The odvance on sleeping and parlor car tickets authorized in 1920 has been cut in half-the advance made on ordinary fares at that time having been completely taken off many months ago.

## FOR SHIPPERS

The percentage of advance granted to the Railways in 1920 has heen reduced ten points. In addition to a five point drop at the first of the year.
