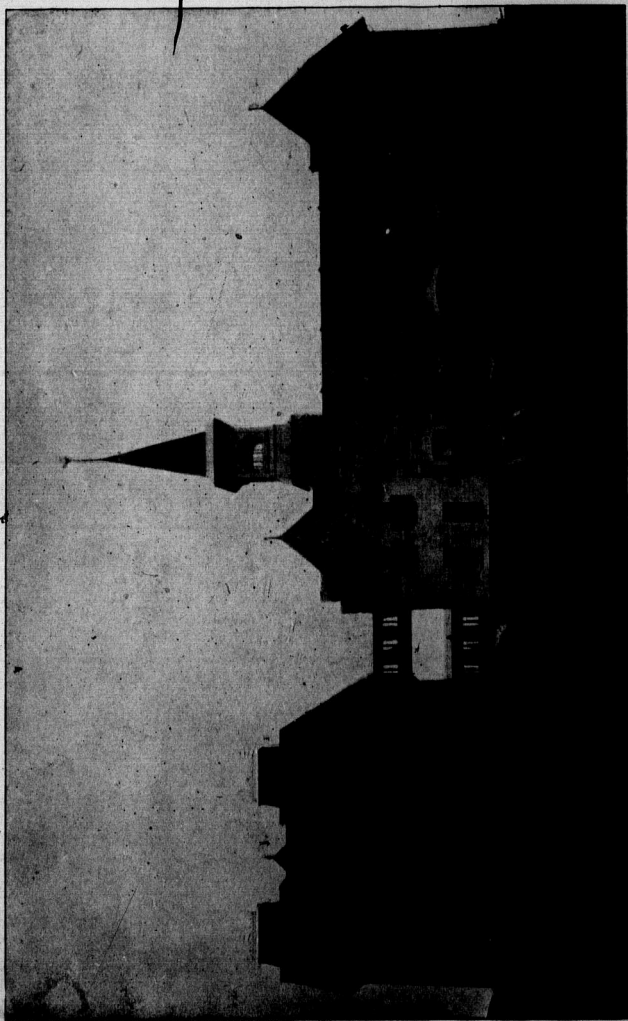

GEORGE MOORE MEMORIAL HOME — AND — OLD PEOPLE'S HOME AT LONGUE POINTE.

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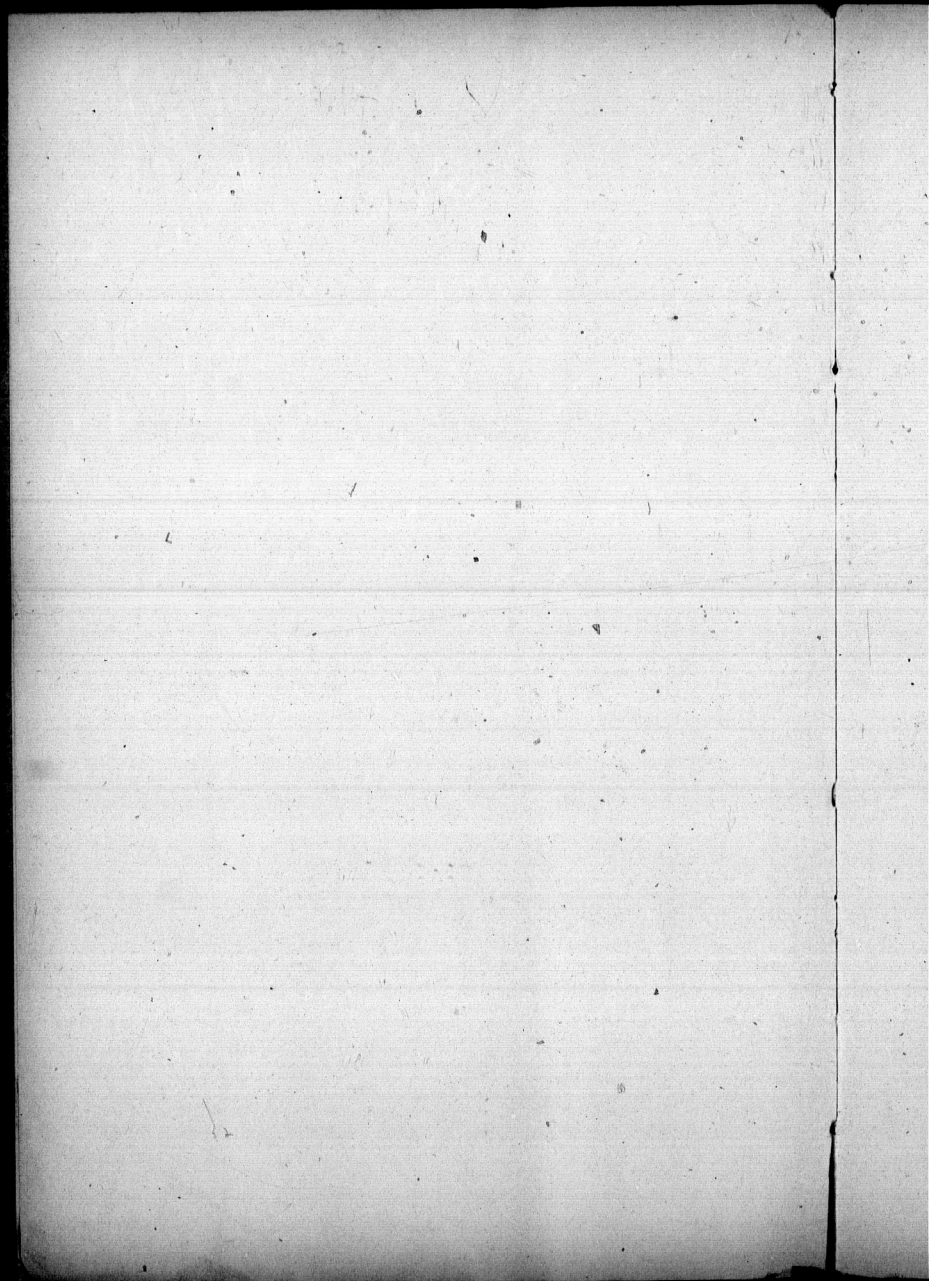

MINUTES OF THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING, held April 21st, 1897.

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS.

The President, in the course of some remarks, said that they could not let the opportunity pass without giving their testimony to the goodness of their Heavenly Father, who had so wonderfully watched over and protected their Homes during the year that had passed away. No untoward accidents had befallen their buildings. Their inmates had lived in peace and comfort, and had, on the whole, enjoyed fair health.

During the past winter, and at the present time, the Home at Longue Pointe was fully taxed to receive all applicants; but, so far, no homeless old people had been refused who had applied duly recommended. They had again to record the value and usefulness of the Moore Incurable and Convalescent Home, that the Board had felt to be the missing link in the benevolent work of their Institution. Quite a number of people who, needing a short rest, to recruit from sickness or feebleness of body had, from the healthful

surroundings of that locality, been able to resume their ordinary avocations in life.

The Report would mention that one after another of their Governors were passing away to the life beyond, teaching those who remain that what their hands find to do, to do it with their might, and to impress upon those who love others to lend a hand to perpetuate the usefulness of their excellent Institution.

THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING MARCH 31ST, 1897.

The Board of Management of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge have the honor to submit the following Report:—

INMATES.

The average number for the year, 131; the highest number for the year, 141; the lowest number for the year, 121; showing an average of ten (10) more than last year.

GEORGE MOORE MEMORIAL HOME.

The average number for the year, 34; the highest number for the year, 37; the lowest number for the year, 28. In Moore Home at present 40; total received in Home since opening, men 57, women 102;—total 159.

DISCHARGED.

Men 28, women 67;—total 95.

DIED.

Men 9, women 12;—total 21. Sent to Insane Hospital, 3. Remaining in the Home, men 18, women 22; total 40.—total 159.

NIGHT REFUGE.

Number of lodgings given in Night Refuge, men, 33,085; women, 525. Total, 33,610, being 5,594 less than last year.

SOUP KITCHEN.

The quantity of soup and extra meals, 81,819, being 11,125 less than last year.

GENERAL MAINTENANCE.

The cost of maintenance has been \$18,039.92. The sum of \$8,734.70 was expended for food, being \$1,196.32 more on this item than in 1895-96.

DEATHS.

In Country Home, 8; in Moore Home, 8; in Refuge City House, 3; in Hospital, 4. Men, 13, women, 10,—total 23.

KINDLING WOOD.

This industry is carried on as usual, and the returns are satisfactory, as will appear by the Treasurer's statement. A stock of dry wood is kept on hand, and it is hoped that the friends of the Institution will continue to patronize us.

OUTDOOR LABOR.

During the Fall and Winter men were, as formerly, sent out to work, and gave general satisfaction. The proceeds carried to revenue account was \$513.

POOR RELIEF.

The Committee met weekly on Monday morning during the year, and carefully attended to all the duties that relates to the internal arrangements of both the City and Country Houses.

INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

The Ladies of the Industrial and Visiting Committee are entitled to the thanks of the Governors and the Board for their unremitting attention to the work committed to their management. Their report will be laid before you.

BOARD OF OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The thanks of the Governors and the public are due to the Board of Outdoor Relief for the very efficient manner in which they have discharged the onerous duties committed to them. Their report is before you.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The Board desire to place on record their appreciation of the faithful and self-denying attention shown by the Ministers of the city, and others who attend to the moral and religious interests of our people, both of those of the Night Refuge and the Country House, and their weekly services at the Country House on the Lord's day.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

Entertainments given to our people, for which the Board desire to express gratitude to the various churches and kind friends who have contributed by social gatherings at both City and Country Houses, with music, songs, recitations, etc., thus giving pleasure and enjoyment with kind words to our inmates, especially during the cheerless winter evenings, for all such and increasing interest we are sincerely thankful.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF OUT-
DOOR RELIEF FOR WINTER
OF 1896-97.

The Board respectfully submit to the subscribers of the Outdoor Relief Fund the annual report of the proceedings during the past year, together with the accounts showing the receipts and expenditure for the same period. On December 9th, 1896, a meeting was held of city clergymen, representatives of some of the National Societies and Committees of the House of Industry and Refuge, to arrange for the winter work. After fully discussing the subject of relief, it was resolved that the operations of the Board be carried on as usual, and the following gentlemen were appointed a Committee for that purpose, and to make an appeal to the public, through the press, for donations to sustain the work, viz:—Charles Alexander, A. F. Gault, James Moore, Hon. J. K. Ward, Jeffrey H. Burland, Joseph Richards, James Wilson, William Reid, Daniel Wilson, Walter Livermore and Rev. F. Riedel. The meeting of the Board for the distribution of relief commenced on Thursday, December 17th, 1896, and were continued weekly during the winter until March 18th, 1897, as shown by annexed statement. Since the Board closed, a number of destitute families, widows, and deserted wives are being cared for.

The relief given consisted of fuel, coal and wood, bread, oatmeal and flour, tea and soap, new and second-hand clothing; each case brought under the notice of the Board was carefully investigated, and if found worthy, was relieved. The Board acknowledge and return thanks for the generous support afforded by the citizens and friends at a distance.

To the Metropolitan Coal Fund for five tons coal delivered to twenty families through the city. To the city newspapers, viz: Gazette, Herald, Witness and Star, the Board desire to return sincere thanks.

The Board desire to record the valuable services rendered to them by Revd's. Messrs. Patterson, McManus, DeGruchy, Duclos, Roy, Massey, and other Christian

workers in attending the Board, visiting and reporting cases that came under their notice.

The accounts current with D. McMillan, Secretary-Treasurer, duly audited, is herewith submitted, showing a deficit of \$440.79.

REPORT.

To the Board of Management of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge.

GENTLEMEN,—Taking age into consideration, the health of the inmates during the past twelve months has been very good.

In the "Country House" where the old people are, the demands upon the Medical Officers has not been very great. The same might also be said of the "Moore Home," where the cases are mostly convalescents or chronics.

Visits have been made in a number of cases to the City Refuge, where they have received necessary treatment or have been sent to some of the hospitals.

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

In submitting our Thirty-Fifth Annual Report, we would call particular attention to the increased claims upon the Society during this winter of more than unusual hardship and want of work. The number

of workers has been largely increased, each case proving so urgent that we felt it imperative to relieve by providing work and thus prevent, if possible, the need for charity, although often that had to be extended to cover present needs. Employment has been provided for 193 women, and \$4,591.34 expended in payment of same.

The workers classified are as follows:—

The Annual Bazaar realized \$4,576.22. This Bazaar serves a double purpose: it brings in funds for our work and it helps to dispose of the stock of clothing on hand. This accumulation of stock is one of the greatest difficulties with which the Society has to contend, and any suggestion as to how to meet that difficulty would be gladly welcomed. The proceeds of the fancy-work table, viz., \$365.00, was expended in purchasing clothing for the different charitable institutions and our own workers. The result of the Spring sale was most discouraging, only \$195.93 being realized, and the committee have to meet a new year burdened with a stock of over 8000 garments. It is of great importance to have as much as possible of this stock sold, as we depend on that as a part of our needed revenue, and we earnestly hope that some kind friends will help us in disposing of it. We are grateful to the following ladies for their kindness in conducting the Friday morning meetings with the workers:—Mrs. Castle, of Rochester; Mrs. McWilliams, Mrs. Lindsay and Mrs. Turnbull; also to the latter for supplying hymn books, books and papers. The kindly and sympathetic words spoken must have encouraged many a heart that has felt but little of this world's brightness. Through the generosity of our friends we were again able to supply our workers at Christmas time with gifts of Christmas

dinner and clothing. A full list of contributors is appended. Miss Dow and Mrs. Gault sent \$40 each towards supplying Summer Trips for the women, and through the kindness of one friend we were enabled to supply coal and wood to 16 families.

The Old People's Home at Longue Pointe has been regularly visited, and the inmates found happy and contented; when improvements for the comfort of the old people have suggested themselves to the ladies, they have reported to the governors.

We would most heartily thank all those who by their generosity have enabled us to carry on our work; particularly would we thank the churches for the generous contributions at the time of the Bazaar, also the many who, outside of our own committee, have given us practical aid.

We most cordially thank the ladies of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's Ladies' Aid Societies for visiting and inquiring into the needs of applicants.

We feel confident that it only requires the nature of our work to be known, and people to feel that every purchase made from the Industrial Rooms means help to the industrious poor, to secure the support we need.

All orders, including those for the finest underclothing, receive prompt and careful attention from our efficient Superintendent, Miss Rhind.

We extend our sincere thanks to Messrs. Bentley & Co., for printing; Messrs. Burland & Co., for tickets; editors of *Gazette*, *Star*, *Witness* and *Herald*, for insertion of notices; and to all who in any way have assisted us in furthering the interests of this most deserving charity.
