Sneak Thieves Around Town

During the past month or so, there have been numerous cases of thieving of one kind and another, going on in the town and country districts. Just why there should be so much of this contemptible work, is somewhat of a conundrum. Is it because people are too lazy to work, and are resorting to stealing, boot-legging, gambling and other lawless methods of making a living?

On Sunday night the store of Mr. L. S. Shaffner, boot and shoe merchant was broken into. The thieves made their entrance through a back window. They evidently used a glass cutter to break the upper pane sufficiently to get a hand in to turn the catch, and raised the lower sash.

Mr. Shaffner said he only missed a few pairs of shoes, but the cash box was taken from the safe. This, however contained no cash, but deeds, insurance and other papers of no value to anyone, other than the rightful owner. Mr. Shaffner would appreciate having this box and contents returned by parcel post, express or inform him where he could get it.

Mrs. W. W. Dodges home was also among those broken into in town, and a cash box stolen, which like Mr. Shaffner's contains papers, that are of no value to anyone but her. If the highwayman would see that it is returned to Mrs. Dodge, they would certainly confer a favor.

Different homes in town and district have been looted in the same way; and in cases reported, it seems "cash" is the thing most sought after.

In our opinion a few "ride coats" scattered throughout the province would help materially to lower the crime wave that is sweeping over the various communities. These police are without doubt the finest organization in existence and their presence alone is worth a great deal to the district—and when they get on the trail of a culprit—some body is going to go over the road.

Rockefeller Gives \$375,000 To Acadia University At Wolfville

(Morning Chronicle)

Wolfville, Oct. 22—A special meeting of the Board of Governors of Acadia University was held in the College library this afternoon. The most important feature was the announcement made by President Patterson of a subscription of \$375,000 toward the \$1,500,000 of the Acadia new Forward Movement. This subscription had been made by John D. Rockefeller

Dr. Buttrick, Chairman of the General Education Board and Mr. Thorpe, financial adviser of the Board, had visited Wolfville in the early summer, and had made a careful study of the work and of the financial standing of the institution. This gift grows out of the investigation.

This brings the amount subscribed to the new Forward Movement up to \$800,000. The new building will be pushed to an early completion and will be available for the classes on February, first. 


