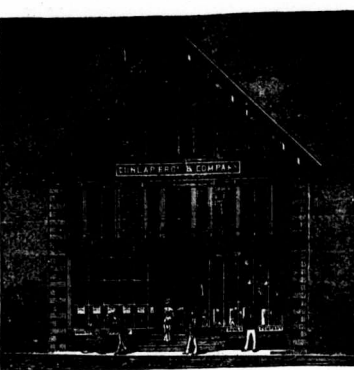

GENERAL NEWS.

—Montreal hotel-keepers have been

visited by Confederate bills.

—Thirty-five persons were injured by a

railway collision near Dublin last week.

—The Russian Government has just

borrowed £15,000,000 for railway con-

struction.

—Mrs. Martin, who recently died near

Murray Harbor, P. E. I., was in her 106th

year.

—The British marines in the Sudan

are being mounted, and the new marines

have thus become a reality.

—The health inspectors of New York

seized seven tons of meat unfit for human

consumption last Thursday night.

—The circulation of the Century mag-

azine has risen during the past year from

120,000 copies to 134,000 copies.

—James Holmes and William Brecken,

the Halifax dynamiters, were held before

Judge Thompson last week and convicted.

—About one-half of Maudslayi, the

capital of Burnham, was recently destroyed

by fire, and 90,000 people were left home-

less.

—The funeral of the late Prince Leo-

pold took place on Saturday in St.

George's Chapel. The funeral services

were very impressive.

—The last steamer for the season of the

weekly mail line to Liverpool will leave

Halifax on Saturday, May 3rd, and the

first steamer from Quebec will sail on the

10th of May.

—The bodies of 61 of the victims of the

terrible mine disaster at Pochontash,

single, have been taken to the city of

Halifax next, the trustees not having found

the results satisfactory.

—A man has been arrested in North

Carolina for the murder of an ex-Confederate

soldier seventeen years ago. The crime

was discovered through a quarrel between

the murderer and his wife.

—The Clydesdale horse, Bartlett,

which took first prize at a cattle station at

the Dominion Exhibition last year, was

sold at auction at Charlottetown, P. E. I.,

a few days ago for the handsome sum of

\$2,200.

—The annual boat race between Oxford

and Cambridge University crews was

rowed on Monday morning, on the regular

Thames course of 4½ miles between

Putney and Mortlake, and was won by

Cambridge.

—Seventy-five men were seriously in-

jured by the derailing of a passenger train

near Clyde, Tenn., last night. The train

was carrying 100 passengers and 100

freight cars. The train was derailed by

a small fire which started in the engine

room and spread to the freight cars.

—The Woodstock Sentinel says: The

License Inspector is showing commenda-
