A Political Sensation.

Lord Salisbury has caused a sensation by giving utterance to what would have been looked upon, a few years ago, as a rank trade heresy. He made a speech at Hastings last week, in which he said Great Britain's free trade policy had not been initiated by the rest of the world, as was anticipated years ago. He noted that foreign nations were, indeed, pursuing the policy of protection and proceeded as follows:

"We are excluding us from their markets and are trying to kill our trade, and this state of things appears to grow worse. We live in an age of war tariffs. An important point is that while nations are doing everything to obtain each others' commercial favors, none are anxious about the favor of Great Britain, because Great Britain has stripped herself of all her arms and weapons with which the battle is to be fought. The attitude which we have taken in regard to it is disloyal to the glories and sacred doctrines of free trade to impose duties on anybody for sake of anything we get thereby may be noble, but it is not businesslike. (Cheers.) On these terms you will do to get nothing. If you intend to hold your own in this conflict of tariffs, you must be prepared to refuse nations the injury you access to your markets. We complain most of the United States, and it so happens that the United States mainly furnishes us with articles which are essential to the good of the people and with raw material, which is essential to our manufactures. We cannot exclude either without serious injury to ourselves. I am not prepared to punish other countries to inflict dangerous wounds on ourselves. We must confine ourselves to those matters wherein we shall not suffer much whether injury continues or diminish. While we cannot raise the price of food and raw material, there is an enormous mass of imports, such as wines, spirits, silks, gloves and lace from countries besides the United States which are merely luxuries, and of which a diminished consumption could be risked in order to secure access to the markets of our neighbors. I shall expect to be excommunicated for propounding such a doctrine. But I am bound to say that I think the free traders have gone too far."

As might be expected these utterances have raised quite a storm on the other side of the water, particularly on his own side of politics. A London despatch says: "The leading conservative organ bluntly declares that he has no good either to himself or to his party by his reference to free trade; while the chief Unionist organ in the province the Birmingham Post plainly says that if such news is translated to Leeds the Unionist alliance is dead, while the Times, the Standard and the Chronicle throw cold water on his plan in unmistakable language. The Post says that Lord Salisbury advocates the common-sense view that retaliation is becoming a necessity in the case of imported luxuries. The speech has caused great excitement among the liberal newspapers. In Manchester, Liverpool, Birmingham, Glasgow and other business centres the premier is severely denounced."

H. H. Warner, of Rochester, N. Y., has brought the Hillside group of mines in Arima for \$200,000.
