

WHY DISCRIMINATE? The schedule of electric rates as nounced by the town council are not as low as many users of electric power had believed to expect, and in some respects are a direct discrimination against the users of electricity for power purposes.

Take the minimum rate\_No discount is allowed upon accounts up to \$10.00, while over that amount and up to \$19.99, 5 per cent. is allowed. This is a discrimination of 5 per cent. against the power user, as users of electric light using \$10. 00 or more monthly are allowed 10 per cent. Then twenty-five cents per month, or \$3.00 per year is charged for meter rent as against ten cents per month or \$1.20 per year to light users.

This means that the Graphic and other establishments which have installed electric motors, will be obliged to pay 10c per kilowatt, or as much as the smallest user of light in the town, and besides pay 15 cents additional meter rent. The discounts are too low and the amounts upon which discounts

are allowed are too high. As an instance-What industry here using power would use \$50.00 per month or \$600. per year and from this amount only 25 per cent is deducted, making the rate 7 1-2 cents per kilowatt. If this discount was allowed off of amounts of \$20.00 or more it would be reasonable.
