

UNITED STATES SPEAKS TO MEXICO IN TERMS THAT CANNOT SAFELY BE DISREGARDED

THAW'S LAWYERS AGAIN WIN OVER N. Y. STATE

Matteawan Fugitive Temporarily Immune from Immigration Officials.

RIOUS SCENES IN SHERBROOKE COURT.

Three Points Argued Yesterday and Decided in Favor of Prison—Jerome Leaves For Quebec to Consult Attorney General of Province.

Sherbrooke, Aug. 27.—Harry K. Thaw, won three victories from the New York State authorities today and was locked tonight in the Sherbrooke jail, immune from the time being from the Dominion immigration authorities, after having received from the townspeople of Sherbrooke a wonderful ovation.

So riotous was the scene in the superior court when, at the morning session, Mr. Justice Globensky refused to allow counsel representing New York State to be present for the proceedings, that the court subsequently warned spectators that a repetition of such scenes would mean jail sentences for the demonstrators.

Speaking from the bench at the afternoon session he said that never in his experience as a member of the bar and of the bench had he been a witness to such a disgraceful scene. It was carried out in the presence of court attendants and four armed Dominion police, who stood silent while emotional women rushed toward Standard White's slyer crying: "three cheers for Thaw, we will give you Justice, Harry."

Tonight with Thaw's term of confinement indeterminate, and the key to the riddle unfound, there was a general exodus of those who rushed hither after the fugitive's sensational escape from Matteawan eleven days ago.

William Travers Jerome, former prosecutor of Thaw and specialist on matters appertaining to his life, left for Quebec tonight, accompanied by Franklin Kennedy, deputy attorney-general of New York.

Either tonight or tomorrow will depart District Attorney E. A. Conger, of Duchess county, Sheriff Frederick Hornbeck, of the county, Supt. Klein, of Matteawan, John Black, former district attorney of Duchess county, and with him sheriffs and deputy sheriffs of Vermont and New Hampshire, who were ready to strangle Thaw in the event of his deportation.

URGES MORE KNOWLEDGE AS MEANS OF CLEANSING WORLD

Scientists and Educators in Attendance at International Congress Depreciate Policy of Keeping Silent on Matters of Sex-hygiene.

Buffalo, Aug. 27.—Scientists and educators of world-wide fame at the Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene, in a special session today, agreed with practical unanimity that the time had come when the attitude of the world's educational institutions toward sex hygiene should be re-estimated. They saw in the silence of the past on the subject, a growing and real menace to the future of the race that must be combated by a system of education without exaggeration or morbid suggestion. Public opinion, they maintained, has already reached the point where this revolution is demanded.

Dr. Charles W. Elliot, president of the congress; the Rev. Richard J. Tierney, S. J., of Woodstock College, Maryland; Dr. Hugh Abbott, Miss Laura B. Barrett, of New York, and other prominent delegates spoke on the subject of a symposium attended by the entire congress and a large number of citizens at Elmwood Music Hall this afternoon. Dr. Elliot presided.

"A remarkable change in public opinion has taken place in regard to sex hygiene," Dr. Elliot said, "using the term in its broadest sense. The policy of silence was almost universal. Medical discoveries have contributed to the shift in public opinion, which also has been moved by the many signs of physical deterioration consequent on the rush to city life. The most important question is: "What force can now be put in play against the formidable evils which gravely threaten the very life of the race? No one force or agency can be completely relied upon."

"Public progress in regard to sex hygiene and eugenics is to be secured chiefly through educational methods. The work must be done delicately and without interference with parental rights or religious conviction."

Rev. Richard Tierney said his convictions were not favorable to the movement in all its details; neither were they adverse. "Eliminate the details of sex hygiene; train character; teach that purity is noble and possible; that vice is vile and carries its own punishment; that marriage is inviolable; that the family is sacred. Knowledge is not moral power. Christ, not hygiene, will cleanse the world," was his advice.

In an address before another section of the congress, Dr. Edward C. Spitzka, of New York, declared that New York City, in its classification and care of defective and abnormal children stands on no higher level than a country village.

PRESIDENT WILSON WARNS ALL AMERICANS TO LEAVE MEXICO

United States Takes Definite Stand and Will Not Recede. STRENGTHEN FLEET IN MEXICAN WATERS. State that Outrages to U. S. Citizens Will be Avenged—Huerta Must Resign from Power and Other Conditions Must be Accepted.

Washington, August 27.—President Wilson went to congress today and revealed how the Huerta provisional government in Mexico had rejected the friendship of the United States and its effort to aid in the establishment of peace and a government which could be recognized by this nation, and which would be obeyed and respected by Mexico's own people.

After picturing the possibilities for Mexico if she maintained her present position, "isolated and without friends who can effectively aid her," the President announced the necessity of a firm neutral stand by the United States government, a policy of "hands off" to avoid the situation in which she was placed.

He also voiced an urgent appeal for all Americans to leave Mexico and for the United States to aid them in every possible way, but in emphatic language served notice upon those who assume to exercise authority in the Mexican territory, that they would be held to a definite reckoning for losses and suffering of American citizens.

CLOSING LETTER FROM MONTREAL EXCHANGE

(F. B. McCURDY & CO.) Montreal, Aug. 27.—Trading on the local stock exchange reached moderate volume this morning and was also fairly active in the afternoon. Prices for the most part showed very little change. The bulk of stocks were practically unchanged, but Spanish River and MacDonald were of special interest. MacDonald was the firm as well as the active feature. In the forenoon the sales reached about 650 shares and the price from 25 at the opening advanced to 27 1/2 at the close of the forenoon, the final sale taking place at somewhat of a decline. The stock in the afternoon was not quite so firm and sales fell down to 25 3/4. Spanish River, after opening at 49, fell off to 47 1/2, but recovered in the afternoon to 48. The market is very erratic on these two stocks and no wonder. The decline has now lasted quite a long time and it would seem that some sort of explanation should be forthcoming from some quarter. Of course the worst appears to be over, but shareholders are feeling very dissatisfied over the whole performance. No one is sure what may be taking place. As against the statement that \$1,750,000 has already been paid Mr. MacDonald, leaving a comparatively small balance at easy terms to be met is the statement that this balance may be the cause of trouble. This would seem to be an unlikely outcome inasmuch as with the bulk of the money paid over it would be inappropriate that trouble should arise over a small balance. However, the street does not know what to think and this leaves the market an easy prey to all sorts of influences. It is a certainty that a considerable short interest has been outstanding in both stocks. Possibly it was the selling by shorts which induced the present decline. It is known, of course, that there was considerable enforced selling, but even this may have resulted from the fact that the market was being pounded down day after day, thus necessitating the posting of additional margins. It would seem that a considerable number of the shareholders in both stocks are still holders of the full amount they had at the beginning of the decline. This is somewhat surprising when it is remembered the distance the stocks have fallen and the utter absence of information on the cause of the decline. Ottawa Power was one of the stocks to show strength again today. This is one of the most satisfactory stocks on the whole list. Since the had break some weeks ago, the stock has constantly advanced. Today's sales took place in the forenoon at 115 1/2 and a buyer of a small lot in the afternoon had to pay 116 1/2. It is still ten points below the high price of this year and from the manner in which shareholders are holding on, it looks as though this ten would be made up before much longer. Canadian Cottons Preferred also showed renewed strength, selling at 77.

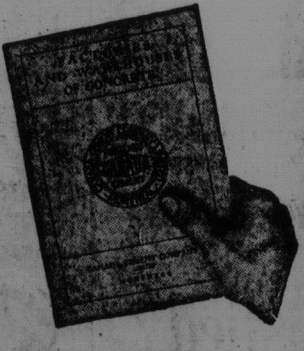

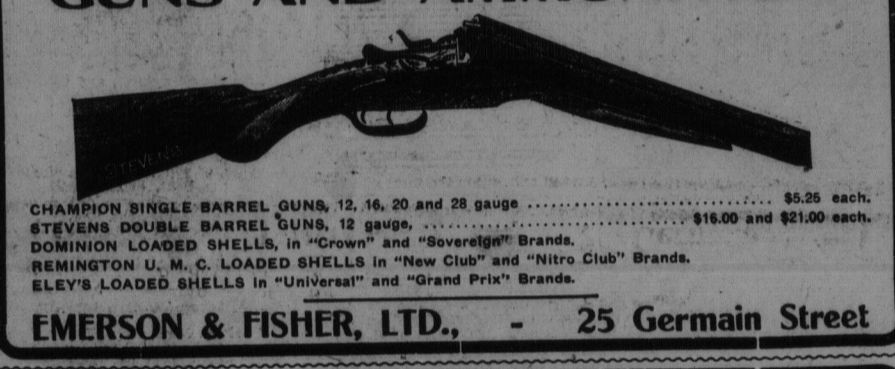
