# SIR EDWARD CARSON TELLS OF U-BOATS

Total of 134 Vessels With 304,000 Tons Sunk in First Eighteen Days of February: 91 With 198,-000 in Same Time Last Month, and 118 With 223,000 Tons in December.

Forty Encounters Between Armed Vessels and Submarines
Occurred in First 18 Days of this Month, Indicating Quite a Number of U-Boats were Destroyed or Cap-

London, Feb. 21.-in a speech in the House of Commons, Sir Ed ward Carson, First Lord of the Admiralty, said the submarine menace recently had grown until its extent had become grave and serious.

The menace had not yet been solved, but measures which had been adopted, he said, would mitigate it by degrees. Sir Edward informed the House that an anti-submarine department had been established in the admiralty, composed of the most experienced and capable men in the navy. The number of armed merchant ships had been increased 47.5 per cent. in the last two months.

The House, said Sir Edward, would expect him to deal mainly with the growth of the submarine menace and he would do so by surveying

Citing forty encounters of British ships with German submarines in the last 18 days, he gave interesting details. While admitting that in some bases the evidence of actual sinking was vague and doubtful, nevertheless he considered that a great achievement. He said that a few days ago British destroyers attacked an enemy cubmarine, which was hit, the captain being killed. The submarine dived, hut was so injured it was obliged to rise again and was captured, and its crew taken prisoner. Another submarine was sunk by a transport. In still another instance two patrol boats reported the sinking of two enemy submarines, without themselves suffering any casualty. A full report appeared to establish that one of these had been actually sunk, but there was doubt about the second.





New York, Feb. 21.—Declines outnumbered advances in today's professional market, which most often reflected the increasing perplexities arising from international conditions and the impending holiday. Business during the forenoon was fairly large and broad, but the balance of the session was marked by a steady dimunition of operations.

Shippings were again materially effected by the further delay respecting their status, Mercantile Marines losing 1½ to 3 points, with over four for Atlantic, Gulf and West Indies.

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


