One thing which this recruiting campaign has accomplished has been to set the young men of the city thinking and the results, although not as good as they should be, have been most encouraging to the citi-

Sergeant Knight, as the chief speaker of the evening, was repeatedly cheered and there is no doubt that he has won a place in the hearts of the citizens of St. John. In his pointed catchy style of direct speaking he appealed to the man himself and his words last evening brought forth excellent results. Other speakers, including Rev. W. G. Lane, honorary major in the 28th Dragoons, who wore the King's uniform in South Africa, were equally good. C. B. Allan, secretary of the St. John branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, gave some very interesting information concerning what the fighting man's family would receive in the event of his enlisting. Col. B. R. Armstrong gave a full explanation regarding the pay of the soldiers, not only what they received for daily employment but also in the way indemnities such as wounded or total disability. Rev. W. G. Lane, the first speaker, said: "Why do we want you? Now, young men, I believe everyone has a warm spot which, if touched, will make him respond. We want you because you are a Canadian. An official statement declares that the gun fire of the French has been effective, notably in Belgium, near Het Sas and Steenstraete. This is the district in which the Germans gained ground several months ago by the use of asphyxiating gases.



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



New York, Sept. 8.—The rather vio-New York, Sept. 8—Apathy, resulting mainly from lack of patronage, was again the most pronounced feature of today's market session. Important stocks, that is to say, investment issues, moved irregularly on light offerings, few fluctuating more than a point, while specialties, chiefly war shares, were moved back and forth as so many pawns in the speculative game.

There were several exceptions to this rule, notably Bethlehem Steel and Crucible Steel, these ascending to their highest quotations since the shiking of the Arabic became a market factor. Bethlehem Steels best price was 302, a gain of twelve points, and Crucible Steel at \$9.38 showed a maximum advance of five.

Crucible led all the industrials in activity except United States Steel. Its rising being accompanied by a variant of the old rumor of additional war contracts and buying by banking interests for control. United States Steel was under mild pressure until the final hour, when it advanced to 751-8, a gain of three-quarters on heavy buying which ranged from 1,000 to over 3,000 shares in individual lots.
