

#### FIVE DOLLARS A YEAR FOR RENT

You Can Get Two Rooms in Vienna for That Amount Per Annum.

Vienna, Dec. 26.—The Government axes rents in this country, stipulating in some cases the amounts that ought to be charged, too. Hence landlords have to be good, to a certain extent, and tenants must not kick lest they offend the august Imperial Government and go to jail. Throughout Austria all living quarters must consist of a kitchen and a living room and, according to the lists just published, Vienna has 2 homes of this character for which no more than five New York, Dec. 26 .- The New York dollars annual rent is charged. In other Austrian cities this low figure is even less a curiosity. Lemberg has 279 and Laiboh 145 homes renting at five ollars per year.

Nearly seven hundred Vienna flats, having from two to four rooms, rent for from five to ten dollars annually. Nearly 5,000 flats rent from ten to authorized in the naval program of twenty dollars annually, while nearly 24,000 rent for from twenty to forty dollars per annum.







### SHOT HIS SWEETHEART TRIAL MAY SOLVE **MURDER MYSTERY**

Mrs. J. Marshall Dodge to Face Jury For the Shooting of Wm. Heath.

Lunenburg, Vt., Dec. 24.-With the approach for the time of the trial of Mrs. J. Marshall Dodge, this town's wealthiest woman, who is charged with the murder of Wm. Heath, a painter, who was shot and killed while at worl in an upper room of Mrs. Dodge's residence, early in September, the interes in this mysterious case is steadily increasing. The trial is to come up week after next, and, in the meantime, Mrs. Dodge is at liberty, under \$8,000

This case, apparently simple and devoid of sensational complications, has baffled the authorities, the lawyers, and detectives more than any case in the history of criminal cases in this state, and it would cause the most general surprise, should either the prosecution or the defence succeed, in the course of the trial, in solving the mystery surrounding the death of William Heath.

All the men at the disposal of the attorney-general of this state have been at work for several months, gathering evidence and preparing the case for the state. The case of the Government is believed to be extremely weak, as there were no witnesses to the crime, and in spite of the most diligent search, the prosecution is said to have found nothing that could be constructed as a motive for the deed.

The Known Facts. The known facts in the case can be summed up in a few words. One day in the early part of September, William Heath, a painter, who had previously worked for Mrs. Dodgs, was engaged in painting the woodwork in one of the upper rooms of Mrs. Dodge's residence was killed by three shots from a revolver which belonged to Mrs. Dodge No one could be found who was in the house at the time when Heath met his death, except the owner. Mrs. Dodge herself gave the alarm to the neighbors, saying that Heath had committed suicide. She was arrested and charged with the murder of Heath.

According to Mrs. Dedge's story at the preliminary hearing, she was at work ironing in her kitchen, when she heard the shots.
