Bathurst maintained its lead in the former rink and won out by a score of 18 to 13. On the other rink, however, both teams fought desperately for the lead right up to the last. Dalhousie won by a score of 19 to 11. Their total in the two rinks gave them a victory over their opponents, the final score as stated above being 31 to 29.

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**D. CHAMPOUX WAS INTERVIEWED**

**Enthusiastic About Bridge Across Restigouche—The Lumber Business**

The Quebec Telegraph of a recent date has the following interview:—  
That the lumber business is at present at a very low ebb and even lumbermen are unable to predict when an improvement will begin, is the statement made by Mr. David Champoux, president of the Campbellton, N. B., Board of Trade, manager of the Chaleurs Bay Mills and secretary-treasurer of the Matapedia Lumber Company, who, with his wife and daughter is at present staying at the Chateau.

Mr. and Mrs. Champoux and daughter are leaving on a three months' trip on Thursday next to France, Italy, Belgium and England. They will return to Canada in May next. They leave for Montreal to-morrow from whence they will go to New York and embark on La France.

Mr. Champoux was disinclined to discuss the lumber situation at all. The business is very bad he states, and at present there are no signs of improvement. The reason why, he cannot tell. When it will improve he has no idea.

He was much more enthusiastic, however, in discussing the necessity for the interprovincial bridge between Quebec and New Brunswick, stating that anyone who knew the country there could not fail to endorse the project. A delegation of Campbellton residents, he states, will wait on the Quebec government to-morrow in an endeavor to rouse more interest in the project and to point out the great mutual advantage that would result to both provinces by the erection of the bridge.

It would appear that it is proposed to divide the cost between the Dominion, Quebec and New Brunswick, the Ottawa Government to pay half and the two provinces each 25 per cent of the cost. New Brunswick, he states, is ready at any time to put up her share of the cost and he hopes that as a result of the delegation meeting with the Quebec government that this province will feel the same about the project.

Mr. Champoux denies the rumor that he has disposed of his timber limits in Quebec and states he has no intention of doing so. His visit to Europe is in no way connected with business.

Mr. Champoux has varied interests in Nova Scotia and Quebec. He is manager of the Chaleurs Bay Mills, secretary of the Matapedia Lumber Compagnie Champoux, lumber and Company, secretary-treasurer of La mill owners, who hold limit and freehold land at Restigouche and Quebec. He is also president of the Couture Rheault, Ltd., Mout. Joli, Quebec, a director of the Canadian Forestry Association and a director of the Southern Fire Protection Association.

**DEFINITE ANSWER WITHIN TEN DAYS**

**Dominion Government Ministers Promise Early Consideration of Bridge Matter.**

The delegation composed of Messrs. W. D. Duncan, D. A. Stewart of the Campbellton Board of Trade, Thos. K. Busted and Hugh Sellars from the Municipality of Mann returned Saturday from Ottawa, and are very enthusiastic. They are confident that the Dominion government will place in the estimates for this year a sum sufficient to carry on the work. The delegation was given an attentive hearing by Mr. McCurdy, Minister of Public Works, and Mr. Wigmore, New Brunswick's Cabinet Minister, both of whom promised to bring the matter of a grant before the Council immediately and support same. These gentlemen promised a definite answer within ten days. It is altogether likely the matter will be dealt with on Saturday next.

The whole matter is now up to the Dominion government. If the answer is favorable, the necessary surveys will be made at once and by next fall tenders will be called for so that the work might be commenced during next winter.

**DALHOUSIE.**  
Dalhousie, Mar. 15.—On Wednesday the Dalhousie Curlers had as their guests four of Campbellton's strongest rinks. Play started in the morning at an early hour and continued until the dinner hour. Dalhousie's rink led by Andrew Barberie succeeded in beating Fred P. Wetmore's rink by a score of 17 to 10. At the same time S. L. T. Clifford was leading a rink against R. K. Shives of Campbellton, and he, too, succeeded in bringing his team victory, the score being 14 to 10. In this game Mr. Clifford played his best game this year.

In the afternoon J. B. McKay of Dalhousie lined his rink up against Max Mowat. The game was a walk-over for Mr. McKay, Dalhousie winning out by 20 to 2. The other rink was occupied by James Gould's rink of Dalhousie and Thomas Wran's of Campbellton. Be it said to Jim's credit that he played a masterly game. The scoring was close throughout, but Dalhousie came out the victors by 13 to 11.

It is interesting to note, that with the exception of Mr. Andrew Barberie, who is one of the old curlers, all three who led the Dalhousie rinks are young curlers, and judging by the way they have been playing all winter, Dalhousie will be a dangerous contender for next winter's curling honors.

**Chatham Would Like to Play Sussex At Bathurst Rink.**

Efforts are being made to bring a Chatham and Sussex hockey team together on the big ice surface at Bathurst. The game at Moncton, in view of the incompetency of the Referee, turned out to be a farce, and was not in any way the test of the relative strength of either team. The M. P. B. of A. A. U. of C. officials did not display enough interest in the game to have a competent official in charge. It was to have been expected that two referees, one representing each league would handle the match. Several influential citizens of Bathurst, with Mr. W. J. Fenwick as the active promoter, are desirous of seeing the teams at Bathurst. Chatham has expressed its willingness to play there and the decision of the Sussex team in the matter is being awaited. If the Sussex boys are good sports they will accept the proposition made to them by Bathurst, which we understand to be very attractive.—Chatham World.

**OPEN COUNTRY FOR TOURISTS**

**Roadway Down Matapedia Valley a Great Benefit to Whole Province.**

March 16.—A large and representative delegation will arrive in the city tomorrow from the counties of Rimouski, Matane, Temiscouata, Bonaventure and Gaspé to urge upon the Government in order to press their claim for the nationalization of the roadway from Riviere du Loup to the Gaspé coast, via Mont Joli and Causapscal.

The delegation will consist of the mayors and councillor of the various municipalities and their prominent citizens. The representatives will meet at the Clarendon Hotel at 9:30 before proceeding to the Parliament Buildings to wait upon the Premier and several Ministers of his Cabinet.

There is not the least doubt that the object of this delegation is considered sympathetically by the Provincial Government. At the present time Quebec is receiving hundreds of thousands of American automobile parties, many of whom would continue down through the lower counties of Quebec to the Gaspé coast and from there on through New Brunswick, returning home to the United States via that province and Nova Scotia. Instead, they either turn at Quebec and retrace their way back to Montreal or cross the line on the Beaus-Jackman Highway, which results in a large financial loss to the province.

The cost of nationalizing the roadway from Riviere du Loup eastward to Matapedia will not be a heavy one and it is more than likely that the Provincial Government will do their utmost to carry out this project which will open up the eastern parts of the province to the general welfare of all concerned.

**HON. CHAS. MARCIL ASKS QUESTIONS**

Getting Information in Reference to Railway, Mail and Bridge Matters.

The following question and answers taken from Hansard of Friday, March 4th, referring to our public matters will be of interest to our readers:

**QUEBEC ORIENTAL AND A. Q. AND W. RAILWAYS.**

**MR. MARCIL (Bonaventure):**  
1. Has the Minister of Railways and Canals received any report from the Board of Railway Commissioners on the service given by the Quebec Western Railway? If so, has any action been taken on such reports?  
2. If no action has been taken is any contemplated in the public interest?

**Hon. Mr. REID (Grenville):**  
1. The Chairman of the Dominion Railway Board has unofficially made certain recommendations to the Minister of Railways and Canals, which have been taken into consideration. The Government is, however, unable to hold out any immediate hope that these railways will be taken over and included in the Canadian System.

**2. Answered by No. 1.**

**MR. MARCIL:**  
1. Has any rolling stock been leased or sold by the Canadian National Railway to the Quebec Oriental and Atlantic and to the Quebec & Western Railways during the past year? If so, what amount?  
2. Was any application made by the companies mentioned for any such rolling stock?

**Hon. Mr. REID (Grenville):**  
1. Two coaches and one baggage car have recently been rented to the Quebec Oriental Railway by the Canadian National Railway management.

**2. The Quebec Oriental Railway applied as indicated in answer to Question No. 1.**

**BONAVENTURE-GASPE RAILWAY SERVICE.**

**MR. MARCIL:**  
1. Has the Government taken any during the past year to improve the railway service in the counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé? If so, what action?  
2. Has any proposition of the Atlantic Quebec and Western, and the Quebec Oriental Railways, having for its object the linking up of those lines with the Canadian National System, by purchase, lease or otherwise? If so, what were these proposals and what action has been taken?

**Hon. Mr. REID (Grenville):**  
1. There has been no complaint as to the service provided by the Railway through the county of Bonaventure.

**2. Proposals have been made from time to time looking to the lease or purchase by the Government of the lines in question. No action has been taken.**

**CAMPBELLTON-CROSS POINT MAIL SERVICE.**

**MR. MARCIL:**  
1. Have any complaints been received by the Government or any of its members concerning the ferry service between Campbellton, N. B., and Cross Point, Quebec? If so, what was the nature of these complaints?  
2. Is any action to be taken to remove the ground of such complaint? If so, what action?

**Hon. Mr. BALLANTYNE:**  
1. Yes. That the ferry after 25th October, 1920, did not begin its trips until 7 a. m., instead of at 6 o'clock, as prescribed by the regulations, and that services were discontinued three weeks before the close of navigation.

**2. Yes. Instructions will be given to comply with the terms of the license: (b) The District Engineer reports that navigation was officially closed and all boats removed on 17th November, but the ferry did not stop until 25th November.**

**BONAVENTURE-GASPE MAILS.**

**MR. MARCIL:**  
1. Has the Post Office Department received any complaints during the past winter regarding the mail service in the counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé? If so, what was the nature of such complaint?  
2. Did the department authorize any curtailment or change in the railway mail service? If so, what, and why was such change authorized?

**Hon. Mr. DOHERTY:**  
1. Yes—the complaint was in regard to the railway being blockaded by snow and thereby disorganizing the mail service. Regular train and mail service has been resumed.

**2. The Department will not authorize any curtailment or change in the Railway Mail Service.**

**CAMPBELLTON BRIDGE.**

**MR. MARCIL:**  
1. Has the Government or any of its members received a request lately for the erection of a highway bridge over the Restigouche river between Campbellton, N. B., and Cross Point, Quebec?  
2. If so, (a) from whom and (b) what were the reasons?  
**Hon. Mr. McCURDY:**  
1. Yes.  
2. (a) From the Municipal Council of Escombin, the Campbellton Board of Trade and a large deputation which waited upon the Minister of Public Works in January, 1921; (b) the subject matter of the petition will have the most careful consideration.

Moncton, March 11.—A large number of fans saw the fast Sussex Amateur hockey team trim Chatham's team here last night in the local Arena, 8 to 5.

With the game went the honors of the N. B. Amateur Hockey Championship—the chess factory town players holding a very unique standing this year, having won from Charlottetown and finally from Chatham. Subsequently with the defeat of the Chatham team, it might be said, that her past hockey honors this season were crumbled and humbled.

The ice was heavy and individual play featured the game. Occasionally combination work was evidenced, but on the whole individuality, was the more noticeable.

For the losers the stars might be said to be the Rev. Father Spratt, Curry and Keoughan. For the winners LeClair and the Radcliffe brothers played a brilliant game, while Finnegan in the Sussex case showed his old time form and vigor.

Chatham's game was on the score board as lost after Father Spratt was sent to the penalty box in the first period. The Rev. Father had played his usual excellent game and when he went to the boards his team mates lost heart, and Sussex piled in the goals (when H. Radcliffe found the Chatham nets three times and LeClair dented the Chatham defence lines for the fourth tally.)

When the teams took the ice a discussion arose as to allowing the referee, Jimmy Lightizer, to continue. It was finally settled when George Jones took the whistle and Lightizer went on as Judge of play.

The period opened with some exciting work. Sussex showing the prowess of the game in a rink which she knew better than Chatham. Chatham found the Sussex net often, but Finnegan saved. In the third period Chatham bucked up and before the gong had sounded they had found the Sussex net three times in succession whereas Sussex failed to find the net—but once.

**Roger Flanagan.**

The death of Mr. Roger Flanagan, one of Chatham's most highly respected residents and a man who was well and favorably known all over the province, occurred Friday evening, about 8:30 o'clock, at his home, the Bowser House. Mr. Flanagan had been ill for over a year, with heart trouble, but his death was unexpected when it came last night. Deceased was a son of the late Martin Flanagan of St. Margarets and came to Chatham about fifty-five years ago, conducting a general store in St. John street, afterwards in Water Street. Seventeen years ago he leased the Bowser House, and has conducted it as a hotel since. He was a genial host, solicitous for the comfort of his guests, and popular with all classes. He is survived by three daughters—Marguerite, a trained nurse in Albany, N. Y., Alice, wife of John D. Ward, Esq., Josephine at home, and one son Charles, in the States.—Chatham World.

### GAS POWER FROM WASTE WOOD

The progress which has been made by British firms in the construction of suction gas plants for utilizing waste wood is of special interest to many countries overseas, where there are large quantities of this material available. These plants distill the wood and produce gas which is of excellent quality for the use in gas engines.

This method of utilizing is much more economical for power producing purposes than burning in a boiler. A recent example of a large installation on these lines is afforded by a mine in a British Dominion, where a British firm has supplied four suction gas plants capable of yielding a total output of fourteen hundred horse power. The fuel used is in the form of logs up to two feet long and a foot in diameter; and the gas is applied to the driving of four horizontal gas engines.

Three of the engines drive electric generators and the fourth is coupled to an air compressor for operating pneumatic drills and hammers in mines.




