



west Land Regulations Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTCH GIFT TO AMERICA.

Duplicate of Henry Hudson's Vessel, the Half-Moon.

AMSTERDAM, July 8—The early history of America is so picturesquely linked with Holland that the proposal of the Holland Society to present a souvenir in connection with the coming Hudson-Fulton celebration in September next is at once graceful and appropriate. When Henry Hudson, and adventurous Englishman, set sall from this port three hundred years ago, a little boat named the Half-Moon, of 96 tons displacement and 80 tons burden, carried him and his covoyagers across the Atlantic and over the waters of the bay and river which are named after him; and it is proposed to send to America a durbicate of the Half-Moon, with all her quaint appointments.




