A FRANK CONFESSION.

'Canada Beats Us to a Standstill," Said a Languishing Minneapolis Miller They "Want That Wheat."

A Minneapolis correspondent of The Boston Transcript writes: If the Minneapolis millers wish to recapture the European market, they will not be able to do it, because they can't get the wheat. As one miller says:
"The confounded farmers won't raise
the wheat for us." The miller's conception of the farmers is a man
created by the Lord to raise wheat for the miller to make into flour. And when the farmer refuses to per-form his natural function, it irritates the miller excessively. The fact is that for three years the Minneapolis miller hasn't been able to get enough standard wheat to run his mills. standard wheat to run his mins. The farmer prefers to raise other crops. He has found it more profitable to raise garden vegetables for the great city which the millers have built there. When the Northwest consisted chiefly of bonanza farms, wheat was the only crop raised, because it was the simpliest and easiest crop to raise on a large scale. iest crop to raise on a large scale. But as the farms have been sub-divided into small holdings, as in the East, diversified farming is the rule. And with a steadily increasing rule. And with a steadily increasing farm population in the Northwest, with thousands of new miles added every year to the farming territory, there has been a steadily decreasing wheat crop. The millers look to irrigation for some relief That will reclaim an enormous area of arid land. But that will merely be the land. But that will merely be the old story over again—wheat raising for the first few years, and then diversified farming. Minneapolis can

mever again rely on American farms to furnish her mills with grist. No, if the Minneapolis mills are to No, if the anineapois mins are to expand, if they are to recapture their export trade, they must look elsewhere for their wheat. And they do look elsewhere. They look across the Canadian line into Manitoba, into Saskatchewan, into the great stretches of fertile prairie that make up the Canadian Northwest. And the covetous eyes with which the millers lead agrees with which the millers look across the border raises a most interesting situation.

"We Want That Wheat."

At home in Massachusetts most of

us hear occasionally something about reciprocity. But in this city reciprocity is no academic question. "I tell you, sir," said a miller, with tremendous earnestness, "we want that wheat. Up there"—he made a swinging gesture toward the north-"there is the finest wheat area in the world. There's no question about that. It isn't merely the claim of a railway boomer any more. It's true. As a wheat-raising country, Canada's got us beat to a stand-still. It's three times the area of the Louisiana Purtimes the area of the Louisiana Purchase, and every acre of 'it's the finest wheat land in the world. We want that wheat. If we had the 60, 000,000 bushels that Canada's raised this year, think how our mills would hum. I tell you, if our mills are to live, we must have that wheat. That line"—he pointed to the Canadian boundary line on. wheat. That line—he pointed to the Canadian boundary line on a map—"that line is a wall 500 miles long and five feet high, and it's made of silver quarters, each quarter the American tariff on a bushel of Cana-dian wheat. That wall is a greater misfortune to us than Joseph Cham-berlain's import tax on flour ever berlain's import tax on flour ever

"That wall stands between Minneapolis and the greatest boom any city in America has ever known. It stands between Minneapolis and a million population; it stands between us and such a prosperity as we never dreamed of."

"Queen of the Wheat World." Of course, that's but one side of the reciprocity question. The American farmer is selling his wheat to-day for \$1.20, while his neighbor across the Canadian line is selling his for but ninety-four cents—the farmer takes a different view of reciprocity. But the Minneapolis millers do

want that wheat and want it terribly. They have already resorted to various devices to get it. They imported some of it in bond, made it into flour and shipped the flour abroad, thereby avoiding the duty, which the Government does not impose on goods which are imported only to be exported again. But that has been cumbersome and full of red tape. And it has had one most serious disadvantage. When the wheat was imported, in order to escape the duty, not only the flour made from that wheat, but also all the byproducts, the bran and the siftings, must want that wheat and want it terducts, the bran and the siftings, must be exported. And there is no mark-et for the byproducts abroad. The millers suggest—and Congressman Lovering, of Massachusetts, has al-ready introduced such a bill into Congress—that whenever a certain bulk of wheat is imported the duty on the wheat skall be refunded. But on the wheat is imported the duty on the wheat shall be refunded. But what solution of the question will ultimately be made remains to be seen. Perhaps the millers will do as the farm-implement manufacturers have done within the past two years, build branch factories in Canada to supply the Canadian trade. And thereupon the millers will become a thereupon the millers will become, as

these farm-implement manufacturers have become, the most active opponents of reciprocity.

Meanwhile Canada's wheat goes east by Canadian railways to Canadian ports. Meanwhile the biggest grain elevators in the world are grain elevators in the world are being built at Port Arthur and Fort William, Canadian lake ports, which no one East has ever heard of but which will loom large on the map within a few years. Meanwhile Canada is preparing for the autonomous, domestic handling of her own wheat crop, and looks forward to sit on America's throne as queen of the wheat world. Meanwhile the Minneapolis mills languish.

### STARVING PORT ARTHUR

Emperor Nicholas Informed That the Fortress Is Doomed.

n. Stoessel Likewise Gives Other Frank Details of the Actual Condition of Port Arthur to the Crar-Japs Hold Two Permanent Forts-Probable Burning of the Coal Stores of the Russians By

London, Nov. 25.—The correspondent at Moscow of The Daily Telegraph claims authority for the statement that Gen. Stoessel's despatch sent by the torpedo boat Rasteropny informed Emperor Nicholas that the Port Arthur garrison was being starved out, with other frank details of its actual condition, showing that the fall of the fortress is inevitable.

They also occupy the Caponiere galleries and the moats of the two Rihling Forts and North Keekwan Fort.



HANGING BOOK RACK.

An Ornament Especially Adapted to

An idea for an odd book rack to hang against the wall is suggested in the illustration below. Its dimensions may be governed by the space it is desired to fill, but if a plain wall is available for its hanging place it might be well to make it three feet long, with sides three feet three inches high.



HANDSOME HANGING BOOK BACK. The shelves can be ten inches apart and openings are made in the sides be tween the shelves as shown, while at the back five upright ornamental strips are placed to strengthen the shelves and add an odd feature to the construction. The ends of the shelves are cut in the form of a tenon and slipped through mortises in the sides of the rack, where they are held in place by means of wooden pins.

This book rack is distinctly orna-mental and will be found especially acceptable in a bedroom or den where there is no room for the more bulky shelves which rest on the floor or than a large library.-Woman's Home

WHERE LIMBURGER IS MADE

Famous and Odorous cheese as It Is Manu-factured at Bades, Ont.—The Atmesphere Is "Cheesy."

The good old County of Waterloo, the most prosperous manufacturing and agricultural county in Ontario, is the home of an industry that flourishes alone within its borders, namely, the manufacture of limburger

cheese.

The towns of the county each has possessions that are contributing to their prosperity and advancement, as well as advertising their respective fame abroad. Berlin has its sugar rednery and varied industries, Water-Lea Segrence string of recers. Galt relinery and varied industries, Waterloo Seagram's string of racers, Galt
has its great iron works, Preston its
mineral springs, furniture factories
and foundries; Hespeler its woolleamills, and last, but not least, Baden,
its limburger cheese factory.

It was for the purpose of ascertaining how this famous and odorous
heres is made that a Tornto World

taining how this famous and odorous cheese is made that a Toronto World reporter drove over to the picturesque little village of Baden one afternoon recently. The reporter looked in vain for a tall smoke stack that might possibly indicate the existence of the works, and finally stopped a native with the salutation, "Can you tell me, sir, where the limburger cheese factory is located."

The man, while he did not "have a mustache like the Kaiser," gave evidence of his Teutonic extraction by replying: "Vy you shust go down dot lane wher dot house is vot vas burnt down vonce."

burnt down vonce.

Atmosphere Is Cheesy.

Following the directions so explicitly given, the reporter made his way past the ruins of a recent fire, and even before he struck the lane was assured he was on the right track by a passing breeze which certainly gave evidences of the close proximity of a

evidences of the close proximity of a cheese factory, rather than of a field of new mown hay.

At each succeeding step the atmosphere became more "cheesy," and on turning the corner of the building and beholding the factory, the reporter involuntarily uttered, "Great the factory little accuracy for the succession of oaks from little acorns grow; great

smells from little factories blow."

The Baden factory, if factory it could be called, was found to be a small frame addition, probably 12x30 feet in size, attached to the rear of the interest of the owner of the industry—Lewis Lieber. Mr. Lieber was both affable and busy. The pro-prietor, with his wife and daughter, were hard at work wrapping up the cheese preparatory to shipping. Mr. Lieber willingly consented to talk about his product, which, though maintaining a profound silence nevertheless possessed so strong an in dividuality that its presence was un sed so strong an inmistakable and pronounced.

Three Limburger Factories.

"There are only three limburger cheese factories in the Dominion," said Mr. Lieber, "and they are all in Waterloo County, being located at Heidelburg, Erbsville and Baden. I learned the business from old mass

kabel (now deceased), who made the tret limburger cheese in Canada."

Regarding the process of manufacture, Mr. Lieber says that he uses in the neighborhood of 3,000 pounds of milk daily, which his teams collect from farmers residing within a radius of few miles from the factory. The of four miles from the factory. farmers receive a price agreed upon per hundred pounds for their milk, which is weighed at the factory. The which is weighed at the lactory. The milk on its arrival is poured into a vat and heated to about 85 degrees, at which temperature it is maintained for an hour. A small amount of rennet is poured into the vat, which thickens the milk. Then the mass is cut with a utensil of the draw knile cut with a utensil of the draw knile whey to a state allow the whey to cut with a utensil of the draw knife variety, so as to allow the whey to well up, which is extracted, the percentage of whey being 90 per cent. to the remaining 10 per cent. curd. The curd is afterward poured into long moulds and is left on tables between thin board partitions, so that the cakes in settling will not run together. Next day the cheese are put on shelves in a cool cellar, where they are left to mature and gain the strength and flavor for which they are justly noted. It is necessary each week to turn each cake over two or three times, to prevent the cheese in settling from becoming lopsided.

The Aging Process. As about 5,000 cakes of cheese are kept constantly on hand in the cellar kept constantly on hand in the cellar undergoing the aging process, the task of turning them over becomes no light one. The cheese is milk and at its best when from a month to six weeks old. When two months old it begins to assert itself, and emits a perfume that does not at all resemble the odor of violets or roses. As the the odor of violets of roses. As the cheese ripens and becomes ready for market it is wrapped first in a layer of cheese cloth, then paper and afterwards receives its outer wrapper of tinfoil, which is imported from New York, and costs 7 cents per pound laid down.

Owing to the brisk demand, which is greater than the supply, the

is greater than the supply, the manufacturers rest easy on that score. During the month of June past, Mr. Lieber sold \$1,000 worth of cheese, and he estimates that his year's sales will total \$8,000. He has been in the business for eight years, and has established a trade that extends as far as Manitoba and British Columbia. He says that the best cheese is made from September to December, at which time the milk is the richest. No request has been made to the police for the ap-prehension of any one connected with The bogus ballot boxes, twenty in

number, were made the first week in October, the job requiring the com-bined efforts of three tinsmiths four nights. The work was done entirely at night, and the contract taken and work performed by the C. L. Roof & Company, tinsmiths, in the employ of E. B. Erwin, a leading hardware merchant. The work was done on overtime, and Mr. Erwin states that he had nothing to de with it, and did not share in the profits, the amount of which he refused to disclose, describing it as "emough."

The tinsmith firm consists of Claude L. Roof and Hamilton Roof.

The reputed price paid for the boxes is two hundred dollars. The senior member of the firm will, it is said, go to Canada of his own motion and testify as to his connection with the

scheme.
