ST. JOHN FEATURED IN MONTREAL PAPER

An evidence of the larger place St. John is occupying in the minds of the Canadian people is found in the fact that the Upper Canadian newspapers are now devoting more space to this city than ever before.

Under the caption "New Wave of Progress Sweeps Millions and Men to St. John, N. B." the Montreal Herald of Saturday devoted a full page to the development which is taking place here.

To have 100,000 people in five years. To be the greatest port in Canada. To be a great manufacturing centre. To be the best governed city on the continent. To be a city beautiful. To keep on "boosting." And if the breed keeps up they'll get it all.

Some Facts of Progress. Contract let for \$12,000,000 dry dock and piers for C. T. P. terminals. A million dollars in real estate deals in six weeks. Twenty thousand new population coming within 18 months. Three new railroads coming along. Big water and pit mouth power development near by. New paper and pulp mill, new cement works, new iron and brass foundry, new candy and broom factories coming. New buildings leaping up. And every St. John man's a booster.

REGIMENTAL ORDERS N. B. REGT. ARTILLERY

The following regimental orders have been issued by order of Lieut. Col. Baxter, commanding officer of the 3rd New Brunswick Regiment of Artillery:

1. A salute will be fired at the opening of the legislature on Thursday, 7th March, at 3 p. m. For this purpose the following are detailed: Capt. J. T. McGowan in command with two subalterns, six non-commissioned officers and eight gunners from No. 5 Battery.

2. The detachment will proceed to Fredericton on the morning of the 7th prox. by a train to be announced later. The O. C. detachment will take his instructions from R. S. Barker, private secretary to his honor the lieutenant governor. The detachment must be on parade at the guns not later than 2.45 p. m.

3. Dress: Winter dress will be worn.

4. In firing the salute particular attention must be paid to the following rules: "In firing blank there will be an interval of not less than 15 seconds between rounds."

5. Officers of the regiment are requested to attend the ceremony. Those not with the saluting party will rendezvous at the Parliament Buildings at 2.30 p. m. and meet his honor the lieutenant governor at the main entrance. "Levee dress" with full dress headdress will be worn—officers in full dress have the right to wear business but arrangements must be made to secure uniformity. Junior officers who have not full dress are permitted to attend in undress uniform.

The band of the Regiment is holding a concert at Fredericton on the evening of the 7th prox. Officers are requested to be present. Mess dress or full dress for those in possession of it. Junior officers may wear undress.

A circular has been received from Headquarters stating that an accident was recently caused by neglect to examine a rifle after firing, although difficulty was experienced in loading the next round. It was subsequently ascertained that the envelope of the bullet had "stripped" and remained in the bore. The attention of all concerned is drawn to the serious and perhaps fatal results due to neglect in failing to examine the bore of a rifle, if there is the slightest difficulty in loading or the round fired was a "miss."

The same authority states that it has been noticed that, in some instances, officers of corps undergoing training in a camp of instruction do not attend for more than a few days, that as the course of training in camps is progressive, unless an officer follows the syllabus from day to day, he is likely to become as much of a hindrance as a help in carrying out the instruction of those under his command. If, therefore, it is found that an officer of this unit is only able to camp for a few days, a recommendation should be put forward that he should be relieved altogether from annual training for the year and thus avoid the expense entailed for his transportation to and from camp, for no benefit is derived, so far as the training of his unit or himself is concerned, by his attendance at camp for a short period only.

The annual meeting will be held at the Union Club on Saturday, 9th March, at 8 p. m. Reports of the Regimental and Band Committees must be in the hands of the adjutant not less than three days previous to the meeting.

SALE OF LAND BY THE BOARD

AFTERNOON OR SATURDAY

Much Business Before Special Meeting - Applications for Lancaster and West End Lots - Contracts Awarded for Fire Department Supplies - Chief Clarke Replies to Criticisms of Force.

At a special meeting of the Safety Board on Saturday a large number of applications to purchase or lease city lots were considered, and contracts for fire hose and salvage covers awarded.

Ald. J. B. Jones presided and those present were Ald. Wigmore, Elliott, C. T. Jones, Wilson, Green, Potra, Mayor Fink, the common clerk, Director Wisely, Chief Clarke, and Chief Kerr.

The first business was the reception of the report of the sub-committee appointed to consider applications to purchase lots from the city. The report recommended the acceptance of the offer of W. E. Barnhill, of \$1,000 for the lots corner of Main and Church streets, and \$3,000 for lots on the Manawagonish Road. Both properties are under renewable lease to Mr. Barnhill.

Ald. Green moved that Mr. Barnhill be sold the two properties for \$4,000 without the triangular strip, bounded by the pipe line.

After some discussion it was decided to recommend the sale to Mr. Barnhill of both properties, including the triangular strip for \$4,100.

It was recommended that James Ready be sold lots on the Manawagonish Road for \$3,500, provided he relinquished all rights across the pipe line.

Ald. Green moved that the price be raised to \$4,500. Mr. Ready's lease would not enable him to demand payment for improvements to the land in excess of \$20 an acre, and it would be better for the city to appropriate that sum for \$3,500, he said. The motion to sell for \$4,500 was adopted.

A recommendation of the committee to raise to Oscar Taylor for 25 years, lots on Prospect street, formerly under lease to Geo. Irvine, was turned down on motion of Ald. Potts, who objected to further leases being given until the plan of the Lancaster lands is forthcoming.

The committee reported against the application of C. P. Baker and J. King Kelley to purchase the Meely house.

Ald. Green said the city was only getting \$100 a year, and should sell or do something with the property.

Ald. Potts moved that the house and lot be offered at auction with an upset price, and this was adopted.

The offer of Mrs. Mary Brennan to purchase lots 4 and 7 in Block D, for \$800 was turned down.

Another sub-committee reported on the application of Geo. Troop to purchase lots at the foot of Broad street, Sydney ward, recommending that a price of \$400 for two lots be asked.

Ald. Wigmore said it was reported that Mr. Troop was trying to get certain parties to take an option under lease to Geo. Troop, and for a much bigger price than \$400.

On motion of Ald. Potts the committee was instructed to look into the matter and report again.

A sub-committee consisting of Ald. Scully and McLeod, recommended that Geo. E. Holder be given two lots No. 575 and 570, corner of Germain street and City line, for \$700, and this was approved.

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been made up and posted. You can vote the section down at the council. Ald. Potts moved that the police and firemen be given a vacation of 14 days this summer.

The board approved the director's recommendations for repairs, painting and new apparatus as follows: Painting exterior of No. 4 engine house. Inside No. 6 engine house, steel ceiling and sides in engine rooms No. 5, salvage corps No. 2, engine room No. 3, guard room and police court room.

Providing new shed for No. 7 engine house, new ladder truck No. 7, new double wagon No. 6, new floor in No. 1 engine room if necessary, repairs to roof of Carleton public hall.

Chief Kerr said there was need of a brake for the large hook and ladder truck and recommended that La France brake be secured.

The director was authorized to purchase the brake.

Chief Kerr brought up the matter of putting rubber tires on the hose wagons, and it was referred to a sub-committee.

Chief Clerk said Police Officer MacNamee had broken his leg while on duty and recommended that he be given full pay while laid off.

On motion it was decided to give Officer MacNamee full pay for the present month.

Chief Clerk took exception to a statement of Dr. J. Manning before the commission meeting to the effect that if a policeman arrested a man he went off duty for the night, and therefore grabbed the first man he could.

"That's not so," said the officer. "No officer leaves his beat unless he is relieved. We try to give some consideration to the officer who has to appear in court in the morning, but frequently they are on duty all night and have to appear at court in the morning."

The board adjourned.

HOW ONE SMALL BOY OBTAINED A HOLIDAY

Curious Crisis in Scholastic Career of a City Lad—Conflict Between Phases of School Law.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 21 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available non-patented land in the Northwest of Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agent for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any time, but certain conditions must be met: mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years, or homestead 160 acres on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted lands for six months of six years from date of homestead entry, including the time required to earn homestead patent, and cultivate 100 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$12.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on 100 acre extra and erect a house worth \$300.00.

THE BIOLOGICAL BOARD OF CANADA.

For the purpose of placing the work of biological research throughout the Dominion on a substantial and businesslike basis the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has introduced a Bill into Parliament to create the Biological Board of Canada. This board is not a new organization. Under the name of the Marine Biological Station of Canada scientific research of a varied and important character has been carried on by its members for many years. The scientific investigators who from season to season have been engaged in this work include many of the ablest Canadian biologists. There has been no lack of men prominent in this field of research willing to give their services to the Dominion without remuneration, but their work has been hampered and hindered by a complicated system of departmental "red tape," which it is the object of the Bill introduced by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to remove.

In the last report, issued in 1907, and consisting of "Further Contributions to Canadian Biology," the names of the board of management of the Marine Biological Station are given as follows: Prof. E. E. Prince, commissioner of fisheries, director; Prof. R. Ramsay Wright, University of Toronto, assistant director; Prof. D. P. Denhalow, McGill University, Montreal, secretary; Prof. L. W. Bailey, University of New Brunswick; Rev. Abbe V. A. Huard of Laval University, Quebec city; Prof. A. P. Knight, Queen's University, Kingston, Ont.; Prof. A. B. Macallum, University of Toronto; Prof. E. W. Macbride, McGill University, Montreal; Dr. A. H. Mackay, of Dalhousie University, Halifax, N. S.

Reading between the lines of the director's preface note it is not difficult to see that these distinguished investigators have been by no means satisfied with the treatment their work received at the hands of the late Government. "The station has been hampered in various ways," writes the director, "by the limited nature of its reference library, but especially by the lack of a suitable fishing launch fitted for investigating deep-sea grounds."

The story is told, and can be vouched for, that on one occasion the board wrote to the Department asking to be supplied with a German treatise on some subject under investigation and received from a junior clerk the somewhat startling reply that he could not understand why they could not be satisfied with books printed in English! This kind of treatment did not tend to further the work of biological research, but the board, being entirely under the control of the Department had no option but to put up with it. The work in consequence was obstructed and delayed.

When Mr. Hazen became Minister of Marine and Fisheries this unsatisfactory condition of affairs was brought to his attention. The Bill which he has now introduced is the result. It provides for the creation of a board to be called "The Biological Board of Canada," to be under the control of the Minister. The board will consist of two members appointed by the Minister, one appointed by each of the universities of Dalhousie, Laval, McGill, New Brunswick, Queen's and Toronto, and one to be appointed by each of such other universities (to be named by the Minister) as may engage in all biological research. It will have charge of all biological stations in Canada, and have the conduct and control of investigations of practical and economic problems connected with marine and fresh water fisheries, flora and fauna, and such other work as may be assigned to it by the Minister. An annual meeting will be held at Ottawa at which officers will be elected.

As in the past no member of the board will receive any payment or emolument for his services, but he will be paid all actual reasonable travelling or other expenses in connection with the work. From the money appropriated by Parliament for the work of the board, which in the present year will amount to \$15,000, or from funds which the board may receive through bequest, donation or the sale of specimens of natural history, the secretary treasurer under direction of the board, shall expend such sums as are necessary for biological research.

These in brief were the contents of the Bill. The board is placed in the happy position of being independent of the whims and fancies of understrappers in the Department, and can pursue its researches to much better advantage. Few people in all probability ever heard of the Biological Board, and fewer still have any idea of the scope of its work. A thorough understanding of the biological and physical features of the coast and waters is essential to the prosperity of the fisheries of Canada. The reports which from time to time the board places on record are of inestimable advantage to fishermen. The effects of dynamite illegally used in fishing operations and the results of sandblast pollution may be mentioned as among the subjects which have in recent years been under long and careful investigation. The last report issued by the board contains thirteen articles dealing with practical and technical matters bearing upon the fisheries of Canada and is a valuable contribution on many of the complex problems they involve.

NOVA SCOTIA COAL.

The total revenue received in the Province of Nova Scotia during the last fiscal year from its mineral resources was \$847,606.11. The principal part of this was made up of royalties from coal mined within the Province which amounted to \$591,556.66. The total amount of coal raised in 1911 was 6,208,444 tons against 5,477,146 tons during the previous year, an increase of 731,298 tons. The production for 1911 was the greatest of any year since 1908, when 6,480,000 tons were raised. The record of sales for 1911, however, are in excess of any previous year, totalling 5,556,464 tons. Of the coal produced in Nova Scotia 2,108,665 tons were consumed within the Province. The largest export was to Quebec, which took 2,667,831 tons, New Brunswick comes next with 541,591 tons, then the United States with 332,201 tons. The other consumers of Nova Scotia coal are Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and St. Pierre.

By far the largest part of the territorial revenue of Nova Scotia is derived from its coal mines, which have been operated successfully for many years and which furnish the Eastern Provinces of Canada with a very considerable percentage of its fuel. The mines gave employment to between 12,000 and 13,000 people and next to agriculture and fishing occupy the most important place in the industrial life of the sister Province.

Just now when the people of New Brunswick are looking forward to the actual development of the coal mines of this Province, the Nova Scotia figures give some idea of the important place mining may take in this Province, when its coal areas are fully developed. The territorial revenue of New Brunswick for 1911 was \$325,489.94, of

which only \$13,000 was obtained from mines and minerals. The royalty paid on coal last year was \$6,486.97 against \$4,634.19 for 1910, which is a large increase for one year. Not all of the coal mined in New Brunswick pays royalty, but only that portion of it which is transported over the Central Railway.

With the construction of the Gibson-Minto line and the full development even of the mines which are already opened in Queens and Sunbury counties, the provincial revenue from coal will be increased four fold. The situation of the mines, practically on the main line of the National Transcontinental, and the facilities that will be afforded for transportation when this great highway is opened for traffic will further add to the output of the Queens county mines.

From what can be learned, it is the intention of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to utilize Queens county coal on the Atlantic Division of the C. P. R., and possibly over the whole line to Montreal. As the Canadian Pacific become the lessee of the Gibson-Minto road on completion by the terms of charter, that great organization will have a direct interest in utilizing the coal mined in this Province wherever it is practicable. The construction and operation of the Valley Railway will furnish another customer for the New Brunswick coal, and at the same time add largely to the revenue of the Province.

The principal object of the government of New Brunswick in granting the charter and guaranteeing the bonds of the Gibson-Minto Railroad was to secure the full development of the Queens and Sunbury coal areas and bring about the establishment of a great industrial centre in the heart of the Province. Such development as is fully expected to follow the completion of the new railway will be of immense benefit to the rural population residing near the mines.

Since the construction of the railway has been practically assured, investigations as to the extent of other mineral resources in that section of the country have been made with the result that the valuable clay deposits which exist in that locality will most likely be developed. Firebrick, sewer pipe, paving brick and other articles of a similar nature could easily be produced from the raw materials to be found handy to the coal mines. It would not be surprising if in the near future the now quiet village of Chipman should become an important industrial centre.

ROOSEVELT'S CAMPAIGN.

Ex-President Roosevelt's candidature is having a somewhat disturbing effect in certain Republican circles across the border. When President Roosevelt completed his term of office and Mr. Taft took charge, there were many people who thought that his retirement was only a temporary one and that sooner or later he would again enter the lists as a candidate for the Presidency. The surmises of these people, which were based on somewhat obscure remarks made by Mr. Roosevelt about the time of his retirement, have proved to be correct. Mr. Roosevelt has announced his willingness to permit his name to come before the Republican Convention when it next assembles a few months from now.

Senator Dickson of Montana, who is booming the candidature of the ex-President, is out with a lengthy statement giving reasons why Mr. Roosevelt should be accepted as the next Republican nominee to the Presidency. The Montana Senator is not at all satisfied with the way President Taft has administered the office and blames him for the present desperate condition of the Republic party in practically all states of the Union. The important part of the proclamation issued by Senator Dickson is as follows:

"The lack of positive leadership during the past three years has turned a Republican majority of sixty in the House of Representatives into an adverse Democratic majority of seventy; has changed a two-thirds vote in the Senate into the bare political control of that body, and temporarily has lost control of a dozen Republican States of the north and west.

"The lack of leadership, of statesmanship, has produced a condition of business bewilderment which has halted the prosperity of the whole country.

"There can be no cure for this industrial stagnation unless we substitute a policy of progressive and constructive legislation which shall meet modern conditions with modern laws. These alarming conditions challenge the sober attention of every Republican who hopes for success in the coming Presidential election.

"These are the things that have caused a nation-wide movement for the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt as the Republican candidate for President.

"The overwhelming demand of the masses of the Republican voters for him to resume the leadership of his party can only result in his nomination by the National Convention. The rank and file of the Republican voters have once before followed him to victory, and are now convinced that his leadership is absolutely necessary to success in November."

Senator Dickson has only scratched the surface of the causes producing the present plight of the Republican party. For many years that party has failed to recognize the rights of the people of a self-governing country and allowed the control of the party machinery, the Legislatures and even the judiciary to pass into the hands of a few great corporations, which made laws and interpreted them in a manner to suit the interests of the corporations, which were often diametrically opposed to those of the people. In the last days of the Roosevelt regime an attempt was made to alter this policy, which resulted in the "trust-busting" campaign of the past three years and has had an important bearing on the present political situation and played an important part in the campaign which gave the Democratic party control at Washington and in many Republican states.

Whether the Democratic party can hold the advantage that it has gained in the election that will take place next November, is a matter of grave doubt among many political readers across the border. The city populations of the United States are generally Democratic but the same cannot be said of the rural districts, which are usually Republican when there is no special bid introduced into the campaign. The populists, the green-backer and the free silver man all belong to the rural communities and sometimes are strong enough to turn an issue. From present indications the next Presidential election will be the most keenly contested of any that has taken place since Lincoln was last elected.

Mr. H. Maxwell Clark, travelling representative of a Western organization known as the Canadian Highway Association, is now in Toronto conferring with the provincial authorities of Ontario regarding the construction of an ocean to ocean highway. The Canadian Highway Association is said to have a membership of three hundred men who are residents of all parts of the Dominion. They propose the construction of a trunk highway road, 4,455 miles in length and extending from Halifax to Prince Rupert. The route of the highway as laid down by Mr. Clark is as follows: Halifax, Moncton branch to St. John; Campbellton, St. Flavie, Quebec, Montreal, with branch to boundary; Ottawa, branch to Prescott; North Bay, branch to Toronto; Cobalt, Port Arthur, Winnipeg; Regina, one branch to British Columbia, through Crow's Nest and main highway, via Sankatoon, Yellow Head, Fort George and Prince Rupert. Mr. Clark wants the Provincial Premiers to meet in the spring and consider his proposals.

GENERAL.

Suffragettes To Jail. London, Mar. 2.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, Mrs. Tukes and Mrs. Marshall, three of the leaders in the suffragette disturbances of last evening, were this morning sentenced to two months in jail, each. Mrs. Pankhurst announced that the suffragettes were prepared to go the limit to gain sympathy and attention for their cause.

Queen Mother Ill. New York, N. Y., Mar. 2.—A London cable today says: It is reported that Queen Alexandra, who is suffering from influenza, has had a sudden relapse, and is in a serious condition. Two physicians and the King were summoned. Shortly afterward, a royal carriage left Buckingham Palace and was driven to Marlborough House, the quarters of which remained open for a period of an hour.

Shipping Notes. C. P. R. steamship Monmouth left Liverpool last Friday for St. John with a general cargo. C. P. R. steamship Montreal, left London last Friday for St. John via Halifax with passengers and cargo. The Marine Department, Ottawa, has sent out notices that the fairway buoy stationed off Partridge Island will be discontinued on April 1; also that a lighted buoy will be placed off Black Point.

Schooner V. S. M. Bentley, of Parrabour, N. S., 364 tons register, built at Port Greenville, N. S., in 1910, has been transferred to Nassau, N. P., having been purchased by Messrs. Brice & Ranger, of that place. Coal steamer Astarte, Captain Whelan, arrived yesterday from Parrabour, N. S., with a cargo of coal for the Dominion Coal Co. Manifest for 29 cars of United States provisions, lumber, lard and mules, were received at the customs house last Saturday for shipment to United Kingdom and South Africa.

Schooner Kineo reports Feb. 18, about 70 miles S.E. by E. from Cape Sable, saw a large dismantled water-logged lumber laden schooner. Saw no signs of life about, but about 2 miles from the derelict saw the house of a large vessel. A wireless message was received at New York by the White Star line from the captain of the British steamer Oceanic, from Southampton Feb. 28 for New York, saying that a propeller blade had been lost at sea, but that the steamer was proceeding without trouble. She expects to arrive about noon Thursday, March 7, and will leave on return voyage on schedule time.

Perry, sailed last Friday morning from Cardiff for Rio Janeiro. Steamer Ida Line, which has been getting general repairs at the New Burrell Johnson Iron Co., will leave tomorrow for Sandy Cove. She is commanded by Capt. B. H. Outhouse. Capt. Rudolph's new schooner at Allendale, N. S., was to have been launched last Wednesday. She is named Ella M. Rudolph and is said to be a beauty and a credit to her builders and all concerned.

The Dieby fishing schooner Albert J. Lutz, Capt. Apt, was in port at Shelburne on Feb. 25, and reported having had two dorics swept overboard by a big sea during last Thursday's gale. The vessel had 35,000 pounds of fish, the result of one day's fishing, and an excellent day's work it was.

The death of Capt. Archibald J. Emenau occurred at Lunenburg on Wednesday, at the early age of 49 years. He is survived by his widow and two children; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Emenau; a brother, Wilfrid, first mate on the schooner St. Olaf, in the south seas; and two sisters, Mrs. J. Anderson and Mrs. J. M. Anderson, both of Lunenburg. For a number of years Capt. Emenau was in the employ of Clarke Bros., Bear River, commanding the barkentine Ethel Clarke. FINANCIAL WORLD
IMPROVEMENT IN NEW YORK TONE OF THE STOCK MARKET

New York, N. Y., Mar. 2.—The stock market manifested a tendency to further improve its position today, most of the leaders rising to a new high level for the present movement. Other high class issues displayed a strong undertone, and the volume of business was relatively large, although early signs of unusual activity were not borne out. Surface conditions pointed to a very considerable elimination of the supposedly large short interest during the last few days, but that element was disposed to renew its operations in mild form today by pressing Reading for sale. That stock, at most alone of the speculative favorites was somewhat inclined to heaviness. There was some activity and resultant strength in the Eries, and the more prominent specialties fully retained their recent advances. Commission houses reported a further awakening of public interest but this is assumed to be of a speculative character rather than in the nature of an investment demand. Impartial observers point out that the many uncertainties and adverse factors now prevailing, such as labor troubles at home and abroad, politics and unsatisfactory industrial conditions will have to be adjusted before anything approaching a genuine demand for securities can make itself felt. On one important subject, namely, general trade, there is more unanimity of opinion than has been shown for some time. It is conceded that decided improvement, and the approach of spring is naturally expected to give added stimulus. The change for the better is most pronounced in the larger distributing centres, less optimism being shown locally and in New England settlement of the troubles at the textile centres will help in great measure to restore confidence, and negotiations now under way are expected to meet with early success. There was some selling here for foreign account, and cables from London reported serious interruption to traffic in the provinces by reason of the coal strike. Firmness was reflected in the American department where another rise in rate interest was announced. It is evident that Paris is increasing its interest in copper shares. Bonds were again steady, the only special feature being a one point gain in the Erie general fours. Total sales par value \$1,084,000. 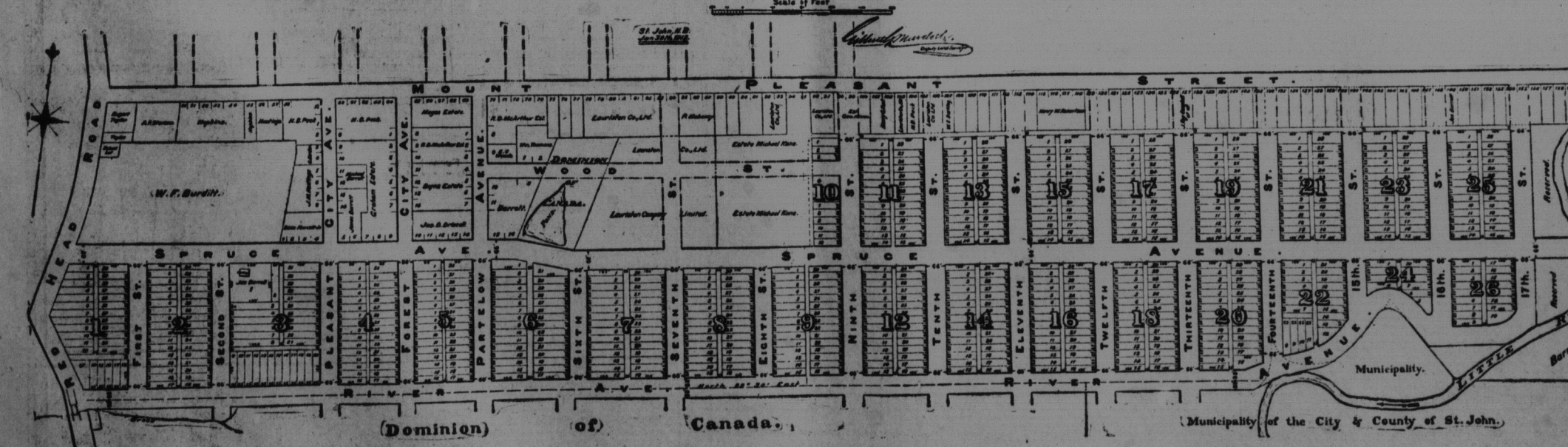

ON WELL, AFTER ALL PERHAPS THEY AREN'T

Anyway, the Socialists Say They are Not Ragamuffins and they Have Some Prominent Adherents.

Are the Socialists ragamuffins? was the theme of A. Taylor's discourse before a large meeting in the socialist hall last evening. "The dictionary," said the orator, "defines ragamuffin as a low fellow. The Countess of Warwick, descendant of the King Makers, is a socialist, and she is described as the best dressed and most intelligent woman in England. Would any city father call the countess a low fellow, a ragamuffin? Chief Clark says the socialists are opposed to all authority. The socialists respect all authority that is established for the good of the people, but they resent arbitrary exercise of authority, as any other self-respecting citizen does.

"The saint whom this city is named after, was at loggerheads with the public authority of his day, and was frequently thrown into prison," he added. "The socialists showed more respect to authority in this city than St. John showed to the authorities in Jerusalem. He never asked permission to speak in the streets, while the socialists are in hand to the police, the mayor and the board of safety asking that they be accorded a right enjoyed in most places under the British flag."

A. W. Robb Gave Good Advice to Boys Before the Members of the Every Day Club Last Evening.

A. W. Robb, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., was the speaker at the usual Sunday evening lecture in the Every Day Club last evening. REAL ESTATE BOOM HITS THE COUNCIL

Unusually Large Volume of Business for Monthly Meeting this Afternoon—Many Applications for City Lands.

The city council will have an unusually large volume of business before it at its monthly meeting today. The boom in real estate has caused a great demand for city lands and if the real estate agencies have as many applications to purchase land as the city has received recently, they must be doing a very large business. There seems to be a conflict of opinion in the council as to whether it is good policy to sell the city's lands at this juncture, and as no principle governing the dealing with applications has been worked out, much time will probably be occupied in disposing with them. A large number of bills and by-laws will have to be read and adopted unless they are referred to a special meeting.

C. R. tracks near the Marsh bridge by the St. John street railway. Copies of the resolution of the joint committee of the resolution of the joint committee of the city council and St. John board of trade, requesting the federal government to take steps to extend the Negro Head breakwater to Partridge Island.

Petition of H. S. Ritchie and others, praying that Ritchie and Brock street (so called) may be incorporated as public highways.

COMPANY WILL BUY GREENHEAD PROPERTY Parties Holding Option on Land for Site for Cement Plant Now Wishes to Buy It.

It was stated at City Hall on Saturday that the parties who took out an option on the Greenhead property where it is proposed to establish a big cement plant, have asked for a deed of the property, as they were ready to pay over the price agreed on. The option was taken by R. Max McCarty, who, it was understood, was acting for an English company. At the time of taking the option Mr. McCarty deposited \$1,200 with the city, on the understanding that the option money would become the property of the city in any case, and that the company would have to pay over an additional \$25,000 to complete the purchase, making the price \$26,200.

When asked about the matter yesterday Mr. McCarty said he had nothing to say at the present time. There seems to be no doubt but that the company which is taking over the Greenhead property will start development work before long. That operation will be conducted on an extensive scale seems to be indicated by the fact R. Max McCarty has made application to purchase 40 lots along the line of the C. P. R. in Lancaster, which it is understood is wanted by the same company which has acquired the Greenhead property.
