LONDON, FRIDAY, MAY, 1. MR. WHITNEY MISLED THE LEGISLATURE.

There is conclusive evidence that the Legislature was misled by Mr. Whitney on the question of the Canadian Northern Railway guarantee.

In 1904 the Ross Government guaranteed the bonds of the Toronto-Sudbury branch of the Canadian Northern Railway, 265 miles, to the extent of \$20,000 per mile. The Government took a first mortgage upon

the road as security. Mr. Whitney, then leader of the Opposition, objected to the guarantee on that portion of the road between Toronto and Mara Township, Ontario County, in the organized section of the Province. His contention was that Assistance should be given only to railroads in the newer and unorganzed districts.

On Thursday, April 9, two days before the close of the late session, the Whitney Government brought down a bill to guarantee the bonds upon an extension of 50 miles of the Toronto-Sudbury branch of the Canadian Northern, to the amount of a million bollars, or \$20,000 a mile; and in addition a bond guarantee of \$1,500,000 upon the terminals at Toronto and Budbury, which he said had been pmitted from the statute of 1904. The security of the Province would be a mortgage upon these terminals and upon the 50 miles of new road.

"We found the valuable part of the property left out of the mortgage," said the Premier, referring to the guarantee of 1904. He added: "To protect our mortgage we were compelled to take this course by the action of honorable gentlemen opposite them-The Provincial Secretary the Premier's statement. There is no question whatever," he said, as reported in the Toronto World, "that the Provincial security will be immensely improved.'





TO WATCH STOMACH WORK

Method to Aid Diagnosis.

Munich, May 1. - The problem direct observation of the interior of the human stomach during life has been solved by Dr. Rihl, according to a medical weekly. The method which is employed includes the passing of a double tube through the oesophagus to the stomach, the inner tube being fitted with a small electric bulb. Water is passed by means of a subsidiary attachment through the outer tube, filling the stomach. The light is then turned on, permitting, the medical paper says, the closest observation of the movements of the stomach. The paper regards this as an important ad_ vance, which will permit of a closer study of cancer of the stomach and other internal maladies.


