Baron Wissmann will probably retire or be sent to settle affairs in West Africa. He is displeased because he was not appointed head of the new colonial department.

Revolution in the Vatican.

London, Jan. 8.—A remarkable domestic revolution was effected in the Vatican Monday. Every Italian in the service of the Papal domestics, both in the interior and in the ante-chamber, have been transferred to foreigners. This is in consequence of an inquiry that showed that Signor Crispi had secret agents among the people employed in the Vatican.

Better Business.

London, Jan. 8.—On the street yesterday afternoon, after the closing of the Stock Exchange, prices became the firmest they had been during the day. This increase of strength was due to reports of an influx of gold to the Bank of England, and rumors that the finances of the Buenos Ayres waterworks undertaking have been satisfactorily arranged with the Argentine Government in such a way that the amount of the Barings' liabilities is reduced by several millions.

Rome, Jan. 8.—A terrible snowstorm, accompanied by winds of hurricane force, has been raging since this morning on the Gulf of Trieste and along its shores. The storm extended from Capo d'Istria to Venice. The severest cold weather known to the present generation now prevails in the olive-growing region of Italy. A violent rain storm, accompanied by lightning, descended upon the city this evening. The palace of the Propaganda was struck by lightning.

Typus Fever in Florence.

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Rome, Jan. 8.—An epidemic of typus fever is playing have in Florence. Ninety persons have died within a few days from this disease, and one regiment has had every man but four on its roster sick at one time with it. One hundred wells in the neighborhood have been analyzed, and 90 were found to be infected. Orders have been issued to boil the water before using. The Anglo-American colony is panic stricken, and almost all have left the city.

The Behring Sea Dispute.

London, Jan. 8.—Sir Edward Clark, Solicitor-General, speaking at Plymouth, said, with reference to the Behring Sea dispute, that Lord Salisbury was only asserting a doctrine laid down by the United States Governmentyears ago, namely, that no nation could claim sovereignty over the open sea. Hostilities between England and the United States, said Sir Edward, would shock the conscience of the world, and even the contemplation of such hostilities would be an outrage upon civilization and human, ity. "It is to be hoped that Lord Salisbury's offer will the accepted; thut, if an English vessel is seized on the high seas and violence is used toward British subjects, one fatal half hour would put it beyond the power of the two countries to settle the difficulty by arbitration."

Cold Weather In London.

London, Jan. 8.—The new year has not opened auspiciously in London. Twenty-three days of continuous frost, the mercury at times reaching within 5° of zero, has given the population a better conception of rigorous weather than they previously possessed. No such winter has been known in England since 1830. Hares, rabbits, pheasants and wild birds generally are dying by tens of thousands. Seagulls are seeking shelter in London, hugging close to chimney stacks for warmth, but frequently perishing from hunger and exhaustion. Great hummocks of snew-covered ice are floating down the Thames, and piles of snow in every thoroughfare outside the main city, avenues give London the appearance of an arctic city. Upper reaches of the Thames River are entirely frozen, and at Windsor and Walton fairs on the ice have been organized. Bullocks and sheep have been reasted, stalls have been erected for the sale of goods, and numerous ice picalies have been carried out. On the frozen Cold Weather in London.

Murdered His Young Wife.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 7.—Robert De Rose, aged 27, last night killed his wife, Elizabeth, aged 22, at a lodging-house on Hess street. Mrs. De Rose deserted her husband and became a chorus girl at the Bijou Theater. She roomed with an actor named Mitchell. De Rose called at the house last night, and, seizing Mitchell's pistol, which was on a table, shot her in the back. De Rose was arrested.

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The Bishop Was Fined.

Detroit, Jan. 7.—In the Recorder's Court Bishop A. J. B. Jenner was convicted of cutting down sixteen shade trees near the corner of Woodward and Willis avenues, in violation of a city ordinance, and fined \$25, to be paid within twenty days. His defense was that the trees interfered with the approach to his residence, were decaying and unhealthy, and that he was ignorant of the law. The court, in convicting him, found that there was nothing malicious in his conduct.

THE WORLD OF WORK.

Terrible Accident in a California Mine

Eight Men Rilled.

San Andreas, Cal., Jan. 8.—An accident occurred on Tuesday in the north shaft of the Utica mine, at Angel's Camp, which resulted in the death of eight men. The skip with the miners aboard was coming up for dinner. When within 150 feet of the top of the shaft the cable parted at the reel, letting the men, skip and 100 feet of cable fall into the sump at the bottom of the shaft, a distance of 450 feet.

The names of those killed are: Joe Carter, William Case, Dan Dennison, Tom Conovish, John Demarris, Dave McCann, P. Trupich, J. Bristano. Four of them are married and have families. The bodies presented a sickening sight, being fearfully mutilated, one being found without any head and another with half the body and lower limbs. The sump contained about fourteen feet of water. Four bodies have already been recovered, three of which were recognized as Joe Carter, Wm. Case and Dan Dennison. It is but a little over a year ago that a cave-in occurred in the same mine, burrying sixteen men, and the slow work of recovering their bodies had nearly been accomplished when the second disaster took place.

Crowe's Pickings.

New York, Jan. 7.—A Baltimore dispatch says: Last Monday afternoon at a meeting of the stockholders of the Franklin Bank of which Charles J. Baker is president, those present learned from Mr. Baker that ex-Councilman Crowe, who failed a few months ago, had overdrawn his account on that bank to the extent of \$100,000. The bank holds Crowe's paper to an extent of \$119,000. The bank surplus of some \$50,000 was gone, and the \$97,264 charged in the bank reports of Jan. 3, 1891, to the profit and loss account was all lost. The capital stock which was \$320,000 had been impaired to the extent of one-third.

Anticipated His Death.

Scottdale, Pa., Jan. 8.—Thomas Goswick, who was instantly killed a few days ago in the Dexter mines, near here, kept telling his wife prior to his death that he believed that some accident was going to befall him, and assigned reasons for his belief. He was not content with this, however, and finally addressed a letter to her, which he forbade her opening unless some fatality should overtake him. He was employed in a room almost adjoining the Fountain mine, which has been after for some time and is being flooded in the hope of quenching the flames. He was fearful lest the water should force through and drown him. In this letter, which has just been opened, he fully outlined a method of procedure to recover his body in this event.

Immigration Figures.

Montreal, Jan. 7.—The returns from the immigration offices show that the arrivals at this port for 1890 were 8,589, an increase over the previous year of 658. The amount of money which the immigrants acknowledged owning was \$498,400, an average for each person of less than \$60. The destination of these new comers was: Quebec, 2,727; Ontario, 2,296; Manitoba, 1,080; the Northwest, 422; British Columbia, 379; United States, 1,033. From this it will be seen that over 1,000 went to the United States, which reduces the gain to Canada to something over 7,000. Of the new concers there were farmers, 511; farm laborers, 624; general laborers, 1,062; mechanics, 846; clerks and traders, 482; female domestics, 413; "no calling," 2,969. The agent's report states that the call in surrounding districts for agriculture labor has exceeded any previous year, and was far beyond the supply. Employment for market gardeners is on the increase in Montreal and district.

New York, Jan. 7.—A Washington dispatch to the Herald says President Harrison has decided to accede to Gen. 

ROMANTIC LOVE TALE.

Murder of Comte de Villeplaine, Former ly of Hespeler, Ont.

A cablegram from Paris says: A year ago the Comte de Villeplaine was residing with Mme. la Comtesse at his chateau of St. Chanol not far from the ancient city of Troyes in Eastern France. In the prime of life, with a large fortune and good looks, the Count had plenty of idle time upon his hands. As an inevitable consequence, being of an amorous disposition, he was well known among the village maidens of the vicinity, and thus made friends with Julie Berthet. Julie was passably handsome, saucy and not at all bashful. She was naturally flattered by the Count's preference. Julie had a lover named, singularly enough, Aube, after the department. Aube was not overpleased at this proof of Julie's powers of fascination, and decidedly objected to its further exercise. The handsome Count, however, paid little attention to his rival's ill-concealed dislike, and continued to press his suit with characteristic ardor.

These events occupied the late winter and early spring months, and May was just ripening into June; when one morning after a heavy thunder storm had drenched Troyes and its environs and the clouds were still hanging heavy over the Chateau Chanol a peasant passing along a by-road came upon the body of the Count lying stiff and cold almost within the shadow of his own residence.

The police not having met the popular demand for the name and antecedents of the criminal the gossips set to work to unravel the tangled skein after their own fashion, and finding no other person equally interesting in the Count's death, decided that the Countess, if herself not actually the murderess, was privy to the dark deed, seeing that she had come at the early age of 35 into a large and encumbered estate. These cruel rumors stung the poor widow to the heart, and without delay she laid her troubles before M. Goron, the head of the Paris detective force, resolved to clear her reputation at all costs. M. Goron at once intrusted the case to one of his best men, by name Bastart, who took the first train for Troyes and be gan the quest which has just ended successfully.

Disguising himself as a hawker and penetrating all the roads and lanes in the vicinity of the ancient capital of Champagne has made himself thoroughly acquainted with the district. Finding in his rambles a quiet country inn, he made it his headquarters, and soon discovered that it was also the rendezvous of a gang of noachers.

Bastart played cards almost nightly with the poachers, and one evening the conversation turned on the assassination of the nobleman. Sundry dark hints were given and inuendoes made that pieced together resulted in producing the conviction in the detective's mind that Aube, who was one of the party, was the murderer. After collecting further information that strengthened his belief in this theory, including the facts regarding the amour between the Count and the fair Julie he learned that the Count, in his capacity as landlord, had been unusually stringent in his treatment of the poacher, who was his tenant.

Armed with these data, the detective obtained an order from the Central Office for the arrest of Aube, who, with many protestations, declared his innocence. On being confronted, however, with all the evidence that had been accumulated against him, the poacher confessed that he had done the Count to death. He is now awaiting his trial at the assizes.

The above was a cable message to the New York press sent from Paris, France on the 30th ult. relating to the tragic death of Count Charlo Boscary de Villeplaine. THE WOMEN VOTERS. The unostentatious, orderly manner in which hundreds of women voters cast their ballots in the municipal election in London on Monday last has made converts ot many who previously looked askance at the thought of any but men exercising

the franchise. The act of voting is the act of effectively expressing one's opinions. The ADVER-FISER is not prepared to say that women do not think as wisely, are not as deeply interested as men in everything that relates to the moral and material welfare of the

Every "argument" against women being allowed to vote has been employed in days long past to prove that women should not be permitted to read.

Women have as much right to express their opinions through the franchise as persons of the other sex. They are on the average as intelligent and in general more conscientious. Their exclusion from a direct voice in municipal and legislative concerns has been an exclusion injurious to the best interests of society. What is the right arm of power of the Christian Church to-day? Who chiefly furnish church attendance, prayer-meeting attendance, and mission effort? Women.

Is it wise to exclude so potent a power for moral good from other fields which need nothing so much as an infusion of that ethical influence, that desire to protect the home, which characterizes woman?

No. 1, who had been listening attentively to these recitals. "In my town a manannounced himself as a candidate for sheriff. When he went home and told his wife what he had done she positively refused to agree to live in the tumble-down dwelling adjoining the county jail, which was the shoriff's residence. Nothing daunted, the candidate drove out six or seven miles to the jail the following day with his wife, and the inspection of the place simply confirmed the lady in her position. They quarreled then and there, and the husband and wife actually separated. In the convention the husband received only seventeen votes, and was the last man in the race." "What became of the wife?" asked the interested came of the wife?" asked the interested

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came of the wife?" asked the interested auditors. "O, she came back to her hushand," was the reply, "and has had her own way with him ever since."

These recitals may seem rather farfetched, but we venture to say that in a more or less modified shape they correspond with the experiences of every candidate for a public office. There are men who think it no harm to deliberately mislead date for a public office. There are men who think it no harm to deliberately mislead candidates or their agents on all possible occasions. What they aim to get rid of is the button-holing canvasser, and they believe that the easiest possible way is to affirm by nod, wink, or positive assurance that his case is all right and will be indorsed. To most candidates for public office the canvassing habit and the necessity for coaxing electors to do their duty by going to the polls is a positively distasteful, time-wasting expedient. When, in addition to these, hundreds of ablebodied men have to be carried to and from the polling places, it becomes expensive as

the serious humiliation of the sanguine can didate who is made the victim of the duplicity of anxious-to-please electors. 'The citizen's duty in casting his ballot, it was well said by a professor of Columbia College, N. Y., in a recent address in favor of obligatory voting, "does not differ in kind from that of the jurymen, sworn to decide the issues presented to them without fear or favor."

SUGAR FROM CANADIAN BEETS. With the object of getting the West Indies to trade exclusively with Canada, Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, told the nerchants there that the cultivation of the sugar beet has been a failure in Canade. The Ontario Government is also ex perimenting, and has enlisted the co-operaion of many farmers and capitalists. The making of sugar from beets is not a failure in Canada, because it really has never had a fair trial. It may happen that Canada will yet grow the bests necessary to pro luce all the sugar required for people, and perhaps go into the exporting usiness. AXE AND REAPING MACHINE COM-BINES.

Fourteen of the largest axe factories in the United States have been organized under a trust, and they have managed to raise the wholesale price of axes in the course of a few months from \$5 25 to \$7 per dozen. Before the combine was formed, too, manufacturers paid freight on the goods; but they pay no freight now. They also gave a warranty with the axes, so that, if one was broken or turned out to be of poor quality, it was replaced by a good one; but no warranty is given now. And to show what power the combine possesses, every retail dealer is furnished with a slip which reads: "There is now but one axe company in the United States, and that is salled the American Axe and Tool Company, with headquarters at Pittsburg. This company has purchased outright every axe factory in the country of any importance, and by thus controlling the production have advanced prices on an average of \$2 per dozen. This company also controls the manufacture of axe polls (or the heads of axes), the machinery of which is patented, and this enables them to keep the prices so high no one else can afford to make axes." The free-born American citizen will be able, perhaps, to discover a vein of humor in this manifesto of the axe combine; but it is such humor as the Sioux Indian practices upon his victim. Another trust, more recently formed, is that of the reaping machine manufacturers, and one of the first fruits of it is the dis-charge of 10,000 workingmen, as it has been found that under combination the labor of this number of men can be saved. But the price of machines will go up for the farmer all the same, and the McKinley tariff will leave him without redress.



The Chicago Medical Society Discusses Soveral Queer Cases and Other Subjects.

Chicago, Jan. 8.—Dr. Jacob Frank reported a remarkable case of skin disease at the regular meeting of the Chicago Medical Society. It was of a man aged 33 years, who once a year since his birth has shed his skin in orthodox snake fashion. Dr. Frank discovered the case last July at St. Elizabeth's Hospital. It nomplused him and he called Dr. Zeisler, a skin specialist, for consultation. After much study they arrived at the conclusion that it was a case of erythema scarletina forma, recurrent. Dr. Frank exhibited casts of the man's feet and hands and big plates of the outicle from his trunk. After shedding his shell it is the patient's custom to wear his casts as moccasins and gloves until the new skin is strong enough to endure wear.

Immigration Figures.

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—The annual immigration returns for Ottawa show the total arrivals to be \$36, a decrease from 1889, when they numbered 1,159. Of the \$36 last year 541 were males, 175 females and 120 children. One hundred and sixty-three were classed as farm laborers, 186 as general laborers, 13 as mechanics, 62 as clerks, etc., and 31 female servants. The remaining 381 were not classified. Ninety-nine went to Quebec, 708 remained in Ontario, 11 went to Manitoba and 18 to British Columbia.
