# Earthquake Wipes Out Robinson Crusoe's Island

# chusetts Regiment, which has been at Ottawa since Saturday, paraded on How Much to Secure Railway Juan Fernandez Off Chilian Coast Disappears—Latest Dispatches Say 2,000 Dead at Valparaiso.

Lima, Aug. 21.—A steamship brings a report that the Island of Juan Fernandez, off the Chilean coast, was wiped out. On it was a penal settlement and a fort. It belonged to Chile.

The Island of Juan Fernandez was mountainous and sparsely settled. It was about the size of Pitcairn Island, and twice the size of the Island of Oahua, on which Honolulu is situated.

Juan Fernandez is best known as the original of the fabulous island on which the immortal Robinson Crusoe spent so many years. It was actually for eighteen years the solitary abiding .place of Alexander Seikirke who was wrecked there, and on whose experiences Defoe founded his cele-

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 21, 3 p.m.—The Nacion today published a sensational dispatch from La Paz, Bolivia, announcing that 2,000 persons lost their lives as a result of the earthquake shocks and fires at Valparaiso, that 170 deaths from the same causes occurred at Limache, 40 at Quillota, 35 at Conchalia, 11 at Petarca, 9 at La Placilla, and 6 at La Calera.

On Sunday last, Aug. 19, there was a strong convulsion at Varparaise which produced a further panic. A dispatch from Santiago today announces that the President of Chile, Senor Riesco, is proceeding to Valparaise accompanied by the ministers of the interior and war, in order to supervise

#### FEARFUL DESTRUCTION.

Special telegrams from Santiago published here this morning announce the arrival there from Valparaiso of Charles Johnson Gana, a well-knows Chilean, after a terrible journey, accomplished partly on foot and partly on horseback. He confirms the reports of the fearful destruction and incalculable loss of life at Valparaiso.

The Chilean ministry of the interior reports that the railroad from Tiltil to Batuco is working regularly, but that from Tiltil to Santiago the line is not working. At Colina, Batuco, Polipico and Tiltil, the railroad stations, stores and dwellings have all been destroyed. The President of Chile has ordered the immediate construction of provisional buildings of wood and zinc in order to house the homeless. Military engineers are now preparing the railroads and telegraph lines.

#### ESCAPED PRISONERS SHOT.

The authorities at Valparaiso are organizing distributing centers, where food and medicine will be served out to the earthquake sufferers, who are displaying great patriotism and courage.

Large parties of convicts, who escaped from the prisons in Chile, have been committing robberies and other crimes at Valparaiso, Casablanca and Vina Del Mar, but the majority of them have been captured and summarily dealt with. Upwards of fifty have been publicly shot, and this action is exercising a salutary effect on the convicts who are still at large.

All the public bodies in Chile are co-operating in the relief work, and the sufferers from the disaster are engaged in repairing the damaged buildings and the telegraph and rallway lines. It is reported that the Chilean Governnent will introduce a bill in congress providing for the issue of in paper notes. The project also proposes a new national loan to enable the Government to meet all emergencies.

# WAKES AFTER LONG SLUMBER

Hospital Patient Has a Three-Months Spell of Napping Following Operation.

Norristown, Pa., Aug. 21. - William Schnable, aged 36 years, of Edge Hill. has just been awakened from a sleep which continued for over three months and baffled a number of leading Philadelphia specialists, who worked upon the remarkable case at the University of Pennsylvania Hospital.

While going down a flight of cellar stairs last March, Schnable was struck on the head and knocked unconscious. Recovering consciousness, he was found to be all right physically, but there was some derangement

of the mental powers. At the home of his sister, Mrs. Fred Hohenleitner, at Edge Hill, this county, he grew worse. # WAR GAME IS COSTLY TO PLAY

Military Expenditures of the U. S. Exceed Those of Any Other Nation.

Washington, Aug. 21. - Advocates of international arbitration and disarmament will find some striking arguments in data relating to the cost of the armies and navies of the leading nations recently compiled by the information divisions of the war and navy departments. The data shows that the United States spends annually on its army and for pensions, which must be regarded as a military expenditure, a much larger sum than any of the so-called military powers of the old world, while its outlay on its navy continues to be maintained at a maximum in contrast with the di-

minishing outlay of other great pow-The war department has received from the military attaches abroad memoranda of the appropriations made by various countries for the year 1906-7 for the support of their respective armies. Great Britain taxes its people heavily to support its naval and military establishments, and maintains a regular army much larger than the United States. It appropriated \$144,-987,336 for the support of its army for that year, including an appropriation of \$11,435,580 for fortifications. France, which also maintains an extremely large standing army, numbering near ly 500,000 men, appropriated \$156,614,388 for the support of its army, of which \$1,158,000 was for maintaining fortifications. Military authorities here note with interest that Germany appropriated practically the same amount for the support of its standing army. \$156,608,043 and for fortifications \$1,631,-

After Britain, France and Germany, comes the United States, in the size of the appropriation made for the support of the military establishment. This country appropriated for the current fiscal year \$71,817,165 and for fortifications \$5,053,993.

It is because of the immense sums the United States pays out each year to its pensioners that this country may be said to be expending more for its military establishment than any other power in the world. In connection with these scheme. fourth-class cars are introduced on those lines which do not already run them, fourth-class tickets being exempt from the tax. These poor people's cars are little better than cattle trucks, but members of the Anti-Railway Ticket League, which has been formed, pledge themselves to travel by them only, in order to deprive the Government of the tax.

# IN NEW BRUNSWICK

10614 A Large Part of the Province Mrs. Rhoades Wants No Notori-Is in the Grip of the Flames.

St. John, N. B., Aug. 21.-A large part of the Province is in the terrible grip of forest fires. For nearly two months little rain has fallen, and fire once started in the woods is almost impossible of repression. On the north shore fires have swept from Rogersville to Barnaby River for a distance of eight or nine miles, and a terrible fire is now raging within a short distance of both villages. One hundred and fifty to two hundred men have been fighting the flames for several days, but on Saturday the heat was so intense that the men were forced to abandon the first line of trenches they were digging in an effort to control the flames, and were compelled to start on a new line

closer to the settlements. The whole country for miles around is a mass of flames, and a thick pall of smoke hangs over the Miramichi Valley, shutting out the sky and turning the sun into a sun-colored disc. From all over King's County come similar reports. In the town of Sussex, in the center of the fire zone, the heat is so terrific that factories have shut down. The damage to the timber limits is incalculable.


