HIGH SPEED ROAD FROM THE WEST INTO ST. CATHARINES IS NOW CERTAIN

GOING TO HAVE HOLIDAY

Since the posties have had Saturday afternoon, people on the delivery routes have been calling at the office for their mail. This means a man has to be kept to sort out or go through several hundred letters when he should be enjoying the holiday.

General Questions Asked

LABOR THREATENS MINE INDUSTRY

Effect of Shut-Down at Kirkland Lake—Unrest at Cobalt.

COBALT, June 20.—After having learned that the members of the Miners' Union at Kirkland Lake called a strike without the sanction of the District Executive, and after learning that one of the district officers had gone to Kirkland Lake for the purpose of endeavoring to bring about some sort of a settlement and induce the men to return to work, The Globe's correspondent took occasion to look into the situation carefully.

It is learned that the union has addressed an appeal to the mine managers of Kirkland Lake asking for another meeting. To this the mine managers have agreed. It is a peculiar fact, however, that even should the mine-workers offer to return to work at the wages and the conditions which they formerly obtained, the mining companies are not prepared to take them back.

Water in Lake Shore

The Lake Shore, the leading producing mine in the Kirkland Lake camp during the past year and paying in-cent dividends of about 2 1/2 per cent quarterly, has not only closed down tight, but has taken the pumps out and is letting the mine flood with water.

MAIN POINTS BROUGHT OUT OVER HYDRO

The principal features of the hydro radial proposals as brought out last night at the special meeting of the City Council are as follows:

The ratepayers of St. Catharines by a considerable majority passed a by-law at the end of 1916 to go in with other municipalities for the construction of a high speed radial line from Port Credit to St. Catharines.

The Council last night passed a formal resolution saying that this municipality along with others will issue extra bonds to cover a percentage of the amount chargeable to Saltfleet and West Flamboro townships, till such times as those places pass the by-law to assume their share.

This extra liability for St. Catharines amounts roughly to \$60,000.

The estimate made for the whole line fully equipped was slightly over \$11,000,000 in 1916.

This was made large enough by 15 to 25 per cent. to take care of any increased cost now.

Negotiations will be conducted by the Hydro Electric Power Commission for the acquisition of the N. S. & T. according to Mr. Gaby, chief Engineer.

By-laws will also be submitted to the municipalities lying east and south of St. Catharines asking them to go into the radial scheme for extension to the Niagara frontier.

With these carried the Commission would have authority to proceed with the purchase of the N. S. & T. Ry. if the Government will sell the latter. In case a sale cannot be effected the Hydro may build to the frontier if the municipalities east of here want to go into the scheme.

Figures given by the Chief Engineer showed that the prices at which the Commission can buy materials today is in some cases lower and in other cases no higher than in 1916 when the estimates were made.

Three other municipalities have yet to pass a resolution asked for by the Commission and when they do the Commission can proceed at once with final surveys and the construction of the road.

If all the municipalities carry the resolution, active building operations on the road to St. Catharines will likely begin this summer or early next spring.

Work has been authorized to start on the construction of the line from Welland to Port Colborne and Bridgeburg.

The vote on the whole matter at the meeting last night stood five for and three against. One alderman was absent and the Mayor did not vote. He never votes except to break a tie.

North Grimsby and Beamsville have yet to pass the resolution. They are meeting about the matter this week and the first of next.

SPLendid PROGRAMME AT THE CHAUTAUQUA

After the musical programme had been rendered, a very interesting and instructive lecture was given by Rev. Dr. George Adams of Montreal, which was very much enjoyed by the large number present.

WIRE STRIKE STILL A DRAW

CHICAGO, June 19.—With the ninth day of the telegraphers' strike at hand, both sides today were claiming that "victory was in sight." It was hoped by officials of the union that decision would be reached by the A.F. of L. in session at Atlantic City, as to whether aid should be extended to the striking keymen. S. K. Konenkamp, president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union of America said it was possible Samuel Gompers, president of the A. F. of L., would ask President Wilson to intercede in behalf of the strikers.

President of United States Isn't in it for Earning Power With B. Carroll.

Bassett Carroll appeared in police court this morning on a charge of assault on C. C. Martin on Thursday night. Carroll encountered Mr. Martin on the N. S. and T. tracks and struck him over the head with a stick, inflicting a gash, stating that he had been engaged by the N. S. and T. company to act as their detective at a salary of \$15,000 a month.

The magistrate asked Carroll how long he intended to work at such a large salary, and sent him to jail for one week to sober up, although the man stated he had not had a drop to drink since the Scott Act came in force.

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT WILL TEST POPULAR SENTIMENT ON DRY TOPIC

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT., June 20.—The Ontario Government is taking steps to begin a campaign of education with regard to the referendum on the Temperance question. While the attitude of the Government on the question is not yet decided upon, it is desirable that the entire electorate should be thoroughly familiar with the nature of the four questions to be voted upon. The first step in this campaign will be the issuing of 15,000 copies of the speech delivered by Premier Hearst in which he thoroughly explained the ballot.

WESTERN LABOR NEWS SCORES 'PEG ARRESTS

Allows Liquor Imports

TORONTO, June 20.—In an interview regarding the effect of the Senate's action on the sale of liquor in the province of Ontario, Vice-Chairman W. S. Dignam of the license department said: "The effect will be to renege the conditions as they were prior to the order-in-council, in March, 1918, as soon as the promulgation of peace. This means that people who have private dwellings falling within the definition of such in the Ontario Temperance Act can import liquor from other provinces or from other countries."

"I might say, however, that the conditions to which we shall return with the expiration of that order-in-council will be modified by an amendment to the Ontario Act, which was passed at the last session, prohibiting liquor advertising within the province."

Sir William Hearst stated that the action of the Senate will not interfere with the Provincial government's referendum scheme.

ADJOURNS TILL TO-NIGHT

The jury empaneled to investigate the death of Bedros Anigian, the Armenian who was shot in a grocery store on Ontario Street, was to have held an adjourned meeting last night but owing to there not being sufficient evidence, it was again adjourned till tonight.

CONCERT ENJOYED

The weekly band concert was given in the park last evening by the 19th Regimental Band, and was listened to by one of the largest crowds of the season. The programme was exceptionally good, and every number was keenly appreciated.

CHARGED WITH BIGAMY; PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Benjamin Simpson was before the magistrate this morning on a charge of bigamy, he having first married a Toronto girl, and on May 18th, 1919, married Lily May Dickson. The man pleaded not guilty, and as he went to secure the services of counsel he was remanded to jail until the 27th.

UNWISE HASTE OF SCHOOL BOARD

The public is becoming anxious to know what the Public School Board is going to do about building two new schools. It will be recalled that two or three members stated early in May through the press and at ratepayers' meetings that two schools would be built this year. There was no doubt of it, they said, and citizens need not worry about the certainty of the accomplishment. In fact, if the dilatory City Council wouldn't vote the necessary money forthwith the progressive element of the Board would take the matter to the people in an effort to force the Council's hands.

Furthermore, the Council, and particularly the Mayor, was criticized for giving the financial phases such extended consideration as four weeks. In fact, much feeling was shown because more special meetings were not called, and the vote of \$168,000 for two schools and two sites was rushed through. The Board was beyond all doubt intent on starting the one school at once, regardless of any arguments or proposals for consideration, and enquiry as to costs.

What has since happened amply justifies, surely, the attitude taken by the Mayor.

Today the School Board finds itself in an embarrassing position.

It has received tenders, according to information available, but which has not been disclosed at any regular meeting of the Board, but at a special at which no reporters were present. The lowest tender for one school was \$138,500. That the breath of the Board should have been taken away is not to be wondered at, but this fact does not extricate the Board from an unenviable position in the eyes of the public.

The City Council took four weeks to consider the formal request of the Board for \$168,000. The Mayor, for one, felt that this sum would not begin to buy two sites and build two schools, and that the Board would be back for more money. Now it develops

that the lowest tender for one school is \$138,500. Naturally the Board is in a dilemma of a rather disturbing nature. The weeks are drifting on and yet the promised schools are a long way off. The tables obviously have turned.

DEMOCRACY'S PRICE

With the diplomatists of the civilized powers assembled in conference to decide upon the price Germany and her dupes must pay for peace, says The Veteran, other powers are busily engaged elsewhere in arriving at the price Democracy has decided to charge for her share in the consummation of victory. These powers are the forces of organized labor throughout the world, and their many voices are rapidly being merged into one. Summed up and boiled down, the demands of the workers are that they be given a larger share of the wealth which their efforts produce; that less of their daily time be mortgaged for the payment of food, shelter and clothing; that a moderate share of the pleasures and profits of life be made available to them, and that co-operation between capital and labor be genuinely instituted.

The fruitful fulfilment of these reforms, long, though fitfully sought after, has been greatly accelerated by the war and its lessons. Upon "ordinary" men the past four and a half years of sacrifice have fallen the most heavily. Throughout long, black months the cry was ever that we bled for democracy; that we fought to make the world a safe and decent place to live in. Not from the world's workers did this cry first emanate, but from the statesmen, the politicians, the captains of industry and the eminent among us—the world's "talkers" adopted it as a battlecry, and the world's workers put it into practice. And now comes the reckoning. Labor is determined that the world shall be a better place to live in; that the loyal sufferings of war shall eventuate in a more equitable distribution of wealth; that the "drones" and the "toil nots" shall no longer be arrayed in pre-war glory at the meretricious expense of starvation-dodging employees; in short, that the principles for which so many men shed their blood shall become effective the world over.

EXPLANATION AS TO ESTIMATES

The statement made by the Chief Engineer before the Council that in the estimates, prepared in 1916 for the proposed radial between Port Credit and St. Catharines from 15 to 25 per cent. was allowed for any probable increase overcomes a good deal of the opposition that existed to carrying out the work now. It has been considered and justly so, that there would be a considerable increase in cost, if the road were built today, as against what it would have cost if it had been built in 1916. There has been a marked advance in the cost of many materials, in labor, rolling stock etc.

It is now disclosed that the estimates made by the engineer for 1916 was made large enough to take care of any increase that might be likely to occur.

A further light is given on this point when the statement of Mr. D. B. Hanna is considered. Mr. Hanna is president of the National Railways and in speaking of the proposed construction of a main line between Toronto and the Niagara frontier for the

C. N. R. he stated that he could build a road for seven millions of dollars. Hence in estimating the cost of the Hydro as something over eleven millions it is evident a sufficient amount was provided for to absorb any of the increases there may be in costs over 1916.

With this important feature cleared up it can be more easily understood why the municipalities that voted for the enabling bylaw in 1916 are satisfied to proceed with the construction work now.

This was the one point that The Journal desired to have made quite clear. It has been found that the cost of the Chippewa Canal work has exceeded the original estimates by several millions of dollars, owing to advances in materials, equipment, labor etc. This paper for one did not want to blindly sanction the prosecution of a railway work which might also greatly exceed the estimates. By the figures and explanations given by Mr. Gabry on behalf of the Commission a majority of the Council was quite sa-

tisfied that a good margin was provided in the original estimates to take care of any advances that have occurred since 1916.

An outstanding argument as to why labor would not on the whole cost more was that mechanical appliances would be brought into use which would reduce very materially the number of laborers that would now have to be employed as against what was estimated in 1916.

LOOK OUT FOR THE FAKER

With the coming of peace and the restoration of normal conditions, the financial faker is sure to make his appearance. He will not go about seeking whom he may devour; he will rather appear in the guise of a friend desirous of helping the person who wants to get on in the world.

The Spring and Summer seasons are those in which the financial faker is most active. He is so, because, when the temperature is high, he finds the public more inclined to warm up to his "bargains", more inclined to take a chance.

The financial faker expects to make a haul during the coming season, for during the reaction following upon enforced war-time economy, he thinks that the public will be inclined to go to the other extreme. Or will thus be ready with his fake mining shares, wild-cat real estate schemes and worthless oil ventures. What is more, he will catch many persons if they don't look out.

Taxes Year 1919

Under the authority of By-law No. 3200 passed on the 25th. day of March, 1919, notice is hereby given that all taxes for the year 1919 are now due and payable but may be paid in three instalments as follows, subject to the following exceptions and conditions.

Taxes which are not payable by instalments:  
Taxes in Income Assessment, Arrears of Taxes and charges collectable as taxes for any work done or services rendered by the Corporation are due and payable in bulk on or before the 25th. day of June, 1919 (and not by instalments.)

Payments by Instalments  
1st. Instalment—due and payable on or before the 25th. June 1919. One-half of the taxes will be the amount of the 1st. Instalment.  
2nd. Instalment—due and payable on or before the 25th. September 1919. One-quarter of the taxes will be the amount of the 2nd. Instalment.  
3rd. Instalment—due and payable on or before the 25th. November, 1919. One-quarter of the taxes will be the amount of the 3rd. Instalment.  
Taxes not paid when due.  
If default is made in the payment of any instalment on the above dates, the privilege of payment by instalment becomes cancelled and the whole of the taxes or the balance unpaid, as the case may be, at once becomes due and payable together with percentages in addition, as follows:

Upon default in payment of taxes on the dates appointed,  
Penalty On amounts paid within ten days of time of such default, a percentage charge of one per cent. will be collected.  
Penalty On amounts paid within twenty days of time of such default, a percentage charge of two per cent. will be collected.  
Penalty On amounts paid within thirty days of time of such default, a percentage charge of three per cent. will be collected.  
Penalty On amounts remaining unpaid after thirty days of time of such default, a percentage charge of five per cent. will be collected.

Failure to pay the above instalments of taxes as they become due not only forfeits the right of settlement by instalment but brings the parties under the penalty of the Assessment Law, which enacts, that in case any party shall REFUSE OR NEGLECT to pay the amount imposed upon him for the space of fourteen days after demand, the Collector shall levy the same, with costs, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the party who ought to pay the same.

1. Ratepayers who do not receive their tax bills by the 1st. day of June should notify Tax Collector's Department of the fact.  
2. Cheques tendered in payment of taxes must be "marked" by bank and made payable at par to the City of St. Catharines.  
3. Taxpayers sending amounts by mail for payment of taxes should also enclose the tax bill and a self-addressed and stamped envelope for the return of receipted Tax-bill.  
4. Taxes are payable at the office of City Tax Collector.

## THE CAUSE AND CURE OF BOLSHEVISM

The following article appeared in the February number of "The Veteran," official organ of the Great War Veterans Association, and is of particular interest in these times of unrest:

In March, 1918, Sir Robert Borden invited representative members of the Great War Veterans Association from each province to confer with his cabinet on the question of control of alien enemies in Canada. Several lengthy sessions were held, and the problem was discussed from all angles. The G. W. V. A. asked that allied aliens be conscripted and enemy aliens interned, and strong resolutions to this effect were presented to the premier. In support of the resolutions many instances were cited from various parts of Canada showing the disastrous effect upon the country's capacity for production through the high handed refusal of Germans and Austrians to work full time; their disinclination to contribute to war funds; their freedom from all the burdens of war; the exorbitant wages they were able to demand and the standing menace presented in their almost unrestricted freedom.

Premier Borden pointed out to the delegation that the chief difficulties in the way of dealing with aliens revolved around Labor's attitude and the question of international law. Mr. Doherty, Minister of Justice, was emphatic in his declaration that measures to be adopted in Canada for the purpose of bringing aliens into line and preventing their exploitation of the country's best interests, retaliatory treatment would be immediately visited upon British subjects held as prisoners of war in enemy countries. He also expressed himself as well satisfied that our alien population was no source of menace, and claimed that the authorities had interned all dangerous aliens and were keeping a closely watchful eye upon all others. The Premier gave the Veterans to understand that he feared an "industrial revolution" on the part of organized labor were steps to be taken towards conscripting labor.

In view of the predictions made at that time by the G.W.V.A. that trouble would ensue sooner or later from uncontrolled freedom of aliens in Canada, and the Cabinet's practical refusal to regard the problem seriously, it is interesting to note what Thomas B. Fraser, writing in the January issue of McLean's Magazine, has to say on the subject of Bolshevism in Canada. After some months of close investigation, Mr. Fraser points out "that there is a bold, systematic and dangerous effort being made to lay the fuse of Bolshevism from one end of the Dominion to the other." In an article replete with facts he states "that a good deal of the Canadian propaganda material appears to have been printed in Detroit and Seattle. It is found everywhere

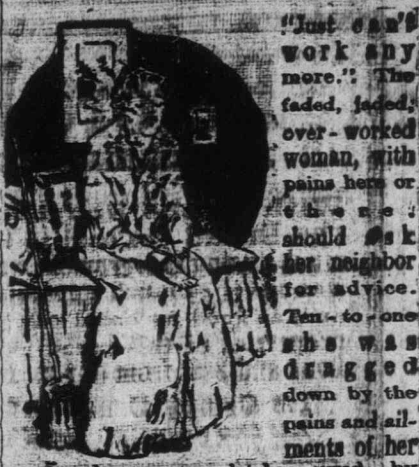

in easily and undeniably answered by the statement that every profiteering corporation, every "ring," "trust," and industrial or financial conspiracy to exploit fleeing tolls from the people, is actively promoting Bolshevism in Canada. High tariffs and combines, manipulators of food stocks and the necessities of life, exploiters of labor, profiteers both great and small, are all indictable as agents of Bolshevism, for they are the parent promoters of unrest, the missionaries of discontent, and the instigators of revolt. A vast amount of hypocritical twaddle has been "preached, preached and screamed" during the past four years about the "ideals of democracy." As a popular and patriotic theme it has most readily and frequently been prostituted—not by the men who shed their blood in the cause—but by the living opponents of every form of democracy; men whose whole lives have been built up and entrenched by plutocracy, and who now, aided by all the arts and crafts at their disposal, seek

to befor the issue, and place upon other shoulders the responsibility for a state of affairs which they themselves have created, during a lifetime of intrigue and selfish ambition. The forces of plutocracy, incalculably strengthened by teeming millions of war profits, now seek to get the clock back to the unthinking days of 1914, and to safeguard their "interests" under the camouflage cry of protection for the "social order." And what is this vaunted "social order" which permits, perpetuates and protects an aristocracy of finance on the one hand, and ignores or repudiates responsibility for abject poverty and positive squalor on the other? ### ONTARIO'S BIG CROPS

Ensure Equal Crops Next Year by Attention to Seed Grain.

Larger Profits From Live Stock Made When Stables Are Given Thorough Clean-up - Live Stock Thrive Better In Dry, Well-Ventilated Stables.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

Ontario is fortunate this year in having a good supply of grain in almost all classes of crops. The more grain there is to select from, the better chance there is to get the very best seed for sowing in the spring. Too many farmers forget the seed supply for next year's crop until most of their grain is fed or sold.

If the best of this grain was set aside for seed at threshing time or taken from the grain bins before any of it was fed or sold, there would be less work of seed preparation in the spring and a foundation provided for better seed than is often sown.

Small, shrunken or broken seed has a feeding value nearly equal to that of large plump seed. The following results of seed selection experiments conducted at the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph will show, however, that there is very great difference in the value of these seed purposes:

(Oats were tested seven years, barley six, and spring wheat eight.)  
Selecting the best seed from that which the farmer has available will not only provide large plump seed for sowing which will produce the most vigorous plants and the largest field of best quality, but it will very largely eliminate any weed seeds which may be in the grain. Dr. C. A. Zavits, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

**Clean, Dry and Ventilate Stables.**  
Cleanliness, dryness and good ventilation are hygienic conditions very desirable in the housing of all kinds of live stock. Horses, cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry, all do better and are less liable to contract infectious and contagious diseases when kept under such conditions than when dirt, dampness and poor ventilation are found in the stables in which they are housed.

Undoubtedly, outbreaks of infectious and contagious diseases do occasionally occur in the best built and best kept stables, but the danger of their spreading is much less than where unhygienic conditions prevail.  
Without doubt, good stock has been produced under stable conditions that were not of the best, but the chances of producing and maintaining good healthy stock are much greater where cleanliness, dryness and good ventilation in the stables are the order of the day.  
Dirt of all kinds, whilst it does not itself produce disease, is liable to harbor and foster the bacteria or other germs that do cause infectious diseases, hence, so long as it is lying around inside the stables it is a source of danger to the stock.  
If there is one class of stable more than another in which cleanliness is desirable it is the dairy stable. Milk is an ideal food for many varieties of bacteria as well as for human beings or live stock, and many varieties of bacteria are always present in stable dirt. Consequently, when dirt or stable dung gets into milk, many contaminating bacteria get in with it. It is the action of these bacteria in the milk that causes it to spoil either by souring or putrefaction. Consequently, one step in the production of good clean milk is to have it produced where there is little danger of dirt or dust getting into it.  
Dampness is a great agent in the spreading and fostering of disease. Perhaps the one disease that it is most liable to induce is pneumonia. Many hogs are lost annually as a result of contracting pneumonia through being kept in low-lying damp quarters. Dampness due to but ventilation is very conducive to the development of various lung troubles with all kinds of stock. The damp stagnant air in badly-ventilated stables lowers the vitality, depresses the blood circulation and so puts the animals kept under these conditions in such a state as to make them ready subjects for the development of such diseases as influenza, pneumonia, tuberculosis and others. Prof. D. H. Jones, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

**Binder for Stone Road.**  
If a broken-stone road gets very heavy auto traffic then it must be laid with a tar or asphalt binder to keep the pieces of stone from grinding on each other and finally powdering up under traffic.  
**Time to Use Road Drag.**  
If the roadway is full of holes or badly rutted the drag should be used once when the road is soft and slushy.

**SOLDIERS' SETTLEMENT BOARD HAS ACTED ON UPWARDS OF 8000 APPLICATIONS**

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 20.—Up to the 27th day of May, the Soldier Settlement Board of Canada has approved 7,900 applications for the benefits of the Soldiers' Settlement Act and a great many more applications were before the Qualification Committee in the various provinces. These figures which will be largely augmented by returns for the past two weeks of May and for the present month shows that Canada leads in providing suitable farms for her war heroes.

## REPRESENTATIVE POWERS PRE

Germans ask That Former Not Placed on Trial, but Four are Holding F

OPPOSE ACKNOWLEDGMENT WAR RESPON

Clause Relating to Trial of German Emperor Also tested.

COUNCIL REJECTS ALL SUGGESTIONS OF

Allied Leaders Refuse to Change in Pace in Ans Four Notes.

BERLIN, June 23.—Germany sign the peace treaty of 1918 and associated powers. The assembly yesterday afternoon of 237 to 138, decided to peace treaty. The assembly voted confidence in the new government of Herr Bauer, 236 to eight members abstained.

On the question of signing the treaty, five members of the assembly refrained from voting.

Before the vote of confidence, Herr Bauer, the new German emperor, declared that the government sign the treaty, but without acknowledging the responsibility of the German people for the war without accepting the terms contained in articles 227 to 230 of the treaty relating to the former emperor and the other German personages.

REPORT REACHES PARIS. Oppose Admitting Guilt of Germany in Causing the War.

PARIS, June 23.—Communique from the Germans to the Allies, relating to the vote of the assembly at Weimar, reached here at 7:45 o'clock. The Germans are now before the council. One of the main points is understood to announce the assembly voted in favor of the treaty with certain reservations.

It is not known what the conditions are beyond declaration of the guilt of Germany in the war and to give up the emperor for trial.

REJECTS SUGGESTION Council Will Not Grant the Germans.

PARIS, June 23.—The assembly has definitely rejected the German suggestion that further concessions be made in the peace.

The council received a message from the Germans, which proposed to have been prepared and were held to be the meeting of the assembly. President Wilson went to the residence of Premier Lloyd George where the council took its session.

One of these, from the German government, declared that the German government was ready to sign the peace clauses making Germany responsible for the war and calling for the former emperor for trial.

The council of four met at 8 o'clock in the morning and then adjourned for the afternoon. The council met again at 9 o'clock after brief further consultation.

WANT VOTE OF CONGRESS Treaty Will be Signed of Answer.

PARIS, June 23.—Advised by the American government to the peace conference yesterday afternoon that the national assembly met at noon and that the peace conference would demand a vote of the assembly.

The council said that the peace conference would be forwarded to the powers to change the peace treaty by waiving their demand for the surrender of the former emperor and for acknowledgment in writing of responsibility for the war.

It was added that no member of the Allied powers would be signed.

## The Silo In Western Canada

To raise two head of cattle where only one could otherwise be raised—that is what thousands of farmers all over the American continent have been able to do with the help of silos. It is no wonder, then, that as the land in Western Canada is becoming more settled, silos should be making their appearance in greater and greater numbers there. Already in Manitoba many farmers are beginning to look upon the silo as a necessary part of the farm, and more than a hundred of them are in use in various parts of the province. Saskatchewan and Alberta, together have probably about half the number as Manitoba, and the number in all the provinces is being slowly but surely added to every year.

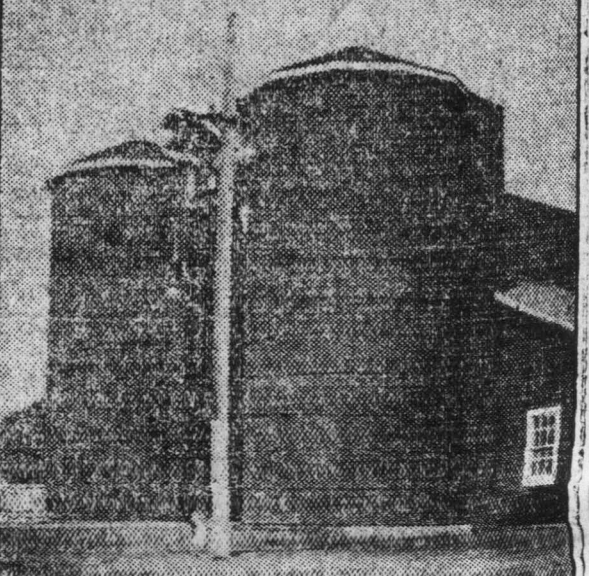
With plenty of unoccupied prairie land growing an abundance of nutritious grasses the cattle feed problem in Western Canada has not been a really difficult one in the past. During the summer months the stock could forage over a large section of the country and there was no need for the owner to compute how many acres would support a cow. The obtaining of winter feed was just a matter of energy—a man could have as much hay as he could cut, free for the cutting. With such conditions as these, and they still prevail in many parts of the country, the need for silos has not been greatly felt up to now.

But the days of free range are drawing to a close. Already there are parts of the country where little or none is to be had. And as the country is getting more and more settled, and, moreover, as a system of mixed farming is becoming the rule throughout every province, even in those parts where for many years straight grain growing was practised, the need for some additional means of ensuring a steady supply of feed all the year round is beginning to make itself felt in various parts of Western Canada.

Silos will, therefore, continue to spring up throughout the country. Near Lacombe, Alberta, a ranching company, which has made a great reputation for the quality of beef it produces, is contemplating the erection of four new silos this year. This company has found with the silos it has in use that it can maintain double the number of cattle hitherto supported on the same area of land. Many smaller farmers are having the same experience. It is, as one farmer aptly expressed it, "like getting another farm for nothing."

In times not long past it was not difficult to get a farm "for nothing" or "next to nothing" almost anywhere in Western Canada, and although land is still very cheap compared with its productive capacity, it is not always easy for a farmer in older settled districts to expand, and the only thing for him to do to increase his production, and thus his prosperity, is to intensify his methods. That this stage is being reached in some districts is a good sign for the future development of the country.

In the large irrigated area in Southern Alberta east of the growing city of Calgary, there is on foot a movement that may eventually lead to the establishment of silos on most of the farms in this territory. It is a country admirably suited for dairying and other

branches of the livestock industry, capable of producing sufficient food for the support of hundreds of thousands of horses, cattle, sheep or swine. Most of the farms are for Western Canada, on the small side, generally from 50 to 320 acres each. But the soil is wonderfully fertile, and with an assured supply of moisture made possible by irrigation, will grow abundant crops of grain and fodders, including wheat, oats, barley, alfalfa, various kinds of grasses and clovers, and also roots and vegetables. For ensilage purposes, alfalfa, sunflowers, alfalfa, peas, oats, and many other crops can be grown. In years to come this part of Alberta will be one of the greatest food producing areas in the world.

What crops are used for ensilage purposes in Western Canada? In Manitoba corn is mostly used, but in Alberta peas and oats are most popular. Other crops used are sudan grass, millets, rape, buckwheat and alfalfa. Sunflower is also being tried, but at present it is only in the experimental stage. The success with which peas and oats are grown, the enormous yields and high feeding value of the mixture, together with its succulence, palatability and flavor, account for its popularity and it will always maintain a leading place with the farmers of the most westerly of the Prairie Provinces, no matter what strides are made in the growth of suitable varieties of corn.

Silos are coming to stay in Western Canada. Their appearance in slowly increasing numbers is a landmark in the development of the country. As they increase in numbers the prosperity of the country will grow, and, as one far-sighted man has put it, "Western Canada will then not only be the granary of the world, but a universal provisioner as well."
