Province, in Town and Country, public attention was largely drawn to the Temperance Reform or Blue-ribbon Clubs, and the workers in our Divisions were temporarily willing to lay aside the distinctive features of our old Order and labor for the advancement of Temperance under any name that promised good results.

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

Officers and Representatives,—

Another year has rolled around, and we meet again in Annual Session. Standing, as we do, between the labours and conflicts of the past, and the enterprises and anxieties of the future, it becomes us devoutly to recognize the Divine Hand in guiding us hitherto, and earnestly and hopefully to consecrate ourselves anew to the high purpose for which we are associated.

This Annual Session has been postponed to the present by the Grand Division Executive, in order to afford to the members of this Grand Body an opportunity of joining the citizens of Halifax in their public reception of the Queen's Representative, the Governor-General of this Dominion, and the Royal Princess, his lady—a motive which, I have no doubt, this Grand Division will approve. The great principles of our Order are extracted from the word of God; and from the same source we draw the inspiration of christian patriotism, and learn to "render unto Cæsar the things which are Cæsar's"; and though our Order knows no nation or forms of civil government, or maxims of civil administration; yet I am persuaded that there is not a member of it on this wide continent who does not sympathize with us in our loyal affection and share our veneration for the illustrious Lady who wears the Crown of England; nor is there a member of our Order in this Dominion who does not welcome to his heart, and to a home in this country, a Princess of His Royal blood.

By the advice of the G. D. Executive, I prepared an address to the Governor General, on behalf of the Grand Division, and accompanied by brethren W. C. Silver and Thomas W. Chesley, presented the subjoined address to His Excellency and received his Excellency's reply:—

ADDRESS OF SONS OF TEMPERANCE.

"To his Excellency John, Marquis of Lorne, Governor-General of Canada, &c., &c., &c.

"*May it Please your Excellency,*—

"We the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of the Province of Nova Scotia, now in thirty-first annual session convened, beg to approach Your Excellency with sentiments of the most ardent and devoted loyalty to the person and Government of Her Majesty the Queen of this Realm, whom Your Excellency has the distinguished honor to represent in this Dominion.

"The members of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, numbering some 10,000 in the Province of Nova Scotia, and 150,000 in various parts of the world, are pledged to abstain from the use of all intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and to use every legitimate means to promote their disuse among others, under the persuasion that total abstinence is most conducive to personal well-being, to social and domestic happiness, and to national prosperity.

"On behalf of the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia we hereby offer to your Excellency, and to Her Royal Highness the Princess, our sincere congratulations on your safe arrival on the shores of this Province, and on the auspicious circumstances under which your Excellency enters on the administration of the Government of the Dominion.

Most earnestly do we pray that the blessing of Heaven may rest on Your Excellency and on Her Royal Highness; and that Your Excellency's occupancy of the Vice-Royal throne may be rendered illustrious by the advancement of all classes of Her Majesty's subjects, not only in material prosperity, but also in all those virtues which adorn humanity.

I have also to thank Bro. Thos. Hutchings, P. G. W. P., Special Deputy, for a copious and detailed report of the state of the Divisions visited by him in Halifax and Hants Counties. Bro. Hutchings has held *thirty* public meetings, visited *twenty-two* Divisions, resuscitated *three* and organized *two* new Divisions.

From the information with which I have been furnished, I am able to give the following brief and general outline of the state of the Order in the respective Counties, viz:—

ANNAPOLIS.—No Report.

ANTIGONISH.—The Order in this County is languishing through the indifference of its members. The temperance sentiment of the County is sound and progressive, but the Divisions are cold and torpid.

CAPE BRETON.—Political agitation has divided the interest; nevertheless, the Divisions meet regularly and will regain their strength and influence, as things settle down to their normal state.

COLCHESTER.—Rival organizations are sharing the honors of the field, but notwithstanding the energy of the competition, the Order is, upon the whole, holding its own.

CUMBERLAND.—The Divisions are well attended and prospering. "White Ross," No. 142, after a slumber of eight years, has started into life and blossomed again. It was re-organized on the 15th inst., by Deputy B. N. Fullerton, with thirty-three members.

DIGBY.—No Report from Digby proper. In the Westport District, the Divisions are doing a noble work, and are second to none in the jurisdiction for activity and enthusiasm. The cause of temperance is rapidly progressing throughout the County. Every English-speaking village has its temperance organization, and in the Township of Clare the Acadian French are organizing.

GUYSDOWN.—No Report.

HALIFAX.—All the Divisions in this County are in a satisfactory condition, except Nos. 171, 224, 303, and 373. "Alder Bank," No. 303, located at Little River, was resuscitated on the 11th inst., by Deputy Hutchings, and resumed operations with sixteen members.

HANTS.—All the Divisions in the Eastern part of this noble County are in good order and doing a great and good work. "Urbana," No. 400, and "Woodville," No. 418, have been re-organized by Deputy Hutchings, and No. 6.

two new Divisions have been organized, viz.:—"Lorne," located at Maitland, with thirty-three members; and "Memorial," located at Cheverie, with twenty-eight members. The Divisions in West Hants are supposed to be working, though some of them are crippled by rival societies.

KINGS.—No Report.

LUNENBURG.—A sad and doleful sound comes from this County. "Ches-ter" has suspended, her two sisters "sleep fast in silence," and Brother Skinner "sits upon an ancient sigh, whose memory of sound is long since gone!" But despair "takes heart when there is no hope to speed." Futurity

"May bear within its folds some hidden spring
From which will issue blessed streams."

PICTOU.—No Report.

QUEBENS.—The Divisions in this County are holding their own. "Temperance Banner," a new Division, located at Port Mouton, has been organized by Deputy Gates, with twenty-six charter members, and a good prospect offers for the formation of still another Division in this County.

SHELBURNE.—The Report from this County is satisfactory, and all the Divisions are believed to be in working order.

YARMOOUTH.—So far as heard from the work of the Divisions is above the average. An application for a Charter, signed by *twenty-nine* applicants, had been forwarded, and arrangements were made to organize a new Division at Overton, where the prospects were promising.

In August last the temperance Bodies of this County celebrated the Jubilee of the formation of the first Temperance Society in the Province, which was organized at Beaver River fifty years ago. Six of the Divisions in the County took part in the demonstrations, and your G. W. P. attended as the head of the Order. The proceedings extended over a period of two days, awakened the deepest interest among all classes of the community, and formed one of the most magnificent celebrations ever witnessed in the country, and one which will leave its mark in the County throughout coming years.

From this brief sketch of the state of the Order in the Jurisdiction it will appear that while there exists no ground for discouragement, and while it is probable that adverse influences which have militated against our progress have not been less felt by other organizations, yet the vigour of the competition with which we have to contend, and the gradual narrowing of the sphere of our operations imperatively demand the putting forth of greater activity to vindicate our claims to be regarded as the most effective temperance organization in existence.

THE REFORM MOVEMENT,

which has absorbed a number of our Divisions, has not been fully understood by the members of our Order. Dazzled by the splendor of its march they everywhere threw themselves into the front of the movement, and in many cases abandoned their Divisions to helpless decrepitude, or to a death of desertion. Whereas, did they fully apprehend the true mission of that movement—that it is simply *initiatory* and *preparatory*, and requires the support of the older organizations to give stability and perpetuity to its work, they would stand by the old ship while there was a plank to stand upon, or a peg to nail to the mast!

PROHIBITION,

pure and simple, the final purpose of all our efforts, is day after day adding to the number of its converts. The accession to the ranks of the temperance army of such men as Sir A. T. Galt and the Hon. Dr. Tupper, Minister of Public Works, who will henceforth stand side by side with the Hon. S. L. Tilley and others in the "great conflict," and by the influence of their personal character and high position bring nearer the hour of final triumph, is cause for mutual congratulation. The city of Fredericton, N. B., has done credit to itself by adopting the "Canada Temperance Act," by a vote of *two to one*. The Counties of Albert and Westmoreland are also preparing to submit the Act to the vote of the people, with every prospect of success. The County of Digby and the Town of Truro in this Province in like manner propose taking steps in this direction; and it is worthy of consideration whether this Grand Body should not express its sentiments more unequivocally than it has yet done as to the wisdom of such a procedure. The Conference of Temperance workers announced to be held in this Hall on Thursday next, will, no doubt, also give attention to this point, together with other matters touching the general question.

The Reports of the "Agency" and the "Alliance Journal" committees will be laid before you, and the claims of

THE AGENCY FUND AND THE ORGAN

will demand serious deliberation, as vitally connected with the well being and prosperity of our Order. I have received a communication from Prof. John Allison, formerly of this Province, but more recently of Wisconsin, containing an offer to edit and publish the "Alliance Journal," at his own risk, under certain conditions, which will also be laid before you, and is commended to your consideration.

In closing this Report I beg to express my gratitude to the officers and members of the Grand Division for the generous indulgence afforded to me during my extended term of office, the duties of which have been, I fear, but imperfectly discharged by reason of the manifold claims of my profession. My sincere thanks are due, for many acts of official and fraternal courtesy, to Grand Scribe Parsons, whose devotion to the duties of his office has been a homily, and whose presence at our Quarterly Sessions has been a sunbeam and a benediction. I am deeply grateful to the brethren of the Order for the many words of cheer and encouragement which they have spoken, and respectfully bespeak for my successor in office the same fraternal kindness which has made my duties both easy and pleasant. And may the "Great Patriarch above" guide the deliberations of this Session, and conduct them to such issues as will promote His glory, and advance the interests of our noble Order.

The report of the standing Committee of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL for the year was read by the G. S., and referred to the Committee on the State of the Order :

ALLIANCE JOURNAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee report that the paper has been regularly furnished by Messrs. Sanction & Piper to date, and that intercourse with them has been very satisfactory. The workmanship and accuracy have also been about all that could be expected or desired.

Your Committee sent abroad one thousand circulars in September, requesting answers to lay before the Grand Division relative to support for the next year. To these favorable replies have been received, and unfavorable. The measure of support promised is on the whole much less than was named for this year. Your Committee acknowledge with regret that members of our own and other temperance organizations, as well as the general public, do

not appear to consider a weekly temperance paper a necessity, at this time; in which opinion your Committee do not concur.

The paying subscribers for this year gave about \$700, and the amount derivable from advertizements is about \$200; which, if the issue of a thousand copies weekly were continued, would cause an expenditure of about \$800 in 1879 from funds of the Grand Division, allowing that the present list holds good.

The claim of the printer to the close of the present year will be about \$500, for which the Grand Division will have to provide; and there is yet due Mr. Macuab from 1877 \$73.60. The amount to be collected for advertizing accounts in January will enable the Agent to pay other expenses, and have about \$100 over. There is yet owing by the British Templars \$64.00 and by the I. O. G. Templars, \$47.55, which debts were occasioned by their not paying their portion of loss when they withdrew from partnership in the paper.

The amount drawn from Grand Treasurer since last Annual Session by your Committee is \$1371.50; of which \$1020.78 has been paid Mr. Macnab for work performed before this Committee had charge. \$30 has also been paid him received from British Templars. The present year has been more favorable for revenue than its predecessors; but the prospects and offers for support for 1879 are not as promising as they should be.

REPORT OF AGENCY COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have pleasure in reporting that, as far as their work has extended, it has proved very beneficial to our cause, and more particularly to our own organization. Without it, limited though it has been, the number of subordinate Divisions in the jurisdiction would be much less than it is to-day, and very many members now in them would have been lost as to influence for our principles, and some might have been lost as men. The continuous and ardent zeal of our Worthy Brother Hutchings your Committee would again speak of with commendation.

The particulars hereunto appended of our Brother's last mission, show a balance of \$60.76 due by the Committee for services rendered. Your Committee, fully alive to the importance of their work, have endeavored to obtain funds; and Brothers Chase and Hutchings collected in the City of Halifax eighty-six dollars, part of which remains in the hands of the Grand Treasurer. The Grand Division has never shown any indifference to the

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calls of the Agency Committee; and will not at this time, it is presumed, allow our faithful laborer to remain long unpaid.

In all work of moral reform those for whom it is undertaken do not most appreciate it; and the active promoters usually have to provide means for its continuance. The Chiefs of our order, assembled in Grand Division, have always considered themselves fathers of the people; and while urging others to do for themselves and for all mankind, as is their duty, they have never neglected missionary work. This, however, should not be relied on; and it is to be hoped that county organizations where existing, and members of our order generally, will in their several localities give more aid in the next year than they have in time past. Those who have received many helps, ought in their turn to become contributors for the benefit of others.

A report from the special Committee appointed at the last Quarterly Session on the "Formation of County Branches of the Dominion Alliance," was read by the G. S., and after considerable discussion a motion to lay it on the table for further and future deliberation was carried by a majority vote.

The subjoined report from Maxwell Murdock, a member of this Grand Body, but at present residing in Montreal, and a delegate to convey fraternal greetings to the Grand Division of Quebec, was presented and ordered to be published in the minutes:—

As your representative appointed to attend the meetings of the Grand Division of the Province of Quebec to convey fraternal greetings, I beg leave to report briefly:—

I had the privilege of attending one Session of the G. D. of Quebec, which met on the 21st and 22nd of January of this year. The number of members in attendance was not large, it being the semi-annual session. Their officers' report showed the order to be in fair condition throughout the jurisdiction; the number of Divisions being fifty-six (56) with a membership of about two thousand three hundred (2300).

The subject of the best means of extending the order received considerable attention, an organizing agent has been laboring for some time with that object, and met with some success. Bro. R. M. Barratt is that worthy individual. He will be remembered favorably by a great number of temperance people in Nova Scotia as the Agent of the Grand Division. My first temperance expedition was in company with Bro. Barratt and a number of others at the organization of Fraser Division in Pictou County. The G. D. of Quebec have felt the force of the commercial depression, and as one result have been obliged to discontinue the service of their Agent.

I had much pleasure in conveying, as instructed, the fraternal greetings of the G. D. of Nova Scotia, and in doing so took the opportunity of informing them of the position of our branch of the order. The greetings were kindly reciprocated by expression of sentiments of thanks and good feeling by many of the members. By resolution I was instructed to convey back to the Nova Scotia brethren their warmest thanks—which I now take the liberty of doing in this report, I know I utter the sentiments of every member when I convey to you their hearty "God speed," and I know you will join them in aspiring to the proud position of having upon the Statute book of this Dominion an effectually carried out prohibitory law. Such appears to be their determination.

During the year I visited frequently several of the subordinate Divisions in this city, and found a number of active and determined members fighting well for the order; but the order does not hold the position it should in the

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metropolitan city of Canada. A good deal of the temperance work is done by Church societies.



A memorial from the Grand Section of Cadets of Temperance was presented and referred to the Committee on Communications :

GRAND SECTION C. OF T., HALIFAX, N. S.,
Nov. 27th, 1878. }

To the Grand Worthy Patriarch, Officers and Representatives of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance in Annual Session assembled :

WORTHY BROTHERS,—At the Annual Session of the Grand Section Cadets of Temperance of the Province of Nova Scotia held in this city in August last, the undersigned, representing the Grand Section, were appointed to draft a memorial to the Grand Division, and have the same presented at this Annual Session.

Having found for some years past that the admission of youths to the Order of the Sons of Temperance at 14 years of age has crippled us in our efforts to extend the Order of Cadets in our Province, and, believing that youths at this age are more at home in organizations of this kind, we would most respectfully solicit the Grand Division to use their influence with the "National Division" to change the rule, and limit the age to 16 years instead of 14 as at present.

In presenting this important subject for your consideration, we feel sure that anything you can do to aid us in advancing the interests of the Order of Cadets of Temperance will be done by you to the utmost of your power.

We therefore ask you to give this matter your serious consideration, to the end that this useful branch of the Temperance Army may prosper throughout the land.

P., Longley, seconded by R. J. Wilson, and resolved, "That the report of the Committee on County Auxiliaries of the Dominion Alliance be taken from the table for discussion." Its adoption was moved and seconded: spoken to by Representatives R. Thompson; Dr. McRobert; T. Hutchings; Dr. Hamilton; J. Grierson; A. Longley; B. Corning. P. Monaghan, P. G. Scribe, pre-

sented an amendment to part of the last section of the report, seconded by D. B. Newcomb, which was carried; and the report as amended was then adopted as follows:

To the Grand Division S. of T., N. S.

The special committee appointed at the last quarterly Session of G. D., to consider the propriety of organizing County Branches of the Dominion Alliance, beg leave to report as follows:

I.—That in the opinion of your committee the object aimed at by the Alliance, cannot be attained without the aid of an organization in each County in which all friends of Temperance and Prohibition can unite.—The necessity of such an institution will appear greater when we take into consideration the fact that while nearly all Temperance workers entertain one opinion in regard to Prohibition, they are so divided into different societies, each having their own special work to attend to, that situated as they now are, it is quite impossible for them to co-operate to advantage, and further, that there are many friendly to the Prohibition movement, who are not members of any existing Temperance society or even total abstainers.

II.—That your committee believe that no organization can be better adapted to the work of centralization of public opinion on the question of Prohibition throughout any Electoral District than an auxiliary of the Dominion Alliance, as its principles are endorsed by the most advanced Prohibitionists, not only of this Dominion but of Great Britain.

III.—We are further convinced that if such an auxiliary were formed in each County, with an annual subscription to membership of, say fifty cents (50c.); the fees thus collected by an energetic agent would be sufficient to make the work self-sustaining.

IV.—In conclusion your committee would say that it seems evident to them from the above considerations and others that little further advance need be expected in the direction of Prohibition, until the entire strength of those favourable to the cause be combined in one organization having for its direct object the total suppression of the Liquor traffic. That while this Grand Division, as a body, cannot undertake the duty of forming County or other auxiliaries to the Dominion Temperance Alliance, it would express approval of the principles of that organization which are recommended to the serious consideration of the members of the Order and others who are desirous of suppressing the evils of intemperance.

No. 6.

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REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Members of Grand Division:

This thirty-first Annual Session finds our noble old order holding its own throughout this jurisdiction.

The Reform Club movement swept over our Province and has accomplished incalculable good; and the members of our order proved their catholicity by working most successfully in these later organizations. Now that the enthusiasm has settled down into quiet hard work, our divisions are receiving reflex benefit, and promise during the coming winter to come fully up to the efficiency and numerical strength of three years ago.

Our order has been brought prominently into public notice—home and foreign—from the activity displayed in Halifax, by the City Divisions and the Grand Division, in the erection of one of the finest arches in the city, commemorative of the visit of our new Governor-General and his royal wife. The temperance cause in America and in the Old World will be benefited and brought into greater prominence by this activity of their brethren in Nova Scotia.

The Address to our Governor General and his cordial reply will be received with delight by our entire membership; and these records will be perused in the years to come with especial interest.

When it was announced that the Vice-regal party was to land at Halifax about the 24th of November and would spend two days in the city, at which time the citizens, societies and Governments of the day would pay especial honor to the representative of our noble Queen, and her son and daughter, it was thought by the Grand Officers and leading members of the order most desirable to change the date of our Annual Session from the 12th Nov. to the 20th, so that our members could have a double privilege by the one visit. The change was made and duly announced in the ALLIANCE JOURNAL and through the general press; and our present large assembly may be taken as general approval of this course.

Our meeting in Star Hall, in accordance with a vote of the Grand Division at the Session in April last, brings us to-day as guests of one of the youngest Divisions in the city; but one that is enthusiastic in temperance work and which has wrought great good in this part of the city. This fine hall is in part a result of the organization of Northern Star Division.

The Divisions formed, during the year, eleven in number, are a credit in every way to our order. They have been organized at a time when attention was called to other departments of our work, when other names than the "Sons" were most frequently before the public. It is an encouraging fact that six of those divisions have been formed during the past three months. And it is confidently expected that our members roused to activity will, during the ensuing winter, plant many new societies in localities where by right of discovery and conquest our old order possesses the highest claims.

For the quarter ended 30th September, returns have been received from 112 Subordinate Divisions with a membership of 6850; there are known to be some 40 Divisions more that are working sluggishly with an estimated membership of 2200 = 9050; there are also some 20 Divisions on our books which for some months past have not been active, with an estimated membership, when working, of 1000; giving 172 Divisions with a total membership of 10050. How soon these dormant Divisions will spring into active

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life it is impossible to say. Scarcely a month passes without one or more of such societies coming again to the front.

The receipts for the year, in the face of hard times and attention given to other branches of the work, are satisfactory. They are repeated here from the financial statement:

The expenditure during the year has been large for the ALLIANCE JOURNAL, but quite economical in other departments. The stock has been well kept up. Tracts have been furnished to our Agent, Bro. Hutchings, who has distributed them through many districts, thus sowing seed that must bring forth good fruit in the days to come.

The Grand Treasurer reports \$258.73 in his hands, but the per capita tax (\$186.36) is over due the National Division and must be at once paid. In addition quite a large sum is due on account of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL. Economy must be practiced to enable us to meet these obligations; but our old order is quite equal to all demands; and it is great satisfaction to know that our means are employed for the solid advancement of the cause of temperance.



The Temperance Alliance meetings:

TEMPERANCE CONVENTION.

In compliance with a call issued by a number of Temperance men, a Convention was held at Temperance Hall yesterday to take into consideration the advisability of forming a Provincial Branch of the "Dominion Alliance for the Total Suppression of the Liquor Traffic," and the examination of the "Canada Temperance Act of 1878." Notwithstanding the inclement state of the weather there was present a large number of persons, including some of the old and influential Temperance workers in the Province, among whom we noticed A. Longley, M. P., W. C. Silver, Rev. G. Christie, P. Monaghan, Alderman Wm. Murray, Rev. R. Alder Temple, John Heenan, W. J. Gates, J. D. Wallace, Dr. C. C. Hamilton, John Grierson, Rev. G. O. Huestis, Rev. Mr. Lowden, Dr. W. E. McRobert, W. M. Brown, R. S. Blois, John Mosher, J. A. Halliday, Thos. Hunter, Bowman Corning, J. Albert Black, R. Thompson, Samuel Rettie, Rev. Dr. Burns, H. Fraser, R. Putnam, J. Parsons, W. H. Rogers, J. T. Bulmer, Geo. P. Nelson, W. Foster, X. Z. Chipman, and others.

At 10.15 a. m. the Convention was called to order by Dr. McRobert, of Truro, moving that Rev. R. Alder Temple, of Amherst, be appointed chairman. Agreed to.

On motion of Dr. Hamilton, of Cornwallis, P. Monaghan, of Halifax, was requested to act as Secretary.

The call for the Convention was read. The chairman made some brief remarks, and introduced Rev. Thos. Galas of Montreal, Secretary of the "Dominion Alliance," who addressed the meeting giving particulars relating to the formation of the Alliance, its objects, and the progress made since its organization; also setting forth what is required to put into operation the "Canada Temperance Act."

After an interesting discussion, A. Longley, M. P., of Paradise, moved, seconded by Bowman Corning, of Yarmouth, "That it is the opinion of this Convention, that a Branch of the Dominion Alliance should be organized for the Province of Nova Scotia." Agreed to unanimously.

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On motion of Rev. G. Christie, of Bedford, seconded by A. Longley, Rev. G. Christie, Samuel Rettie, Rev. G. O. Huestis, J. Parsons and W. H. Rogers, were appointed a committee to draft a Constitution and By-Laws. The committee reported at the second sitting, the Constitution submitted by them being adopted.

Resolutions of an important character were moved and discussed, nearly all of the prominent members expressing their views on the subject under consideration. Notwithstanding the difference of views on some points, the conclusions arrived at showed that a commendable unanimity characterized the Convention in reference to the very important subjects engaging the attention of those present.

After disposing of the resolutions offered, the Convention was duly organized by the unanimous election of the following named as office bearers:—

President—Hon. Samuel Creelman, M. E. C., Stewiacke.

Vice-President—Rev. Dr. Burns, Halifax; Rev. G. O. Huestis, Selmah, Hants; Rev. Geo. Christie, Bedford.

Secretary—P. Monaghan, Halifax.

General Committee—John T. Balmer, Halifax; Bowman Corning, Yarmouth; Dr. C. C. Hamilton, Canard; George P. Nelson, Truro; Peter A. McGregor, New Glasgow; Rev. R. Alder Temple, Amherst; Avar Longley, M. P., Paradise; J. N. Freeman, Queens Co.; Thomas M. King, Antigonish; J. Grierson, Halifax; J. Parsons, Halifax; Sheriff Bell, Halifax; Rev. M. Lowden, Halifax; James Farquhar, Halifax.

The foregoing is a very brief summary of the proceedings of the two sittings of the Convention. Previous to the adjournment a cordial vote of thanks was presented to Mr. Gales, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, for his attendance, and the valuable information imparted by him.

For the information of the public we here give a copy of the "Declaration of Principles" of the Alliance:—

"That it is neither right nor politic for the government to afford legal protection and sanction to any traffic or system that tends to increase crime, to waste the resources of the Dominion, to corrupt the social habits, and to destroy the health and lives of the people.

"That the traffic in intoxicating liquors as common beverages is inimical to the true interests of individuals, and destructive of the order and welfare of society, and ought therefore to be prohibited.

"That the history and results of all license laws in regard to the liquor traffic, abundantly prove, that it is impossible satisfactorily to limit or regulate by such means a system so essentially mischievous in its tendencies.

"That no consideration of private gain or public revenue can justify the upholding of a system so utterly wrong in principle, so suicidal in policy, and disastrous as to results, as the Traffic in Intoxicating Liquors.

"That the Legislative Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic is perfectly compatible with national liberty, and with the claims of justice and legitimate commerce.

"That the Legislative Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic would be highly conducive to the development of a progressive civilization.

"That, rising above sectarian and party considerations, all good citizens should combine to procure an enactment, prohibiting the manufacture and

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sale of intoxicating beverages, as affording most efficient aid in removing the appalling evils of intemperance."

All persons favorable to the movement, whether connected with Temperance organizations or not, may become members by paying an annual subscription of not less than 25 cents, which can be forwarded to the Treasurer's office, George street, Halifax. Contributions to the funds are respectfully solicited.

It is expected that County auxiliary branches will be formed without delay, (one is now in operation in Colchester Co.)

The greatest difficulty (*so frequently expressed in former reports*) is still met in many places, and that is, in securing the services of suitable parties to act in the capacity of Superintendents, and until the members of our Order are more fully alive to the great importance of planting our principles in the youthful mind, we will have to meet with troubles of this kind; it is to be hoped however, that every stumbling block may be speedily removed, to the end that the children of our land may be interested in the general principles of Total Abstinence.

Another serious drawback to the permanent progress of this work arises from the fact that in many places Bands of Hope meet in Summer and in other places during the winter months, the natural results (apathy and indifference) arising from such a course of action are sure to follow.

We would strongly recommend that continuous effort be put forth, to keep up the interest during the whole year, for we find in every instance that this is not the fault of the children, but the blame lies at the door of those having charge of this special department of our work, let us be found doing our duty to the children, then will we be blessed indeed.

At the beginning of the year, the stock required to supply the demand being nearly exhausted, and having in view the importance of the work, a full supply of Rituals, Members Cards, &c. has been provided, so that everything necessary for the proper working of Bands of Hope, may now be procured from the Grand Scribe.

We are pleased to observe the continued prosperity of the *Rose Bud Band of Hope* as manifested in connection with the visit made to this Grand

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Division this afternoon, and not the least pleasing feature in connection therewith was the presentation of the sum of (\$10.00) Ten dollars to the Agency fund of the Grand Division.

With an earnest desire that these Juvenile Organizations (*the Bands of Hope and Sections of Cadets*) may prosper, we submit this report in the bonds of

The *second*, *third* and *fourth* sections were adopted, *seriatim*. The *fifth* respecting Professor Allison's proposals, having been already disposed of was ordered to be expunged.

The *sixth*, *seventh*, *eighth* and *ninth* were adopted in order, and the report as amended was adopted as a whole:

The Committee upon the State of the Order, beg leave to report:

(1.) From the reports of the Grand Officers, and other documents placed in our hands, the Order would seem to be well maintaining its character, long since acquired, for stability and usefulness. It cannot be doubted but that our Order has done very much in the way of educating the public mind upon the subject of prohibition, the grand aim of all our efforts.

Our present membership is about ten thousand. In view of the existence in our midst of several organizations kindred in character to our own, it is very gratifying to find that there has been no diminution of our membership during the year, and that there is general activity among us in behalf of the common cause.

THE DIVISION ROOM.

We feel that the Division Room should be made a place of greater attraction. Many have been instructed there in times past, and its advancement.

tages are as open now as ever before. We would earnestly urge upon our brethren of the Subordinate Divisions, the benefits to be derived from a proper use of the hours spent at the weekly meetings, and take the liberty of contrasting the results flowing from the practice of discussing questions of common interest, the reading of papers and essays, and the employment of such other means of improvement as circumstances may suggest, with those resulting from the too general practice of either spending the time in moody silence, or in frivolity and thoughtlessness, amounting almost to open dissipation. Having put on the armor, 'tis here that it should be burnished for the warfare ahead.

THE ALLIANCE JOURNAL.

(2.) Great sacrifices have been made by this Grand Division for the purpose of perpetuating the life of this paper; but not greater probably than the circumstances demanded. Under an arrangement made last session; a saving of about \$500 was effected in connection with the printing and management of the paper, and it was then hoped that the subscription list would be swelled to an extent sufficient to save from any considerable drain upon our resources for the future, but the result has not met our expectations.

The sum of about \$800 has been required to meet the deficiency of the year just ended, despite the saving effected: Unsatisfactory as this result may appear, it is in reality such an improvement upon the previous year as to inspire hope for the year just entered upon.

The drain upon our resources for 1877 exceeded \$1100. We give these facts and figures that our brethren and others interested in the common cause, who may not have turned their attention to this matter, may be made aware of the struggle we are making on behalf of the paper, and be induced to lend us their aid by patronising the paper, and other contributions, as may be within their means to give. The paper is published for the small sum of \$1 per annum, not half its value, and surely among a membership of 10,000, to say nothing about other organizations, and the hosts outside their ranks again, the subscription list should exceed 700!

What are the professions of temperance people worth, if they refuse to support a temperance paper published at half its cost, and sustained in the face of so serious a loss to a portion of temperance workers?

The views of some of the most eminent physicians and scientists of the day, both on this Continent and in Europe, respecting the qualities and properties of alcohol, and its effects upon the human system, in health and disease, have been given from time to time through the pages of the paper, much to the benefit of its readers. It is by the diffusion of such information, that the false and absurd notions still prevailing in many quarters upon this branch of the temperance question, are to be finally dissipated. To the general reader, however, more variety in the paper might prove acceptable. A little more of general news would seem desirable, especially in cases where no other paper is taken, or where it may be the main source of public information.

From the report of the Alliance Journal Committee, we learn that Messrs. Sancton & Piper, the publishers of the paper, have done their work in a highly satisfactory manner, and at a cost far below that of former years.

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AGENCY WORK.

(3.) The work done through the "Agency" is kindred, in some respects, to that done through the instrumentality of the paper, and in other respects diverse from it, but each aids the other; and both are essential to the progress of the cause—the cause of all mankind. We hope that means will be devised by which an agent may be kept in the field, for a part of the time at least, the present year. The smallness of the contributions on the occasions of the lectures of our Agents have almost become a scandal to temperance people, and it is greatly to be desired that more liberality should distinguish us in this respect for the future, both for our own sake and the sake of the cause.

THE REFORM MOVEMENT

(4.) His undoubtedly done much good, in the way of reforming the drunkard, but it has done little or nothing to help our Order directly. That a movement such as this should have strengthened our Order was only a natural expectation, and in the end that result may be attained—we hope it will. The "Sons" have done much to keep on the "Reform," whether they are helped in return or not, and 'tis only for each and all to labour on in the good cause until our object is accomplished, not caring so much who does the work as long as it is thoroughly done.



JUVENILE ORGANIZATIONS.

(6.) These institutions have already done vast good, and are destined to do much more good in the future. From the "Cadets of Temperance" and the "Bands of Hope" come our best "Sons," and this is only what we might reasonably expect, for they thus receive the necessary training previous to full enlistment in the "Temperance army." God bless the "Juvenile organizations," and all those who have spent time and labour in promoting them. A number of our brethren deserve special commendation in this connection, but they will meet a higher reward than we can bestow.

(7.) *Sons of Temperance Arch, Poplar Grove.*—We feel that the thanks of the Grand Division are due to the members of the city Divisions for their public spirited efforts in the erection of this beautiful Arch, done for the double purpose of contributing to the magnificence of the reception tendered to the Governor General and the Princess Louise, and of doing honour to the body we represent.

It is also worthy of mention, that an address from this G. D. was presented to the Marquis of Lorne, to which His Excellency was pleased to return a gracious reply, expressive of his appreciation of the work which we have in hand.

(8.) We now have the combined influences of the platform, the pulpit, and the press, enlisted on behalf of our glorious cause; we have also some names distinguished in the walks of literature and science aiding heartily in the cause. What we most need now, perhaps, is the aid of honest, able statesmanship, to embody our views and principles into legislative form for the suppression of the traffic in Rum.

(9.) In conclusion we would say: that thirty years of hard labor have not dampened our ardour in the cause, nor will we tire though thirty years more should be required to accomplish the end in view, when we think that the world's happiness hangs upon the issue.

Representative R. T. Murray, reported from the Committee appointed to inquire as to the cost of the S. of T. Arch, that the full cost was about \$210.00; and that upwards of \$125 were promised in the City, leaving a deficiency of about eighty dollars. Moved by R. Thompson, seconded by A. Longley, that Grand Division supplement from its funds the expense of the "Arch;"—carried.

The following is a more explicit statement of size, dimensions and appearance of

THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE ARCH.

There was one feature of the reception accorded in Halifax to His Excellency the Marquis of Lorne and H. R. H. the Princess Louise, which will ever be gratifying to the members of our Order, not only in this Province, but throughout the Dominion. When it was found that such elaborate preparations were to be made for the reception of the Vice-Regal party, some of the City Sons determined that our Order should not be behind in doing honor to the distinguished visitors.

As all, or nearly all, our city members belong to other organizations—to National Societies, militia, and the like—and some, too, among the members of the City Council—it was found impossible to assemble as an order and take part in the pageant, which has reflected so much credit on Halifax, and which more pretentious cities have in vain attempted to equal. Therefore, the next best thing was done. The route of the procession lay past Poplar Grove, the entrance to the Division Room, which has been for nearly a quarter of a century the headquarters of the Temperance movement in Nova Scotia,—from which room have gone forth men trained for any honorable and responsible position in society—men who have left their mark on the social and political structures of the country. It was fitting that near these old headquarters should be erected some token, first of our loyalty and affection, and second, of our vitality. The token decided on was an arch, and with the enthusiasm characteristic of the Sons of Temperance, the city Divisions appointed their committees. The result was an arch that compared favorably with the best in the city—the design, dimensions and finish, being all in keeping, and highly creditable to the Brothers—William Foster, of Mayflower, and John Mosher, of Richmond—to whom the work was confidently entrusted by the Committee.

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The arch was of the stilted order, the main spanning the roadway on Jacob Street, in line with the south-east corner of that street and Grafton, with a smaller arch on each sidewalk. The span was 18 feet in width, and from ground to curve was 25 feet. The curve was about 6 feet, surmounted by the faultless triangle of the Order, with the motto "Love, Purity and Fidelity." From the triangle a flag-pole, some 30 feet in height, bore a beautiful new Nova Scotia flag, while from smaller poles the British and Dominion ensigns were flying. On the curve was the word "Welcome," in bold blue letters, on a pink back ground, while on the front face of the smaller arches "LOUISE," "LORNE," were placed as transparencies. On the main columns were portraits of Her Majesty the Queen, and the late Prince Consort. The reader has here had described the western front of the arch, and leaving out the portraits of Her Majesty and Prince Albert, may take it as the description of the eastern front. But the arch is by no means all described, nor can any description of it do full justice to its beauty, its appropriateness, and the admiration it elicited from all. From the top of the staff, bearing the flag of the Province, a gilded dove with outstretched wings, attracted the eye, while from the curve of the arch a feathered dove (presented to the Committee for the purpose by the well-known naturalist, Mr. Andrew Downs) bearing an olive branch, appeared as if in the act of alighting on those who passed beneath. These emblems of our Order were much admired, but more admired, perhaps, were two fountains, each about six feet in height, which, one on the top of each small arch, shed gentle showers of pure, cold, sparkling water.

All the Sons are justly proud of their part in the right royal reception, and have determined to preserve souvenirs of it by having the arch photographed by Notman, who will, no doubt, be glad to supply stereoscopic and other views of it to the fraternity throughout the Province.—*Albion Journal*.

WORTHY BROTHER.—It is impossible for me to speak in any other than general terms of the State of the Order in this County, for outside of my own personal knowledge I have no source of information to draw from. The Divisional Deputies have utterly neglected to report to me for the last quarter.

Olive Branch Division, Bridgetown, celebrated her thirtieth Anniversary last Monday evening with an enthusiasm which presages thirty years more of vigorous life. Several of the Divisions in this County are doing but little, I fear, in the way of temperance work. The cause generally is in a prosperous condition, however.

Doubtless the general effect of the "Reform Movement" has been good, but thus far it has operated against our Order, so far as my observation has extended. No licenses have been granted in this County for the current year. The Grand Jury made no recommendations, and had they done so, I think the Sessions would have refused to confirm them. This seems to show a growing sentiment in favor of "Prohibition."

The management of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL the last year has given general satisfaction, I think; but 'tis not at all likely that its circulation can be greatly increased, although it is furnished at so low a price.

The "Permissive Bill" of last Winter seems to have excited but little interest hereabouts, but its adoption in Fredericton by so large a majority will probably encourage other places to try it at no distant day.

WORTHY BROTHER,—In this, my Annual Report of the State of the Order in this County, I have to regret an entire absence of information from the out-lying districts. In a general way I may say that while interest in

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the Order we represent has almost entirely declined, yet temperance sentiments, the outgrowth of labor in connection with the Order, has steadily advanced. Our principles are more firmly rooted to-day in this County than at any former period.

St. Andrew's Division has been doing little during the past two quarters. Our meetings, which had been adjourned since last Spring, were re-commenced on the first of the present month, and will likely continue to be held during the winter. The Reform Movement, from which we had hoped so much, has wholly declined. REPORT

OF PAST GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH HUTCHINGS' TOUR IN THE
COUNTIES OF HANTS AND HALIFAX FROM OCT. 7TH TO NOV.
20TH, 1878.

To Rev. R. Alder Temple, G. W. P.

WORTHY BROTHER,—In accordance with usage and with the terms of my commission as "*Special Deputy*," I herewith present the following report of the state of the Divisions in the Sections of the Country recently visited by me, and hope that it may aid you in preparing your report for the coming Annual Session. It has been my privilege to visit the following Divisions, viz.:

Kellogg Division, No. 92; Reform, 361; Gibraltar, 171; Milford, 329; Rose of Douglas, 360; True Blue, 430; Vesper, 124; East Rawdon, 425; Golden Rule, 378; Rechab, 119; Woodville, re-organized, 418; Crystal Stream, 384; Happy Home, 411; Rosedale, 420; Marine, 221; Selmah, 410; Lorne Division, new; Urbania, 409; Rising Sun, 52; Elmsvale, 306; Brookvale, 426; Alder Bank, re-organized, 363; Bismark, 436; Memorial Division—new Division; Pembroke, 412.

I will now proceed to give you an account of the state of each Division:

Kellogg, No. 92, was not as lively as in former days, some of the older members were not taking the same interest as they had been in days past, but I think a brighter day is coming to this old Division.

Reform, No. 361, I regret to be compelled to record this once fine Division in a very low state at present, but as they have excellent material remaining it is expected that this Division will improve during the coming winter.

Gibraltar, No. 171, is dead, and not much prospects of any life for it at present.

Milford, No. 329, is working well, its meetings are held regularly, and the members are very much interested in the prosperity of the Division.

Rose of Douglas, No. 360, is also working well. The interest is kept up and the regular meetings of the Division are very well attended.

True Blue, No. 430, is in very efficient working order, it is in every sense of the word a live organization, and is doing a great amount of good; the meetings are well attended.

Vesper, No. 124, is still as vigorous and efficient as ever, and although they have had to deal with some of their members recently, for the violation
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of the pledge, the Division is in good working order and full of hope for the future.

East Ravdon, No. 425, may be classed among the Divisions of our Order that are doing exceedingly well. The members are interested in its prosperity; the meetings are kept up regularly.

Golden Rule, No. 378, of this Division a great many good things might be said; the number of members is very small, but nothing daunted, they are working hard to complete their new hall in spite of all the opposition that they meet with from heads of families and others in the settlement, and they hope to succeed.

Reeohab, No. 119, continues to hold its position among the Divisions, being as well managed as at any period in its past history, at least, as far as we can judge, although they miss the presence of their late Brother G. J. Creed, who always tried and succeeded too, in keeping up the Division to its proper standard; he has gone, but his influence cannot be forgotten. The position of D. G. W. P. held by him is now in the hands of his son, Bro. R. H. Creed, who is doing all that he can for the welfare of the Division.

Woodville, No. 418, this Division has not been at work for some time; a committee was appointed at the public meeting, to see what could be done, and I am pleased to say that by a letter received a few days ago, it is quite probable that the Division will be revived again.

Crystal Stream, No. 384, located at Summerville, is in fine working order. I had one of the best public meetings here that it has been my privilege to address for some time, and the gathering of members of Divisions at the close, was all that could be desired. This Division is exerting a good influence in the locality.

Happy Home, No. 411, located at Tenny Cape, is also in excellent working order, the members are actively employed in making the Division meetings interesting and profitable to all who attend; this Division is doing well, its meetings are kept up regularly.

Rosedale, No. 420, located at Moose Brook, although small in number, is hopeful for the future; the public meeting was well attended, and will be the means, I trust, of doing good for the cause in the interest of the Division.

Marine, No. 221, located at Noel, is just as vigorous as ever; the solid and substantial is quite apparent here. Great good was effected in this District by the *July Session of the Grand Division* being held at this place; its influence for good has been spoken of in more than one of the Divisions that I have visited; the public meeting at Noel, and the meeting of members of Division at the close, spoke volumes for our cause in this place.

Selma, No. 410, is still at work, my meeting was not as largely attended as it would have been, in consequence of a gathering in one of the Churches, which could not be changed in time, by reason of some misunderstanding on the part of the parties interested, as to the time of my meeting in this place and Maitland, those who attended, however, were desirous of seeing the Division succeed, and were hoping for a larger measure of success in the future.

NEW DIVISIONS.

Lorne, No. —, organized at Maitland, on Monday evening, Nov. 4th., with 33 charter members;—20 of these were initiated and the officers elected and installed into office. I was pleased to have the assistance of Bro. Thomas Hunter, D. G. W. P. of Marine Division, of Noel.

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Urbania, No. 400, located at Urbania, has not been working for some few months past, but it was decided at the close of the public meeting held in this place, to meet the following Thursday evening, to re-organize the Division, and I have no doubt at all but that the resolution was acted upon, as those interested in the cause in this Settlement were very desirous that the Division should resume its work again.

Rising Sun, No. 52. Of this Division it is scarcely necessary for me to speak; its record is so well known that any report from me might seem to be uncalled for; its age has not in the least detracted from its usefulness or from its success; they are already preparing for the celebration of its thirtieth anniversary. May it continue to be the means of comfort, of blessing and hope to all.

Elmsvale, No. 396. This Division I should judge is doing well. The public meeting was well attended and the interest all that could be desired; the Divisional gathering at the close was a good one. They met in regular Session, and I should not be doing them justice if I did not say that in taking into account the fact that they meet in a School House, (not the most convenient place in the world for meetings of this kind) this Division is working very well indeed.

Brookvale, No. 426. Of this Division it is my privilege to say, that if the interest manifested at the public meeting, as well as at the Divisional meeting at the close, can be taken as an index, this Division must be a success. It is very largely made of young persons, and not a few of them either, who can speak and interest themselves in the cause. I was greatly pleased with my visit to Elmsvale and Brookville, the interest manifested in these sections is worthy of imitation.

Alder Bank, No. 363, at Little River, Musquodoboit, I had the pleasure of re-organizing on Monday evening, the 11th of November, with 8 old and 8 new members, under very favourable circumstances.

Bismark, No. 435, located at Mill Village, Hants. Of this Division I can report very favourably; its prospects for the coming winter are encouraging. My meeting was largely attended, and the number of members in attendance was very good indeed; in this place as in many others, the want of interest in the cause, on the part of heads of families, is very seriously felt.

Memorial Division, No. —, located at Cheverie, County of Hants. Organized, November 15th, 1878, with 28 charter members. I was ably assisted in the organization of this Division by a large deputation from Crystal Stream Division of Summerville, as well as by a deputation from Happy Home Division, of Tenny Cape. This new accession to our ranks bids fair to be of great service to the cause in this section of the county. Their prospects for the future are very encouraging indeed.

Pembroke, No. 412. I have to report this Division inoperative. At the public meeting held on Saturday evening the 10th inst. A committee was appointed to see what could be done to get it into working order again. The committee are to meet this evening, it is to be hoped that something may be done for the cause in this place, through the work of this committee.

With my meeting at Pembroke, this present tour closes, except that this evening, I expect to meet with the members of Crystal Stream Division in regular Session, and on my way homeward to-morrow, to lecture at Burlington in the evening, and to leave on Wednesday for Halifax.

And since our Order rejoices to recognize among the Faculty and Alumni of Acadia College and Academies some of its oldest, truest and warmest friends and advocates, it is fitting that at the outset of our proceedings this Grand Division should express its sympathy with them in the losses sustained by the Institution, when the late conflagration laid a large portion of their buildings in ruins—losses which, we trust, will be repaired by the Christian public with a liberality which will place the Institution in a loftier and prouder position than ever.

I have also to acknowledge my obligations to a large number of Division Deputies, who, in acknowledging their acceptance of their Commissions, have kindly volunteered information as to the state of their respective Divisions.

From these several sources I am able to compile the following brief outline of the state of the Order in the respective Counties, viz. :—

HALIFAX.—The Divisions in the City and County are in good order, and

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exerting a beneficent influence in their respective neighborhoods. No. 354, especially, is in a highly prosperous condition and full of enthusiasm.

ANTIGONISH.—No. 212, flourishing. 406 contending with apathy. No Licenses granted. Prospects upon the whole hopeful.

CAPE BRETON.—(North)—All the Divisions working harmoniously, and adding to the membership.

CAPE BRETON.—(South)—No Report.

COLCHESTER.—Holding their own, with good prospects of improvement.

CUMBERLAND.—Nos. 36, 75, 131, 182, 386, 389, 427, 428, are flourishing, and increasing in strength. No. 428 initiated 45 new members in two evenings. Nos. 387, 427, 431, are holding their own, and No. 388 is at present absorbed. Upon the whole, our Order in this County is advancing and, hand in hand with the Temperance Reformers, strong in its purpose to enforce the law against unlicensed liquor sellers.

DIGBY.—Temperance principles are predominant, the prospects of our Order were "never better," and the illegal traffic in strong drink is being gradually but surely stamped out.

GUYSBOROUGH.—With the exception of two Divisions, Nos. 264 and 399, the Order here is in a languishing condition and requires immediate attention from the Grand Division. No licenses are granted, yet there are "twenty-five rum-shops and plenty of customers." A visit from the G. D. agent is earnestly desired.

HANTS.—In the *West* the Divisions are maintaining their ground with varying fortunes. In the *East* they are in the sunshine of prosperity. "Bismark" Division was organized 2nd November last, with 18 Charter members, and is now nearly fifty strong.

ANNAPOLIS.—No Report; but satisfactory intelligence from Bridgetown and Grandville Ferry.

KINGS.—The Dutcher movement has taken strong hold of the people and raised the tone of public sentiment to a higher elevation. Nos. 112, 196, 316, 331, 330 and 356 are holding their own, with encouraging prospects. Other Divisions not heard from.

LUNENBURG.—No. 32 is languishing. No. 226 is healthy, and vigorously prosecuting the rum-sellers of Petite Riviere.

PICOU.—No Report. Nos. 270, 305, 341 and 371 though small are in good heart and strong in purpose. Others Divisions *silent*. The Reform Movement here as elsewhere is doing a sweeping work.

QUEENS.—The Divisions are in good working order, with the exception of 209 which has hauled down its flag because it has no enemy to fight. 208 is on its feet again.

SHELburne.—No Reports. Nos. 158, 274, 320, 383 and 433 are flourishing; 313 and 400 hold their own; and 269 needs help. Remaining not heard from. "Day Dawn Division," No. 340, was re-organized, with hopeful prospects, on the 7th inst. by Deputy Christie, of 383.

YARMOUTH.—With the exception of 229, the Divisions are all alive and vigorously prosecuting their work in cordial co-operation with the Reformers.

I am persuaded that the County Deputies who have made no report to this office for the last quarter are not chargeable with a want of interest in our Order; and it is to be regretted that the delinquent silence of Divisional Deputies drives these respected brothers to the necessity, either of not reporting at all, or else writing a *Jeremiad* on "total depravity," or the "uncertainty of all human hopes."

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The effect of the Reform movement on the interest of the Sons of Temperance will for some time to come occupy the attention of our Order. It is not to be denied that in some localities it is operating to our disadvantage, by dividing or absorbing the interest of our members; but on the other hand, it is equally true that in other localities it is contributing largely to our membership and infusing new life into our Divisions. Let God work by whom He will, our post of duty is, clearly, in the front of the movement, which is sweeping over the Province. In a comparison of merits between the new organization and our own, the advantage lies on the side of our Order as being more complete in its organism, and specially adapted, therefore, to rural districts, since it is not entirely dependent for the interest of its weekly meetings upon the precarious chances and issues of impromptu addresses. A Division should, therefore, be instituted wherever there is a Reform Club, so that when the day of reaction shall come—as come it must—our Order may afford at once a rallying point and a refuge.

I respectfully remind my brothers that there never has been a time in our history, when work,—energetic hard work,—was more necessary than at this moment. Apathy is suicide. If we do not keep up with the grand movement that is now carrying its conquests into every town and village in the Province, we shall be thrown back to the rear, and to the companionship of camp-followers. And when union, organization, and concerted action are so necessary, it is pitiable to see Divisions laying down their arms, because no foe is thundering at the gates. May some good angel send them a vision of a rum-selling Ishmaelite to set their bristles on end, and start them to their quarters! There is plenty of work to be done, and tools to work with. Our *Agency Fund* wants replenishing; our ORGAN is a stranger to three-fourths of our membership; our Order is unknown in many villages and settlements; the *License Laws* are constantly violated in the face of their too lenient penalties, and rum is still sold in the face of day. Let us consecrate ourselves anew to hard, incessant work, and look to "the everlasting hills whence cometh our help." We are fighting the battle of Truth, of Goodness, and of God; and Truth, and Justice, Humanity and God, all the highest and holiest powers and influences of the Universe, are arrayed on our side.

The Committee on Communications have had under consideration a letter from Jon Dougall & Son, of Montreal, referring to the publication of a Map for the Dominion of Canada, the object being to show the places where Intoxicating Drinks are licensed to be sold.

While the members of Committee are fully in accord with the object as explained by the Grand Scribe, that it would be well for each Division in our province to have a copy of this Map; they are of the opinion that in view of the present state of the finances of this Grand Division, it would not be wise to incur any expense in this connection, but the Committee would recommend that each Division of our Order procure a copy of this Map to be ordered through the Grand Scribe, the cost of the same to be made known as soon as possible through the columns of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL.

In reference to the Communication from Bro. Thos. Gales, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, asking for opinions on the proposed amendments to the License Law, (known as the Dunkin Act), the Committee feel satisfied that the best way to secure an expression of opinion upon this important matter, would be for the Grand Division to go into a Committee of the whole, to consider the general clauses contained in this communication. They would therefore recommend that this matter be taken up as the first business this afternoon.

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The Grand Scribe presented his financial statement in detail—the Grand Treasurer presented his accounts—and the bills against the Grand Division were read by items. Wilson, G. Sentinel; T. H. B. Witter, and Trueman Bishop.

Rev. J. M. Cramp, D. D., P. G. W. P., and Past Most Worthy Associate, was announced in the ante-room. The door was thrown open and our venerable brother received a most cordial welcome, and was escorted to a seat at the right of the G. W. P.

When called upon to address the assembly he spoke very feelingly of the past, and of his connection with the old Order, and of his interest still in the cause.

The following resolution was moved by Grand Scribe Parsons, seconded by Grand Treasurer, and adopted by a rising vote:—

That we are highly gratified that our venerable brother, Dr. Cramp, is able to afford us the benefit of his presence and counsels at this morning's sitting; that we have listened with pleasure to his address; that we are thankful to the Great Patriarch above, for sparing Dr. Cramp to see the day when the great principles which he has so long advocated, so generally prevalent and influential throughout the country; and that we assure our brother that the memory of his active labours for the benefit of our Order, is still fresh in the minds and hearts of its members.

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Legislative Action, more especially respecting the proposed amendments to the Dunkin Act, John W. Hamilton in the Chair.

The subject was spoken to by Thomas Hutchings, James A. Halliday, J. Parsons, H. A. Taylor, Rev. R. Alder Temple. A resolution was proposed to the Committee by T. Hutchings and agreed to.

The Committee rose and the Grand Division resumed, after which the Chairman reported upon the action of the Committee, which was adopted.

The resolution is :—

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Jan. 31st, 1878.

Resolved, That in view of the advanced position of Nova Scotia, in connection with the statutes regulating the traffic in Strong Drink, this Grand Division deems it inexpedient to make any change at present in this important matter, and it is the opinion of the Representatives present at this Quarterly Session, that it would be unwise for us to unite with the provinces, asking for any change, for such a course of action might lead our friends interested in the matter (contained in the Communication now before us) to suppose that we are in favor thereof.

But this Grand Division do most earnestly hope that the other portions of the Dominion of Canada may be brought speedily into a position to stand side by side with the Province of Nova Scotia in asking the Dominion Parliament for a Prohibitory Law.

Grand Treasurer Taylor, read the Report of the Committee on the State of the Order which was adopted by sections, and then as a whole as follows :—

The Committee on the State of the Order

Beg to report as follows : They have duly considered the report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch ; the Financial report of the Grand Scribe and the report of the Lecturing Agent of the Grand Division.

1. They are pleased to learn from the report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch that the Order is in good condition. The prospect for our advance in the work in which we have been so long engaged—over a quarter of a century—is bright and fair. The goodly number of Reform Clubs must ultimately tend to our advancement, as in all probability many of these reformers will find their way into our organization, and thus help along the good work. We have prepared the ground—the seed is now being sown—and in due season will we reap the harvest.

2. They are gratified to learn that the order keeps its own, and is advancing in various parts of our jurisdiction. They, however, regret that Divisional and County Deputies fail in their duty to the Grand Worthy Patriarch and to the Order, and would recommend those filling these important offices—representatives of the Head of our Order—to a more careful consideration of the responsibility of the position they fill in the Order, that they be more prompt in the performance of their duties in the future.

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3. They also report that they find the Financial position of the Grand Division in a healthy condition, with funds sufficient to meet all their liabilities; at the same time they would recommend that those Divisions in arrears to this body make special efforts for the liquidation of their indebtedness—by Collections, Donations, Soirees, or otherwise, that they may be clear from all charges on our books.

4. They would follow in the wake of their predecessors, and again be in earnest in their recommendation of the organ of our Order, the

has passed through important changes during the past quarter. At the commencement of this year the printing of the paper was transferred to the printing establishment of Messrs. Sancton and Piper of Bridgetown, where at a much cheaper rate than previously the paper is printed in a manner satisfactory to those who have the business in charge. The circulation is rapidly increasing and the paper is proving itself worthy of our best wishes and aid. It is necessary for the continued success of this department of our Temperance work that every member of the Grand Division should become an active canvassing agent.

P. G. W. P., Brown has now full control of the Editorial and Business departments, and it is the duty of each Division to aid our brother by brief communications as to the good work throughout the Province. The ALLIANCE JOURNAL is a felt power in Nova Scotia, and the money drawn from the Treasury is well spent. We trust, however, that the subscription list will soon be large enough to make the paper self-sustaining. This can, and would be done if the members of our Order put forth a fair amount of effort.

5. Our Agency Work should never be lost sight of. Its fund is exhausted and should be speedily and abundantly replenished—by Subscriptions and Donations from Divisions, and from individuals—in order that the living voice of our Lecturer may be heard in all our country districts, advocating our noble cause. Without money we cannot work. Divisional and County Deputies could, if they would, do much in aid of this important work. With our large number of working Divisions at present in existence, and with the large number of members on our Financial Scribe's Book there should never be an empty Treasury fund for agency work. We beg to recommend that Divisions will announce a collection for agency work of this Grand Division be taken at each public meeting.

The G. W. P. then presented his Report which was duly referred to the Committee on State of the Order.

OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES :

"Nine years have nearly elapsed since last this Grand Division met in Quarterly Session in the town of Amherst. That session was held, to use the beautiful language of G. W. P. Creelman, 'at a season of the year when the face of nature in every place charms the eye, and fills the heart with gratitude to Him who crowns the year with His goodness.' We now meet at a season when nature is awaking from the sleep of winter, and preparing to put on the beautiful garments of summer—a transition which is emblematic

matial of the moral state of this Province of Nova Scotia, which, under the influence of the temperance forces which are at work, is throwing off the torpor of years, and preparing to start into new life, and to bud and blossom as the rose. When nearly nine years ago the Grand Divisions of N. S. and N. B. then holding their July sessions, respectively, in Amherst and Sackville, met in grand social reunion on Fowlers' Hill, to enjoy an entertainment which was subsequently described by the *Amherst Gazette* as 'the most successful of the kind that had ever taken place in the country,' G. W. P. Currie, in the name of the Grand Division of New Brunswick, said to us, 'Tis true we are your Elder Brother, but we rejoice to know that in effort and results in the glorious work of the redemption of the drunkard, you are our *twin brother*.' Since that period, however, this jurisdiction has so far outstripped its neighbour, that one would scarcely know them to be *twin brothers*. Our membership has run up from *four thousand, four hundred* to nearly *ten thousand*. The influence of our Order is felt in every department of the State. Moreover, such has been the beneficent effect of the law then recently brought into operation, that less liquor is consumed in Nova Scotia, in proportion to the population, than in any other Province or State on the continent."

My thanks are also due to Bro. Thos. Hutchings, P. G. W. P., for a detailed report of the state of the Divisions visited by him, as special Deputy, in the Counties of Kings, Annapolis, Hants, Pictou, Guysboro' and Antigonish.

These papers will be found appended to this Report, and from the information which they supply I am able to report, that excepting where here and there a languishing Division is unable to lift up its head, our Order throughout the jurisdiction, is in a flourishing condition, and exhibiting signs of increased activity.

When the members of our Order extended the handed of brotherhood and co-operation to the Reform movement, on its introduction into this Province, it was safely predicted that the Order was "twisting a rope for its own neck." But results are proving that he who is responsible for that utterance is no prophet. It is true that here and there a Division, carried away by the rush of the movement has been absorbed; but wherever our members have been true to themselves and to the Order, their Divisions, catching some of

the new fire, have been quickened into new life, and have augmented their membership. I am persuaded that our Order has nothing to fear from competition with other organizations, unless its life should die out. In that case it will deserve to go down. It is natural for us to say of an Order with which we have been identified ourselves, "Other daughters have done virtuously, but thou excellest them all." But to make good our boast, we must be animated by the loftiest enthusiasm, and sustain every department of our operations in the feeblest activity. In the meantime, regarding all other organizations as so many tributaries of one grand river which is flowing towards the quiet and peaceful harbor of universal sobriety, our motto should be "Sympathy with all, and Hostility to none."

DECISIONS.

Several decisions have been given by this Office during the Quarter, none of which, however, required to be noticed here, except perhaps the following:

Question, from Bro. Isaiah Wilson, R. S. of No. 154: "Can a person who has been expelled from a Subordinate Division, be proposed, ballotted for, and elected to membership, under our laws, in the same subordinate Division, within six months from the date of that person's expulsion from that Division?"

Answer:—Yes, unless expelled under Chapter of *Finance*. The old laws prohibiting the re-admission of expelled members within six months, were repealed by the National Divisions of 1860, but re-enacted in 1866, so far as relates to members expelled for non-payment of dues.

DIVISIONAL D. G. W. P.'S.

It seems necessary to call attention to the special functions of Divisional Deputies, and to the relation which they sustain to the Divisions over which they exercise jurisdiction, as, in some quarters, misapprehension exists in relation thereto. A Divisional Deputy, is not, as such, an officer of the Division, but the representative of the G. W. P. in the Division. He is not necessarily a member of the Division to which he is deputed. His commission does not authorize him to obtrude tiresome and vexatious interference in matters which are left entirely in the hands of Divisions. It is his duty, however, to sustain the authority of the National and Grand Division in all cases where the Bodies claim the right to dictate; to decide all questions of law; when necessary, without interfering with the prerogatives of the W. P.; to install the officers of the Division every Quarter under conditions prescribed in his Commission; to see that the private work is done strictly according to the B. B.; and to render to the G. W. P., at the end of every quarter, a full report of the state of the Division, of any irregularity in the working; and of all inferential decisions on constitutional questions which he may have given, all official communications to be forwarded to the G. W. P. through the County or District Deputy. It will be seen that the efficiency of our organization, very largely depends on the fidelity of Divisional Deputies in attending to these duties.

AGENCY AND ORGAN.

It is also necessary that the claims of the Agency Fund and of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL should be kept before the Grand Division. Since our last quarterly session the Grand Division agent has been constantly in the field, (480)

accomplishing an incredible amount of work, visiting Divisions and Schools and holding public meetings. During that period he has traversed six Counties, organized two Divisions, and addressed over eight thousand people; but the pecuniary results of his campaign, chiefly owing to the presence of rival organizations, have been considerably below our expectations, and far from sufficient to meet expenses. This matter is respectfully referred to the Grand Division in the hope that they will adopt such measures as will secure their agent from loss.

The report of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL committee will be laid before you, and will also demand your earnest consideration. With such a wide field of usefulness as the extension of the Reform movement has opened up, it seems lamentable that the only Temperance paper in the Province should be doomed to a struggling existence.

There are men in the temperance ranks to-day who must honestly acknowledge that for their present respectability they are indebted, under God, to this grand old Order; and not a few of them can remember the dark days when they lavishly "wasted their substance on the cup that inebriates." I would that these brothers could realize that it would be not only a graceful but a just tribute to the principles of temperance, benevolence and brotherly love which they have espoused, to untie their purse strings and liberally sustain our Agency Fund and our Organ.

PROHIBITION.

One of the most notable events of the last quarter has been the passing by the Dominion Senate, of a Permissive Prohibitory Bill, adapted to the entire Dominion. The Bill appears in two parts—the first part prescribing the means to be adopted to bring the law into operation, and the second part containing the prohibitory clauses, penalties, &c. A comparison of the second part of the Bill with the laws in operation in this Province, brings out points of difference which might be advantageously incorporated into our laws. But comparing the Bill as a whole, the salient point of contrast lies in this: that while the Dominion Bill assumes that the system of granting Licenses to sell is in full operation, and therefore throws upon the temperance people the burden of contesting the ground for prohibition, our Laws, on the other hand, assume that no licenses are granted—that prohibition is an *accomplished fact*, and therefore throws upon the liquor seller the onus and the odium of seeking a License to sell. The Dominion Bill provides that when one-fourth of the Electors of a City or County shall petition the Governor General in Council for the bringing of the Act into force, a proclamation shall be issued appointing a day for the polling of votes for or against the Act; and that should a majority of the Electors voting be in favour thereof, the Act shall then go into operation. It is clear then that while this Bill, taken as a whole, should it pass the House of Commons will prove an inestimable blessing to the Western Counties, and while it is also true, that the second part of the Bill if brought into force in this Province, would place us in no better position than that which we hold at present, it is equally true that were the Act, as a whole, by any inconceivable possibility to supersede, and render null and void the laws now in force in this Province, we should be thrown back at least ten years in our history and be compelled to fight every inch of our ground over again.

The debates in the Senate show that the constitutionality of this Bill is questioned by a number of Senators on the ground that it will invade the

prerogatives of Provincial Legislatures, as recognized by the B. N. A. Act,—a point on which, happily, it scarcely becomes me to venture an opinion. But this I will say, that no enlightened temperance man can read those debates without being astonished at the mental obliquity which prevailed in regard to all the moral, philosophical and political aspects of the question of prohibition as they have been before the country for years; and at the extreme simplicity with which old musty, dusty, moth-eaten arguments, fifty times refuted, have been dragged from the ash-heap to be paraded before the highest Legislative Body in the Dominion. It is said, that the prohibitory law is not enforced in Maine, as though the country was not flooded with authoritative testimonies to the contrary. It was said, that the Bible approves the use of wine,—as though the wines of Scripture and the fiery compounds of the present day were one and the same thing. It was said, that according to the Divine economy virtue is promoted, not by the removal of temptation, but by resistance,—as though there were no such prayer as “Lead us not into temptation,” and no such command as, “Let no man put a stumbling block, or an occasion to fall, in his brother’s way.” It was said, that strong drink is a “good creature of God,” as though it had not been manufactured by hellish arts, in the fires of the distillery, and by the destruction of God’s precious gift of grain. It was said, that it is unjust and tyrannical to compel the many who drink moderately to sacrifice an innocent pleasure for the sake of those who drink immoderately,—as though \$700,000,000 were not too high a price for a country like the United States to pay for what is at best but a pitiable indulgence. With such flimsy arguments as these did venerable senators plead for the legislative protection of a monster, that, like Milton’s “Sio,” sprang full-armed from Satan’s head half woman and half scaly serpent, “armed with mortal sting,” the prolific mother of death, that comes down upon the frenzied drunkard.

“Black as night,
Fierce as ten furies, and terrible as hell.”

In conclusion, brothers, grateful to Divine Providence for the fostering care still extended to our Order, and for the bright future which lies before us, let us address ourselves to the varied duties of the session, and catching a new inspiration from our mutual intercourse let us return to our homes to buckle on the armour afresh, “turn the battle to the gates,” and take for our war song—

“Death! death! to the crested serpent!
War! war! on the curse of Rum!
From mountain and valley the watchword
Repeat, till our lips are dumb.

* * * * *
Arm for the battle of glory;
Strike for the cause of Truth;
Fathers, with locks so hoary;
Sons in the bloom of youth;
Mothers and sisters and daughters,
With your prayers and blessings come!
Death! death! wherever he lurketh
To the serpent whose name is RUM!”

—handed to the Committee on the State of the Order :

G. W. P. and Brothers :

The Agency Committee, knowing that our Bro. Hutchings will be present at the session to be held at Amherst, leave to him the privilege of conveying to you personally the particulars of his labors, which have been very extensive. He can give a summary statement to date, in terms more satisfactory than your Committee could possibly do, and they entrust him with this duty.

Your Committee would state that, having no funds promised or in hand, they could only give our Worthy Brother permission to labor in behalf of the Grand Division and its objects; and he has worked as faithfully as though he had been engaged for large pecuniary reward. The Committee, as well as our Worthy Brother, believed, that while doing missionary work he would be sustained by the appreciation of his efforts, and by the liberal contributions of the Brotherhood and the general public, wherever he went. In this your Committee have been disappointed. The great revival on the Temperance subject, now so apparent, gave hope of liberal support; and your Committee fear that the discouragement experienced may lead our Agent to seek other fields for labor. His work as an Agent in forming and visiting Divisions has been of great advantage to our Order; and his labors in lecturing and in connection with Bards of Hope,—and in visiting schools, gives him a claim on the sympathies and support of the general public.

Your Committee trust that should our Brother be encouraged to give service in the County where the Grand Division holds this session, the Divisions and other organizations in that neighborhood will help to make some amends for the disappointment he has met.

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The Chairman of the Standing Committee on Charters and New Divisions presented the following report which was adopted :—

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Members,—

Your Committee report encouraging progress in this department of Grand Division work.

During the second quarter of the year three New Divisions were organized as follows :—

1. Safeguard, No. 436, located at Sheffield's Mills, Kings County, February 19th, 1878, with 36 members; organized by Deputies J. E. Hennigar and R. Farnham.

2. Bonafide, No. 437, located at North Bay, Ingonish, Victoria County, March 18, 1878, with 18 members; organized by Deputy W. F. McCurdy, of Baddeck.

The Grand Scribe presented his quarterly report which was referred to the Committee on the State of the Order :—

AMHERST, April 23rd, 1878.

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Members of Grand Division :

Thirty years ago to-day this Grand Body was organized in Yarmouth, and our history till the present time is one of consistency, of hard work, of many discouragements, and of splendid success. Our history is the history of temperance in Nova Scotia, and we trust our record for the future will be the consummation of Prohibition. God speed the day!

During this winter, the utmost activity has prevailed in every department of Temperance work. Our Divisions, Lodges and Clubs have plied the ear of moral suasion till the whole land has rung with our temperance songs and our shouts of praise while thousands were forsaking their cups and taking their stand for Temperance and right. But meanwhile the ear of legal suasion has not been lying idle. During the same time the Clerks of License, private parties, and Vigilance Committees have been busy enforcing our Laws. Rum-sellers have been prosecuted, fined, and imprisoned; intoxicating liquors have been seized and destroyed. The results of all these efforts are most satisfactory. From the highest to the lowest circles of Society, the principles of Total Abstinence possess a power never before enjoyed. May this power never be less.

STATISTICS.

Under this head I prefer to give first the following general Temperance statistics :

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—Under the control of the National Division of North America, there are 38 Grand Divisions, 1,976 Subordinate Divisions, and 90,000 members. Under the control of the National Division of Great Britain and Ireland there are 50,000 members. Since the order of the SONS was instituted in 1842, no less than THREE MILLIONS of men have taken the pledge and been initiated into the Divisions. So much has this Order (438)

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done for the cause and for the benefit of other Orders, that the chief promoters of every other Temperance Organization, and the most vigorous Temperance workers in Christendom, during the past quarter of a century, have received much of their training and enthusiasm in the Division Rooms.

The INDEPENDENT ORDER OF GOOD TEMPLARS comprise 60 Grand Lodges throughout the World, embracing over 11,850 Primary Lodges, numbering 735,000 members.

The BRITISH TEMPLARS and affiliated Societies include a membership of 100,000 in the Dominion of Canada, in Great Britain and her Colonies. The various Church Temperance Societies, open Temperance Societies, Rechabites, Sons of Jonadab, Friends of Temperance (which have largely taken the place of Divisions of the Sons throughout the Southern portions of the United States), Women's Temperance Unions, Reform Clubs, &c., &c., aggregate nearly as many more Total Abstainers and Temperance workers as those enumerated above.

By these figures it will be seen that Nova Scotia has more than twice as many pledged members in working Temperance Societies in proportion to her population as the whole Dominion; *no less than fourteen per cent. of her whole population being thus enrolled, and upwards of twenty-five per cent. of the adult population. Probably no Country or State can show so good a record as this.*

When the books closed on the 20th. inst., there had been received 96 returns, showing an average per capita tax of \$3.03; while when the books closed last quarter, on the 20th of January there had been received 112 returns, giving an average per capita tax of \$2.88. This shows a satisfactory increase in the membership of the Divisions, and a slight falling off in promptness, as to forwarding returns. Taken as a whole we have no cause to feel discouraged.

THE POLITICAL OUTLOOK

is good. Not much was done in the Local House—not much more is required to be done with our Local Option Law. The next step for us is Local Prohibition.

The Law proposed in the Dominion Senate and now under discussion in the Parliament of Canada would, if passed, and pushed upon Nova Scotia superseding our own fine Law, be retrogression in this Province.

A serious difficulty to be met by temperance men, is the uncertainty surrounding legislation as to what Parliament has the power to restrict the sale of strong drink; and that would warrant this Grand Body in asking that the Bill be laid over for a year, and that in the intervening time the question of Jurisdiction be definitely settled by the Supreme Court of Canada.

TEMPERANCE MAP.

Messrs. John Dougall & Sons of Montreal have published a temperance map of the Dominion in which Nova Scotia stands as the most temperate of all

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the Provinces. A sample is upon the wall. It would be a move in the right direction if every temperance society in the Province could possess this map.

AMHERST, April 24th, 1878.

The Committee on Communications respectfully beg leave to report that they have had two communications placed in their hands, namely : One from Northern Star Division of Halifax, asking that one-third of the Grand Division Session of the annual meeting in October next may be held in their hall. The other from Bro. Thos. Hutchings suggesting that the National Division be invited to hold its session in 1879 in the city of Halifax.

1. In reference to the communications from Northern Star Division, your Committee would strongly recommend that the invitation be accepted, and that the Wednesday session of the annual meeting in October next be held in the Northern Star Division hall, and that Bro. William Murray be requested to make the arrangements accordingly.

In reference to the communication suggesting that the National Division be invited to hold its session of 1879 in the city of Halifax.

2. Your Committee, for many reasons, arising from circumstances over which we have no control, recommend that for the present no action be taken in this matter.

Moved, seconded and sustained that the thanks of this Grand Division be tendered to Amherst Division, and the friends in Amherst for cordial reception, accommodation and entertainment during this Session. Carried with applause.

P. G. W. P., Taylor read the report of the Committee on the State of the Order. Resolved to consider the same by Sections :

1, 2, 3, 4, adopted after slight discussion.

5, adopted after discussion and slight amendment.

6, adopted after discussion. (The Report of the Standing Committee on the ALLIANCE JOURNAL was read while this Clause was under discussion.)

7, adopted.

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The report as amended was then adopted as a whole as follows :

Your Committee beg to report as follows :

1. In reviewing the work of the last Quarter they have to express sincere gratitude to the Great Patriarch above, for the many good things done in our province, and throughout the Dominion, for, and on behalf, of the cause we have so much at heart.

They are pleased to learn from the several documents submitted for their consideration, viz : The Report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch ; the Reports of the Grand Scribe ; the Financial statement of the Grand Treasurer, &c., that the outlook, on the whole, is cause for thankfulness to every well wisher of the Sons.

2. They are pleased to learn that the Deputies of the Grand Worthy Patriarch have been somewhat more attentive to the duties devolving upon them, in promptly forwarding their reports to the head of this Order, and would invite the delinquents to follow the worthy example of those who are diligently working for the welfare and prosperity of our order.

They congratulate the G. W. P. in having 10 good men who have reported themselves—and their doings at this session—and trust the time will soon come when all will see it to be their duty to faithfully perform the work they obligate themselves to do. They regret that here and there throughout our jurisdiction, there are Divisions languishing, and others unable or perhaps unwilling to lift their head. While on the whole, the Order generally speaking "is in a flourishing condition; and exhibiting signs of increased activity."

3. Your Committee would seriously and urgently recommend Divisional Deputies to ponder well their several duties as foreshadowed in the Report of the G. W. P., believing that were these important duties better understood and more faithfully and intelligently performed, our Order would today occupy a more exalted position, as "The efficiency of our organization very largely depends on the fidelity of Divisional Deputies in attending to these duties."

4. Our Lecturing Agency, and our Organ, the ALLIANCE JOURNAL, demand our most careful and serious consideration, whose work and interest should be kept prominently before the members of all our Subordinate Divisions.

Without money, the work cannot be carried on. How many are there among our 10,000 members who owe everything they possess to their adhesion to Temperance principles, and who yet, do comparatively nothing for the spread of these life-saving and life-giving principles.

If the laborer is worthy of his hire, then our Lecturer, and our ALLIANCE JOURNAL ought to receive a more extended support at the hands of those enlisted under our banner, by a more liberal response to the various appeals made for personal and monetary aid. Without these our work and our influence for good must soon cease. Your committee urgently recommend earnest personal and concerted effort on the part of our brotherhood; much could be done in that way. The giving of the widow's mite was commended by our Saviour. How few there are who follow her example in working for the spiritual or temporal welfare of our fellowmen; for with the many open doors, the recent formation of Reform Clubs, and other organizations, applying to us to come to their help, a more liberal response should be made in order that these effective arms of our work may be sustained.

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5. Your Committee are gratified to find that action has been taken by the Senate of the Dominion with reference to a Prohibitory Law; but while the passage of such a Law will possibly largely benefit our western friends, we, here in the east, and especially in this province, are far in advance of the proposed legislation,—our laws giving us Prohibition pure and simple.

Let us earnestly trust that Dominion Legislation will not deprive us of the blessings we now enjoy.

6. From the Report of the Grand Treasurer we find a large expenditure on account of our Organ the ALLIANCE JOURNAL.

Our paper at its present low price, one dollar per annum, should be taken more universally by our members; few there are who cannot afford that small sum annually for such an agreeable weekly visitor. Every Division should be up to its duty on this point, and aid the committee in charge in their responsible and arduous labor of Love, by recommending it to their friends and extending its circulation in every legitimate way. But for the bonus from an investment in the N. S. B. B. Society due in March last, our general fund would have been largely overdrawn at this date; and any balance now on hand will be required to meet pressing liabilities for the ALLIANCE JOURNAL committee's work, while our Agency Fund needs replenishing.

This Grand Division will surely not expect the Agency Committee to assume personal responsibilities on their behalf, in employing a Lecturer to do the work required by this body. If agency work is to be done in the future as in the past, then "ways and means" must be devised by those for whom the work is performed. The vantage ground we have obtained must be retained at all hazards, and means are required to do it. Let the part liberality be exhibited at the present time, so that our Agency committee will be in a position to devise liberal things.

7. Our Lecturer, Bro. Hutchings' extended Report of recent work, details an amount of earnest and arduous effort during this Quarter as must commend him to the favorable consideration of every Temperance organization in our province; truly our Brother has been "instant in season and out of season," having visited portions of Annapolis, Kings, Hants, Pictou, Guysboro', Antigonish and Colchester Counties from January 23rd to April 23rd, inclusive; having held 170 meetings, travelled, as we learn from his report, 1015 miles, addressed over 9,000 persons, and nearly 2000 children in public and Sabbath Schools, besides distributing thousands of Tracts; and we would earnestly urge the friends of the cause wherever he may visit, to use every effort in their power to "speed on the good work" by liberal contributions, donations, &c., &c.

The ALLIANCE JOURNAL Committee would inform the Grand Division that the arrangement with Messrs. Sancton & Piper for publishing at Bridgetown, is resulting in every way satisfactorily.

The circulation which has increased in some three hundred copies since last year, is yet very far short of what it ought to be, considering the number of organizations and individual activity engaged in promoting the cause we advocate. As all Temperance bodies have their meetings noticed in our columns, there is certainly a lack of consideration or of true liberality on the part of other Temperance Organizations, in allowing the Grand Division, who have been pioneers in this useful work, to have their resources continually and heavily taxed, for maintenance of a publication which is avowedly effective for the general benefit. We naturally look to other bodies for effort to extend the circulation of the JOURNAL.

Your Committee are of opinion that much more might be done by some of our numerous Subordinate Divisions to increase the circulation beyond what it at present is. It is discreditable to our Order, that with nearly ten thousand members in Nova Scotia they cannot unitedly and individually secure from among their own number, and from members of Lodges and Reform Clubs, and the general public more than one thousand subscribers for the only Temperance paper in the Province; and that one delivered by mail for one dollar a year.

Your Committee hope, that the members assembled in Grand Division for this session will, on dispersing, resolve to bestir themselves in their several Divisions and localities; and show their appreciation of a Temperance Press, by active efforts in behalf of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL. The paper would be a useful visitor in every family, Lodge, Reform Club and Division Room; and your Committee concur fully in the expression given at the last annual session relative to its being of paramount importance for the maintenance of the Temperance Cause in this Province, and for the prestige of our Order, and also for their further successful progress.

I have also to thank Thomas Hutchings, P. G. W. P., Special Provincial Deputy, for a detailed report of the state of the Divisions visited by him in the Counties of Colchester and Cumberland.

From information derived from these as well as from other sources, I am pleased to report that notwithstanding the unfavourable circumstances which at this season of the year militate against our Divisions, the Order, throughout the jurisdiction is, upon the whole, maintaining its ground and making some progress. It is cause for mutual congratulation that we have in our Order a noble body of tried and war-worn veterans who abide at their post of duty, and sustain the life and energy of their Divisions with a perseverance that no adverse circumstances can discourage, and their rewards shall be gathered in the day when our cause shall be triumphant, and the light of heaven shall shine on a land redeemed from the curse of the rum-traffic.

From the County of Annapolis, however, the report is not encouraging. A number of the Divisions have been either absorbed or crippled by sister organizations. Against such organizations we cherish no sentiments of hostility. We meet them with open hand or give them a fair field and a " God speed you ! " But if our grand old Order does not vindicate its claim to

superiority in a competition with any existing rival organization; it is not because there is any defect in its constitution, or want of success in its history, but because its influence is paralyzed by the apathy and indifference of its own members.

Never in our history has a crisis occurred when it was more necessary that our Order should stand to the front than at this moment. The inevitable reaction is upon the Reform movement. Hundreds are returning to their cups. Alas! that the strength of moral principle and the obligations of the pledge should be so soon overcome by a vitiated appetite for strong drink! How many helpless captives, writhing in their bonds, are saying—

“ I see the right, and I approve it too,
Condemn the wrong, and yet the wrong pursue ? ”

Distinct and unequivocal is our call to enter the breach between the Reform Clubs and utter dissolution, and should we either from apathy or parsimony fail to execute our mission, we have reason to fear that Divine Providence may transfer the honour to those who shall be more worthy to wear it.

A number of enquiries have been addressed to this office respecting the characteristics and comparative merits of the Dominion Temperance Act, and I am confident that I speak the sentiments of the wisest members of our Order when I say that it would be highly inexpedient, if not suicidal, to take any steps at present towards bringing the act into force in any County of this Province.

The National Division of North America, closed its thirty-fourth Annual Session, in great harmony, on the 20th ult., in the city of Buffalo, N. Y. It is a striking mark of the perfection which our organization, after the experience of thirty-four years, has reached, that no amendments were made at that session to the constitutions of either the Subordinate or Grand Divisions; and unmistakable indications were afforded that, in the judgment of the National Division, our duty in the future is “ not to mend, but to keep ” our rules. Resolutions were adopted by the National Body prohibiting dancing at meetings under the sanction of the Order, and condemning the practice of extending patronage and support to liquor-selling hotels. An appeal was taken by the Grand Sentinel to the National Division, against a decision of this Chair, given at the last Quarterly Session, respecting the re-admission of expelled members. The National Division dismissed the appeal, and decided that “ an expelled member may be re-initiated in the Division expelling him, within six months, but cannot be initiated in any other Division.”

The attention of the National Division was given to the claims of the Order of Cadets of Temperance, and a Ritual was prepared and supplies provided for their use. Nor can the claims of this youthful organization be overlooked by any Son of Temperance who considers its importance not only as a training school, for indoctrinating the young in the principles of Temperance, but also as a *feeder and nursery* of our Division; and my knowledge of this Order, and attachment to it, prompts me to say that every Division that looks well to its future will not fail to countenance and encourage the Cadets of Temperance.

A Committee of the National Division reported in favour of *District Divisions*, and the National Body recommend the adoption of this new feature of our Order. It is worthy of the consideration of this Grand Division whether, in view of the present state of our Agency Fund, it would not be

wise to adopt this recommendation. I respectfully suggest that a special Committee be appointed to take into consideration the expediency of introducing District Divisions into this jurisdiction, such Committee to report at the Annual Session of this Body.

Once more I commend to my brethren of this Grand Division, the claims of the ALLIANCE JOURNAL and the Agency Fund. On these our Order must mainly depend for its propagation. It is deeply to be regretted that at a time when the labours of the Grand Division Agent are imperatively required in the field, the funds of this Body should be so largely absorbed in sustaining a paper which, considering its merit together with the numerical strength of our Order, ought to float without any such subsidy.

Your Committee have found Bro. Hutchings willing to continue his labors even with great uncertainty as to remuneration; and since the last quarterly session he has been employed for about six weeks in the counties of Colchester and Cumberland. He has not found as much support, pecuniarily, for the Agency as he had a right to expect; the friends of the cause in the several places he visited appear to have had too much confidence in the disposition of the general public towards our Missionary work. From the meetings held, and the number of persons in attendance, there can be no doubt of his mission having been a success in other ways; but the encouragement for continuance of Agency work at present is very small.

Your Committee, while making due acknowledgment for services rendered by many to the Agent as he journeyed, are pleased to mention those given by our Brother Robinson Thompson, of Bass River; he having been able as well as willing to give time and efforts in his behalf. Brother J. M. Chase, of Chebucto Division, a member of this Committee appealed to some of the citizens of Halifax, in company with our Brother Hutchings, and obtained about one hundred dollars. To all who have helped the work your committee would make grateful acknowledgment.

The Committee hope that the members of our Order throughout the Jurisdiction will feel called upon to make such arrangements for funds before the Annual Session, as will secure for the Agent employment for the next year, with fair remuneration. If our Cause is to succeed, and our people to be benefitted, there must be Agency work performed; and small contributions from many will serve for this purpose.

It cannot be supposed that our friends will be willing to have the Lecturing Agency discontinued; and as there is prospect of abundant fishery and full harvest, we naturally expect liberal gifts for support of this important work.

The Press is a powerful agent; and having a paper, our effort should be to make it as effective as possible.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

G. W. P. and Brethren of the Grand Division :

For the first time in the history of our Order, we are assembled in the pleasant village of Noel. This is a most appropriate spot for our fraternal gathering. After thirty years of warfare, with many defeats and many victories in our history, we are assembled on this pleasant July day of 1878, in a place where Prohibition by law, and in fact, is so firmly established as most positively to contradict the statement we so often have heard, and hear yet in many places, that "Prohibition, even if made law, could not be enforced." Where we are assembled the people are so intelligent that not a glass of intoxicating beverages can be purchased, and for thirty miles around us the traffic in strong drink has been completely driven out. Step by step has this work been accomplished by the persevering efforts of temperance men and women. At the close of a generation's history we find this district entirely freed from the curse of the rum-traffic. And many other districts in Nova Scotia also testify by similar freedom to the success and purity of our principles, and to the courage and consistency of temperance advocates. Let us
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take courage. There are other portions of our land not yet free from the drink traffic and they need the aid and sympathy of every true lover of his race. May we all remember that "Eternal Vigilance is the price of freedom."

During the past quarter the Order has fairly held its own. It has been in closest harmony with all the other Temperance Bodies and Temperance Workers in the Country. We are a united body in Nova Scotia, and in utmost harmony I may say throughout the Dominion. The Temperance bodies of the Dominion, a quarter of a million strong, are a power whose influence is felt in Legislative Halls as well as in all the departments of Civil Service and social life.

The youthful organizations in connection with our Order are well worth all the attention we can possibly bestow. A new edition of 1,000 copies of Rituals for Band of Hope, has been provided by the Grand Division, and a supply of membership cards has been ordered from England. The attention given by prominent members of our Order some years ago respecting the Order of Cadets of Temperance, has been followed by legal action of the National Division, and thus more prominence is given to a very important department of our work.

THE AGENCY WORK

during the past quarter has been satisfactorily conducted. Brother Hutchings has visited and lectured in many sections of the Counties of Cumberland and Colchester, a detailed statement of which is published in the ALLIANCE JOURNAL. The donation of \$100 from a few friends of the Cause in Halifax has materially strengthened this department by encouraging the Lecturer and the Committee in their, sometimes, apparently thankless efforts.

The seven weeks' work performed by our Agent during the past three months has done much good. No doubt much of the prosperity in Nova Scotia to-day arises from such quiet efforts during the past six years.

Owing to our early meeting this Session the financial accounts of the G. S. were closed on the 8th inst., instead of the usual time, the 20th; consequently only 27 returns have been received instead of some 75 the usual number reported. The Divisions in Hants County have manifested life and activity by their promptness in forwarding returns and tax. The sum of \$363.45, receipts of the quarter, compares favorably with other years.

THE PROSPECT

is good for Summer and Autumn work. We are stronger to-day than ever before in all the materials that constitute true power. And the liquor traffic is weaker than ever before. True, it is a mighty power yet, especially in the City of Halifax, where it seems strongly entrenched behind Wealth and Fashion and Church and State, but there are visible signs of decay. One of these signs is that no respectable man has gone into the traffic for several years, and in that time some who claimed respectability have retired or quietly dropped the trade. We have only to take courage and press on. Our fathers in the Cause had to labor under vast disadvantages; to us is given the lighter burdens and the apparently greater results; may we all prove worthy.

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Rev. G. O. Huestis, Chairman, read the Report of the Committee on the State of the Order. Resolved to consider the same by sections, which was done, and the Report as a whole was adopted subsequently :—

To the Grand Division :

It is matter of thankfulness to the Great Patriarch above, that the Order in this jurisdiction, not only retains its ground, but is advancing.

This intelligence would have been still more gratifying had it come from a greater number of Deputies. It is encouraging to know that two Divisions, have been organized during the quarter.

The reference of our chief officers to the reaction in the Reform Club movement, is deeply affecting, and should greatly stimulate us to renewed activities, and earnest prayer, that the erring may be kept from the pathway of ruin. The work to be done in this direction must be speedily done, or many now wavering in their minds will be lost to us forever.

While cherishing a fraternal feeling towards all temperance workers and organizations, let us not fail to vindicate, by earnest toil and good logic, the superior claims of the well-tried Order of Sons.

We cordially agree with our G. W. P. in his remarks on the recent legislation at Ottawa, bearing on the liquor traffic. While deeply convinced of the importance and advanced character of that enactment, as far superior to any previous law on the subject, we are not, however, disposed to accept it in lieu of our own excellent Provincial License Law.

The recent session of the National Division in the City of Buffalo, was characterized by many pleasing manifestations of brotherly love and zealous devotion to the cause of total abstinence. It was cause of regret that a jurisdiction so large as Nova Scotia should have had but one representative present at such a meeting. It is pleasing to state the fact that a Dominion man, G. W. Ross, of Ontario, was elected to the office of M. W. Patriarch, by acclamation.

The legislative body of the Sons is evidently growing in wisdom,—becoming more and more conservative.

The prohibition of dancing under the sanction of the Order, was doubtless a wise move. We need much vigilance and careful effort to save our divisions from becoming scenes of frivolity. The cause is too sacred to be benefitted by undus merriment.

The Cadet movement claims our continued, earnest and thoughtful attention. No youthful organization is better adapted than this to become a nursery to our divisions. No temperance work produces more blessed results than that devoted to the interests of the young.

In reference to District divisions, we are not prepared for want of experience and observation, to give any counsel on the subject, but think it advisable that a committee be appointed to report at the ensuing Annual Meeting. We regret that the Agency committee is embarrassed for want of funds. Unless the "sinews of war" are forthcoming, there is little hope of signal victories from that quarter.

Bro. Hutchings has done good work for the Order, and is willing still to pursue his labor, but the laborer must have his hire, for he is worthy.

The same remarks apply to the ALLIANCE JOURNAL. It cannot be long

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continued without a more earnest co-operation of the friends of temperance. It is well conducted and deserves a large patronage.

Let us never indulge the idea that we can do without the aid of the press. Finally, let us endeavor to guard our people from the dangers that will surround them, from the influence of politics during the ensuing elections.

Sons of Temperance should be very careful in such times, not to allow the political to interfere with their temperance principles. Stand firm; dare to be true.

The managers of the "*Rose-bud Band of Hope*" submit herewith, their

"FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT,"

and are happy in being able to announce, not only its unbroken prosperity, but increased success in several ways

The "*Band*" has lost during the year *four members* by *death*, and several from leaving the city; and the usual proportion by striking names off the *Roll* for *absence* and *non-payment of Dues*; yet owing to the large numbers of admissions, there are more members on the *Roll*, than at the close of last year; it is gratifying also to state that a larger number attended the *Pic-Nic* than ever before.

The managers are pleased to say that more friends have visited the *Band* during the past year than any previous one; this is especially gratifying, as showing that the *Band* has achieved a reputation as a successful working body in the *Temperance cause*; it has also tended to strengthen the hands of the managers, and encourage them in their work.

The *Band* itself paid a visit as in the previous year to the *Grand Division* at its *Annual Session* in Halifax, in November last, and exhibited its members and mode of working in the presence of the *Grand Division*, going through the ceremonies of *Opening, Initiation, and Closing*. The members of the *Grand Division* expressed themselves as very highly pleased at the efficiency and good management of the *Band*, and it is known that the visit had a good effect.

In November a fire occurred in *Temperance Hall*, by which the *Property* of the *Band* was considerably injured, though no ultimate loss was sustained, owing to the prudent foresight of the managers of

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the previous year, who had the *property* insured ; the estimated amount of damage was promptly paid by the office (*Queens*), in which the insurance had been effected, and the managers were thus enabled to again put the material of the Band in good working order.

The effect of the fire was felt most seriously, however, in the inconvenience of being out of the *old quarters* ; children like *cats* are uncomfortable in strange garrets ; the room used temporarily as Division Room while the *old Hall* was undergoing the necessary repairs were entirely too small for the meetings of the *Band*, and the managers were forced to seek larger accommodation elsewhere. This was obtained through the kindness of the trustees of Poplar Grove church, in the room used as their Sunday school, in the immediate neighbourhood of the *old Hall*, and there they remained under a nominal rent, until the Division Room was ready for re-occupation, when the *Band* again sought shelter under the wings of its Patrons, and was taken in.

The "*Winter Entertainment*" with its usual attractions of *Essays, Games, &c.*, was held on the 15th Feb., and the "*Annual Pic-Nic*" at *McNab's*, on the 24th July ; *three hundred members* were present at the latter, the *Excursion* was well patronized by the public ; the results being a considerable surplus, a portion of which was expended on a subsequent Excursion and Pic-Nic for the managers and their assistants ; the balance, surplus from *Pic-Nic Excursion* \$14.28, has been paid to the Treasurer for the benefit of the General Fund.

A large number of *new Regalias* have been made during the year, so that 300 children can be put on the street fully clothed and equipped with *Regalias, Flags, Banners*, and everything complete. Although the managers do not wish to be boastful they believe that the organization which the Division placed in their hands is as complete a one as can be found anywhere,—self-supporting, with the single exception of the place of meeting—a favour which is not undervalued by the *Band*, the dues are paid regularly and promptly :

G. W. P. then read the following report, which was on motion, referred to the Committee on officers Reports :

GRAND SECTION OF CADETS OF TEMPERANCE OF THE PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

DIVISION ROOM, TEMPERANCE HALL,
 HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 12th, 1878.

To the Representatives of the Grand Section Cadets of Temperance of the Province of Nova Scotia, assembled at the Sixth Annual Session.

HONORED AND WORTHY BROTHERS,—

We meet this day in the interest of our beloved Order, to spread the principles of Truth, Virtue, and Temperance throughout the land. Fully impressed with their importance, we have come up from different portions of our widely extended field of labor, with a desire to do what in us lies, to further the object of our mission, by preventing the youth of our land from entering the paths of the destroyer.

The past history of our Order should commend it to the favourable consideration of every Division of Sons of Temperance, situated in all the larger towns and villages in this Province. Our success in the past has been in accord with the interest taken, and it is safe to say that great, and lasting good has been conferred upon all who have maintained the principles of *Total Abstinence* inviolate, and even to those who may not now be connected with us; it is also safe to say that their association with the *Cadets of Temperance* has not been without its beneficial results, the only regret is that the sphere of our operations has been so limited, owing mainly to the peculiar position in which we are placed by the senior organizations admitting members at 14 years of age, instead of 18 years, which was the standard years ago, and ought to be this day.

It would be well for this Grand Section to consider the practicability of presenting a memorial to the *Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance* of Nova Scotia to make an effort to change the age for the admission of members to 16 years, instead of 14, as at present.

It is a very great source of pleasure to me, to know that the Order of *Cadets of Temperance* occupies so large a place in the affections of the members of the older Order of the Sons; that our efforts in the past have won for us a good name which is rather to be chosen than great riches. Let it be ours to retain the vantage ground we have gained, looking forward to a more exalted position in the future.

No. 6;

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During the past year, two new Sections have been added to the roll, viz:—

Victoria, Section, No. 13, located at Windsor, in Hants County, organized by the G. W. Patron, assisted by members of Avon Division, on the 11th day of March, with 16 charter members.

Memorial Section, No. 14, located at Amherst, in Cumberland County, organized by the G. W. Patriarch, (under special commission) assisted by members of Amherst Division, on the 10th of May, with 24 charter members. Both of these Sections are prospering at the present time, and bid fair to be of valuable service to our Cause in the future.

It is a source of regret to me to have to report any of our Sections as having gone down or even to say for a time that they have ceased working; in this connection,

Canning Section, No. 1, located at Canning, in Kings County, Oxford Section, No. 4, located at New Glasgow, in Pictou County.

Rising Minor's Section, No. 8, located at Oxford in Cumberland County, may be considered as dead.

St. George's Section, No. 6, located in the northern portion of our city, has not met for some weeks, but an effort will be made before long to bring it into working order again. It is to be hoped that this Section may succeed, and it ought, for the Division in that locality (Northern Star) is among the most active Divisions of our older Order of the Sons of Temperance.

It affords me a great degree of pleasure to report, Acadia Section, No. 2, located in Halifax, still occupying the front rank in the order. The meetings are well attended (especially so this summer); the interest is well kept up; and the business of the Section is done in a manner which reflects very great credit upon the members, and upon all who are interested in the progress of the Section.

Bro. John E. Butler, the Deputy for Acadia Section, says:

"In submitting my report for the year just ending, I would take the opportunity to congratulate the Grand Section, as well as yourself, on the rapid advance made during the year in the principles of our Order. If there ever was a time when the youth of our land needed such an Order as ours it is at the present.

I am happy to report Acadia Section (of which I have the honor to be Deputy) in very good condition, with a good average attendance, and although all its members do not take an active interest in it as they might, I am confident it will compare favourably in that respect with any similar organization in the city."

St. Andrew's Section, No. 7, located at Pictou Town, is, as far as I can learn, in efficient working order. This Section has been the means of doing a vast amount of good. May it continue to prosper.

Excelsior, No. 11, located at Yarmouth. Of this Section I have not heard anything for some time. It must be working, however, for the Cadets were accorded a position in the great Jubilee demonstration recently held in Yarmouth.

Headlight Section, No. 12, located at Springhill Mines. Of this Section I can speak personally, as I had the pleasure of visiting it officially in May last. It is working very well indeed. They gave \$2.00 to the agency fund of the Grand Division. The Deputy, Bro. Drummond, says:

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"Though our number is now less than it was last winter, yet those who take an interest in the Section are in no way discouraged. That our membership would decrease in the summer months was to be anticipated. Indeed, when our peculiar situation is taken into the account, I can only congratulate those who now constitute the Section on their fidelity. The great majority of the boys are workers in the coal mines, out of the light 10 or 11 hours each day. I am not, therefore, greatly surprised that they should wish to make the most of the daylight left them after quitting work, by engaging in out-of-door sports, &c. We anticipate a large accession to our numbers during the coming fall and winter months."

Victoria Section, No. 13, located at Windsor. Of the present state of this Section the Deputy, Brother J. W. Smith, writes:

"Our Section is doing well. We have as fine a lot of boys as you can find anywhere in the County. We hope to have one hundred members by the end of the present quarter."

Memorial Section, No. 14, located at Amherst. Have not have had a report since its organization, but I know the Section is in excellent working order.

Tilley Section, No. 1, located at Charlottetown, P. E. I. It is a source of deep regret to me that I am not in a position to report as to the present state of this Section, as I have not had a letter from the Deputy for some time past. It is just possible that the Grand Secretary may have some information bearing upon the position of this Section.

New Dominion Section, No. 2, located at Charlottetown, P. E. I. Of this Section the Deputy, Bro. W. W. Beer, G. Associate Patron, writes:

"I regret very much in presenting my report for this quarter, that I have to acknowledge our Section in a less prosperous condition than I should have liked. Of course we know that at this particular season of the year it is difficult to secure a large attendance. We are happy to be able to sustain the Section, and we are expecting that the coming autumn and winter months may find us enjoying a large share of prosperity."

In summing up the position of our Order from all the information we have received, and from personal observation, I think it is safe to say that we are somewhat in advance of last year, as we have succeeded in introducing the Order in two of the most important towns in our Province. The most important question now is, "How can we introduce the Order in other places?" With a view to the solution of this problem I have, during the past few weeks, written to the most reliable persons in the following places, viz:—Wolfville, Berwick, Bridgetown, Granville Ferry, Annapolis, Digby, Lunenburg, Sydney, North Sydney, Sydney Mines, Little Glace Bay, and Cow Bay, and have received replies from three places only, Digby, Annapolis and Bridgetown, one of an encouraging nature, the others doubtful. It is my opinion that a personal visit, with a distinct object in view, and that of organizing Sections, would be the best plan. No doubt the Committee to whom this report will be referred will consider this very important matter.

As soon as possible after the last Annual Session closed, according to instructions given to the Executive, it was deemed advisable to arrange the different alterations made in our Laws, have them printed and attached to the stock of Constitutions and Bye-Laws on hand. This has been attended to by our excellent brother the Grand Secretary.

Shortly after the close of the last Annual meeting, I was called upon to go to the Island of Newfoundland, to labor for 3 months in the interests of the Grand Division of that colony. During that time every effort was made to enlist the sympathies of the members of the Order of the Sons of Temperance in the Order of Cadets. At the close of my labors, I found that nothing could be done to the advantage of our Grand Section in expending the sum of money placed at my disposal, and therefore it has been refunded back again to this Grand Section.

During the past few weeks, a copy of the New Ritual for Subordinate Sections as published by the National Division, has come to hand. To my mind it is a poor affair, coming very far short of our own. It is to be regretted that such a Ritual as would meet the approval of all parties interested in the prosperity of our Order, was not arranged for, as it is highly advisable that this organization should be in accordance with the National Division of the Sons of Temperance. This Ritual will no doubt be laid before us by the Grand Secretary, and it will be for us to say whether it shall be adopted by us or not.

I am fully in accordance with that part of Bro. Butler's report in reference to members who have passed through the chair in Subordinate Sections, and have become Honorary members, that they should be eligible to the office of Associate Patrons of the Section to which they belong, while they remain in good standing. It would be well for this Grand Section to consider the question, and so amend Article 4 of the Constitution of Subordinate Sections to meet the objection that has been so often raised by many of the members of our Order.

Since the last Annual meeting I have received a package of Band of Hope stock, from the Band of Hope Union of Great Britain, and among it was found what is called a "Senior Member's Card." It was impressed upon my mind that if it could be altered to suit our Order, it would be a fine thing for every member to possess a copy, so that in years to come he might be able to look back to the exact time when he became a member of the Order of Cadets of Temperance. With this object in view I wrote to the Secretary of the Union, and ascertained that for \$2.50 the alteration could be made, and that the price for 100 copies, alterations included, allowing 25 per cent for expenses of importation, &c., would be about \$21.00, thus placing a very neat and appropriate certificate (a copy of which is here presented) within the reach of all. I would strongly recommend that a supply of these certificates be obtained and furnished to Sections at cost price, with expenses added.

In reference to the "Circle of Honor," no doubt the notice of the motion made by the G. A. P. will come up for our consideration, when it is to be hoped that the members will take such action as will tend to make it of service to the Senior members of the Order, or else abandon it altogether; let us come to some definite decision in the matter and act accordingly.

And now, dear brethren, it only remains for me to say that I most sincerely trust that this Session of our Grand Section may be one of harmony and brotherly love. Let all our efforts tend to spread the principles of Truth, Virtue and Temperance throughout the land. In our intercourse with the world let us ever remember our pledge and keep it inviolate, so shall we be an honor to our country, and to the cause of all mankind.

The minutes of last evening's session were read and approved.

The Grand Secretary then read the following report, which was, on motion, referred to Committee on officers' reports :

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REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY CADETS OF TEMPERANCE, PRESENTED AT THE SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE GRAND SECTION OF N. S.

HALIFAX, N. S., August 13th, 1878.

Worthy Brothers,—

A year has passed away since our last meeting. It seems but a short time ago since we met in Annual Session in the pleasant City of Charlottetown and enjoyed the hospitality of our Island brethren, and we can scarcely realize that a year has passed. We gather together again in Annual Session to review the past, discuss the present, and plan for the future work and prosperity of our beloved Order, and in this connection it will not be out of place to glance over the record of the year which has passed.

At the last Annual Session there were reported 7 Sections with a total membership of 303, against 10 Sections and 355 members at the Session of 1876. At the present time there are in working order 7 Sections with a membership of about 350. The figures are taken from the latest returns I have in my possession, (although I have not heard from one of our largest Sections for two quarters, and another has suspended for a short time) so that we are in fact very little ahead of where we were twelve months ago. There is food both for contemplation and discussion in the foregoing figures. How is it, that although we are introducing the Order into various parts of the Province we still seem to gather very little strength in point of numbers? This is a subject which might well be taken hold of by the "Sons" individually and as a body. By our constitution we are to look to them for assistance in fostering this young branch of the Great Reform army, and enabling it to extend its operations throughout the length and breadth of this Dominion of ours; and as it is one of our fundamental principles that we must look to them for aid in carrying on our work, so ought they to be ready to help when they are called upon, or the way is opened in which they can by a little self-sacrifice, aid in doing that which is calculated to bless alike the young and old of our country. It is greatly to be regretted that the "Sons" as a body are not ready and willing to make the little sacrifice necessary to accomplish so great, so good, and so glorious an end.

FINANCES.

As you will have observed by the Grand Treasurer's report, this important auxiliary is in a healthy condition. The total receipts for the year as per Financial Statement are \$111.93. Of this amount \$44.38 was contributed as the net proceeds of a Dramatic Entertainment given by members of the Order, in Charlottetown, last summer. This very generous act on the part of the Halifax members has been of great help to the G. S. The expenditure for the year was \$52.32 leave a balance of \$60.33 to the credit of the Grand Section. The greatest economy has been exercised in the expenditure, nothing having been printed or purchased that was not absolutely necessary.

STOCK.

We have enough Stock on hand at present to last for some time. I regret that a press of business has prevented me from preparing an inventory of the amount on hand.

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NEW RITUAL.

As the members of the Order are aware, the National Division of the Sons of Temperance appointed a Committee to prepare Ritual, &c., for Cadets, proposing to take the Order under its own immediate supervision. Our American brothers seem to have objected to this and are of opinion that the Order will prosper and flourish more, as a distinct and independent body, and with this end in view they organized a "National Section Cadets of Temperance of North America" and invited us to enter that body: As yet this Grand Section has taken no decided steps in the matter. I received a communication some time since from the Most Worthy Secretary, in which he asked if we are willing to be under and governed by the N. S. of N. A. To this I replied in effect, that for the present this G. S. did not feel disposed to rally round that flag, but could not say what might be done in the future. I commenced this section of my report intending to speak of the new Ritual, but have wandered from the subject. As stated in the report of the G. W. P. the book is a failure. I perfectly agree with him in this. Time will not permit of an extended notice of the work. The books are on the table for the inspection of any brother; in my opinion the order, if carried on in the manner contemplated by the Ritual and Constitution issued by the National Division, had better be abolished and re-organized under the title of the "Band of Hope."

MISCELLANEOUS.

Among other matters to come before you for discussion is a notice of motion to change the names of the officers of the "Circle of Honor," also notice of motion to appoint a special committee to prepare a Funeral Service; also Installation Ceremony for Chaplain, in Subordinate Sections.

As was done last year the Journals of the Annual Session have been printed in phamplet form. We have as yet received no bill for this work, whether we are indebted to the Grand Division for it, or are to be the happy recipients of a bill at some future day, I cannot say. It is very interesting to the members of the Order and of considerable use in making the Order known, to have these Journals printed. We have for some years been indebted to the Grand Division for publishing the minutes of our Sessions, both in the ALLIANCE JOURNAL and in the Journals of the Grand Division. Within these last two years we having decided to meet only semi-annually, and the Grand Division now publishing only a Year Book, and not meeting till November, we are compelled to wait for nearly six months before we get our Journals. I would suggest that this Grand Section might vote a sum for the purpose and, by charging the members a small price, we might, by this means, raise enough to very nearly pay the whole of the cost of printing. I submit this matter to your favorable consideration.

CONCLUSION.

In closing this report I complete the fifth year of service as your Grand Secretary. During this time I have endeavoured to perform the duties of the office to the best of my ability, and if I have made mistakes (as the best of us will do) they have been unintentional, and I trust any short comings on my part will be forgotten and forgiven. I cannot conclude without expressing my thanks to the G. W. P., to Bro. J. E. Bulter, and the other

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members of the Order, for the universal courtesy and kindness extended toward me in my official capacity.

Trusting that our meeting will be one of harmony and brotherly love, this report is respectfully submitted in

To the G. W. P., Officers and Members of the Grand Section, Cadets of Temperance of the Province of Nova Scotia :

Your committee on Grand Officers reports beg leave to state that they have before them for consideration the report of the Grand Worthy Patron.

We are also pleased to meet the members of the Grand Section in annual session to legislate upon the means best adapted to further the interests of the great cause for which we are associated, and hope that the session will be beneficial to the more general success of this particular branch of the Temperance army.

With regard to the memorial to the Grand Division, proposing the alteration of the age of admission to the Order of the Sons of Temperance, from 14 to 16 years, your committee think that such an alteration is necessary for the welfare of our Order, and recommend that such a memorial be prepared.

We are pleased to notice that two new Sections have been formed during the past year, and while wishing them great prosperity, trust that this may be an incentive to stimulate us to renewed activity in endeavouring to establish new sections in the unrepresented parts of our province.

We regret that some of our sections have been dormant for some time past, and hope that an effort will be made to induce them to shake off their lethargy and again fall into line.

Your committee is of opinion that a visit from the G. W. P. as a special agent from the Grand Section to establish sections in the various towns of the Province would meet with that success which it so richly deserves, and would suggest that an amount of money should be placed at his disposal for this purpose.

We regret that it was beyond the power of our G. W. P. to place the Order on a footing in the Island of Newfoundland, notwithstanding his earnest efforts in that direction.

Your committee think it would be a step in the right direction to grant subordinate sections the privilege of electing honorary members to the position of Associate Patrons.

We would recommend the immediate importation of a number of certificates of membership, as per sample presented by our G. W. P., at last night's meeting, and that the executive be requested to make the necessary alteration.

In closing this report your committee beg to recognize the great amount of good done to our order by the efforts of the G. W. P., so ably seconded by the Grand Sec'y, and hope that these two brothers who have worked so incessantly for the promotion of our cause will long be enabled to labour among us for the furtherance of those principles which we hold so dear, and the elevation of our standard of Truth, Virtue and Temperance.

TEMPERANCE STATISTICS.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—Under the control of the National Division of North America, there are 38 Grand Divisions, 1,976 Subordinate Divisions, and 90,000 members. Under the control of the National Division of Great Britain and Ireland there are 50,000 members. Since the Order of the SONS was instituted in 1842, no less than THREE MILLIONS of men have taken the pledge and have been initiated into the Divisions. So much has this Order done for the cause and for the benefit of other Orders, that the chief promoters of every other Temperance Organization, and the most vigorous Temperance workers in Christendom, during the past quarter of a century, have received much of their training and enthusiasm in the Division Rooms.

THE INDEPENDENT ORDER OF GOOD TEMPLARS is comprised of 60 Grand Lodges throughout the world, embracing over 11,850 Primary Lodges, numbering 735,000 members.

THE BRITISH TEMPLARS (U.T.O.) and affiliated Societies include a membership of 100,000 in the Dominion of Canada, and in Great Britain and her Colonies. The various Church Temperance Societies, open Temperance Societies, Rechabites, Sons of Jonadab, Friends of Temperance (which have largely taken the place of Divisions of the Sons throughout the Southern portions of the United States), Women's Temperance Unions, Reform Clubs, &c., &c., aggregate nearly as many more Total Abstainers and Temperance workers as those enumerated above.

By these figures it will be seen that Nova Scotia has more than twice as many pledged members in working Temperance Societies in proportion to her population than the whole Dominion; no less than fourteen per cent. of her whole population being thus enrolled, and upwards of twenty-five per cent. of the adult population. Probably no Country or State can show so good a record as this.
