The legations are preparing for a slege. Tien Tsin, March 3.—Rioting of a serious nature occurred here last night. The outbreak had been feared and precautions were taken as far as it was possible to protect the residents from harm. Between 9 and 10 o'clock in the evening the soldiers mutinied. They set fire to a number of buildings and then began looting from house to house. They were joined by the rabble. The shops and tanks on all the important streets were looted and some of them were wrecked. In order to intimidate the populace the soldiers kept up a continual gun fire. The rattle of musketry could be heard throughout the night. Only a few of the police remained loyal and they were greatly outnumbered and powerless to suppress the disorders.

No fewer than 14 fires were raging simultaneously in various parts of the city. The soldiers broke into the Pelyang mint which was set on fire. 




