This simple expedient would save the Corporation from incessant anxiety and annoye ance, and lessen the charge upon the income. Now with respect to the income itself, it is raised from landed proprietors—the class of all others sed -the only class who cannot escape repairs, insurance, loss of tenants, and fifty items of a damaging nature.
