The whole revenue of this congregation is derived from weekly contributions by envelope and the plate collections.

All subscribers by envelope are supplied with envelopes on the first Sunday in each quarter.

Members and adherents who are not subscribers may be supplied with envelopes on application to any of the managers.

All subscribers are expected to contribute a fixed sum weekly, and if, from any cause, they are unable to do so, they shall be expected to make up all deficiencies at their earliest convenience.

Subscribers wishing to increase or decrease their contributions are requested to notify the managers, so that a corresponding alteration may be made in the books.

Subscribers are particularly requested to see that their envelopes are properly sealed and their names and pew number on the outside before they are handed in.

MISSIONARY COLLECTIONS

Collections for the Mission Schemes of the Church are received by envelope on the last Sunday of each month, and are placed in the boxes which will be found on entering the church, just inside the doors.

If not convenient to give on the last of the month, any other time will do.

Envelopes will be found by any who wish them, in the small boxes at the church doors.

It is expected that, as far as possible, subscribers will give a definite sum every month, and if subscribers fall in arrears they will be notified of the same as often as the committee think it best.

Disj

Session Statement for 1898

As a Session, in the kind providence of God, we are brought again to the season at which it is our privilege to make a statement of the happenings of the year. We have been able, not as a unit we regret to say, but as we are, to discharge the duties devolving upon us with a very considerable degree of satisfaction. Our membership continues as last year, with the exception that on account of continued absence from the city, the resignation of Mr. Laird has been accepted.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was regularly observed each quarter. At the March communion, 738 participated; at the June one, 719; September, 589; December, 677.

Fourteen male infants were baptised during the year, eleven females; one male adult and four female adults.

The membership is 999. 44 were added on profession of faith and 24 by certificate. 42 withdrew by certificate, most of them leaving the city. 8 deaths occurred during the 12 months, some of them members of long standing.

The year has been one of decidedly mixed experiences, but on the whole we are able gratefully, as represented by this report, to thank God and take courage.

FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Board of Managers of Knox Church

For the Year Ending December 31st, 1898.

Your Board of Managers take pleasure in presenting this their fifty-fifth annual report, and although we are unable to report any great financial gain, we have not gone back, and have a small balance to close the year 1898.

Your Board are pleased to report a small increase of \$46.88 in the envelope collections, but have to note a decrease of \$30.61 in the loose collections from those of last year, leaving a gain of \$16.27 on regular Sunday collections. The following are the exact figures as taken from the Treasurer's statement.

The number of subscribers by envelope for 1898 was 506 as against 452 for 1897. The average giving per Sunday by envelope for 1898 was \$91.37, and loose collections \$9.94, as against \$90.47 and \$10.53 for 1897.

There is still a large amount of arrearages on the books amounting to \$271.66, and allowing for those unable or unwilling to pay, your Board considers \$174.66 of this good and collectable. The rest will be marked off the books.

Your Board also wish to thank the members and adherents of the congregation who contributed so liberally towards the floating debt fund, there being 139 subscribers who gave a total of \$248.65.

The circulars sent out in regard to the weekly givings of pew holders and inviting those not having regular sittings to secure them and become subscribers to the church have been kindly received and quite a number have expressed their intention of becoming regular subscribers to the support of the church. Your Board after careful examination of the furnace below the pulpit found it unfit for further use, and have replaced it with a new one from Messrs. Burrow, Stewart & Milne, which is giving good satisfaction.

The kitchen has been painted and papered, improving the appearance very much, and will greatly add to the comfort of those whose duty require them to use this room.

Your Board have paid \$1,000 on the mortgage on the Sunday School. Of this amount \$392.00 was contributed by special collections and the remainder, \$615.00, by the School.

The Managers who retire by rotation are Messrs. Walter Turnbull, John Robertson and John Gillespie. W. J. McFadden having resigned at our last meeting, it will be necessary for the congregation to elect a fourth Manager to serve out his term.

In conclusion your Board recognize with thankfulness the manifest signs of spiritual and temporal prosperity, and express the hope that such may increase and that as pastor and people our efforts may be successful in advancing the Kingdom of Christ in our midst.

SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

-OF-

Knox Church Sunday School

For the Year 1808.

If there is any inference to be drawn by the casual observer from the record of Knox Church Sunday School for the year 1898 as it now stands before him, it must be that of the steady march of prosperity which has been characteristic of the sixty-second year in the history of this school. While no larger, perhaps, numerically, it has been greater in its attainments. Throughout the year strenuous efforts have been put forth for the furthering of the schemes of this School.

In the matter of attendance a recapitulation is herewith given, and it is left for those identified with the school and others less closely linked as regards regularity in attendance to judge for themselves whether or not the school is entitled to the sympathy and co-operation of the members of Knox Congregation, some of whom display little interest in the school work.

In a perusal of these figures the reader is brought into proximity with a very important detail of the school's working, and he should then allow the honor which is to be derived from such an admirable state of affairs to rest on someone, in which case it would inevitably fall to the lot of the Superintendent and his two assistants, together with the teachers and officers, who have striven long and laboriously for the welfare of the school.

As to the contributions for all purposes received from the scholars, a detailed account is given as follows:—General fund, \$253.74; building fund, \$189.94; Mission, \$340.23; a total of \$733.91, which speaks well for the generosity of the members of the school.

A scheme inaugurated within the last year, whereby teachers from both schools gather in the basement of the Church on Wednesday evenings, at 6.30 o'clock, to partake of bread and butter and tea or coffee, and which is paid for out of a fund collected by the teachers among themselves. An adjournment is then made to the Church parlor, where those who have gathered hear the facts and chronology of that part of the Bible pertaining to the following Sunday's lesson duly expounded.

During the year, by way of encouraging the scholars who take a lively interest in the Shorter Catechism, prizes were offered for the perfect memorization of that book, which seemingly small is in reality one of the most important appurtenances in the denomination of Presbyterianism. Alice Warrington, Jennie Anderson, Maude Lyddecote, Richard Garbett, Stella Slater, Andrew Warrington, Maggie and Mary Bonner are the ones who have received the proffered trophies as a reward for the diligence displayed in their search into a very important ingredient into the faith, for which the covenanters became martyrs centuries ago.

The last Christmas, save two, which this generation will see prior to the dawning of another century, was made memorable for families numbering about 40, who have been associated with this congregation. Being in less fortunate circumstances than is desirable at such a happy season of the year, it was proposed by the teachers that something should be done to alleviate the stress of hard times which had surrounded them, by sending them the proceeds of the donations of groceries and provisions, toys and candies which were contributed by the members of the school and amounted to about \$40.00 in value.

During the year twenty-seven scholars have joined the Church and three members of the school have passed to the great beyond.

After all the expenses had been met in connection with the affair, \$5.18 was realized out of the Sunday School picnic held at Grimsby Park on July 4th, and \$12.31 of a balance remains over and above all expenses in connection with the second school picnic at Toronto Island on July 27th.

The Chinese Department, started in the spring of the year, now has six scholars, with as many teachers. Some of the Chinamen are bright and learn quickly; but others are dull, one especially feigns ignorance when religious topics are discussed. Two can speak English fairly well and one taught the Sunday School lesson in Chinese. The men are visited at their places of business, and are made to feel at home while in the Church.

The year just closed has been one of the most successful in the history of the school. Our attendance has not increased very much, but in many respects our school has improved. Thirty of our scholars attended Sunday school every Sunday during the past year, and each of them received a suitable reward for their faithfulness. Our Infant class continues to grow. At present it numbers 62. We found our primary room entirely inadequate to accomodate them, and we decided to raise money and build a suitable room. With this in view, each teacher was allotted a district of our church membership to canvas, and we are pleased to say we were able to collect \$266.00 in this way. Plans for our new extension were drawn up, and Messrs. Donaldson & Patterson, whose tender, \$399.00, was the lowest, erected two very handsome brick rooms. These rooms were opened

early in the fall entirely free from debt. One is used as a primary room and the other as a Young Men's Bible Class room. We take this opportunity of thanking all in the congregation and mission who so generously helped us.

Notwithstanding the large outlay for our new building, we were able to give \$25.00 towards the mission schemes of the church.

We are looking forward for greater things in the future, and our prayer is that God will make us faithful in this work, which He is so abundantly blessing.

More teachers are needed for a number of small classes, wont you come and help us?

In presenting this report we rejoice to give thanks to God that we have been privileged to do something for the spread of the knowledge of the Gospel at home and abroad, and that our labors have been appreciated by those who have received the benefit. However, we cannot but think that much more could be done if our congregation were only in earnest in carrying out our Master's command "to preach the Gospel to every creature."

The amount given through the missionary boxes, \$552.77, is a little below that given in 1897, and the number of subscribers whose names appear on our books is also below last year, being only 126. We have also to report that instead of raising \$250.00 for the support of a Missionary in the North West only \$132.00 has been subscribed by members of the congregation, all of which seems to indicate that our interest in missions is on the decline.

During the past year a larger amount of missionary literature has been distributed in the congregation than for many years past, no less than 194 persons taking the Presbyterian Record. As a congregation we have been indebted to the Rev. Kenneth McKenzie, Missionary to Honan, for a very stirring address, and to Rev. John Young of this city, for two lectures on the mission fields of our church, viz: Trinadad and New Hebrides, accompanied with lime light views. A very interesting letter from Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of missions in the North West, was received and read, also two from Mr. A. E. Armstrong, a student of Knox College, laboring at Kippewa, Oue. As a

committee we have sought to lay before the congregation at the monthly prayer meeting such information as we could secure, and some interesting papers were read, which we hope were not without effect.

We sincerely thank the Young Ladies' Mission Band for canvassing the congregation for the Presbyterian Record, also for donating \$10.00 for the North West mission fund.

In looking forward to the work of another year we express the hope that a greater interest may be manifested in this important work, and that we may be found doing our best for those who are not so highly blessed as we are.

OF

Knox Church, Hamilton

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Grounds, and any other houses or real estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the congregation, shall be held in trust by three members of the said congregation, in full communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the sixth day of September, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in full communion with the congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the members of the congregation, which shall have been called from the pulpit of the Church by the officiating Minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of Elders shall be determined from time to time by the Session, as occasion may require, but the election shall be by the members of the congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in clause third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine Managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occuring by a resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings, without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall select their own Chairman, Treasurer, and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings either from the pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Three Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more members of the congregation in full standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any special meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular chartered bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, moneys from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the congregation shall be under the control of the Managers with the concurrence of the Minister.

oth.—The whole revenues of the congregation from all sources shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of stipend, salaries, and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the congregation. The "Poor Fund," however, shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for missionary and benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The members of the congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate statement of the income and expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the annual meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the congregation at any special or annual meeting.

13th.—A committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of the Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting, and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be chairman of the said committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing Rules shall be in force until altered or amended, and no motion to alter or amend said Rules shall be put unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the congregation. and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the congregation shall be called to consider the same, not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing Rules no one shall be held to be a member of the congregation who is not in full communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said congregation, and no others than members in full communion shall be allowed to vote at any congregational meeting.
