LONDON PRESBYTERY.

The Statistical and Financial Statement for the Year.

The statistical and financial statement of the Presbytery of London for the current year contains some interesting in-

rent year contains some interesting information.

The total number of families reported for the past year is 3,068. The number of communicants is given as 6,176, a gain of 190 members since the last report. There were added during the year 677, 420 of whom were received on profession of faith and 257 by certificate. The number of removals by death amounted to 106, by discipline 2, by certificate 346 and without certificate 57. The ordinance of baptism was administered to 269, of whom 224 were infants and 45 adults. The number of ministers on the roll of the Presbytery is 33, of elders 235, of other office-bearers 372, and of persons engaged in Sabbath school work 592. The first object, indeed, of all honest men, no matter what their predilections may have been in the past, must be the un-doing of the class legislation that has re-tarded the growth of the country, that has toing of the class legislation that has retarded the growth of the country, that has accelerated the exodus of the flower of our population, and caused widespread disconnent throughout Canada. What has been the record since 1878? In the decade from 1871 to 1881, before the introduction of the policy of high taxation, which was to work wonders, the population of Canada increased 19 per cent. From 1881 to 1891, according to the official census, the National Policy being meanwhile in full swing, the increase foll to less than 11 per cent. During the ten years of tariff for revenue, the population of Canada increased 689,786, though the greater cart of that decade was a period of worldwide depression, and 517,869 only during the ten years of the high tax policy. And far from staying the exodus, or of re-

taining within our borders the 800,000 comers that the Government immigrated to the Dominion the records show that the exodus was larger by many thousands than in the years from 1870 to 1880. It may be said, however, that our country has been managed as well as any other colony. Not so; in free trade New South Wales, the population increased in the last ten years 60 per cent.; we increased less than 12.

If we look for the causes, they are not difficult to find. In a recent sermon at Winnipeg, Rev. John Hogg pointed out one great canse "in the unsatisfactory condition of that class of the community whose labor lies at

great canse "in the unsatisfactory condition of that class of the community whose labor lies at the very base of a country's prosperity." He continued:

"As a general experience, the farmer cannot make his income meet his expenses. He is weighted down by something that is dragging him under water, and his sons desert the farm to seek more remunerative employment in the city. The farmer is the worst used man in the country. He has to toil and sweat and bleed at ever pore to nourish into strength 'infant industries,' which get fat as he gets lean. He must toil in poverty that they may roll in wealth. In spite of all the fine things that are printed about our crops, the Manitoba farmer just now is the most discouraged man in the country. Let any one who knows tell you of the thousands of summonses that have already issued against them to pay their notes, and the sum total in this province of judgments issued against those who cannot. And you scareely imagine a keener sarcasm on 'infant industries' now nourished by the farmer's toil and sweat into the strength of a gigantic monopoly which feels strong enough to take farmers by the throat, saying 'Pay me that thou owest,' and extorting principle and interest and compound interest, leaving the farmer destitute of everything he owned. It is not hard to tell what the weight is that drags the farmer under water, and so long as such a policy of unjust taxation exists, farm work can never have in it the elements of contentment. The sarcasm, however, takes another form, for the farmers of this Dominion rivetted upon themselves the shackles which oppress them. It is high time that they should wake up and think."

It is not too late to save the country. is not too late to get back to the level ground of dispensing with all taxes that can be thrown off and of getting down to a policy of tariff reform, economy, honesty and fair play to all industries. But there is no time to be lost.

ALL UNNECESSARY TAXES MUST GO. No nation has ever been injured by the moval of unjust and oppressive taxes.

Let all unnecessary taxes be taken off. Canada could be well governed to-day if taxes on necessaries of life and raw material were enormously reduced.

It is an absurdity to argue, as some journals do, that high taxes are necessary to produce revenue. Every student of English history knows that Sir Robert Peel obtained additional revenue from customs by throwing off duties at one swoop on 750 articles!

The fact is that in so far as a tax is "protective"—that is, in so far as it prevents trading—just in so far is it ineffective in bringing a revenue to the Government that

There are many articles on the taxed list in the Canadian tariff that could be profitably imported at a smaller rate of duty without injuring the revenue one iota. Iron is one of them, binder twine is another, barbed wire is another. Coal oil (crude and refined), of course, come under the same category. 

Rev. D. M. Mihell, M.A., Assumes the Charge of Adelaide Street Baptist Church, Rev. D. M. Mihell, M.A., late of Park-

ale, Toronto, the newly-chosen pastor of delaide Street Baptist Church, preached his inaugural sermon yesterday morning before a large and evidently deeply interested
audience. Mr. Mihell, who is comparativeby a young man, was a fellow-student with
Rev. H. C. Speller, late pastor of the
Adelaide Street Church, both having
graduated at the same time from Woodstock College, Mr. Mihell being ordained in
1881. The reverond gentleman, while taking no advantage of the orator's artifices,
is a pleasing, fluent and forcible speaker,
and his discourses give unmistakable evidence of careful study, patient research
and strong convictions, aiming more at a
lucid and earnest presentation of Gospel
truth than at rhetorical display. Judging
from the manner and matter of Mr.
Mihell's discourses, as well as from the
commendatory comments of his brother
ministers the Adelaide Street Church
will have no cause to regret
their choice of a pastor. Yesterday morning's address was based on the words found
in Ephesians vi., 18, 19, 20. The preacher
showed from the text, and from numerous

FOR REFLECTION.

The question of heating is now occupying the attention of the Board of Education, and from facts that have recently developed it is believed the board would do well to carefully consider the advisability of heating the Gollegiate Institute building with hot water. It has been the pleasure of a number of citizens to closely inspect the heating apparatus now in operation in the Canadian Bank of Commerce building, who think that nothing better has been placed think that nothing better has been placed in operation in this city in the heating

This building has lately been entirely

This building has lately been entirely overhauled at a large expense, and a new system put in, using the Bolton heater. While this article does not advocate one heater more than another, the one in this particular case gives admirable satisfaction.

The building referred to was formerly heated by hot water by two heaters of different manufacture, and used 75 tons of coal per season, but the present system is running at the rate of 30 tons per season. When such a large saving as this is affected—and that it is so there can be no doubt—the board should have little trouble in establishing which system is the best to put in.

The idea that large buildings cannot be heated and properly ventilated except by steam and the Smead-Dowd system must give place to better information, for when such buildings as the Cathedral school, Denver, Col.; the public schools of Watertown, N. Y., the public schools of Lake Geneva, Wis.; the public school of Nashville, Ill., and the public school of Beaver, Penn, are most effectively heated and ventilated by hot water, and at such vast saving over are most effectively nested and ventured by hot water, and at such was saving over that of hot air that one can hardly credit the reports, the board should not hesiate to try at least one building, which could be done by some firm whose security would be so ample, and whose competence would be so ample, and whose competence would be undoubted, that the city would run in

RIZPAH ON THE ROCK.

Disaster Transforms Sluggards Into Practical Workers.

Dr. Talmago's Discourse at Brocklyn Tabernacle Sunday.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Dec. 4.—This is one of those discourses of Dr. Talmage, delivered from texts which no one seems to have used before. Important and practical lessons were drawn. The opening hymn, in which many thousands joined was:

Come ye disconsolate where'er ye languish. The subject of the sermon was, "Rizpah on the rock," the text selected being II. Samuel, xxi, 10: "And Rizpah, the daughter of Aiah, took sackcloth and spread it for her upon the rock, from the beginning of harvest until water dropped upon them out of heaven, and suffered neither the birds of the air to rest on them by day, nor the beasts of the field by night."
