Important Bills Before Parliament.
Among the Bills introduced recently into the House of Commons were an Act to amend the Marriage Act and an Act to amend the Dominion Elections Act.
The first was introduced by Mr. Lancaster, member for St. Catharines, Ont., and is as follows:—
1. "Every ceremony or form of marriage heretofore or hereafter performed by any person authorized to perform any ceremony of marriage by the laws of the place where it is performed, and duly performed according to such laws, shall everywhere within Canada be deemed to be a valid marriage, notwithstanding any differences in the religious faith of the person so married and, without regard to the religion of the person performing the ceremony, as married people of the respective persons married as aforesaid, and of the children of such marriage, shall be absolute and complete, and no law or canon or decree or custom of or in any province in Canada shall have any force or effect to invalidate or qualify any such marriage or any of the rights of the said persons or their children in any manner whatsoever."
The proposed amendment to Elections Act reads:—
1. Section 10, of The Dominion Elections Act, chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, 1906 is amended by inserting at the commencement of the said section, of this section, "Subject to subsection 2 of this section," and by adding to the said section, the following subsection:—
2. "No person shall vote in more than one electoral district, on voters lists for the same year, and if by the laws of any province, he is entitled to vote in more than one electoral district, he shall, for a Dominion election, be entitled to vote only in the electoral district in which he is domiciled at the time of the election."

Suggestions for Making Pies.
Never bake a pie on a cracked earthen dish. It spoils the flavor of the pie.
Pie crust and pastry made with butter or half butter and half lard is considered more wholesome than crust made from lard alone.
Pies should be well baked. To insure this allow an hour for baking. Half baked, soggy undercrusts are neither palatable nor digestible.
The upper crusts of pies should always be perforated to allow the steam to escape, this is essential to keep the juice in the pie.
The amount of flour used depends upon the fruit. Very juicy fruit requires at least two tablespoons of flour, this makes a thickened juice, which is less apt to soak the under crust. The flour should always be mixed with the sugar thoroughly to separate the particles of flour and prevent lumping.
If a fruit is used which is lacking in acid use a little lemon juice. Tasteless dry apples can be used for pies if lemon juice and water is added with judgment. If the apples are too long in cooking they may be partly cooked before they are put in the pie.
To insure a thick pie fill the tin to roasting with the fruit.

Wolfville people who have looked into the matter are not very well pleased with the report of the late census. They find it difficult to believe that the increase in population in our town during the last decade has been as small as shown in the returns. The statement that the population of the town of Kentville is nearly a thousand more than that of Wolfville is likewise hard of acceptance. There is evidently an error somewhere which ought to be rectified. It may be that the proper course to follow would be the taking of a new census by the town authorities. This has been done in a number of places in Canada with amazing results. THE ACADIAN hopes the matter may be carefully looked into.

Mrs. Sproule, wife of the Hon. Dr. Sproule, Speaker of the House of Commons, has given orders that no wines or intoxicating liquors will be used at dinners or other social functions in the Speaker's chambers during her reign as mistress of the official residence. Mrs. Sproule has been a life long and ardent advocate of temperance reform, and has been of great assistance to her husband. It is generally admitted that the standard of public life in this respect has been greatly raised through the example of the present Premier, the Hon. R. L. Borden, and the late Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, both of whom are teetotalers, and have been vigorous in condemnation of intemperance.

Town Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with the Mayor and all the Councilors present. The Finance Committee reported receipts during the month \$1838.45 with expenditures \$1085.90. The bank overdraft on Nov. 30th was \$34.43. The Water Committee reported on work done during the month, including pipe laid on Highland avenue, repair of services, &c. The following bills were read and ordered paid: A. C. Johnson \$43.50, Wm. Stairs, Son & Morrow 142.24, Wood & Mahony 55.05, Hinchinson's Express 3.50, Valley Telephone Co. 44.93, F. B. Crawley 2.50, F. H. Christie 3.75, Petty Cash 7.89, Rebecca Gould 15.00, E. S. Crawley (insurance) 20.00, Acadia Dairy Company 35.00, A. M. Wheaton 73.97, S. E. Gouday 15.00, Acadia Electric Light Co. 44.93, Carrette Patterson My Co 44.40, George Farris 21.62, Frank Angus 34.00, Mrs. Emma Johnson 14.50, Henegar Bros. 6.57, A. J. Woodman 2.00. An application was received from Mr. Obed Baker, for permission to keep a pig. Temperance Alliance Appeal for Funds.

Public meetings have been held, literature has been distributed, schools have been visited and there has been carried on a vigorous campaign of education in Total Abstinence principles. Along legislative lines a great deal has been done. As result of the union of the temperance forces in an appeal to the Government for better legislation, the Nova Scotia Temperance Act was placed on the Statutes in 1910, and in 1911 improved by amendments. With additional amendments, the Act will be one of the most satisfactory in any Province in the Dominion. The work of the Alliance in the past has been supported by subscription and free-will offerings from friends of temperance in all denominations. We now appeal to all Churches and Temperance Societies for generous contributions. The Alliance is the Church in action against the barroom. We must keep up a steady fight until the liquor traffic is suppressed and to do our work we need money. Before the 1st of January we require \$2000.00. We respectfully appeal to all clergymen and ask them to give an opportunity to their congregations to contribute on a Sunday in December or January, or entrust the work of soliciting funds to a person in the congregation in sympathy with the work of the Alliance. May we not expect response to this appeal from every Church in Nova Scotia? We are doing our best to fight the barroom - one of the greatest enemies of the Church.
