy, though it be not conspicuous in the annals of Theological Controversy, or rendered memorable by literary labour and scholastic achievements, yet wherever it is known, it is held in the highest veneration and respect, and adds equally to the lustre of the Colonial Bench. The Bishop of Quebec is emphatically a good man. He stands forth to the world a primitive Apostolic Bishop, deriving no false fictious reputation from qualities more dazgling than useful; and whose Mitre, as unsullied as that of Hough, is ever surrounded by a bright and steady halo. Many men have revelled during their youthful days in the gratifications of sensual pleasure, till wearled and nauscated with a surfeit of enjoyment, and having exhausted every refinement of vice, they have become suddenly metamorphosed into harsh and ascetic bigots, denying to others a healthful draught of those pleasures which themselves have quaffed to a hurtful excess. But the piety of our Bishop was not put on after he had flung off the garments of unrighteousness. It was a clothing he had assumed from his carliest youth, and the whiteness of his Christian vest has never been sullied by the hot passions of youth, the ambitious schemes of manhood, or the grasping avarice of old age. Of noble birth, and connected with the first families of our Aristocracy, Bishop Stewart has ever been distinguished for unostentatious humility, priding himself more on the Christian badge than on his long line of ancestry and royal descent. Hannah More, writing of him to Danlel Wilson in 1831, says, "I have had a visit from my valued friend, Dr. S. from Canada. It was pleasant to hear a man of his birth speak of it as a great advancement, that he was now appointed a travelling missionary, instead of a local one. I find him much improved in spirituality. He has been the honoured instrument, since we last met, of causing twenty-four Churches to

Though our Bishop forbears to embroil himself in the political heats that inflame this Province, he strenuously upholds the interests, and the establishment by law, of the Church committed to his care. Every society tending to relieve the distressed, to reform the wicked, to propagate the Gospel, or to benefit mankind, receives his steady and benevolent aid, and like Bernard Gilpin, he has raised from a lowly state more that one young person, in whom he has perceived the germ of a spiritual nature, and the promise of a fitness for the ministerisl office, defraying the expences of their education, and sending them forth to labour in the sacred vineyard. His private charities flow in a wide and never falling current. No vain pomp, no superfluous luxuries, no costly furniture, no exten-

vagant banquets exhaust his income, but on the widow, and the orphan, and the fatherless, and on the wretched, his bounty silently and unceasingly descends. His luxuries are alms-deeds—his walks are to the houses of mourning, and his banquets are those exquisite and incorruptible viands, which a pure and Nathaniel-like (John i. 47) life administers to him who leads it, and to those who come within the sphere of its action.

In the pulpit Dr. Stewart delivers plain and practical discourses, strongly embued with Evangelical Doctrines. He is more remarkable for earnestness than eloquence, and cares far more to render himself intelligible than admired. He seeks to win souls in preference to courting human applause by well rounded

periods, or flowery declamation.

Bishop Slewart sustained many severe privations and fatigues in travelling through the almost impervious woods during the earlier part of his Ministry (which commenced in 1807); at which time, we ought also to add, he devoted the whole of his private income to acts of charity, and the wants of the Canadian Infant Episcopal Church.

These journeys, and the labours and hardships encountered in the course of them (added to the distressing anxiety the wants of his Church have occasioned him, since his accession to the See with an encreasing population and declining means), have rendered his Lordship prematurely aged. Though born only in 1775, and consequently only 60 years of age, he bears the appearance of being at

least fifteen years older.

If the heary head, when found in the ways of righteousness, be a crown of glory, how much more honoured must be that head which old age has not silvered over, but which has been rendered white by the extreme of Missionary toil, by many a weary travel through the tangled wilderness, and by a constant, unflinching endurance of personal labour and hazard in the faithful discharge of the most sacred duties. Though venerable and dignified in his aspect, he is plain and simple in his manners, serving God and man with singleness of heart, and devoting every thought to the glory of the first, and to the temporal and eternal advantage of the latter.

The Church of England may boast of Prelates more learned, more elequent, more celebrated than Bishop Stewart, but she cannot exhibit one who better merits the title of "good." Such is his absence of guile, his single-hearted benevolence, his undying faith ripened into works, his practice of Apostolical Christianity, that in after years when the subject and the writer of this article shall alike be gathered to their fathers, he who contemplates the excellencies of this amiable Bishop will be led involuntarily to exclaim, in the words of the Romish Priest over the grave of Bishop Bedell, "O! sit anima mea cum Bedello."

MOUNTAIN, THE RIGHT REVEREND GEORGE JEHOSH-APHAT, D.D., D.C.L., BISHOP OF QUEBEC, second son of the late Right Rev. Jacob Mountain, D.D., born at Norwich on the 27th of July, 1789. Was educated by private tuition until he entered Trinity College, Cambridge, where he took his degree in 1810. Studied for the Holy Ministry under the guidance of his father, by whom, on the 2nd of August, 1812, he was admitted to Deacons' Orders, and on the 16th of January, 1814, was advanced to the Priesthood. His father dying in 1825, Dr. Stewart succeeded to the See. In 1836 Bishop Stewart prevailed on Archdeacon Mountain to assist him in the Episcopate, and on the 14th of January he received Consecration under the title of Bishop of Montreal, succeeding, on the death of Bishop Stewart the following year, to the undivided Diocese, thus becoming third Bishop of Quebec. It was during Dr. Mountain's Episcopate that Canada was erected into an Ecclesiastical Province, and it was in accordance with his wishes that the Metropolitical See was located at Montreal. Also during this Episcopate the University of Bishops College. Lennoxville, was established. In May, 1843, the Bishop undertook the arduous task of visiting the territories of the Hudson's Bay Company, travelling nearly one thousand miles in bark canoes. After a brief illness, Bishop Mountain breathed his last on the morning of the Feast of the Epiphany, 1863, having zealously laboured among those over whom he was placed, for twenty-seven years. In the words of his biographer, "His family and the Diocese were father-

STRACHAN, THE HONOURABLE AND RIGHT REVER-END JOHN, D.D., LL.D., FIRST BISHOP OF TORONTO. Born at Aberdeen, Scotland, on the 12th of April, 1778. Entered the University of Aberdeen in 1794, taking his M.A. degree three years later. Came to Canada in 1799. On the 22nd of May, 1803. he was Ordained Deacon by Bishop Mountain, and appointed to the Mission of Cornwall; the following year being advanced to Priest's Orders by the same Bishop. In addition to his parochial duties he continued his work of teaching, in which he had been engaged for several years. His school was very popular, numbering among its scholars names which have since become celebrated, and which have been intimately associated with the progress of our young country. In 1811, the degree of D.D., was conferred upon him by his Alma Mater. In 1812, at the urgent solicitatations of the inhabitants of York, Dr. Strachan was prevailed upon to resign his charge at Cornwall and to remove to that Parish. receiving at the same time the appointment of Chaplain to the Troops. In 1827 was appointed Archdeacon of York. It having been decided in 1839, to form Upper Canada into a separate Diocese, Archdeacon Strachan was nominated First Bishop, under the title of Bishop of Toronto, and the same year received Consecration. Bishop Strachan ended a labourious and eventful life on the Festival of All Saints, 1867, after a ministry of sixty four years. The closing words of the aged Bishop, in his last sermon, were those of the Apostle, "I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor

height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate

us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus oun Lord."
FULFORD, THE MOST REVEREND FRANCIS, D.D., BISHOP OF MONTREAL AND METROPOLITÁN OF CAN-ADA, second son of Baldwin Fulford, Esq., of Great Fulford. Born at Sidmouth on the 3rd of June, 1803. Graduated B.A. at Exeter College, Oxford, 1824, and the following year was elected a Fellow of his College. In 1826 he was Ordained Deacon at Norwich Cathedral, and Priest in 1828, in the Cathedral of Exeter. In 1832 he was presented by the Duke of Rutland to the Rectory of Trowbridge, in Wiltshire, which he occupied ten years. In 1838 he was appointed Chaplain to Her Royal Highness the late Duchess of Gloucester, and in 1842, having resigned the Rectory of Trowbridge, he was appointed to that of Croyden, in Cambridgeshire, which he retained until 1845, when he was nominated by Earl Howe and licensed by the Bishop of Lendon as Minister of Curzon Chapel. Mayfair. On the erection of Montreal into a separate Diocese, Dr. Fulford was nominated by the Crown as First Bishop, and on the Festival of S. James the Apostle, 1850, he was Consecrated at Westminster Abbey. In September of the same year his Lordship arrived at Montroal, and at once entered upon his new duties; his enthronement taking place on Sunday, the 15th of that month. In 1859 the Canadian Dioceses petitioned Her Majesty to appoint one of the Canadian Bishops to "preside over the General Assemblies of the Church in the Province." In the year following letters patent were issued, promoting the Right Reverend Francis Fulford, D.D., Bishop of Montreal, to the office of Metropolitan of Canada. Bishop Fulford died on the 9th of September, 1868, after a ministry of forty-two years, eighteen of which were spent in the Episcopate.

Piocese of Algoma.

The Missionary Diocese of Algoma was constituted in 1873. It embraces the Muskoka Territory to the East of the Georgian Bay, and then extends North-West about forty miles beyond Fort William on Lake Superior, to Pigeon River, which is the boundary between the United States and Canada. The entire length of the Diocese is eight hundred miles, and the width from one hundred and fifty to two hundred miles. The population is at present about 12,000, of whom a large proportion are Indians, very many of them still in a heathen state.

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We reprint the following from a number of the "Algona Quarterly," a little periodical published in the interest of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, hoping that it will extend a knowledge of the wants of our cun Missionary enterprise, and arouse greater and more lasting interest than has hitherto been taken in this work:

"There are at present seven Missionaries at work in our Diocese, three in the Lake Superior region, one on Manitoulin Island, and three in the Muskoka district. Of these Missions two are to the Indians, the remaining five among white settlers.

The population at each place is at present small, but it is desirable that we should occupy these places as soon as possible, and so be in readiness for the settlers as they come in.

The northern shores of Lake Superior are dotted with Hudson Bay Company Posts, around which cluster the Indian wigwams. The country generally is rocky and abounding in silver, copper, and other valuable minerals, but some parts contain good farming land, and will doubtless soon become settled. The Muskoka District is being rapidly taken up by incoming settlers, and the farming there generally is very good.

It is the wish of the Bishop, as speedily as possible, to open up some new Missions. He proposes to place catechists at the smaller stations, whose duty it will be to teach school during the week, and to conduct Divine Service on Sunday when a Missionary cannot be present. Several travelling Missionaries will be employed who will journey from place to place, preaching the Word and baptizing converts.

THE PRESENT MISSION

Are (1) Prince Arthur's Landing, on Lake Superior, where a little Church has been built. (2) Sault Ste. Marie, at which place the Bishop will have his residence. There is a little stone Church and a fair congregation, who assist to the extent of \$200 per annum in the support of their clergyman. (3) Garden River Indian Mission—at present in charge of a catechist. (4) Shequaindah Indian Mission, on Manitoulin Island, where there is a Church and School. (5) Parry Sound; (6) Mary's Lake; (7) Bracebridge. The three last are Missions to the white settlers in the Muskoka District.

THE LAKE SUPERIOR INDIANS.

The Indians of Lake Superior present a sad contrast to those enjoying a state of comparative civilization at Garden River and Shequaindah. They are in a very neglected and degraded state, living in their wigwams made of a few poles stuck in the ground in a circle from twelve to fifteen feet in diameter, and meeting together at the top, where an aperture is left for the smoke to escape, the remainder being covered over with birch-bark. In these miscrable little dwellings we find often three or four families—containing from fifteen to twenty individuals—all huddled together with a few dirty blankets to cover them, a kettle suspended over the fire containing their common meal, and a number of hungry wolfish-looking dogs mingling with them. In one wigwam—a very small one—we find three old women finishing off the remains of a feast which the younger members of the community have evidently been indulging in. One is licking out a frying pan with her tongue, another polishing some fish-bones, and the third is wiping the grease off a wooden scoop and conveying it to her month.

These poor creatures have little idea of the noble intent of our Christian religion. They are more or less acquainted with it through the occasional visits of Missionaries of various denominations, and some have been baptized; but of Christian teaching they certainly can have received but very little. One poor wretched old man, with long shaggy hair and an exceedingly ugly face, comes begging after us, the ground of his plea being that he has been once baptized by the French Christians (R. C.) and twice by the English Curistians (C. E.) and now he has made up his mind to belong to the Church of England. In the morning these poor people will come round us to attend our service, held at the door of our tent, and the same evening they will be engaging in their pagan ceremonies. Such is their sad condition, and such the need of our doing what we can for them.

CHIEF "LITTLE PINE."

There is a fine old Indian Chief living at Garden River; his name is Little Pine; he is about seventy years of age, and yet he is still a fine looking man of commanding figure and noble countenance. This old man, three years ago, left his home at Garden River, and started on a journey of four hundred miles to

Toronto and other Canadian towns. His object being to tell the white people the wants of his own poor people, and to ask that something might be done for the education of their children. He could not speak a word of English, but he asked his missionary, (the Rev. E. F. Wilson) to accompany him and interpret for him. This was the substance of his speech: "My dear brothers and sisters-I have come a long way from a far country in the North to speak to you. I thank the Great Spirit that He has kept me safely on my journey. I thank the Great Spirit that I, a poor Indian, am permitted thus to stand up before you white people and address you. You are a strong people; you are becoming stronger and greater every day. Our greater Mother the Queen, is like the Rising Sun in her strength. No one is able to resist her. But we poor Indians, are very weak. We are decreasing in numbers, and becoming weaker every day. We no longer have our lands and hunting grounds which our fathers used to have. All the country now is possessed by the white people, and we are driven back far away. I, who address you, am an old man. I do not expect much longer to live. It is not for myself that I come to speak to you, but I come to speak to you for my children and my grandchildren. I see it is no longer possible for them to live by hunting as I and my fathers have done. I see that if they are to exist at all, they must cease to follow the customs of our fathers, and begin to learn the customs of the white peeple. This, then, I ask of you, I ask you to build for us at Garden River, "A big teaching wigwam," where the children of the Indians may be received and educated, and clothed and fed, and taught to do everything like white children; thus they will be enabled to live here in this world, and at the same time be fitted for the future eternal life."

has This was the substance of the old Chiefs speech,—and it had a great and a very lasting effect; -indeed its effect still lasts, it has by no means died away. Some \$300 was immediately subscribed towards the object and the next summer Mr. Wilson paid a visit to England accompanied by another Chief, a younger brother of Little Pine, named Buhkwujjenene,—and collected about £800 sterling. With this they returned, and in due time "the big teaching wigwam,"—or as we should call it, an Industrial School-was built, and opened for use on the 22nd day of September, 1873.

THE SHINGWAUK INDUSTRIAL HOME.

The Industrial Home took the Indian name of the old Chief Little Pine. few friends in England engaged provide to funds sufficient to meet the salaries of the teachers, &c., and, to the support of the Indian children various Sunday Schools in Canada undertook to contribute. Thus everything seemed well, and all looked prosperous for the future, and little did any one anticipate the sad calamity which was so soon to happen. But God's ways are not our ways.

"He moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform,"



The Industrial Home was only in existence six days. It was opened for use on Monday, and on the following Sunday it was burnt to the ground. The fire broke out in the middle of the night, and so rapidly did the flames advance that nothing whatever was saved, and most of the inmates escaped in their night dresses with blankets and counterpanes wrapped around them. A telegram was at once sent to England telling of the sad disaster, and in about a fortnight £350 had been contributed towards the rebuilding. This sum went on increasing until, at the present time, there is a sum in hand of nearly \$10,000 for rebuilding the institution. The new building is to be much larger than the one that was burnt, with accommodation for from 70 to 80 children and eight or ten aged and infirm Iudians.

SUPPORT OF THE MISSION WORK.

For the support of the mission work of the Diocese the Bishop will require at present about \$5,000 per annum. To meet this want an Algoma Missionary Association has been set on foot, which has its branches in each Diocese. The funds are to be raised mainly through the medium of collecting books, each collector undertaking to raise the sum of \$20 per annum. In each Diocese a secretary-treasurer has, with the approval of the Bishop, been appointed to act on behalf of the Algoma Missions

In Huron Diocese, Mr. John Beard, of Woodstock, is the Secretary-Treasurer, and 60 books are to be distributed.

In Toronto Diocese, Rev. Saltern Givins, of Toronto, is the Secretary-Treasurer, and 80 books are to be distributed.

In Ontario Diocese, Rev. F. W. Kirkpatrick, of Kingston, is the Secretary-Treasurer, and 45 books are to be distributed.

In Montreal Diocese, Mrs. Simpson, 38 McGill College Avenue, Montreal, is the Secretary-Treasurer, and 40 books are to be distributed.

In Quebee Diocese, Rev. John Walters, of Point Levis, is Secretary-Treasurer and 40 books are to be distributed.

In Fredericton Diocese, Rev. T. E. Dowling, Carleton, St. John.

The money is to be paid in by the collectors to their Secretary-Treasurer within ten days after the 1st June, 1st September, 1st December, and 1st March in each year, and the Secretary will then transmit the amount in full to the Bishop of Algoma.

This is the simple plan that has been adopted in order to supply the Bishop of Algoma with means for carrying on his missionary work. As has been said already, for the support of our missions we depend on the alms of the Church, and we believe that God will put it into the hearts of his people to help us. Our work is in the field,—labouring in the vineyard under the direction of our great Lord and Master. In addition to our annual requirements for the support of our missions, we need money for purchasing land and erecting small school-houses. Perhaps some to whom God has given wealth, whether in this country or the old country, will assist us by a few liberal donations towards this object. We might even this summer occupy six or seven new stations among the Indians if the means were provided. Land may be brought at present at a very low price, so that it seems advisable to purchase with the view of its eventually becoming a source

of income to the Diocese. At every station that we occupy, we propose pur chasing about 200 acres of land, and erecting immediately a small mission house consisting of a large room for school and Sunday services, and a bedroom and kitchen at one end. This little building will be occupied by a catechist, who will receive \$300 per annum salary and free use of the land, in the cultivation of which he will be assisted occasionally by Indian boys from the Industria Home."

Now that the Diocese of Algoma has, by the deliberate action of our Provincial Synod, been set apart as a special field of labour, and certain specified conditions and agreements entered into by the several Dioceses for the support and maintenance of this undertaking, is it not our bounden duty to fulfil and to meet these engagements? Is it not enough that the Bishop of that infant Diocese should have cause for anxiety in the knowledge that he is unable to do all that he would; that new Missions should be opened, and the glorious truths of Christianity carried further on to those now labouring in heathen darkness and superstition? Is not this, with the many other cares of his office, quite a sufficient source of auxiety to him? Then why add to it? Witness in His Lordship's appeal to the Clergy of the Anglican Church in Canada the difficulty in which he is placed in having a scarcity of funds with which to carry on his work, even as it was begun. We give it here in the hope that it may arouse in some who may not have seen it a sense of their responsibility, and that it may be productive of some substantial results.

TO THE RIGHT REV, THE BISHOP AND REV. THE CLERGY OF THE ECOLESIASTICAL PROVINCE OF CANADA:

Rr. Rev. and Rev. Brethren in Christ,-

I address you on behalf of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, and bespeak your hearty co-operation, to enable me to carry on the Mission work therein Permit me, in the first place, to remind you that it was by the deliberate action of the several Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province; first, in Diocesan Synod, and then, by their representatives, in Provincial Synod, that the Missionary Diocese of Algoma was formally set apart, and constituted, with the express understanding, that the Bishop and Missionary staff should be supported by the several organized Dioceses.

Further, that as a Missionary Diocese without any fund or resources, beyond what little the members of the Church within its limits can give, the Diocese of Algoma is entirely dependent upon extraneous aid for means to support the little band of clergymen and laymen now actually labouring therein, whose claims upon the Mission Fund amount to upwards of \$4,000 per annum. And lanly, that since the responsibility of supervising this newly formed Missionary Diocese has been deputed to me, by a majority of the representatives of the several Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province in Synod assembled, it is not unreasonable to expect that the funds, necessary to carry on the work, should be provided by those who have thus committed themselves to sustain and support it.

I have been grieved to find that some of those who were active in bringing about what was, at the time, considered to be so desirable a work, now think it was premature, and are failing to contribute their quota towards maintaining this poor Diocese which they were instrumental in bringing into existence; but Brethren, seeing it is a thing done, it is now all too late to repudiate a liability which has been deliberately incurred, and which the honour of the Canadian Church is pledged to carry on.

It will surely be a sad scandal, a blot on the escutcheon of the Church, if the work, which has been so well begun, should be abandoned, or allowed to fall through for lack of support, and reason given for the world to sny, that, after putting her hand to the plough and beginning to cultivate what may truly be termed her legitimate Mission Field, she is looking backward and growing cold, especially when, if only united in action, a very small effort would fully meet all that is required, not only to maintain existing Missions, but also to extend the work as much as is at present needed.

By a calculation carefully made, I find that if only an average of eight individuals in each Parish or Mission, in the organized Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province, can be found to give six (6) cents a week, or sixteen persons three (3) cents a week, for Mission work in Algoma, all that is required to send a Missionary to every district where a labourer is at present needed, would be amply provided. And shall it be said that amongst the members of our communion, in this highly favoured Dominion, there are not eight persons in each Parish both able and willing to contribute the sum of six (6) cents a week, over and above all perochial and diocesan claims, to aid me in doing our blessed Master's work, and fulfilling the high mission given to His Church of preaching. Again, there are men (clerical as well as lay) who have offered to cast in their lot with me in doing the Master's work; but, to each alike, I am obliged to say, I can do nothing! for so small are our funds, and so uncertain our means of supply, that I dare not, in justice to those who are at present labouring with me, increase my liabilities.

Brethren of the Clergy, I ask your assistance, feeling assured that it onlyneeds that every Parish and Mission should take its share in this work, with a proper sense of responsibility, to effect a large result.

May I ask you then, Brethren, to speak plainly, earnestly, levingly, to your people upon this subject—to give them an opportunity of discharging their duty by making a collection once a year (say on Whitsunday) in your churches for the Missionary Diocese of Algoma—and also to form a Missionary Association, to consist of members who will promise to subscribe, not less than one dollar annually, to the same object. Only do this, and I fear not but that all that is required to enable me to carry on my work will be forthcoming; for I have ever found the Laity ready to give liberally whenever and wherever I have had an opportunity afforded me of bringing the subject before them.

Bear with me, Reverend Brethren, when I remind you that it is only as the Church is supporting, and extending her missionary operations, that she can be said to "live"—that a deep responsibility rests upon her to be up and doing the Master's work, and that every baptized member of the Church should be made to feel and urged to meet his share of that responsibility from which neither Parish nor Individual can safely separate itself.

Commending this all-important subject to your consideration, and praying that the Great Head of the Church may put it into the hearts of all His people more clearly to realise and more willing to meet their responsibilities.

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The Metropolitan's Address.

RIGHT REVEREND AND REVEREND BRETHREN, AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY:

We cannot but regard the present meeting of our Synod as a very eventful one, from the fact that we are at this time invited to welcome among us two of the neighbouring Dioceses, which have expressed their desire, after mature consideration, to cast in their lot with us. I feel sure that we shall receive them with a very cordial welcome, persuaded that their accession to our body will add material strength to this Ecclesiastical Province, and will be a signal for closer union among our scattered members. I am also confident that we shall not give a less hearty greeting to the newly formed Missionary Diocese of Algoma, whose Bishop will now take his seat in the Upper House, and will ere long, I trust, have his own Diocesan Synod, which will send its representatives to this body. Our Province will, in this case, at once number eight Bishops in its Upper House, and a hundred and sixty-eight delegates in the Lower House. God grant that the "multitude of counsellors" may give increased wisdom to our present deliberations! It may be a question, however, whether, considering the great expendi ture of money and time to which the representatives from the more remote Dioceses will be subjected, and for other reasons also, it will not be expedient to diminish the number of delegates furnished by each Diocese.

For the prosperity of the Church within this Province we may well be thankful. There is evidence of life and earnestness in our various parishes, and a steady increase in the number of our clergy. And when we think of the great variety of opinion, and the wide diversity of practice which have, of late especially, characterized the Mother Church, we have reason to bless God for the harmony which, with a very few exceptions, prevails among ourselves. One cause of this, I think, is the urgency of the Lord's work, which lies immediately before us here in Canada, leaving us but little time for petty disputes and vain wrangling. Here we have a country to subdue for the Lord—a kingdom to wrest out of the enemy's hands—sheep wandering upon the dark mountains, to be gathered into the Saviour's fold. We all preach alike the doctrines of the Cross, the one all atoning sacrifice of Christ, the necessity of conversion, the work of God's holy spirit as the Teacher, the Quickener, and the Sanctifier of souls. But I should be very thankful if, by a generous and brotherly compromise, we could come to some agreement as to the minor matters, which affect our practice; such as the mode of conducting our ordinary public services, our rubrical observances, our postures and vestures in the House of God and matters of this kind, which, when placed side by side with the salvation of immortal souls, are indeed most trivial. With a view to this happy result, and also to relieve those to whom the length of our present Morning Service is somewhat burdensome, a measure will probably be proposed during the present session. "I believe, however, that if we all resolve to observe strictly the directions of the Church, and to carry out loyally and honestly the spirit of our liturgy, many of our divergencies will at once cease, and a happier and more blessed uniformity will be displayed in our ministrations. There are I believe at the present time many outside of the Church's limits, who are showing a desire to draw near to our fold. Nothing is so sure to repel them as the promulgation and practice of extreme views; nothing so likely to attract them as a faithful, honest, and spiritual exhibition of the simple truths which our Church sets before us in her Articles and Liturgy. Oh that we may ever go forth to our great work animated by one spirit, bound together by a common faith and practice, and depending on the

Before entering upon the business of the present session, I think it very desirable that we should see clearly the position which this Provincial Synod occupies in reference to the minor Synods of our respective Dioceses. It was never intended that they should conflict one with the other. The object of our Diocesan Synods is to deliberate and legislate on all questions which have special reference to the Dioceses which they represent, whilst the object of the Provincial Synod is to treat of those matters which affect us in our more enlarged capacity as members of the Church of England, whose lot is east within the prescribed limits of this Ecclesiastical Province. Each inferior Synod has the privilege of framing its own special laws and regulations, so fair at least as they do not contravene any canon enacted by the superior Synod of the Province, to which we all by virtue of our union are bound to conform.

It will be desirable, I think, to endorse this action of the Mother Church during the present session.

My REVEREND BRETHREN,-

In my last Charge I stated that, in the previous four years, more events had occurred materially affecting the interests of the Church than in any similar period within the memory of living men. The four years which have elapsed since the delivery of that Charge have not been marked by such prominent events as the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland, the Lambeth Conference, or the Council at Rome, but they have been by no means devoid of matter of interest to all Churchmen. The progress of events at Rome, the growth of the old Catholics, the German Legislation for the purpose of bringing all religious bodies under the absolute control of the State, the proceedings of the Irish Synod, and the anomalous condition of our Mother Church, afford occasion for sorious thought, some of these things awakening hope, and others causing fear and anxiety. The principle avowed by the old Catholics is that on which our own reformation was, or was intended to be, conducted, the principle of rejecting Roman accretions, and maintaining the faith and practice of the early ages of the Church; and if they can maintain their position, and are not led astray by rationalists and fanatics, they may occupy a glorious position in the Western Church.* We should pray for them that they may be guided through the many dangers whereby they are beset, and become efficient witnesses for, and maintainers of, the "faith once for all delivered to the saints."

What will be the result of the deliberations of the Irish Synod we cannot yet determine, but there has been much cause for fear, although there are now more hopeful signs, that the members of the Church of Ireland are bringing upon themselves far worse evils than those necessarily consequent upon its disestablishment. In their antagonism to Roman error, they appear to be abandoning the Catholic faith; and if the counsels of the more violent members should unhappily prevail, they may be entirely separated from communion with the Church of England, with which they were but lately so closely united. When the old paths are deserted, the probable extent of aberration from the right way can not be accurately determined.

In England, on the other hand, there is no probability of any change in the standards of doctrine, or in the authoritative teaching of the Church, but there is far too much of individual license, so that we must admit the common complaints of lawlessness to be not altogether without foundation, whether we regard those who neglect what she has enjoined, or those who practise and teach what she has discouraged or prohibited. Consequently there is a feeling among the Rulers of the Church, that something must be done to vindicate their authority, and to compel obedience to their mandates; and it is not for me to criticise their action, but I may express my fear, that, unless they are wise and prudent, there will be a lamentable disruption, resulting ultimately in the disestablishment of the National Church, and the multiplication of sects. Let us hope and pray that all may be so over ruled by the great Head of the Church, that peace and order may be restored, and lawlessness restrained, without undue restrictions, or the loss of any earnest, devoted laborers in the Lord's vineyard, through injudicious treatment. Grievously has our Church suffered in times past, through the saicidal policy of driving out some of her most zealous and useful servants; may she be preserved from a repetition of her error.

The reference to the unsettled state of the Church in England recalls to our minds the irreparable loss sustained by the femoval of that illustrious man, late of Winchester, but better known as Samuel Wilberforce, Bishop of Oxford, whose wisdom in counsel, and far sightedness, would have been invaluable to his brethren in the present crisis. By common consent, the revival of the living action of the Church in her Convocations, her Synods, her Congresses, and the remarkable increase of the co-operation of influential laymen in Church work, are attributed to his influence beyond that of any other innividual; and from the primate of all England downwards all who had been accustomed to work with him, and were most capable of judging of his merits and of his beneficial influence, both in counsel and in action, have borne testimony to

his worth, and lamented his sudden removal.

tion of Canterbury, the Archbishop said: "When we consider how much more he did than is given to the lot of the most gifted of men, when we consider how deep was the mark he left almost everywhere, during his long episcopate; we can scarcely believe he leaves his work unfinished. Yet doubtless the loss will be felt as a calamity, and that over a wide range, such as the departure of scarcely any other man from amongst us would have reached. Doubtless not only in England, but in our Colonies, his loss will be deeply felt.-It was not that strange persuasiveness, it was not that wonderful power of rhetoric, which gave him his great influence, it was something deeper which made him so dear to every one. It was a real, genuine, genial Christianity, which enabled him thus to reach men's hearts, and which makes every one of us feel as though we had lost an intimate friend."*

As Colonists, we may not pass over, without special notice, the death of the foremost of the Colonial Bishops, the Metropolitan of South Africa, the indefatigable and stout-hearted Bishop Gray. One who knew him well, the present Bishop of Edinburgh, said at a public meeting, that from his knowledge of Bishop Gray, he believed there had appeared no holier, more faithful, or more Christian-like character during the present generation. "With regard to the actual work which he accomplished, and which no one could have accomplished without a strength of will and an energy of mind almost beyond that which men possessed, no one knew how much the English Church has gained from the struggles in South Africa." And a resolution of the S. P. G. contained this statement, that "his single-minded devotion of himself and substance to the work of God, his eminent administrative ability, his zeal, which never flagged, his considerate tenderness in dealing with others, his undaunted courage in grappling with unexpected obstacles in the defence and confirmation of the Gospel, will live in the records of the African Church as the qualities of her founder, and will secure for him a place in history as one of the most distinguished in that band of Missionary Bishops, by whose labours in this generation the borders of the Church have been so widely extended."

Having thus commemorated two of the chief Pastors, who have been taken from the Church on earth, since the last Visitation, I have now to speak of our own special loss. Our meeting together at this time is saddened by the removal of the venerable Brother, whose kindly greetings and hearty welcome you have for many years received on coming to the city, who, occupying as Dean the

The duties of his office may be efficiently performed by others, but I think you will all concur with me, that he occupied a position in relation to yourselves which cannot soon be filled; for his age and experience, combined with his well-known integrity and largeness of heart, procured for him a personal influence, such as can only be enjoyed by one advanced in years, and placed where he may have opportunities of frequent intercourse with his brethren, an influence which was constantly directed to the promotion of peace and harmony. He held firmly to his own opinions, and respected the same firmness in his brethren who differed from him; but he rightly held, that diversity of views could not justify ministers of the same Church in holding aloof one from another, or in refusing to co-operate in works designed for the glory of God How extended was his hospitality. how genial his disposition, and how comprehensive his sympathy, you need not to be reminded. Some of you can speak, from the experience of many years of happy and profitable intercourse, but I would set him before my younger brethren as an example of persevering, earnest labour in the Lord's vineyard, as one who was ever ready to attend to every call of duty, who never regarded his own convenience, nor bleaded weariness, when his services were required by any, even the most lowly of his Parishioners, or for the interests of the Church at large. He always evinced a lively interest, and took an active part, in every Church work, and especially in the Synod and in our Diocesan Society, where his counsels were received with marked deference. It would have been a sore trial to him to live for any long period, destitute of power to work, and his Master was pleased to spare him that trial, and after a short interval of retirement, he entered into his rest, his last appearance in this Church being on the Festival of the Purification, when he assisted at the Holy Communion, and read in the Gospel the words of the aged Simeon most appropriate to himself. Although he might have spoken of himself, as "abounding in the work of the Lord," his feelings on his death bed were expressed in the words of the hymn, the last read to him at his own request, "Just as I am without one plea, but that thy blood was shed for me." "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, that they may rest from their labors, and their works do follow them.'

While enumerating those who have been removed, I cannot forbear noticing one who, although not strictly speaking a Clergyman of this Diocese, always evinced an interest in its welfare, and in all our proceedings, which could not have been exceeded if he had been in truth merely one of ourselves, without any special duties or interests. influence for good, he was eminently useful to the numerous civilians who crowded his Chapel, including many not belonging to our Communion. We may grieve that he met with opposition from some who, sering his work, ought to have been among the first to bid him "God speed;" but although he may at time; have been somewhat discouraged, he persevered, knowing that he was sincerely striving to do the work of the Lord, and that, in the way which he had adopted, the divine blessing had been abundantly vouchsafed to him. I believe indeed that his residence among us, and the pattern which he proposed for our action was beneficial to us all, and that some of you will cheerfully admit that you are greatly indebted to him for suggestions, which have added much to the power of your ministrations. He was commended to me, by the Chaplain General, when he came to this garrison, as one who had been singularly successful in his labours for the conversion of sinners; and we have reason to believe that here also under his ministry many were brought to the knowledge of the truth. We may not all have his power, but we may all strive with the same carnestness, and the same love for our Lord and for the souls of men.

We are thankful that our ranks have not been thinned by many deaths, but there have been numerous removals, suggesting matter for serious reflection, for most of them are to be attributed to the insufficiency of the salaries provided for the Clergy in this Province, five of our brethren having been allured to the Diocese of Fredericton by better offers than can be obtained here. Now why is this? Cannot Nova Scotia provide for the Clergy as well as New Brunswick? I have no doubt that it can; and I believe the people generally would be very indignant, if we were to adopt the opposite opinion. If then they have the ability, how is it that they have not the will? Is it not possible that you may have to blame yourselves partially for this state of things? I say partially because, without reference to your personal action, the people all know that it must be their bounden duty to provide for those who minister to them, and cannot plead ignorance; but still it may be that you have not each done all that might have been expected towards enforcing this obligation. You are the duly appointed teachers of the several congregations, and it is for you to set before them their duty. I can understand the difficulty of pleading for oneself, but false delicacy should not be allowed to interfere with the performance of your duty. The Lord himself "hath ordained, that they who preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel," and he that is taught in the word should "minister unto him that teacheth in all good things." I think that, if the duty of giving were more frequently inculcated, it would not be so much neglected. It should be treated as part of our duty to God, as an act of worship well pleasing to Him. So long as their contributions are regarded, merely as payments for the services of a Clergyman, each will naturally consider what his neighbor does,

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and what is a fair proportion for himself, and he will estimate this proportion much too favorably for himself in all probability; but if the truth be recognised, that God demands such offerings, that he requires a portion of everyone's income for himself, and that what is given for the service of the sanctuary is truly offered to Him. then

much larger amounts may reasonably be expected.

Moreover, I believe, that there is a definite rule given to us in Holy Scripture, and that the law of tithes is still in force, that God requires from every one, at the least, one-tenth of his yearly income, whether large or small, that this is as it were His tax, and that freewill offerings, in the strict sense, only begin after payment of these dues. The payment of tithes was certainly antecedent to the giving of the law, since Abraham paid them to Melehisedec; and hence we may infer that, as the Father of the faithful paid them to the type of our High Priest, so are we bound to pay them to the High Priest himself, through those who minister in his name. If this principle were generally recognised, even supposing the tithe to include the whole of a man's offering, for all purposes, for the poor as well as to the Church, there would be no room for complaint of want of funds for carrying on the Lord's work. And even if the obligation to pay the tithe be not admitted, there can be no doubt that God claims a portion of what has been entrusted to each one's stewardship, and you are not faithful ministers if, through delicacy or from any other motive, you neglect to set forth the teaching of Holy Scripture concerning this matter. In any case you may avail yourself of the aid of the Rural Dean to enforce your own personal claims. If you cannot speak for yourself, he can speak for you, and in this respect the appointment of Dean may be made more particularly

And if some are induced to quit this Diocese, by the insufficiency of the stipends provided for them, still more have we to deplore the effect in diminishing the number of Divinity Students at our College, and of Candidates for Holy Orders. This is an old story, and on former occasions I have spoken at length of the evil, and of the best mode in my judgment of remedying it, but the matter is of such extreme importance, that I do not hesitate to repeat my remarks, and again to call upon you to consider whether you are each doing your duty with respect to it. I again express my conviction that, if you were, the dearth of laborers would not be so serious as it is at present. I have begged you to be constantly on the watch in your Sunday Schools, and elsewhere in your Parishes, for boys who may be educated and trained for the ministry, with a reasonable hope that as they advance in years they will be inclined to devote themselves to the work. But my exhortations have thus far been in vain, and very few of you have, to my knowledge, attempted to act upon them. Parents should be pressed to devote a son to the Lord's service. There is a natural reluctance to prepare sons for an office

in which they can hardly hope to procure a reasonable maintenance, but this difficulty does not appear to affect the supply of ministers for the several denominations of Christians around us. Why should we then suffer so much? Are our people less liberal, less disposed to provide adequately for those who minister to them in Holy things, or is there less zeal and devotion among ourselves? Now that all have the rudiments of a good education, there ought to be found youths qualified to proceed further with aspirations beyond the counting house, and desiring to labour rather for the good of their fellow creatures than for their own gain. This course implies faith and foresight, for the services of the children who may be influenced by you, can only be available after a long interval, but we have to provide for the future, and it matters little whether we are permitted, in any matter, to see the fruit of our labours, so long as the Church is benefitted. If we feel the evils of the dearth of ministers now, let us be the more anxious to avert them from those who shall come after us. For students preparing for Holy Orders, our College provides very nearly free board, as well as a free education, and I am not yet without hope that we may have a great increase in the number of young men availing themselves of such a liberal provision. That we must depend chiefly upon the College, for a supply of duly trained Clergymen, is certain; and we must all admit that, as a general rule, a Minister ought to have some acquaintance with the languages in which the Holy Scriptures have been given to us, and to be able, at least, to refer to his Greek Testament with easc.

Once more I must say that I think more might be done by you in the way of recommending parents to send their sons to Widsor, whether as Divinity Students or otherwise. I am aware that dissatisfaction has been expressed, and we are sometimes told that you do not care to recommend our old University. But, putting aside vague declamations, and statements so ovidently exaggerated that they could not be of any use, we have not been favored with any statements of actual tangible objections, nor with any practical suggestions for the improvement of our system. It is not by keeping aloof from organizations, good in themselves, that abuses can be remedied, or improvements effected, but by taking an active part in them, and earning an influence, through the manifestation of

an honest interest in their progress and success.

I have spoken of means to be used, for procuring a more adequate supply of laborers, but I do not forget the directions of our Great Head. He also had to complain, "the harvest truly is plentous, but the laborers are few;" and he hath commanded, "pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest." We must appeal to Him, to incline the hearts of men to devote themselves to His service, with a single desire for His glory and the salvation of souls. of the two great Missionary Societies of our Church, was most cheering, when the members of our Communion throughout the world united in one great act of intercession; and their voice was heard, and many came forward to offer themselves for the work, moved as we may not doubt by the Holy Spirit in answer to our prayers. It would be well to have such an appointed day annually, for there are ever increasing needs, and the same mode of providing for them will ever be found effectual; but unhppily, owing to the weakness of our nature, any such appointment, when it recurs at stated times, is much less impressive than when made upon a special occasion; the same warmth and earnestness are not excited by it, and its efficacy is proportionately diminished. An annual observance of the day would probably become, with very many, merely a matter of routine, but we may well be guided by the decision of the Church in England in this matter, and in any case let us not neglect the ordinary use of the means upon which, above all others, we may expect the blessing of God. Let us urge the Lord's people to give attention to this great want, and to remember it constantly in their supplications and prayers.

And while we pray for more laborers, let us not neglect the order of the Church, to pray for those who are from time to time to be ordained to the Ministry. It is vain to speak to your congregations upon this subject, unless you are yourselves careful to use the prayers appointed for the Ember Days in your public services. We are constantly hearing complaints, that this or that Clergyman is deficient in power, in piety, in cloquence, in diligence, or in some other respect; may not our people be taught that they can have no right to complain, who have not habitually and earnestly prayed, that the needful gifts and graces may be bestowed upon those who are charged with the cure of souls? In this age, qualifications are needed such as in the last generation were rarely called into requisition. Objections are to be met, and obstacles are to be overcome, such as had not then to be encountered. Moreover, much more is now expected of every man who occupies a prominent position, and claims the obedience or respect of any portion of his fellows. You must aim at much more than mere performance of routine duties. An efficient minister is one who is ready to take advantage of all the opportunities afforded by varying circumstances and unexpected occurrences. For example, if there is a revival among the members of any of the neighboring congregations, or an endeavor to produce one, he will not sit still, complaining of the efforts of others and suffering his flock to be scattered; he will meet work with counterwork of a better kind, and if there is any real awakening, any increase of seriousness and of solicitude about spiritual things pervading the community, he will avail himself of it to the advantage of his own people. This is a remarkable charecteristic of the most earnest and successful of the Clergy in lasting.

These missions have not yet been introduced here, but there is room for them, and if rightly conducted, they may be very beneficial. To the success of such an effort in any given place, two things seem more particularly essential: 1st, an earnest loving preacher, May we not, my brethren, and 2nd, fervent faithful prayer. attribute many of our failures, and our want of success in our ministry, to the lack of faith? We are doubtful, wavering, even while we pray for ourselves and for our people, and we receive nothing. Is it not so that we are often so weak in faith that, while we fully recognise the efficacy of prayer in the abstract, we do not look for, or expect, the desired answer to our own special interessions on behalf of others, any more than if wo were of those sceptics, who avowedly deny its power and the possibility of its effective operation. This is probably most applicable to the public prayers, and yet of these we ought to believe and to teach that they must prevail, that a special blessing is promised to united prayer, May I not remind you of the specific answer vouchsafed to the united prayers of the whole Kingdom, when two years ago the Prince of Wales was raised up from the bed of sickness, and restored to health, snatched out of the very jaws of death? and of the answers to the prayers on the day of Intercossion to which I have already referred? Only let us not presumptuously expect an answer to prayers, while we neglect anything that we can ourselves do towards the desired object; there is no promise of blessing to idlers. We must be "up and doing," while we acknowledge that though "Paul may plant, and Apollos may water, it is God that giveth the increase, aud do all with humble reliance upon Him, for the blessing to be secured by earnest believing supplication.

While speaking of public prayers, I may notice the Amended Act of Uniformity of 1872, allowing much more liberty than had previously been enjoyed in our services. The Clergy who are content with providing for their people two services on each Sunday, are not affected by this Act; but to you, my Brethren, who, actuated by a deep sense of your responsibilities, are multiplying services, and laboring to the utmost of your ability, the provisions of this Act afford a welcome relief, enabling you to adapt your services to the exigencies of time and place, and to the circumstances of the people among whom you minister. Having already issued a synopsis of the Act for your use, I need only remind you that no special or additional form of service is lawful, unless it be "approved by the

You may, perhaps, expect me to speak of the all-important subject of education, causing so much perplexity to the Home Government, and to those responsible for the administration of public affairs in these Colonies; but I can add nothing to what I have said in former Charges, respecting both general education and the teaching in our Sunday Schools. The latter more than ever demands your most serious attention, now that a merely secular system is adopted by the State Schools. We probably, all of us, hold that this system is very objectionable, although we deem partial instruction better than ignorance, and if a feasible plan should be devised for granting aid to denominational schools, fairly and impartially, we

ought to combine in striving for its adoption.

In my last Charge, I mentioned that an Appeal was pending before the Judicial Committee of Privy Council, in the case of Mr. Purchas, of Brighton, against the decision of the Judge of the Archbishop's Court the Court of Arches. The appeal has since been heard, and judgment was delivered in 1871, on an exparte statement, Mr. Purchas being unrepresented. The use of Vestments, and the position of the Celebrant at the Lord's Table, were the chief points to be determined, and judgment was given: "That the Cope is to be worn in ministering the Holy Communion, on high feast days, in Cathedrals and Collegiate Churches, and the surplice in all other ministrations;" also that the Prayer of Consecration is to be used at the north end of the table, so that the Minister looks south. "If it had happened, as it does in one of the Chapels Royal, that the north side had been where the west side usually is, a question between the letter and the spirit of the rubrics would have arisen."

This judgment occasioned much excitement at the time of its delivery, and was rogarded as so indefensible that the then Attorney General, Sir J. Coleridge, applied for a re-hearing, in order that counsel might be heard for the defendant, and a large number of the Clergy of England signed a protest against any interference with a position which, as it now appears, had been in many places customary from the era of the Reformation.* The judgment has been the cause of unceasing controversy up to the present time, being regarded, even by those who are least disposed to violate the law, as not binding either in law or on the conscience. As the cause was undefended, and the question has therefore not been argued, it is held that no one, except the actual defendant, Mr. Purchas, is bound by the judgment, which moreover, according to the opinion of Sir R. Phillimore, contradicted a previous decision of

the same Court, that the words of the rubric standing "before the table" apply to the whole sentence. How their Lordships reconcite these two decisions I am not able to explain. The Lord Chancellor himself lately said in the House of Lords, "every one knows how extremely hard it is for any person, for any layman, perhaps for any lawyer, to be satisfied that these two decisions are reconcilable with each other." It is probable now that the question will be again fully argued before the lately constituted Court of Appeal, and it is to be hoped that all parties will submit to the judgment whatever it may be. The position cannot be essential, and even they who most strenuously maintain the propriety of the one, or of the other mode, may well submit to the law when impartially expounded. But the two portions of the judgment must stand or fall together. If the Minister is always to stand at the north end of the Holy Table, the Cope must be worn in Cathedrals, the celebrant being attended by an Epistoler and Gospeller, agreeably habited, according to the requirements of the Canon, and the surplice must be worn by the Clergy, in all their ministrations with that exception, so that there will no longer be any excuse, if there ever has been, for the use of the gloomy black gown in any of our ministrations. How far these decisions of the Judicial Committee apply to us, I do not pretend to be able accurately to determine, but I presume that if we are bound by them at all, we must be bound altogether. We cannot pick and choose according to our own tastes if there is a legal obligation; but on the other hand, if, as I believe, we in the Colonies are not legally bound to obey them, we may take them as a guide to the meaning of the rubrics and formularies of the Church, and when they are evidently the honest unbiassed interpretations of able men, they must commend themselves to us, as binding our consciences.

There has been another still more important case, which I must not pass over unnoticed, as the charge was of preaching false doctrine I refer to the case of Mr. Bennett, who, by the use of language utterly indefensible, afforded the desired opportunity to those who wished to check the preaching of the doctrine held by him, with respect to the Holy Eucharist. In a Book called "A Plea for Toleration," he spoke of "the visible presence of our Lord, upon the altars of our Churches," but before his trial, in a new edition, he substituted "the real and actual presence of our Lord, under the form of bread and wine, upon the altars of our Churches," omitting the word visible. The Judge of the Arches' Court decided that this "change of language might be regarded as a recantation of an error, which must otherwise have been condemned," and finally decreed that," to describe the mode of presence as objective, real, actual, and spiritual, is certainly not contrary to the Law." Against this judgment there was an appeal to the Judicial Committee, who affirmed it, stating their opinion, however, that Mr. Bennett's words were "rash and ill-judged, and perilously near a violation of the law."

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The three charges, as stated by their Lordships, were, that the Respondent had contradicted the Articles and the Prayer Book: 1, as to the presence of Christ in the Holy Communion; 2, as to sacrifice in the Holy Communion; 3, as to adoration of Christ in the Holy Communion. Upon the first they say, "the two propositions, that the faithful receive Christ in the Lord's Supper, and that the wicked are in nowise partakers of Christ, when taken together, do not appear to be contradicted by the statement, that there is a real, actual, objective presence of the Body and Blood of Christ in the sacrament, after a heavenly and spiritual manner." "The Respondent has never affirmed, that the Body of Christ is present in a corporal or natural manner. On the contrary, he had denied this, and speaks of the presence in which he believes as spiritual, supernatural, sacramental, mystical, ineffable." Upon the second, they say: "It is not lawful to teach that the sacrifice or offering of Carist upon the Cross, or the redemption, propitiation or satisfaction wrought by it is or can be repeated in the ordinance of the Lord's Supper, nor that in that ordinance there is, or can be, any sacrifice or offering of Christ, which is efficacious, in the sense in which Christ's death is efficacions, to procure the remission of the guilt or punishment of sins. It is well known, however, that by many divines of eminence, the word Sacrifice has been applied to the Lord's Supper in the sense, not of a true propitiatory or atoning Sacrifice effectual as a satisfaction for sin, but of a rite which calls to remembrance, and represents before God that one true sacrifice." "To apply the word Sacrifice, in the sense in which Bishop Bull has used it, to the ordinance of the Lord's Supper, though it may be liable to abuse and misapprehension, does not appear to be a contravention of any proposition legitimately deducible from the 31st Article."

Upon the third charge they say: "The Church of England has forbidden all acts of adoration to the Sacrament, understanding by that the consecrated elements. She has been careful to exclude any act of adoration, on the part of the minister, at or after the conseeration of the elements, and to explain the posture of kneeling prescribed by the rubic." But they add, "some of their Lordships have doubted whether the word 'adore,' though it seems to point rather to acts of worship, such as are forbidden by the 28th Article, may not be construed to refer to mental adoration, or prayers addressed to Christ present spiritually in the Sacrament, which does not necessarily imply any adoration of the consecrated elements, or of any corporal or natural presence therein." And finnally, "his language has been rash, but as it appears to the majority of their Lordships that his words can be construed so as not to be plainly repugnant to the two passages articled against them, their Lord ships will give him the benefit of the doubt that has been raised." That Mr. Bennett used very extreme language, and was charg-

able with inexensable laxity and rashness, must be admitted by every

one who has looked into the case. And even the Judge of the Arches' Court, who treated his views as essentially justifiable, had to speak emphatically in condemnation of the mode of expressing them. But upon the principles adopted in the Gorham case, it was not possible to condemn his opinions; and in fact it is not easy to determine, since the decision in that celebrated case, what statements can be proved to be so repugnant to the language of our formularies as to incur legal condemnation. When that judgment was delivered, one party in the Church rejoiced in its supposed victory, but far-seeing thoughtful men perceived that the door was thereby opened to dectrines of a very different character, and that one after another might be denied or misstated with impunity.

But while much latitude is allowed in doctrine, the Committee are very strict as to practice; and their Lordships said, "in the performance of the services, rites and ceremonios, ordered by the Prayer Book, the directions contained in it must be strictly observed, no omission and no addition can be allowed. But the Church of England has wisely left a certain latitude of opinion in matters of belief, and has not insisted on a rigorous uniformity of thought, which might reduce her communion to a narrow compass."

Their Lordships' decree cannot be strictly observed, because in our services there are some occasions when we are not provided with any directions for our guidance, but its general soundness must be admitted, and I now again urge you, as I have urged in times past, to a strict observance, as far as may be possible, of the rules and orders of the Church. If we must err on one side or the other, it appears to me that error in excess is ordinarily a less evil than in defect, for in the former case all that is ordered is strictly observed, while something over and above is done. But we commonly find the negligent disposed to condemn their more careful and scrupulous brethren; and this is not surprising, because such strict observance is a repreach to themselves. A great advance would be made towards uniformity, if the party commonly charged with ommissions would redeem the pledge published by their recognized organ.

Record, "and we take upon ourselves to say, that Evangelical Churchmen as a body, will be found ready to accord a loyal obedience to it, for they hold the obligations of law to have a much higher claim upon them than any personal preferences of their own on secondary questions of ritual." But notwithsanding this assurance, the orders of the Church, which are perfectly clear, or have been already settled, are systematically violated, by many of those whose sentiments the Record professes to represent.

It is however, generally admitted by thoughtful men, that in the present age of freedom and enquiry, all attemps to enforce a rigid uniformity, either of doctrine or of practice, must be futile, and, since a National Church must be comprehensive, that within 1876.]

Moreover, the very excesses which we deplore are tokens of life. Whenever there has been a great awakening, a stirring up of the vital energy, a quickening and revival of the Church, there have been, and must be, irregularities on one side or the other; and the most abnormal workings out of life are better than the dull uniformity and quietness of death. They, however, who, having pledged themselves to conform to the regulations of a certain system, wilfully or carelessly violate their pledges, are to be condemned; and no organization can be maintained without some restriction of individual liberty. There must be an authority to interpret the laws, and obedience to the recognized authority is a Christian obligation, when it does not conflit with our higher duty.

That some persons are endeavoring to restore Mediaval corruptions, which our Branch of the Church has deliberately rejected, is too true; but they are few, and the profession of the leading ritualists should be accepted, that they believe themselves to be acting in strict accordance with the spirit of the Prayor Book, as it was left at the last revision. One thing is certain, that the excesses are encouraged by every semblance of unfair treatment, and that ritualism will never be checked in England, so long as the Bishops give the people reason to suppose, that they do not mete out the same measure to all, that they treat with severity the addition of some unathosized ceremonies, while they connive at the neglect of many positive orders, even at the mutilation of the services, and the entire omission of one of the Creeds. In my opinion, there are only two fair and equitable courses to be pursued consistent with equity. Either there should be a rigid enforcement of uniformity, and strict observance of the Rules of the Church, in every detail, which is impracticable, owing to the diverse circumstances of our congregations; or equal latitude should be allowed on both sides of the exact line. I have adopted the latter course, and although the variation in this Province has been almost entirely on one side, and some few of you have taken undue advantage of my non-interference, I am thankful that, upon the whole, the effect has been satisfactory, and that most of you, my Brethren, appear to be heartily, honestily, and conscientiously, endeavoring to fulfil your vows, and to conform, as strictly as you can, to the constitutions and orders of that Branch of the Church of which you are min-

istry for over twenty-eight years, and transfer my work and office to another sphere of labor," and three days later, he issued notices for a meeting to be held in New-York on December 3rd, "for the purpose of organising a Reformed Protestant Episcopal Church." Here then he admits, that he is about to set up a new Church, in the place of that which has existed from the beginning; and you will observe that, in his letter to the Senior Bishop, he spoke of transfering his office as well as his work. The functions of his office he has pretended to exercise, not only in the ordination of Priests and Deacons, but even in the consecration of a Bishop, Mr. Cheney of Chicago. I believe the preliminary steps have been taken for his deposition; but time is allowed by the Canons for his repentance, and withdrawal of his abandonment of the Church. With respect to persons admitted by him to Holy Orders, since his resignation of his office and work in the Branch of the Church in which he received authority to ordain, I have no hesitation in saying that they are not to be acknowledged as ordained ministers at all. That a Bishop, having no Diocese, may go about the world ordaining whom he pleases, and that such persons are to be recognised by the Church, although they may be destitute of any qualification, is contrary to common sense. It has been held, from the first, that some irregularities cause ordinations to be null and void. Thus, in the Council of Nice, the ordination of Priests without due enquiry is declared null and void, and also that by a Bishop for a Diocese wherein he has no jusisdiction. And if such irregularities can ever invalidate the act of ordination, the acts of this man must be held to be invalid, most especially in the pretended consecration of Mr. Cheney, who was himself under sentence at the time, and incapable of receiving power to perform any ecclesiastical function. * Any Clergyman performing the functions of an office while under suspension, is guilty of "irregularity," which, in its ecclesiastical signification, is equivalent to telony, and involves ipso facto deposition and excomunication.

The case of Bishop Cummins is very sad, for there is reason to fear, that he never heartily embraced the doctrines of the Church of which he was for about seven years a Bishop, although he had taken an oath, of "conformity and obedience to her doctrine, discipline and worship." It is certain that these were the same, when he quitted her, as when he took that oath, and he does not allege any change in his own views, as a reason for abandoning her communion. He speaks of the prevalence of false doctrine, in the Diocese in which he was an assistant Bishop, but having the sole chage actually, although not nominally, he was himself pledged to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrine

Sentence of degradation from the Ministry was solemaly pronounced upon Mr. Chener, by the Bishop of Illinois, in accordance with the unanimous judgment of Church Court, in June 1971.

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He has pretended, that he desired to return to what he calls Bishop White's Prayer Book, which in fact was not Bishop White's, and was never adopted by his branch of the Church, having only been put forth by a Committee in 1785, and superseded, after four years in 1789, by the Prayer Book as it now is, which was used by Bishop White for nearly forty years until this death. Moreover the Prayer Book to which Bishop Cummins refers contains the doctrines which he repudiates, upon the Sucrements, the Orders of the Ministry, and Confession and Absolusion of the sick. He is very strong upon the necessity for a revision of the Prayer Book, affirming that "the only true remedy," for what he condemns as erroneous, " is the judicious, yet thorough revision of the Prayer Book." But in a sermon preached in 1861, and repeated in 1867, he takes as his theme, "the fitness of the Book of Common Prayer, to be the bond of unity, the manual of worship, for all the confessions which divide Protestant Christendom, the golden chain to restore the ancient unity of the Kingdom of the Redeemer," The special fitness of the Prayer Book to fulfil this office, arises, he says, from the fact, that " it embodies, as no other uninspired volume does, the ancient and primitive Catholic faith of Christ's Church. This goodly robe of the bride of Christ is wrought out of the purest gold of dvine truth; its warp and its woof are alike Holy Scripture." Again " are not these facts evidence that the system of the Prayer Book is the system of the Bible ? This is the boast, this is the honour of our Church. Let her willingly submit to the ignorant reproach that men of every creed can find in her something to favor their views, while she shares this reproach with the Word of God." Once more, where is the longing of the soul, which it does not satisfy, where the craving it does not appeare; where the deepest experience of the love of God which finds not here an appropriate utterance? Where the contrition which cannot unburden itself in its penitential pleadings? What soul-sorrow finds not fitting expression? What soul rapture may not find wings for its Heavenward flight, in these anthems worthy to be chanted by Cherubim and Scraphim?" "Come and see is our reply to him who would depreciate the liturgy, and tell us that its tendency is to deaden spirituality, and to make formal lifeless Christians. Come and see the saints of lofety stature, the men and women of lofety holiness, the mighty wrestlers with God, the meek and lowly followers of the Lamb, whose names and works are now the heritage of all Chistendom, and whose lives are most truly the fruit of Prayer Book nurture."

I must apologise for quoting so much from such a man, but his sentiments are so just and his language so good, that we cannot find a better or truer eulogium of our Prayer Book. Alas! how fallen is he now! how strangely perverted his judgment! To say the least, what is to be thought of his fitness to be a guide, and the

founder of a sect, who, after twenty-two years acquaintance with the Prayer Book, could describe it in such glowing terms, and within six years condems it affiming that a thorough revision is the only remedy for the numerous errors which, in his opinion, are nourished by it in the Church in which he had ministered for eight and twenty years, which is to-day precisely what it was when, leaving the Episcopal Methodists so called, he entered her ranks and received a commission to promulgate her doctrines. He now takes advantage of that commission, and of the still higher office to which he had been called, to injure her, as far as he can, by a new schism of which he is himself to be the leader, in which, in short, judging from his conduct on the day of the organization of the sect, he expects to be the lord and master. But the question immediately occurs to us, if there is no special advantage in Episcopal ordination, and all ministers are to be equally esteemed, whether deriving their anthority from Christ or from the congregation, what can he as a Bishop do that they can not? what rights, power or authority has he, by virtue of this office? and why did he attempt to consecrate another Bishop? And again, does he really mean, that he would regard as true ministers, with whom he ought to hold communion, all who claim to be such, the Unitarian and the Universalist for example, or would be undertake to reject some as unsound, thus arrogating virtual infallibility to himself? Is it to be endured, as it must be if this union principle be admitted, that a minister denying the validity of infant baptism shall have a right to occupy our pulpits, and to tell us that we are unbaptised outside of the covenant of grace?

Unhappily Dr., Cummins is not the first Bishop, who has become a schismatic or a heretic, and has attempted to found a new sect; and it will be with him as it has been with others, that his work not being of God will come to naught, but in the meanwhile he may be the occasion of leading astray some who, having not been well grounded in the faith, are liable to be blown about with every wind of doctrine. We hear that, in this Dominion of Canada, two congregations have been organized under his superintendence. Let us hope that they may speedily recognise their error and return to

An attempt has been made to liken this to the old Catholics movement, but there is this essential difference. The old Catholics are what their name indicates, they walk in the old paths. The Branch of the Church, of which they were members, has formally adopted new Articles of Faith, which they have declined to accept; but there is no such plea for Bishop Cummins. The Church from which he has seeded maintains, that nothing shall be required to be believed as an Article of the Faith, but that which may be proved by the Holy Scriptures. Bishop Reinkens has been constrained, by the peculiar circumstances of a large body of Christians, deserted by their Pastors, and left, through no fault or act of their oways.

Some persons have indeed ventured to suggest, that this new so-called Reformed Episcopal Church is in the same position as the Church of England at the Reformation. But it can scarcely be accessary to demonstrate the fallacy of such a comparison. It is sufficient to notice that the rejection of the Supremacy of the Pope was the act of the whole Church of England, in her Convocation in 1531, and that the work of reformation was gradually and cautiously conducted in and by the Church itself. There was no sccession, and no schism, until, on the publication of the Pope's Bult in 1570, they who recognised his authority were compelled to separate themselves.

There has been of late so much discussion of the subject of confession, thas I must not pass it over unnoticed. Auricular confession, or private confession to the ear of the Priest, is as you know obligatory in the Church of Rome, and declared to be necessary for salvation; but this obligation only dates from the Lateran Council in the thirteenth Century. According to the teaching of our own branch, it is generally admitted that such confession is not enjoined, and the question is, whether it is encouraged or even allowable. The maintainers of the affirmative have at least this prima facie support, that it is twice recommended, under particular circumstances, in the Prayer Book, and that it is not enumerated among the Romish abuses condemned in the Articles, and that it is formally sanctioned by the 113th Canon. That there is a prevalent strong prejudice against the practice of auricular confession we all know, but popular prejudices are not always reasonable, and are very often traceable to a confusion between the use and abuse of their subject matter. That confession is a condition of forgiveness, requires no proof, for we all believe that " if we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins." Here confession to God alone is mentioned, but many sins are also against our neighbors, and some occasion public scandal. In these cases, we also learn from Scripture, what accords with our own judgment, that there sould be confesssion also to the person injured, or to the whole Church, and not only so, but where possible restitution or satisfaction, as set forth in the exhortation to the Holy Communion.

In primitive days such confession was public, and the restoration of this discipline, the Church in the Commination Service, affirms to be desirable. But it was afterwards deemed expedient, to substitute private confession, and penance, until at length penance was elevated to the rank of a sacrament, and an elaborate system was adopted, requiring an accurate investigation of the details of every sin, in order to determine the ponance to be enjoined as a satisfaction. Hence avise the objections most commonly urged against confession, as part of the sacrament of penance, and therefore necessitating these minute enquiries and disclosures. But setting aside the notion of satisfaction, to be made according to the Roman system, there is no occasion for such exact scrutiny. The confessor, being made acquainted with the nature of the sin, and being satisfied of the penitence of the sinner, may grant absolution, without any such minute investigation; and if this distinction were admitted, and understood to be practically recognised, the most effective objections now urged against the practice would be obviated.

That auricular confession, as at present understood, was not practised in the Primitive Church may be certainly affirmed, the confessions in those days having been made to the congregation, or at least the penance being openly performed, and the absolution invariably pronounced in public, even when the Priest had first been privately consulted. But in the third Century, a special officer was appointed in each Church, to receive confessions of secret sins, to prevent public scandal, which office however was abolished in the Eastern Church after about one hundred years. This is strong evidence against the present doctrine of the Church of Rome, that confession is obligatory, and essential to the pardon of sins. And one of the leading writers of that Church upon this subject says, "it would be untrue, and absolutely contrary to the mind of all the Fathers, to conclude that salvation could not be obtained without the exercise of penance. They held in the fullest and most absolute sense the efficacy of true internal contrition.* And some of the strongest maintainers of the utility of confession, and of the sacramantal character of absolution, such as Dr. Pusey, and Mr. Carter, state, that the Fathers use language altogether "inconsistent with any law or custom of compulsory confession ?

With respect to the teaching of our own reformed Branch of the Church, we are thankful that we are in harmony with the early ages. I think the fair inference is, that she would not have confession habitual, but that she recognises its benefits and would encourage its use, under certain circumstances, as set forth in the exhortation to the Holy Communion, and in the service for the visitation of the sick, and this with a view to absolution as expressly stated therein. We find too that the foreign Confessions of Faith generally agree, in maintaining the necessity of the power of the keys, with our own principal Divines since the reformation. They condemn the teaching that it is necessary for every one, and that postbaptismal sin can only be pardoned through penance; but they agree that private confession of sin is beneficial, and may be necessary for some persons. Of our own Divines, I think it may be well to quote at some length the words of one whose name is familiar, but whose

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works are probably not as well known to some of us as they ought to be. Hooker speaks as usual very cautiously, but in this case very decidedly.* "It is true that our Saviour by those words, 'whose sins ye remit they are remitted,' did ordain judges over sinful souls, give them authority to absolve from sin, and promise to ratify in heaven whatsoever they should do on earth, in execution of this their office. Howbeit all this, with two restrictions, which every jurisdiction in the world hath, the one that the practice thereof proceed in due order, the other that it do not extend itself beyond due bounds, which bounds have so confined penitential jurisdiction that, although there be given unto it power of remitting sin, yet not such sovereignty of power, that no sin should be pardonable in man without it." Again, "Albeit we willingly confess with S. Cyprian, the sins that are committed against him, he only hath power to forgive who hath taken upon him our sins, he which hath sorrowed and suffered for us, he whom God hath given for our offences, yet neither did S. Cyprian intend to deny the power of the minister, otherwise than if he presume beyond his commission to remit sin, where God's own will is it should be retained."

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"Strange it were unto me, the Fathers, who so much everywhere extol the grace of Jesus Christ, in leaving unto his Church this heavenly and divine power, should, as men whose simplicity had generally been abused, agree all to admire and magnify a needless office." "The sentence of ministerial absolution hath two effects: touching sin it only declareth us free from the guiltiness thereof, and restored unto God's favor; but concerning right in sacred and divine mysteries, whereof through sin we were made unworthy, as the power of the Church did before effectually bind and retain us from access to them, so upon our apparent repentance, it truly restoreth our liberty, looseth the chain wherewith we were tied, remitteth all whatseever is passed, and accepteth us no less returned then if we had never gone astray."

You observe then Brethren, the clear distinction between the power of absolution, as explained by Hooker, and that maintained by Romanists since the Council of Trent; the former is declaratory and the latter strictly judicial, for "our Lord and Saviour," they say, "hath ordained His Priests judges, in such sort that no man which sinneth after baptism can be reconciled unto God but by their sentence." + If it be strictly a judicial act, then it follows that it is essential to pardon, and genrally necessary to salvation. Now it is certain, that our Church has not required all her members to have

recourse to the Priest for private confession and absolution, and therefore it follows; that she only recognises such absolution as declararory, although she would have it highly valued, as an authoritative declaration, by officers duly commissioned for that purpose, and therefore bringing comfort to the soul of the penitent, and imparting well founded confidence in the time of affliction, and in the hour of death. That the form, "ego absolve to," or I absolve thee, as retained in our absolution, is not necessarily judicial, is shown by Bingham,* and it appears to have been used for three centuries before absolution was decreed to be judicial. It must therefore mean, "I, having heard thy confession, believing thee to be penitent, and sincere in thy desire for pardon, do declare that in my judgment thou hast fulfilled the necessary conditions, and therefore I exeacise the authority committed to me, and assure thee that thou art pardoned." Even the strictest maintainers of the judicial character of absolution, admit the necessity of contrition in the recipient, in order to give efficacy to the sentence; and therefore the benefit is not more certain, according to the one theory, than according to the other.

The whole value of absolution must depend upon the authority, under which it is pronounced, and this is especially the commission given to the Apostles, by the great Head of the Church, on the day of His resurrection, as soon as He had overcome the sharpness of death, which words are repeated at the ordination of every Priest. They who dispute the power of the Keys, object that this was not the primitive form, that in fact these words were not used in the ordination of Priests until the thirteenth Century; and this is true but if the authority was originally conferred, it must belong to all who are ordained to the office, and commissioned to discharge the functions of the ministry of reconciliation, whether the words are actually recited or not. The Primate of the Church of Ireland has however shewn, in a Charge lately published, that the very words were used at the ordination and consecration of Bishops from the very earliest ages. † The prayer of consecration given in the so called Apostolic Constitutions, and another, in an ancient manuscript representing the use of the Western Church in the fourth Century, ask for this power. There are other ancient manuscripts of the same tenor; and the reason for this use of the words was probably that "the Bishop in the Primitive Church, was considered to be the proper minister of absolution, and all the power of discipline was lodged in his hands. But inasmuch as the needs of the Church required more than he was able personnally to perform, the Presbyters, as his proper assistants, were taken in to be fellow laborers with him, and to act on his commission, (i.e., merely as his

deputies) in administering discipline. As the Church increased in numbers, more and more of the work was committed to the Presbyters. But the ancient view lingered long in the Church. It was not till the thirteenth Century that our Lord's commission was introduced into the service for the ordering of Priests, and the power of the Keys, which they had hitherto exercised as assistants to the Bishop, was conferred upon them directly and personnally, in the words of the shepherd and bishop of their souls. The change appears to have been a reasonable one; as the Presbyters of the Church already executed the functions these words conferred, by preaching the gospel and administering the sacrements, by prayer, and exercising the discipline of the Church, it seems proper that the authority should be conveyed to them direct, and not merely by commission as assistants to the Bishop." However this may be, the Primate has evidently arrived at his conclusions, after careful investigation; and if he is correct, the objection, based upon the supposed late introduction of the words into the Odination Service, is thoroughly refuted. Moreover, with reference to their meaning, he says, (and you will remember that he is a very decided antiritualist,) "there is not a vestige of authority for assertion, that the Church in any age sanctioned such an opinion, as that these words had respect only to sins against the Church, without any reference to sins as against God. What those words meant, when spoken to the Apostles, that they meant as applied in the ancient ordinals to the Bishops, and that they meant when they were transfered to the service of the ordination of the Priesthood, and that they also meant when retained by our reformers in their amended

The attempt to make these words bear a non-natural interpretation, would be called Jesuitical, by the persons who thus explain away their meaning, if such tampering with words were attempted by an opposite party. Those very solemn words have been pronounced over each of us, my Brethren; let us not lightly regard them, not neglect the weighty commission thereby conferred upon us. I would fain hope, that none of us have presumed to accept ordination to the Priestood, without being satisfied as to the propriety of the use of this form, for that would be sacrilege, and that if unhappily any one so ordained has since adopted the opinion that they are not rightly used, or are meaningless, such an one will not continue to officiate under what is, in his judgment, a profane assumption. What these words meant when addressed to the Apostles, the same must be their meaning now. We have no right to assume that the Apostles could read the hearts of men, that is the prerogative of God alone, and no such power is attributed to them anywhere, the gift of discerning of spirits being quite a different thing. They could not forgive absolutely, nor condemn according to their own judgments; but they could pronounce the

acquittal of those who gave satisfactory proofs of penitence and faith, and this authority is conferred on every Priest now. Some are unable to accept this high truth of Gods's word, but in reality there is no more difficulty in believing this now, than when the words were uttered. It is as hard to believe, that S. Mathew or S. John could remit sins, as that this power can be given by the Holy Ghost now, and with whatever qualifications it is to be accept-

ed now, by the same it was modified then.

Let us not then, my Brethren, hesitate to invite heavy laden sinners to come to us, that we may point them to Christ, and that to those who have come to Him, but are still doubtful, and through fear of presumption unable to rest in his love, we may speak the comforting words assuring them of pardon, and bidding them be of good comfort. The words are provided for us, let us not neglect to use the exhortation. But on the other hand, I carnestly entreat you, not to attempt to lay a voke upon those for whom Christ died which may be intolerable, and I solemnly charge you, to beware of so urging confession, with a view to absolution, as though confession to God were insufficient, as though the atoning blood might not be directly applied by the great High Priest. The intervention of the human agent may frequently be of great value, but this is owing to the infirmity of our nature, for which our Lord in his infinite mercy has compassionately provided, while they who can, by a direct act of faith, appropriate the promises, and discern the invisible, are stronger than they for whom such aid is indispensible.

Connected with confession and absolution, and often confounded with them, but in great measure distinct is "direction." This is most frequently desired, and to satisfy this want peculiar qualifications are required in the minister, who ought indeed to be specially trained for this work. The confessor, acting only ministerially, may perform his duty well without any special ability; but he who acts also as a director requires much skill and wisdom, and can only be efficient after long experience. In common apprehension the two offices are invariably connected, and practically they are likely to be so very frequently. He who receives the confession of sins, and weaknesses, and doubts, and perplexities, is expected to be able to supply ghostly counsel and advice. There are many cases occurring in the life of man, where with the best intentions, it is very hard to determine for oneself what is right. Tender consciences are often troubled with needless scruples and doubts and fears, while persons of a different temperament, under the influence of self interest, or some other perverting cause, do not perceive the guilt of positive evil. The intervention of Nathan was required to arouse the sleeping conscience of David, and we all know, with what soothing self deception the transgressor can commonly put away troublesome thoughts and stifle his convictions. But in confession the sinner has, as it were, to face the realities of

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his condition, his acts have to be clothed with form and substance, and are brought before him in their true proportions, and with the aid of a judicious counsellor he is enabled to detect secret motives and springs of action, which would have escaped his own unaided investigation. The advantage of having recourse to the ministers of religion, for aid of this kind and for spiritual advice, is recognised by all who have any knowledge of human nature; and such confidential intercourse with the individual members of his congregation is sought by every minister, who has any regard for their welfare,

and any earnest desire for the salvation of souls.

So far then as regards such intercourse, its value being admitted, the question is only whether it is better that it should be solemnly conducted, with certain regulations as to method, and time, and place, or that its character should depend upon accidental circumstances, being conformed to the ordinary customs of society? One essential condition is the assurance of secrecy with reference to all such confidential communications, in whatsoever form, or under whatever circumstances, they may be made. No one can be expected honestly to disclose his sins, his weaknesses, and his temptations, to the minister of God's Word, however great his anxiety and his desire for counsel, unless he can be assured that such revelations will not under any circumstances be divulged. You are aware that the rule of the Church is very strict in this matter, that by the 113th Canon of our Church, the minister who has received a confession is bound not to reveal it to any person whatsoever, under pain of irregularity or of deprivation and incapacity to hold any spiritual office. And it is our bounden duty to take heed, that we never give the least occasion for suspicion, that anything communicated to us, as the ministers of God's Holy Word and Sacraments may possibly be spoken of or made known to any other persons. The ministrations of the Parish Priest must be very indefinite, without point or application to the special wants of his people, unless they have such confidence in him, that they are not afraid to make him the depository of their needs, their perplexities, and their infirmi-

To sum up then, our conclusion is this, that private confession is recommended in our system, as remedial rather than as an habitual practice, as a medicine for the relief of troubled con-ciences, or under special circumstances, and not as one of the ordinary means of grace.* Enough is said to shew that it is allowable, and therefore scriptural, to seek for special absolution in this way, but the language is sufficiently guarded to suggest that a more excellent way is, not to require it, to go at once to the fountain head, and by faith to realise the absolution spoken by the Holy Ghost the Comforter to each penitent sinner.* There is unquestionably a danger in some cases, of relying too much upon the guidance of the Priest, so as to weaken the sense of personal responsibility, and of substituting the audible voice, for the secret communication of the Holy Spirit, but the abuse of any good is no argument against its use.† Only knowing the danger, you should beware of urging as obligatory what is not so enjoined in Holy Scripture, and while ready, in the performance of your duty, to receive every one who desires the benefit of the ministry of reconciliation, you should not in any way encourage habitual recourse to a remedy appointed for extreme

It is probable, that extreme partisans, on either side, will object to these statements, but they are the result of careful investigation, and may be proved to be in strict accordance with the teaching of our own branch of the Church. It is my duty, to proclaim and set before you the truth, and to explain that teaching, without considering whether it may be acceptable or otherwise; but I may observe, that it can only be rightly apprehended by the diligent student, while popular opinions are commonly to be attributed to a merely superficial acquaintance with the subject to which they relate.

In looking over the annual returns, I am thankful to find that, within a few years, there has been in many, or I may say most, of your Parishes a marked increase in the administrations of the Holy Communion, and I trust that the few exceptions will not long continue in that unenviable position. You have each received a charge, to be "a faithful dispenser of the Word of God and of his Holy Sacraments." Are you fulfilling your obligations, when you do not afford your people frequent opportunities of complying with their Lord's injunction, "this do in remembrance of me"? Woe be to the shepherds who feed themselves and not the flock, who withhold the means of grace, and debar the faithful from the sacred food for which they hunger. There may unhappily be, in some Missions, few or none so hungering, there may be a reluctance, instead of a desire, to partake more frequently, but this is probably the fault of the Pastor rather than of the flock, and a consequence of his detective teaching. At all events, your duty is clear. So long as two or three are willing to gather together, it is for you to provide for them; and for yourselves too the celebration is needed; how can you expect life and energy and power, for the work of the ministry, if you do not continually feed upon Him who is the life?

The opinion that we may afford to dispense with means, or that it is a token of advanced spirituality to disregard them, is presumptuous, and the offspring of pride, which is incompatible with spiritual growth. Apparently honoring God, it actually dishonors him, setting up a human system as preferable to the Divine.

We observe the same principle, through all His dealings with man, that He uses means, He requires man to co-operate with him. As the same God rules in the spiritual, and in the material world, so we must believe that both are governed upon the same principles, and we may argue from the visible to the invisible, from the known to the unknown, from the material to the spiritual. In Him "we live and move and have our being," and yet neither life nor health can be secured without our co-operation. The leprosy of Naaman was taken away by Him, but the washing in Jordan was an essential condition. The man born blind only recovered his sight after his eyes had been anointed with clay, and he had washed in the pool of Siloam. Jesus when He fed the multitude in the wilderness, did not distribute the bread Himself, but through the agency of the Apostles. The knowledge of the way of salvation might be imparted by a direct revelation to the sonl. as it appears to have been to S. Paul, but ordinarily "faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God." The enquiry has often been heard, what is the use of prayer? God is omniscient, why should we tell Him our necessities? Yet no believer doubts the efficacy of prayer, or its necessity, if we would have our wants satisfied. How is it then that they who profess to love the Lord Jesus Christ, and to accept, without hesitation or demur, all his teaching, fail to perceive that the Holy Sacraments, which He hath instituted, are generally necessary to salvation, and that, if we would feed on Him, if we would have our souls nourished by His Body and Blood, we must use the means appointed by Himself, the bread which we break, and the cup which we bless, in accordance with His own example and injunction, which are affirmed by His Apostle to be the Communion of His Body and Blood. Wherever the celebrations are increased, there is almost invariably a corresponding increase of communicants. There may be some who presume to draw near to the Holy Table, without the wedding garment, who may be rejected by the King; but, nevertheless, it is our duty to invite, and to try to persuade, all to come with due preparation.

It may be said that people who receive the Scriptures, know their duty in this respect, and do not require to have it more frequently set before them. This plea, if good for anything, must be good to a much greater extent, and may be used to show that all your ministrations are superfluous. I do not find that they who are negligent in enforcing the benefits of the Holy Sacraments ordained by Christ, are at all scrupulous about repeating over and over again the same elementary truths, with which their heavers have been

familiar from their childhood. In fact, we know that, if we would teach any truths effectually, line must be upon line, and precept upon precept, and it must be attributed partly to the neglect of the ministers of God's Holy Word and Sacraments, that so large a proportion of most of our congregations, although regular attendants at public worship, and constant hearers and readers of the Word, are yet self excommunicated, and at the same time unconscious of their danger. It is argued that this duty is not very frequently inculcated in the Epistles of the inspired Apostles, the unerring guides and teachers of the Church of Christ. But the answer is plain, simple, and conclusive. The taking part in the breaking of bread was an essential condition of fellowship with the Apostles. The persons addressed were members of the Church, "called to be saints," instructed in the way of salvation, familiar with its practices; Any such teaching as we have now to repeat and enforce, would then have suggested a doubt, as to that which was unquestioned, would have assumed the possibility of a neglect which was then When the Disciples came together in those without example. days, it was not so much to hear sermons as to break bread, so that it could be said of the whole body, "We being many are one bread, and one body, for we are all partakers of that one bread," that bread of which our Church affirms, in accordance with the inspired Word, that to "such as rightly, worthily and with faith receive the same, it is a partaking of the body of Christ." Of the teaching of our Church, concerning the Holy Sucraments, I refrain from speaking more particularly, as I explained my views very fully in my last Charge (in 1870), to which I refer you for this, as well as for other important subjects, necessarily passed over on the present occasion.

It must, unhappily, be admitted that, however faithfully you may preach, and enjoin this duty, and warn your congregations of the danger of neglect, many will still be unconvinced, or, if convinced, will still follow their own way, and walk according to their own devices. Many will be hearers only, and not doers of the Word, however faithful and earnest the preacher may be; and some may try to satisfy their consciences, by finding fault with you when you press them too hard, and charging you with teaching false doctrine, if you would have them adopt a higher standard than may be needful for the maintenance of respectability. They cannot appreciate the pearls which you cast before them, and will therefore turn again and rend you. But notwithstanding all this, and making allowance for inevitable failures, you may labor in the confidence that all will not be in vain, that some of the seed sown will take

root, and bear fruit.

flock, that he has been more anxious to have them come and hear him preach, and to be in their estimation as "a very lovely song of one that hath a pleasant voice, and can play well on an instrument," than to have them seeking for the food provided by the r Lord. And the proportion of communicants in any congregation may ordinarily be taken as a fair criterion of the diligence and faithfulness of the minister. The hearers are many in these days, and a ready speaker will always attract an audience, although his words may convey little sound instruction, and may be rather adapted to please the ear than to affect the heart. Doubtless it is very pleasant and cheering to have a full Church, and there is a powerful temptation to adapt our preaching to the tastes of the people, who are apt to say virtually, "speak unto us smooth things prophesy There are few members of any congregation who are wise enough, and large minded enough, to wish to have the truth set before them, in all its parts, and from all points of view. Most men are more or less one-sided, and the majority of people cannot bear to have their projudices assailed, whereas the honest seekers after truth will always be glad of the opportunity of hearing both sides of every question wishing to be convinced, if their own views are not correct, and knowing that, if they already hold the truth, the result of argument and investigation must be to confirm it, The most popular system will be that which involves least trouble; short and easy methods are popular, in religion as well as in other subjects, and they who will be well pleased, if you invite them to the House of God to hear a sermon on the Lord's day, will be indignant, if you speak of the duty of coming on other days to worship Him. The importance of faith is readily admitted, because, so long as it is merely a sentiment, it is intangible, and may be supposed to exist without involving much difficuly or self-denial; but faith in action, the external manifestation of that which, unless manifested, may be assumed to have no existence, implies devotion and self-sacrifice; and no teaching can be popular which insists upon these features.

Let us ever bear in mind, my Brethren, that, while we are to be servants of all men for Christ's sake, in all things wherein we may do them good, we are to be teachers and guides, we are ambassadors for Christ, we must proclaim his message in its integrity, we are responsible for the publication of the truth, as our people are for the reception of it. And you must not shrink from claiming this authority, so that all who are entrusted to your care may understand their obligation to give heed to the Word spoken by you. We do not by any means claim for ourselves infallibility, but we ought to speak as clothed with a divine commission, so that they may feel that we have a prima facie claim to be heard, and that, if after a full and honest examination of our teaching in any particulars, they are unable to reconcile it with the Holy Scriptures, they may

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feel that the obligation to reject it is no triffing matter, but that in so acting they are incurring a grave responsibility. Owing to defective training and the self-will, and self-sufficiency, now prevalent, very many people assume to themselves the office of critics and judges, who, far from being qualified to judge or to teach, "have need that one teach them again which be the first principles of the oracles of God," their ignorance being proportionate to their presumption. I fear that the misconceptions of the teaching of the Church, not to say the utter ignorance of it, so commonly to be deplored in her sons and daughters, is to be attributed in great measure to the want of early training, and the defective teaching in the Sunday Schools. It is your bounden duty to endeavour to make them intelligent Churchmen and Churchwomen, and not to afford occasion for the reproach, too frequently well merited, that our congregations know less than any others of the grounds of their faith. So long as this is true, you must not be surprised that you do not gain adherents from other Christian bodies, or that you lose some of the most earnest members of your own congregations, when they are assailed with arguments, which they cannot answer, on behalf of other systems; or are attracted by some specious indications of a more active spiritual life, then they could discern among ourselves. I trust that negligence in imparting such knowledge may never

I trust that negligence in imparting such knowledge may never be attributable to ignorance or indifference on your own part. "The Priests' lips should keep knowledge, and they should seek the law at his mouth." If you are not fully persuaded in your own minds; you will teach with stammering lips, and give utterance to uncertain sounds, and will not prevail. Great is the power of truth; but you will not persuade others, unless you are yourself convinced that you are armed with it, that the way in which you would guide your hearers is the true and the right way, wherein they will find

aids, and enjoy privileges not to be found elsewhere.

And withal look to your motives, for defect there will be fatal. The salvation of souls is the great work, in which you are to be labourers together with God, and with this is closely connected the edification of those who are in a state of salvation. In either part your success will depend much upon your own experience. "The love of Christ constraineth us;" this should be the description of every ambassador of Christ, and it will not constrain you, unless the power thereof is felt by yourself. No theories, no book learning, will suffice, you must speak of that you do know, and testify of that you have seen, if you would be successful in turning many to righteousness. Let your first object be to awaken the sleeper, to convert the sinner from the error of his ways, to persuade him to give himself to Christ, to rely upon the one sacrifice, once for all offered upon the cross, as the propitiation for his sins, and to manifest his faith and love by self-devotion and self-sacrifice. And

then having laid the foundation, building on the rock of ages, you must take heed to the materials with which you build, you will be anxious and careful, to the utmost of your power, to exclude all but the pure gold. You will rightly deem it of great importance, that your converts, and all entrusted to your care, over whom your influence extends, be led to understand, and rightly to use, the means appointed by the Lord himself. In proportion to your love to Him, and your simple dependence upon Him, will be your anxiety to adhere closely to His institutions, and your estimate of the importance of every part of the system organised by Him, under the conviction that "the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men." In whatever . you do, and whatever you teach, let the Lord Jesus Christ be the central object, so clearly set forth, so plainly held up to view, that every line converging to the one point, may carry the eye to Him, "God manifest in the flesh." To know Him, to live in Him, to win Him, to be found in Him, these are the things to be desired. Insist upon this, as the only source of true holiness, the condition of our sanctification—that there must be a real union with Christ, that there is danger in everything that may in any respect interfere with that union. And withal, let us take heed to ourselves, let us be watchful against the dangers to which we are exposed, if we preach what we do not feel, if our piety be professional instead of personal, lest that terrible fate be ours, of which the Apostle speaks, "lest that by any means when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway."

As an example of a case, in which there can be no doubt as to your obligation, both legal and moral, I again call your attention to the rubric before the Prayer for the Church Militant. I have required you to obey the directions of that rubric, of which the plain common sense interpretation has been distinctly cannot do by the Committee of the Privy Council, therefore you, having taken the oath of Canonical obedience, are without exception bound to conformity. How the obligation can be evaded, even according to the most lax explanation of your oath I am unable to imagine; but I have to grieve over the fact, that some of you are still habitually violating your oath in this respect, although it is now sixteen years since I first authoritatively enjoined the observance of that particular

CANON I.

CANON OF THE ELECTION OF THE METROPOLATAN BISHOP.

1. From and after the day on which the See of Montreal shall next become vacant, the Bishop of Montreal shall not, by virtue merely of his office as such, be the Metropolitan of this Ecclesiastical Province.

2. After the expiration of three months, and not later than the expiration of six months after the next and every subsequent avoidance of the Metropolitical See, the Bishops of the said Province shall meet under the presidency of the senior Bishop, or, in case of his inability to act, under the presidency of the Bishop next in order of seniority, and it shall be his duty to summon them to that end, at some place within the Ecclesiastical Province, by giving at least six weeks' notice of the time and place of meeting, and elect

5. All rules, regulations, canons or other provisions of law of the said Province inconsistent with the foregoing provisions, shall

be and the same are hereby repealed.

6. In such election of the Metropolitan Bishop, it shall be necessary that a majority of all the Bishops of the Dioceses in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada concur either by actual vote at the meeting called for such election or else in writing under their hand and seal.

CANON II.

OF SUBMISSION OF CLERGY TO THE CANONS OF THE PROVINCIAL AND DIOCESAN SYNODS.

No Bishop within this Province shall hereafter grant his license to any elergyman to the cure of souls until such clergyman has first subscribed and declared his submission to the Canons of the Provincial Synod, and of the Synod of the Diocese of such Bishop, in the following form:

CANON III.

4. Charges prepared in either of the modes mentioned shall be delivered to the Metropolitan, if he be not the accused; if he be the accused, the charges shall be delivered to the Bishop senior by consecration.

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Board of Inquiry how constituted.

6. The Metropolitan or senior Bishop, as the case may be, shall appoint the Deans, Archdeacons, and Chancellers of the different Dioceses of the Province as a Board of preliminary inquiry, the majority of whom shall form a quorum.

Notice to Members.

7. The Metropolitan or senior Bishop, as the case may be, shall give notice thereof to said Board, and direct them to attend at the time and place designated by him, and organize the Board; and it shall be the duty of each member so notified to attend. The place of meeting must be within the Diocese of the accused. Metropolitan or Senior Bishop shall send at the same time a copy of the charges to the senior dignitary of the Board.

8. The Sittings of the Board shall be private.

9. The Rules of evidence adopted by the Board shall be those of the Civil Courts of this Province; but two witnesses shall be necessary to the proof of any charge.

Presentment.

10. If the majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there are sufficient grounds to put the accused Bishop upon his trial, they shall direct the Chairman to prepare a presentment, to be signed by such of the Board as agree thereto.

11. The Chairman shall transmit to the Bishop from whom they received the charges, the presentment thus signed; and the Bishop

shall send to the accused Bishop a copy of the same.

12. If a majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there is not sufficient ground to put the accused Bishop on his trial, in such case the charges, together with the certificate of the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop by consecration, of its refusal to make a presentment, shall be prepared in duplicate, one to be sent to the Secretary of the Provincial Synod, to be deposited amongst the archives of the Synod, and the other to the Members of the Diocesan Synod of the Diocese where the Bishop has been so charged. No proceedings to be had thereafter by way of presentment on such charges, except upon affidavits of two male com-

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paring proofs and hemselves, and in t forth with reamunicants of the Church, of good standing, of their discovery of new testimony as to the facts charged, and setting forth what such testimony is, which affidavits shall be transmitted to the Chairman of the Court of Inquiry, who shall decide whether they afford ground for a second investigation; and in case he decides that such second investigation is necessary, he shall notify the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop, by consecration, as the case may be, who shall direct an inquiry as, hereinbefore ordered; and if he decides it to be unnecessary, he shall notify the same to the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop, by consecration, as the case may be.

Limitations of Time.

13. No presentment shall be made in any case unless the alleged offence shall have been committed within two years next before the day on which the charges were delivered to the Metropolitan, or senior Bishop by consecration, except the charge be of such a nature that it would subject the accused to indictment before the civil courts.

Trial.

14. When a presentment shall have been made by the Board of Inquiry, or the majority thereof, it shall be the duty of the Bishop forthwith to give to the accused written notice to attend at the place appointed for the trial.

15. The Court shall be formed of the Bishops of the Province, the majority of whom must be present, excluding the accuser, if he

be a Bishop, and the accused.

16. The Bishop to whom the presentment was made shall communicate to every Bishop that he is to attend as a member of the Court; he shall also appoint the time and place for the assembling of the Court; the time shall be within two calendar months of date of such notice, and the place shall be within the Diocese of the accused Bishop. The Bishop to whom the presentment has been made shall inform the accused Bishop, by written notice, to be left at his usual place of residence, of the time and place appointed for the meeting, and summon him then and there to appear and answer.

24. A charge for erroneous doctrine may be made against any Bishop of this Church or by any other Bishop in communion with this Church, not under suspension, deprivation, or degradation,

25. In case of a charge of erroneous doctrine made by a Bishop as aforesaid, if the Bishop accused be afterwards put upon his trial, the Court shall be composed of all the Bishops except the accuser and accused; three Bishops must be present, and the consent of the majority shall be necessary to a conviction.

CANON V.

COURT OF APPEAL OF THE METROPOLIAN.

HOW CONSTITUTED.

The House of Bishops presided over by the Metropolitan, or President of the Upper House, or Senior Bishop in their absence, with two or more assessors to be from time to time nominated by the said House of Bishops, shall be the Court of Appeal from the judgment of any Diocesan Court.

Three Bishops shall constitute a quorum of the Court of Appeal, and the decision of the majority of the Bishops sitting in Appeal shall bind, and in the event of an equality of votes the

decision of the Court appealed from shall stand affirmed.

The Bishop of any diocese, who has given any judgement either alone or in any Diocesan Court in, or is a party to, any case, shall not sit in Appeal in such case.

OFFICERS OF THE COURT.

There shall be a Registrar of the Court of Appeal, and such other officers as the Court may deem necessary, to be appointed from time to time by the Metropolitan.

WHEN APPEAL SHALL LIE.

An Appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeal, in all cases adjudged by any Diocesan Court, on behalf of any party to the case or proceeding in the Diocesan Court.

There shall be no appeal for any error or defect in form in

any proceeding or judgment in a Diocesan Court.

An Appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeal from the judgment or decision of the Bishop of any Diocese.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COURT.

The Court of Appeal may sit in any Diocese, at such times and places as the Court shall, from time to time, order and direct.

The Appellant shall give notice of Appeal to the Respondent and the Bishop of the Diocese in the Court of which the judgment appealed from is given, within one calendar month after such

judgment.

The Appellant shall give to the Respondent, within two calendar months after such judgment is given, a bond with sufficient securities, to be approved by the Registrar of the Court of Appeal, in the sum of \$400, to secure the Respondent for the costs of appeal in case the appeal is dismissed.

Every Appeal shall be prosecuted to a hearing by the Appellant within one year after such judgment is given, if the Court of Appeal shall not so sit, then at the first sitting of the Court of Appeal after

such year shall have expired.

The Appellant shall, within three calendar months after such judgment, bring into the Court of Appeal and file with the Registrar thereof, a transcript of all the proceedings and judgments appealed from, certified to be correct by the Registrar of the Diocesan Court, or the Bishop of the Diocesa whose judgment is appealed against.

If any of the proceedings in the next preceding four sections are not taken within the times respectively limited therefor, the Appeal shall be considered dismissed, and the judgment appealed from shall

stand.

The Appellant shall give the Respondent one calendar month's

notice in writing of the hearing of the Appeal.

The Court of Appeal shall make such rules and orders as to the forms of procedure and practice, fees and costs, as such Court shall from time to time deem necessary.

No person shall perform the office of Lay Reader except he shall hold the Bishop's license.

This Canon shall not apply to the students of any Theological College, so as to prevent them from reading the Lessons in the College Chapel, or to Laymen occasionally officiating, when there

3. No Clergyman shall officiate in any Mission or Parish, either as substitute for the Incumbent or as his assistant, for more than one month, without the written license of the Bishop, and no person who has availed himself of this implied permission shall be allowed to officiate again in the same Mission or Parish within a period of three months, unless he obtain the license of the Bishop or

4. No Bishop of one Diocese shall perform any Episcopal functions in another without the sanction of the Bishop thereof, save in the case provided for by the Canon relating to the powers of the Motropolitan, nor shall any Bishop perform any such functions in any vacant Diocese except by instruction from the Metropolitan; or, in case of the voidance of his Diocese, from the Senior Bishop of

CANON VII.

OF LETTERS TESTIMONIAL.

When a Priest or Deacon in good standing is desirous of leaving. a Diocese, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to give him, on his request, the usual "Letters Testimonia!," but the Clergyman receiving the same shall continue subject to the Episcopal Jurisdiction of the Bishop till the Letters Testimonial shall have been presented according to their address, and accepted by the Bishop to hose Diocese the Clergyman wishes to be transferred; provided always that if they be not presented within three months after their date, they may be considered as void by the authority whence they proceeded, and shall be void unless they be presented within 2E

CANON VIII.

OF EPISCOPAL RESIGNATIONS.

If a Bishop shall desire to resign his Dioceso, he shall give in his resignation to the Metropolitan, in writing, or (if he be himself Metropolitan) to the Bishop senior by Consecration; but such resignation shall not be accepted unless a majority of the House of Bishops consent.

CANON IX.

OF THE SUBDIVISION OF DIOCESES.

The House of Bishops shall have the power of subdividing existing Dioceses, or of forming a new Diocese out of portions of existing Dioceses which may be contiguous, with the concurrence, or upon the application, of the Synod or Synods of the Dioceses affected, and it shall be the duty of such Synod or Synods to consider, without delay, any proposal for the subdivision of a Diocese which may emanate from the House of Bishops.

CANON. X.

OF THE OFFICIATING OF STRANGE CLERGYMEN IN A DIOCESE.

When a Bishop is aware that a clergyman not of his Diocese, is officiating or about to officiate in his Diocese, and when the said Bishop shall have good reason to believe that doubts exist regarding the clergyman's orthodoxy, canonical ordination, or good morals, then the Bishop may inhibit him from officiating within his Diocese, by a writing addressed to him, and to the clergy; and any clergyman, after the receipt of the Bishop's inhibition, permitting such inhibited person to perform any clerical function in his Church, or Mission Chapel, shall be proceeded against by the Bishop for breach of Canonical obedience.

CANON XI.

OF MISSIONARY BISHOPS.

2. In case a Missionary Bishop shall be appointed in the manner herein before mentioned over a District which includes or consists of a part or parts of one or more existing Dioceses, the Missionary Bishop shall exercise no jurisdiction over any such part or parts of such other Diocese or Dioceses, until the Synod or Synods of the Diocese or Dioceses affected shall have consented to his so doing, and it shall be the duty of such Synod or Synods to consider without

delay any such proposal.

3. The Bishop elected, as aforesaid, shall exercise his Episcopal functions in such Missionary District in conformity with the Constitution and Canons of this Province, so far as they can be made applicable to the condition of his District.

4. Every Missionary Bishop shall be entitled to a seat in the House of Bishops, and shall report to the Metropolitan, for the information of the Provincial Synod, at every meeting of the Synod, concerning the state and condition of the Church in his missionary

5. In the event of a vacancy occuring in any Missionary Diocese, the Provincial Synod shall be summoned within six months, to elect another Missionary Bishop; provided the regular meeting of the Provincial Synod shall not take place within twelve months after such vacancy, in which case the election shall be postponed until such regular meeting, and in the meantime, the duties of the late Bishop shall devolve, so far as they can be discharged by him, on a Commissary, whom it shall be the duty of every Missionary Bishop to appoint on his consecretion, and from time to time, as the

6. Nothing contained in the first clause of this Canon shall prevent the election of a Missionary Bishop at this Session of the Synod,

or at any ajourned session of the same.

7. Any Diocese of the Province may, if it desires so to do, separate and set apart any portion of its Terrritory as a District suitable for the establishment therein of a Missionary Bishopric, and such Territory so set apart may become a Missionary Diocese and a Bishop be appointed thereto in accordance with the foregoing Canon.

CANON XII.

FOR ALTERING THE ORDER OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE CHURCH IN CERTAIN CASES.

Whereas the Convocations of Canterbury and York did introduce certain modifications into the order of the Public Service of the Church; and whereas the Imperial Parliament did by Act 35 and 36 Vic., Cap. 35, sanction and authorize the same as amendments to the Act of Uniformity; and whereas it is expedient to extend such modifications to this Ecclesiastical Province:

Be it, therefore, enacted as follows:

Use of shortened Form of Morning and Evening Prayer.

The shortened Order for Morning Prayer, or for Evening Prayer, specified in the schedule of this Canon, may on any day except Sunday, Christmas Day, Circumcision, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and Ascension Day, be used in lieu of the Order for Morning or for Evening Prayer respectively prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer

Special Service for Special Occasions.

Upon any special occasion approved by the Ordinary there may be used in any Cathedral or Church a special form of service approved by the Ordinary, so that there be not introduced into such service anything, except anthems or hymns, which does not form part of the Holy Scriptures or Book of Common Prayer.

Additional Service on Sundays and Holidays.

An additional form of service, varied from any form prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer, may be used at any hour, on any Sunday or Holy-day, in any Cathredral or Church in which there are duly read, said, or sung as required by law, on such Sunday or Holiday, at some other hour or hours, the Order for Morning Prayer, the Litany, such part of the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion as is required to be read on Sundays or Holy-days if there be no Communion and the Order for Evening Prayer so that there be not introduced into such additional service any portion of the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, or any thing except anthems or hymns, which does not form part of the Holy Scriptures or Book of Common Prayer, and so that such form of service and the mode in which it is used, is, for the time being, approved by the Ordinary.

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Separation of Services.

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether the following forms of service, that is to say: The Order for Morning Prayer, the Litany and the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, may be used as separate services, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: Be it, therefore, enacted and declared that order as separate services, or that the Litany may be said after the in addition to the use of the Litany in the Order for Morning without the preaching of a sermon or lecture, or the reading of a homily.

Preaching a Sermon without Previous Service.

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether a sermon or lecture may be preached without the common prayers and services appointed by the Book of Common Prayer for the time of day being previously read, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: Be it, therefore enacted and declared that a sermon or lecture may be preached without the common prayers or services appointed by the Book of Common Prayer being read before it is preached, so this Canon, or by the Bidding Prayer, or by a collect taken from the Book of Common Prayer, with or without the Lord's Prayer.

Schedule.

Note.—The Mininster using the Shortened Order for Morning Prayer or for Evening Prayer in the Schedule may, in his discretion add in its proper place any exhortation, prayer, canticle, hymn, psalm, or lesson contained in the Order for Morning Prayer or for Evening Prayer in the Book of Common Prayer, and omitted, or authorized to be omitted, from such shortened order.

SHORTENED FORM OF SERVICE FOR MORNING PRAYER DAILY THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, EXCEPT SUNDAY, CHRISTMAS DAY CIRCUMCISION, EPIPHANY, ASII WEDNESDAY, GOOD FRIDAY AND ASCENSION DAY,

At the beginning of Morning Prayer the Minister shall read with a loud voice some one or more of these sentences of the Scriptures that follow: "When the wicked man," &c.

A general Confession to be said of the whole Congregation after the Minister, all Kneeling:

" Almighty and Most Merciful Father," &c.

The Absolution or Remission of Sins, to be pronounced by the Priest alone, Standing, the People still Kneeling:

"Almighty God the Father," &c.

The people shall answer here, and at the end of all other prayers, "Amen"

Then the Minister shall Kneel and say the Lord's Prayer with an audib'e voice; the People aso Kneeling and repeating it with him.

" Our Father which art in Heaven," &c.

Then likewise, he shall say :

"O Lord open Thou our lips," &c.

Here all Standing up, the Priest shall say:

" Glory be to the Father," &c.

Then shall follow the Psalms appointed. And at the end or evere Psalm throughout the year, and likewise at the end of the Benedicite, Benedictus, Magnificat and Nunc-Dimittis, shall be repeated:

"Glory be to the Father," &c.

Then shall be read distinctly, with an audible voice, either the First Lesson taken out of the Old Testament, as is appointed in the Calendar, or the Second Lesson taken out of the New Testament, except there be a Proper Lesson assigned for that day in which case the Proper Lesson shall be read, and if there are two Proper Lessons, each shall be read in its proper place; he that readeth so Standing and turning himself as he may post be heard by all such as are present.

Note—That before every Lesson the Minister shall say:
"Here Beginneth" (such a chapter or such a verse of such a chapter, of such a Book,)

After every Lesson.

"Here endeth" the Lesson, or the First or the second Lesson.

At the beginning of the Evening Prayer the Minister shall read with a loud voice some one or more of these sentences of the Scriptures that follow.

A General Confession to be said by the whole Congregation after the Minister, all Kneeling.

"Almighty and most merciful Father" &c.

The Absolution or Remission of sins, to be pronounced by the Priest alone Standing; the people still Kneeling.

"Almighty; God, the Father." &c.

Then the Minister shall Kucel and say the Lord's Prayer, the People also Kneeling and repeating it with him.

"Our Father, which art in heaven," &c.

Then likewise he shall say :

" O Lord, open Thou our lips."

Here all Standing up, the Priest shall say :

"Glory be to the Father,

Then shall be said or sung one or more of the Psalms in order as they be appointed. Then either a Lesson of the Old Testament, as it is appointed, or a Lesson of the New Testament, as it is appointed, except there is a Proper Lesson assigned for that day, in which case the Proper Lesson shall be read, and if there are two Proper Lessons, each shall be read in its proper place; and after the Lesson or between the first and second Lessons, shall be said or sung in English one of the following:

Either the Magnificat, or the Song of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in English, as follows:

Magnificat, St. Luke 1.:

"My soul doth magnify the Lord," &c.

Or else this Psalm (except it be on the nineteenth day of the month, when it is read in the ordinary course of the Psalms.)

"O Sing unto the Lord a new song," &c.

Or Nunc Dimittis (or the Song of Simeon) as followeth:

"Lord now lettest thou Thy servant," &c.

Or else this Psalm (except it be on the twelfth, day of the month.)

Deus Misereatur. Psalm LXVII.

"God be merciful unto us and bless us," &c.

Then shall be said or sung the Apostles' Creed, by the Minister and the People Standing.

"I believe in God the Father Almighty," &c. .

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And asfer that, the people devoutly Kneeling, the Minister shall pronounce with a loud voice : "The Lord be with you." /

Answer-" And with thy Spirit." Minister-" Let us pray."

Then the Priest, standing up, shall say:

"O Lord show thy mercy upon us," &c.

Then shall follow three Collects. The first of the Day; the second for Peace; the third for aid against all Perils, as hereafter followeth; which two last Collects shall be daily said at Evening Prayer, without alteration.

The second Collect at Evening Prayer:

"O God, from whom all holy desires," &c. The third Collect for aid against all perils:

"Lighten our darkness," &c.

Here may follow an Anthem or Hymn.

A Prayer of St. Chrysostom.

" Almighty God, who hast given us grace," &c. 2 Corinthians, XIII.

"The grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ," &c. Here endeth the Shortened Order of Evening Prayer.

CANON XIII.

OF ALTERATIONS OR ADDITIONS IN PRAYER BOOK AND VERSION OF SCRIPTURES.

No alteration or addition shall be made in the Book of Common Prayer and Administration of the Sacraments and other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church, the Articles of Religion, or the Form and Manner of making, ordaining and consecrating Bishops, Priests and Deacons, or the Version of the Scriptures authorized to be read in Churches, unless the same shall be enacted at one session of the Provincial Synod and confirmed at another session of the same; provided that the confirmation be approved by two-thirds of the House of Bishops and two thirds of each order of the Lower House.

Nevertheless, any alteration in or addition made to the Prayer Book or Articles by the Church of England in her convocations, and authorized by Parliament, may be accepted for use in this Ecclesiastical Province by the Provincial Synod at one session only, without the necessity for further confirmation.

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
