The inspector states that some of these places have been under observation for some time by the authorities and a thorough cleaning out will be inaugurated in May. In this event May cannot come too quickly as definite action is urgently neces sary in the specified cases.

The Banner, in their issue of yes terday, attempted to make light of this important question, stating that things were not as bad as was stated in The Planet. This journal, however, is prepared to accept the statements of a man of Mr. French's renutation, as to the true state of affairs, and we are inclined to venture that citizens will concede that Mr. French is in a position to know whereof he speaks-and they, too will not question his veracity in the The statements of the Health Inspector also go to show that the article was a very timely one and there was every provocation for the publishing of it. The prctests of the Banner, however, will not cause the health authorities to deviate from their path of duty in closing up these houses.

It is a compliment to this journal that the matter has been taken up so promptly by the Sanitary Inspector, and it is the earnest hope that the information contained in Mr French's interview will be of value and assistance to him in the performance of his important duties.

Casiri, however, while employed in translating Arabic writers, has discovered the real place from which paper came. It has been known in China, where its constituent part is silk, from time immemorial. In the thirtieth year of the Hegira (in the middle of the seventh century) a manufactory of similar paper was established at Samarcand, and in 706, 58 years afterwards, one Youzef Amru of Mecca discovered the art of making it with cotton, an article more commonly used in Arabia than silk. This is clearly proved by the following passage from Mohamed Al Gazell's "De Arabicarum Antiquitatum Eruditione":

"In the 98th year of the Hegira," says he, "a certain Joseph Amru first of all invented paper in the city of Mecca and taught the Arabs the use of it. And as an additional proof that the Arabians, and not the Greeks of great learning, whom Montfaucon mentions as having been employed in the King's library at Paris, in the reign of Henry II., always calls the article Damascus paper. The subsequent reign of Damascus paper. The subsequent reign of paper made from hemp or flax has given rise to equal controversy."

Examples of the use of modern paper in Spain date from a century before that time, and it may be sufficient to quote, from the numerous instances cited by Don Gregorio Mayans, a treaty of peace concluded between Alfonso II. of Aragon and Alfonso IX. of Castile, which is preserved in the archives of Barcelona, and which bears date of the year 1175; to this we may add the privileges granted to Valencia by James the Conqueror in 1251. The paper in question came from the Arabs, who on their arrival in Spain, where both silk and cotton were equally rare, made it of hemp and flax. Their first manufactories were established at Xativa, the San Felipe of the present day, a town of high repute in ancient times, as Pliny and Strapho report, for its fabrication of cloth. Edition observes, when speaking of Xativa, "Excellent and incomparable paper is likewise made here."

Valencia, too, the plains of which produce an abundance of flax, possessed manufactories a short time afterward, and Caledonia was not long in following the example. The article, made from flax, was not known in Castile until the reign of Alfonso X. in the middle of the thirteenth century, and thence it cannot be questioned that it spread to France and afterward to Italy, England and Germany, The Arabic MSS., which are of much older date than the Spanish, were most of them written on satin paper and embellished with a quantity of ornamental illuminated work, printed in such gay and resplendent colors and gold that the reader might behold his face reflected as if from a mirror.





KEEP YOUR TEETH CLEAN.

If You Don't, You'll Have Grip, Says a London Doctor-One Means to Better Health.

Influenza has been so rampant in England, especially in London, of late, says the London Dally Mail, that med-ical men have been making great ef-forts to discover its causes and to find

It is now generally accepted that the disease is due to a special microbe bacillus influenza which enters by the mouth and forms poisonous products, which, circulating in the system, give rise to the symptoms. Investigators were still puzzled to explain why the microbe attacked some people and not others exposed to the same risks of in-

The theory, and to the lay mind a rather startling one, has been propounded by a well known dentist, that bad teeth and the defective hygiene of the mouth are the west important. the mouth are the most important causes in determining the infection. He contends that in a healthy mouth the invading microbes don't find such a good feeding ground as in a mouth where the teeth are decayed and covered with tartar and the gums in an unhealthy condition. unhealthy condition.

A well known west end physician to whom The Daily Mail applied for an opinion strongly supported this theory. He said the idea had been gaining ground in the medical profession that the defective hygiene of the mouth is largely responsible for a great many diseases of the intestinal tract and especially dyspepsia and gastritis, and much greater attention is paid to the care of the teeth and mouth than was formerly the case.

"Personally before treating any case of indigestion," he said, "I advise a visit to the dentist. As to influenza, I should think it extremely probable that and think it extremely probable that bad teeth predispose to it and especially in those varieties of influenza in which intestinal and gastric symptoms predominate."

Another dental surgeon, who, by the way, also possesses a medical qualification, stated that if people practiced strict hygiene of the mouth the majority of physicians would starve for lack of employment.



HIDDEN GOLD.

The Hoard of Precious Metal That Is

It would be an immense benefit to all mankind if the stores of gold held by individuals in India could be made available for general use. Ever since the dawn of history that country has been gathering gold and hiding it away. Treasures of almost incalculable value are possessed by many Indian princes. When the maharajah of Burdwan died the stock of gold and silver left by him was so large that no member of the family could make an accurate esti-mate of it. A report made to the British government by a secret agent stated that on the estate of the defunct po-tentate were a number of treasure houses, one of them containing three rooms. The largest of these three rooms was forty-eight feet long and rooms was forty-eight feet long and was filled with ornaments of gold and silver, plates and cups, washing bowls, jugs and so forth—all of precious metals. The other two rooms were full of bags and boxes of gold mohurs and silver rupees. The door of this and other treasure houses had been bricked up for nobody knows how long.

These valuables, according to an an

cient custom, were in the custody of the maharajah's wife, the vaults being attached to her apartments, but none of them was allowed to be opened save in the presence of the master. One vault was filled with ornaments belonging to different gods of the family. The natives of India commonly bury their hoards, and among the poorer classes a favorite hiding place is a hole dug beneath the bed. Disused wells are sometimes employed for the same pur-pose. It is undoubtedly a fact that pose. It is undeducted a fact that very many hoards thus deposited are lost forever. Gold is also valued on religious grounds. The god's take up great quantities of gold, silver and precious stones. The temples contain vast amounts of the yellow and white metals. The habit of hoarding seems to have been induced by ages of misgovernment, during which oppression and violence were rife. No feeling of safety existing, it was natural that the natives should adopt the practice of reducing their wealth to a concentrated shape and hiding it.

Frog Egg Curiosities.
Frogs' eggs are laid before they real ly become eggs in the true sense of that word. They are always laid under water and when first deposited are covered with a sert of envelope in the shape of a thin membrane. In this shape they are very small, but as soon as they come in contact with the water they rapidly absorb that element and in so doing go through a queer transfor-mation. The thin membrane containhag the little seedlike eggs is quickly changed into great lumps of a clear jelly-like substance, each section joined to the other, the whole forming a string from a few inches to several feet inlength. On the inside of each of these lumps of jelly the eggs come to perfec-tion and in due course of time add their quota to the frog population of

the world.

Costly Competitions.
