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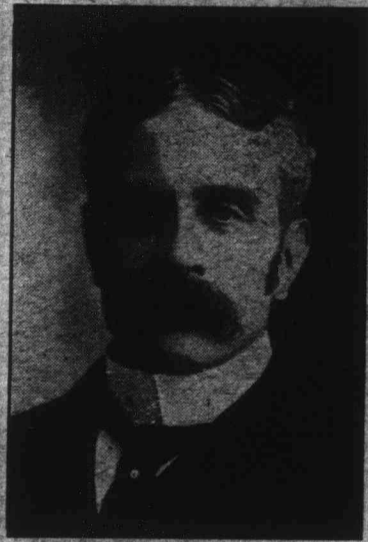

Regina during Mr. Borden's visit. Mr. Borden will be accompanied by one or two eastern men, but his colleagues are not yet announced.
 The provincial executive of the Conservative Association consists of the president, vice president, secretary and treasurer and the presidents of the various local associations. It is understood that communications are being sent out and that the executive will arrange at an early date for a representative convention, and also Mr. Borden's itinerary in the province, where he will hold about six meetings.
 The first Conservative association for Saskatchewan was organized on Aug. 23rd, 1905, when it decided to conduct a non-party campaign in local politics. There has not been a meeting of the association since.

Attorney-General to Turn on the Water at Arcola and Open Town Hall--Announcement Expected Regarding Judicial Seat

Arcola, July 19.—The Star says today: Word was received from Attorney General Lamont Wednesday stating that he would visit Arcola on a date that would suit after the 24th inst. A meeting of the members of the board of trade decided to ask him to come up here on Tuesday, 30, as matter would then be in readiness for the opening of the town hall. The hall will formally open on this date and Mr. Lamont and others will address the meeting to which all the people of the district are invited. CHOOSING A SITE

Mr. Lamont Got Option at Yorkton--Office Staff to Get to Work at Regina

Yorkton, July 18.—Hon. J. H. Lamont, K.C., attorney general of Saskatchewan, was here on Tuesday looking over sites, on one of which the proposed new land titles office will be erected.
 In an interview with our representative the attorney general—who by the way strikes one as being thoroughly capable of filling the high position which he occupies—stated that the proposed building would cost about \$40,000. He received ten-day options on several sites, and on his return to Regina he will advise the executive council which site is the most suitable. The work of erection will commence as soon as the site is secured.
 The staff which will occupy the new Yorkton office will be set to work at Regina next week transcribing the necessary records and documents and all will be in readiness to move to their new offices as soon as the site is secured.
 Mr. Lamont was very favorably impressed with Yorkton and district and expressed the opinion that a great future lies before the town.

DOUKHOBORS AGAIN ON PILGRIMAGE

Out Towards Winnipeg Looking for Warmer Climes and Better Times--Perhaps Sunny Alberta

Makinak, Man., July 17.—Clothed in scanty straw hats and blue nightdresses, thirty simple minded and deluded Doukhobors passed here this afternoon on their long pilgrimage to Winnipeg and the warm country where they expect to find a modern Utopia in which the sun always shines and one does not have to eat meat or butter, but can live to a ripe old age on black bread and raw onions.

All the pilgrims were weary and footsore and many limped painfully, with maimed and bruised feet, but pressed onward with an unfathomable and unshakable belief that they will soon reach a haven of rest. Old men, aged women and wee children tramped side by side, but every face, young and old, showed an ineffable sweetness and patience tinged with joy, betokening their calm assurance that they were only following the command of the prophet.

Where are you going? they were asked.
"To a warmer country," answered one of the women that spoke English slightly.
"What do you want?"
"A warm country where no one must work, where one does not eat meat, nor milk, nor butter, where one can live on fruit and it is sunshine all the time."
"Where is this warm country?"
"We don't know."

Who is leading you there?
"No one but Jesus. Jesus walked and we must walk too."
Then the whole band lifted up their hands to heaven and in their eyes shone an angelic light as they broke into a hymn of praise. Louder and louder grew the volume of sound, the singers raising their arms with their voices, waxing more and more enthusiastic.
They quickened their step and marched forward to their own music. They sang, of course, in their native Russian tongue, but it was not unpleasant to the ear. On the contrary it was quite pleasant as their voices rose and fell in a distinct harmony. Higher rose their voices and wilder became their gestures and then, with a loud triumphant shriek, they ceased almost exhausted.

Long Weary Trip
The party of Doukhobors left Swan River on Monday, July 8, about 30 strong. On Tuesday they arrived at Minnitons, on Thursday at Cowan and on Sunday last at Ethelbert. They came into Dauphin on Monday night, and spent the night in Borlin's stables, singing and chanting and straggling through the streets looking for food. All meat and butter offered was refused, only onions and bread did they accept. Tuesday morning they left Dauphin and started for Ochre River, where they arrived in the late evening, having travelled seven miles that day. They camped there all night, but were not allowed to get much rest as they were continually bothered by people in the community whose curiosity had not been satisfied.

Tuesday morning they left Ochre River and arrived at Makinak about noon where they rested in the shade till about two o'clock, eating their simple meal of bread and onions.
They struck off again along the Canadian Northern tracks for Winnipeg at which place they intend to rest before proceeding to their promised land.

In ten days they have travelled about 150 miles, nearly half the entire distance, so at their present rate of travelling the band will arrive in Winnipeg about a week from Sunday. They have apparently no method in their madness, if mad they may be called. If they are not entirely sane their monomania is at all events harmless. They profess to be all equal and at the same time to be equal and at the same time to be equal and at the same time to be equal.

Looking for Jesus
"We are all brothers, all the same, one with another. We are following out Lord Jesus' example. He walked and we must walk too."
The party now on the road is composed of fifteen women, eleven men and four boys. One aged man, one woman who recently gave birth to a child and four little children have preceded the party a few miles by train. These with a few others were so tired and worn out that they dropped exhausted on the road last week.
The Doukhobors had \$8 amongst them and with this money they bought the weaker ones tickets as far as the money would carry them. Strawberries are just getting ripe along the railroad and on these many of the women and children try to sustain life supplementing the fruit with a little bread.

The pilgrims often break up into small groups and wander around the wild straw berry patches for a while and then return to the railway line. The Doukhobors have left all their possessions behind except a few clothes and hanks of bread tied up in handkerchiefs.
Will They Move?
Winnipeg, July 18.—Will the Doukhobors of Saskatchewan remove to Alberta and enter upon the work of the production of beet sugar in which the Mormons are largely engaged was the question raised by the arrival in the city of a committee of that community headed by Peter Veregin.

The travellers were accompanied by C. W. Speers, colonization agent of the Dominion government, and they had just completed a trip through a portion of southern Alberta, where they inspected lands especially in the vicinity of Lethbridge and Raymond. In the west they also made most careful inquiry into the various processes connected with the extraction of sugar from the Sugar beet and were through the plants which have been established there by the Mormon settlers. Mr. Veregin could not be seen, but information in reference to the trip was obtained from Mr. Speers.

Pleased with Beet Sugar.
"While in the west the committee made careful inquiry regarding the climate of Southern Alberta," said Mr. Speers, "and also with reference to the possible range of production in the districts which can be irrigated. They were especially interested in the consideration of the culture of fruit and, owing to the fact that the Russian people are very familiar with all the processes connected with the extraction of sugar from the sugar beet, they were desirous of learning all that was possible with reference to this industry. The committee are very well pleased with the districts and are confident that by the use of proper methods, the industry of their people would soon produce excellent results there."

Large Purchase of Horses
"While in the west the committee completed the purchase of 250 horses which they shipped to Verigin, where they will be used in connection with the work of the industries which are to be established there and some of which have already been instituted. The industries which have already been established include the large brick yard, where both burned and pressed bricks are produced and the plant for the production of cement and pottery. They are just completing a large grist mill and an oatmeal mill, and are ready to enter on any enterprise by means of which they will be able to afford the means of a livelihood to their people."

No Rebellious Spirit
"As you are aware the quantity of land held by the community has been very greatly curtailed, and now is comprised within a limited area. As members of the Doukhobors society, it was impossible for them to conform to the regulations of the department of the Interior. The members of the society are manifesting no rebellious spirit at the action of the government in this regard. They are peaceable and will continue to prosper. It is their intention to improve their holdings in every possible way and raise their lands to the highest state of cultivation. They will continue to assist in the work of railway construction, and being frugal and exceedingly industrious, there is no danger of their ever being in want."

"The present is the first extended tour by Peter Verigin, since his return from Russia. That journey was made by him at the request of his brethren in the community for the purpose of securing information in reference to the condition of the people of Russia and to inquire into the reference to the progress made by the people here. He spent several days with his friend Tolstoy by whom he was received with the greatest cordiality. He was also well received by the officials of the government who put no obstacles in his way as he pursued his mission in the country. He stated to me that many of the officials in the executive buildings at St. Petersburg were completely shut in owing to the general insecurity and the fear of what might happen on the streets."

Temptation From States
"Lands have been offered to the Doukhobors at low rates in the states of Washington, Oregon, and Montana, but the leaders of the community have paid little attention to these offers, owing to the fact that, as I have pointed out to them, there were now thousands of people coming into Canada from the United States, who would certainly never come to Canada if good lands were available in that country."

Some two hundred farmers and their families were looking forward to the excursion. Last year more people went from Prince Albert than from any other point north of Regina. The feeling here is that the provincial government is to blame. Copies of the resolution were forwarded to the government at Regina and the head officials of the C.N.R.

Sergeant Dubay and Corporal Hunt went out this morning. After making an inquiry into the details the coroner decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The deceased young man was a son of Alex. Seibel, of the Seibel Plains, and had only been married about three months. He had been worried for some time over financial embarrassments.

MODEL FARM FOR NORTH
Prince Albert Likely to Get the Plum from Ottawa
Prince Albert, July 19.—Messrs. Angus McKay, of Indian Head, and Mr. Saunders, of the department of agriculture, Ottawa, were in the city Saturday seeking a site for an experimental farm which the Dominion government propose to establish in the northern part of the province. In company with S. J. Donaldson, M.P., Senator T. O. Davis and Mayor Cook, the two representatives of the government were driven around the city and adjoining country. The Miller farm on the left in the east, and the northern part of the city met with the approval of the whole party and it was thoroughly gone over. The location is a

particularly good one, as the soil is all that could be desired and the site is a commanding one, whence the buildings and the farm generally may be seen to advantage.
So far no experimental farm has been established in the northern part of the west, where conditions are entirely different to what they are on the prairie. In the north mixed farming is carried on and the people generally are entitled to an experimental farm. Both Mr. McKay and Mr. Saunders were very much taken with the natural beauties of Prince Albert. The prettiest city in the west makes an impression on all who visit here.

Mr. Borden's Tour

R. L. Borden has the opportunity of his life. He has many times given promise of genius as a statesman, but what is required of him for a while now is that he prove himself a politician.

There is no reason why the Conservative leader cannot make a triumphal tour from coast to coast. The great issue west is for autonomy rights, and this Mr. Borden can guarantee.

There is no reason while after this trip it cannot be said that his tour is the trail of the conqueror. Manitoba and Ontario can be depended on to make good, and if Quebec goes solid for Laurier, so much the worse for that province.

"Feel like one who treads alone some banquet hall, deserted; Whose lights are fled, whose garlands dead, And all but he departed."

Only Fair

Throughout the whole discussion on the merits of the cent an acre tax The West has been fair in criticizing the arguments of the government and their newspapers.

In a recent issue we ignored the Arcola Star in the discussion, because the editor is so shortly receiving a district court clerkship, and he is not, therefore, in a position to call down men who voted Liberal before he was old enough to mark a ballot, because they took exception to the direct tax imposed by the government that appealed to the farmers telling them that if they wanted to avoid direct taxation they must return Mr. Scott.

We are prepared to let the farmers of the province judge whether the following comment from the Arcola Star regarding our position is justified:

This misconception has been fanned into a flame of opposition by a campaign of misinformation carried on by the opposition press, such as the Regina West and Standard, presumably independent papers. Their object has not been to enlighten the farmers and others as to the purposes of the act, but to arouse into a flame of opposition the inborn antagonism of all people against all taxes, just or unjust.

The question of taxation is an old one and a system of taxation that will please all people is a remote probability. Liberals and Conservatives alike hate paying taxes with an inborn hatred, and when Mr. Tait says that Liberals object he is stating a truism that is in full accordance with well known Liberal traditions, for a Liberal who will not kick against taxes is no "grit."

The latter part of this wrath is aimed at a farmer who wrote as follows to The Star: "Kisby, July 13th. 'Editor, Moose Mt. Star, 'Sir,—Your issue of July 5th with statement headed, 'There is no room for a Kick,' you state instances are known where parties belonging to the Opposition, which means Conservative, has raised discord against the government of Saskatchewan in placing the supplementary revenue tax upon the people."

"Allow me to state that your opinion concerning the opposition is wrongly placed. 'As secretary-treasurer of L.I. district No. 4-C-2, I have had many complaints from both political parties in the district condemning the action of the government in placing the supplementary revenue tax upon the people of the province of Saskatchewan."

"I can give you names of strong supporters of the Liberal government who have held positions of trust at elections and who are strongly against the tax that the council of L.I.D., No. 4-C-2, comprising both political parties, has by resolution condemned it."

"With reference to your last clause concerning the farmers who reside in rural school districts for kicking is a slur against us as farmers, as we have a right to kick against a tax placed upon our land in rural school districts and not upon towns and villages. Yours, Wm. F. TAIT."

The Star deals with this letter at some length, and the principal argument used is that the farmers in the rural districts are getting back much more than they pay in. It was very clearly shown at the recent meeting of the executive of the Local Improvement Districts Association before which Mr. Scott appeared, that in districts, (and there are many of them), where the cent an acre tax is not paid, the government takes the amount out of the Local improvement fund, thus depriving the districts of the money raised for road improvement. It is only fair for papers which defend the government to say whether they consider this a grievance to the farmers, or a benefit to them.

Government papers say that the farmers can send their children to the high school free of charge, but that is only putting the children in the town on an equal basis with the children from the country after the farmers have paid their taxes for the support of the high school, while the ratepayers of the town are exempt from taxation for high school purposes.

The least the government can do, and the people will force that much out of them, is to either exempt the rural districts, or tax the villages, towns and cities.

The University

During the audience which the executive of the Local Improvement Districts Association recently had with Premier Scott, he remarked with regard to the portion of the cent an acre tax for the university that he understood from Mr. Calder that this money would not be required for some time to come.

This statement did not necessarily imply that the university bill will not be put in operation as soon as anticipated, but there is every reason why the government should be in a position to state what assistance the government is to get from the Dominion by way of a land endowment. If the governments of Alberta and Saskatchewan were to act together in this matter the position of both provinces would no doubt be materially strengthened. The lands question seriously affects the university problem and the public mind will not be at ease until we know where we stand respecting this matter.

If Mr. Borden will pledge the Conservative party to restore to us our lands, as he is being urged to do, the university question will be simplified

and there will be no doubt as to the future of that institution. However, the plain duty of the local government is to make the best arrangements they can at Ottawa so that in any case the university will be well provided for by way of a land endowment.

"Meaningless Words"

From a London cable it appears that even though Premier McBride struck out the words "final and unalterable" of the amendments to the B.N.A. act while they were before the British Commons, Sir Wilfrid Laurier persuaded the Earl of Elgin, the Colonial Secretary, to restore the words by way of amendment when the bill reached the Lords, and the dispatch says the bill was "amended as already cabled by adding to the schedule including all the resolutions of the Ottawa conference, the words 'final and unalterable' in this schedule, but not in the bill itself."

In commenting on the omission of the words referred to when the bill was before the Imperial parliament, the Winnipeg Free Press said: "It is reported that the House of Lords may restore these words. They should never have been in the bill. They are meaningless words. Parliament cannot enact anything finally and unalterably."

That Sir Wilfrid thought the words "meaningless" when they were first inserted, and that there was some reason, even if technical, for their being used, is apparent, especially in view of terms smuggled into the Autonomy Act, but this impression was confirmed when the Canadian premier exercises every effort, and with some success, to have the words restored by the House of Lords after the representative body thought, as the Free Press does, as to the finality of the terms of the bill.

There is no doubt that Laurier is the arch-enemy of Provincial Rights, but while he is very glossy from the stage, some of his work is quite coarse. He will find however, as the Free Press says, that "parliament cannot enact anything that is final and unalterable," especially when it so seriously conflicts with provincial rights.

B.C. CONSERVATIVES HONOR THEIR PREMIER

Mr. McBride Receives Handsome Present and Address on Return from London--Reviews His Fight for Provincial Rights

Victoria, B.C., July 18.—When Hon. Richard McBride arrived home from his mission to London to vindicate the rights of this province at Ottawa, the Conservatives gave a public demonstration and the popular leader was the recipient of a presentation and address as follows:

To the Honorable Richard McBride, K.C., M.P.P., Premier of the Province of British Columbia.

Sir—The Conservatives of the city of Victoria desired to place on record their high appreciation of the valuable services rendered by you to the province of British Columbia on the occasion of your recent visit to London, in connection with the demands of this province for justice at the hands of the Dominion Government.

We wish to bear testimony to the great ability and acumen which you brought to bear in the successful accomplishment of your very difficult mission, and to the fact that the efforts you have put forth on the occasion of the introduction in the Imperial House of Commons of the bill to amend the British North America Act resulted in the elimination of the words "final and unalterable," thereby leaving it open to the province to continue its battle for due and proper recognition at the hands of the federal authorities.

By your masterly treatment of this complicated and difficult question, both in Ottawa at the provincial conference and in London, you have won yourself an enviable position amongst the leading statesmen of Canada.

We beg to ask your acceptance of the accompanying piece of plate as a token of the esteem and renewed confidence in your leadership of the Conservatives of this province, and to express the hope that you will long continue to lead the party to victories even greater than those won in the past.

The present which accompanied the address was greatly admired by all who saw it. It consisted of a large silver tea service enclosed in a leather

what she considered to be ill-treatment, proposed to present her cause to the government for the time being at Ottawa, with a view to securing additional treatment, all that might be expected from that quarter would be a reference to the imperial government. And the suggestion was that British Columbia might as well return home and be satisfied with what had been done.

Had Strong Ground

"Well, ladies and gentlemen, backed up by a resolution of the Imperial parliament, and better than that, by the will of the great people of British Columbia I felt that I was indeed occupying very strong grounds when I took my passage to London, England, with credentials which would give me some standing before the London authorities. (Loud and continued applause.)

"Immediately on my arrival in England, I submitted these credentials to Lord Elgin, secretary for the colonies, and I might say, sir, that the receptions given me by that gentleman were very hearty indeed. He at once demonstrated a capacity to grasp the question, and from what I could see, appeared to be very much concerned with the situation. It was indicated to me that the bill necessary to carry out the wish of the federal party at Ottawa had been practically framed and had it not been for British Columbia's attitude, I might have been able to proceed to London and then by following up that notification by official action by my own presence in London, it is likely that further steps might have been taken, and the bill put through without any outside interference whatever.

Given Every Opportunity

"However, let me say at once that his lordship exhibited an anxiety to see that I was given every opportunity to have my case presented to the Imperial government, and in the course of the two months, during which time I was continuously in London, with the exception of three or four days, I had many opportunities offered me (of which of course I took advantage), when I could go before Mr. Churchill, Lord Elgin and Sir Francis Hopwood, the permanent under secretary, and Hamer Greenwood, M.P., private secretary to Lord Elgin, when the claims of the province could be discussed in detail and at great length (hear, hear.)

Sir Wilfrid's Attitude

"Now, sir, in a few words, what has been the outcome of my visit to London, England? I was obliged to go there to face the resolution of the federal government, which resolution contained the words 'final and unalterable.' I came to London, and I might say that I had the privilege as well as the pleasure, of discussing the

question with Sir Wilfrid Laurier. I might say that Sir Wilfrid Laurier did not appear to show the slightest disposition towards meeting me. He was very frank and very keen to show that so far as his government was concerned, it proposed to rest upon the resolution of the federal House of Commons, and that there was absolutely nothing open in the way of a road that might permit of some negotiations between Ottawa and myself at London, before the colonial department.

Went to Imperial Authorities

"Well then, ladies and gentlemen, it was undoubtedly my duty to express as strongly as I could to the Imperial authorities the views of the parliament of British Columbia, and greater than that, the views of the people of the province of British Columbia which were embodied in the resolution and the petition submitted to the local government. After a stay of six weeks I was enabled to obtain a provisional letter from Lord Elgin, but I do not think that I am privileged to divulge the contents of that letter until it has been submitted before the lieutenant governor. However I do think that I can tell you the gist of the matter, and that the bill to be submitted and passed by the Imperial parliament would not contain the words 'final and unalterable.' (Applause.)

"Furthermore the colonial secretary had carefully gone into the case of British Columbia, and fully appreciated the circumstances of this mission, and while he would not express any opinion on the sufficiency of my mission, I was nevertheless gratified by the assurance of the colonial secretary that the words 'final and unalterable' would be dropped from the bill and thus the way is left open for British Columbia. It may be now that we will be in a position to get a commission of enquiry.

"I may say that I received Lord Elgin's letter about 5 o'clock on June 5th, and next morning I presented my reply to Sir Francis Hopwood.

The next step takes me to the time when we went to the under secretary of state for the Imperial government. The proposed amendment the elimination of the words 'final and unalterable' was then discussed. Mr. Churchill took occasion to say that he had been made acquainted by Mr. Fielding of the requirements of British Columbia, and also by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Now if you consult the Hansard of the Imperial house you will find that Mr. Winston Churchill said that while not able to meet the wishes of the province of British Columbia in its entirety, yet he had gone so far as he could and that the objectionable words would be eliminated. (Applause.)

"Heads I Win, Tails You Lose," Was Game Being Played by Hall of Lloydminster

The Battleford Press throws some light on the trouble arising at Lloydminster over the failure of the citizens of the two towns to come to a decision as agreed regarding the future of the place and to which province they should belong. The Press report is as follows:

"Lloydminster citizens did not vote as expected on Monday last on the question of which province the town should belong to. This failure was due to the discovery of an interesting little plot concocted by the opponents of Alberta, and discovered by their opponents shortly before the day set for the polling. It appears that a petition had been circulated by the people residing on the west side of the line asking the Alberta government to incorporate the whole town within that province. This was largely signed, and in the event of the polling being unfavorable to them it was to have been forwarded to Edmonton, but if otherwise destroyed. The people on the Saskatchewan side of the town discovered the plot in time and flatly refused to have the question brought to an issue in any manner, even after their opponents had promised to abide by the result of the plebiscite. The town, as a result, is still divided between two loyalties."

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

The government is assisting to grade a trail through a slough south of Pense, and is ditching through 36-17-22.

Wm. Trant arrived in the city from Arcola on Monday and was sworn in by Judge Newlands as magistrate for Regina city.

Dixie Watson, of Qu'Appelle was appointed a notary public for the North West Territories.—Bathford Herald, 25 years ago.

J. B. Staffer of Portal was in the city yesterday.

D. P. McColl deputy minister of education has returned from Toronto where he attended the convention of the Dominion Educational association.

R. H. Taber of Condie did himself and the district proud by winning everything in sight at the Winnipeg fair. He will bring the same string of horses to Regina next week. He won out against the best imported stock in Canada.

Lewis Hurry gave a dinner at the Royal Alexandra last night in honor of Frank Hewitt, who leaves the city today for Regina, where he will become manager of the Regina Machine works. Mr. Hewitt was formerly with the Garr-Scott company of Winnipeg.—Winnipeg Tribune.

During a recent thunder storm the home of Benj. Prince, Bathford, was struck by lightning. The family were all more or less stunned but without serious result. The lightning struck the front of the house setting fire to it. The flames were extinguished before any damage was done.

In sentencing Joseph Breckenridge, a Weyburn lad of 11 years, to three months in jail for theft, Judge Newlands said that the province will have to provide a reformatory as he cannot send the boys down with hardened criminals. Such treatment is merely schooling them in crime.

The Saskatchewan Construction Co. of this city was awarded the contract for the erection of the new funds titles office at Yorkton. The building will cost about \$25,000.

Plans are out for St. Chad's church on Dewdney street. That portion of the city north of the tracks will now be known as St. Chad's parish, which has been organized with Messrs Honeyman and L. Black as church wardens, and Messrs A. McDonald, J. H. Pantin, H. Helme and M. Miller as vestrymen. A church site has been secured opposite the hotel and a handsome brick building will be erected. Rev. C. R. Littler, B.D. is warden of St. Chad's Hostel. A mission has also been started in the Eastern annex where J. M. Young has donated the site for the building.

Asa B. Steel lost his case against E. McCarthy to recover possession of section 25-16-19. McCarthy sold the land to Steel on a three payment contract and it was agreed that the purchaser should do a certain amount of breaking each year. Steel met the first payment about five days after the amount was due, and as there was not the necessary amount of breaking done the first year \$300 was paid to McCarthy in lieu thereof. Nov. 1st there was interest due which Steele did not pay and McCarthy cancelled the contract. The amount of money paid by Steele was about one thousand dollars. Judgment was given for McCarthy.

That Saskatchewan soil will produce a fine variety of strawberries is evidenced by the samples of home grown berries now on exhibition in the hardware store of Erickson, Helgeson & Co. These berries were grown near the residence of Fred Nordquist in east town and are of a large variety, a great many samples measuring over an inch in diameter.—Habitat News.
