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



Economy.

Economy is one of the lost arts which has not been practiced in this country since the panic of 1893. It is, in fact, a man's always going to invite in, but never catches up with. Economy is a sort of mental reverse english which slows up people who are thinking of mortgaging their home for an automobile, but it is not popular. In fact, the average man would rather be accused of breaking into the baby's safe than be charged with practicing economy. It used to be considered a virtue to lay up something for a rainy day, but now the brittle wage earner carries endowment life insurance and hurries through his next month's salary before he gets to it. Very few people economize hard enough nowadays to raise any blisters. The worst thing that can happen to a man is to earn a reputation for economy by sleeping in the chair car or carrying off the hotel stationary. The average community is never able to distinguish between the father of a large family whose best suit shines like a cheval mirror, and the ingrained tightwad who would hunt a nickel through a board walk until his eyes ran together in one red burial bint. The neatest form of economy practiced in this country is that used by congress just prior to a presidential election, when several millions of dollars are saved until the next session. Economy has a very baleful effect, when used to excess. Many a close-fisted Mayor has been retired by the unanimous vote of a conscientious electorate who instead of paying every highway in the city but the one upon which they abut. The worst enemy of the republic is the statesman who objects to planting a \$225,000 post office building in a city of 345 souls, including the night watch. Economy would be a good thing if a man could get away with it without being detected by the neighbours and tagged in a conspicuous and unpleasant manner whenever he sidled into a 5-cent barber shop.

The Papal Guards

The Most Unique and Striking Army in the World.

The most singular and striking body of trained soldiers serving under any potentate is that which garrisons the Pope's palace in Rome. From the silver-casqued Noble Guards, the Swiss Halbordiers in doublet and ruff, down to the Palatine Guards in shako and the Pontifical Gendarmes in bearskin, they form a distinctive feature of the papal court and a fitting setting to a mediæval picture. Their gorgeous or quaint uniforms, glancing helmets, flashing arms, glittering breastplates—like the black velvet doublets, ruffs and rapiers of the gentlemen-in-waiting—are in perfect artistic harmony with their surroundings, from which they receive and on which they bestow that correlative fitness of the Vatican, although the presence of these troopers and foreign mercenaries, morally speaking, is an anomaly and an anachronism.

This singular little army of a spiritual potentate consists of noble Roman volunteers, burgher civic guards and Italian or foreign mercenaries; and comprises four companies, differently armed, uniformed and officered, and each possessing a distinct history of its own and a separate organization.

First in dignity and antiquity come the Noble Guards in their scarlet tunics, golden epaulets and silver helmets. Raised in 1845 under the name of Light Horsemen, they were formed into two squadrons; and many years later, in 1555, their strength was increased by the addition of 100 free lances, chosen exclusively from the scion of noble houses who could show a sufficient number of quarterings. The two corps were reorganized and united into one by Pope Pius VII. in 1801, when after the stress and storm of the great French revolution, he had righted the ship of St. Peter. These noble guardsmen mount guard in the ante-chamber of his holiness' private apartment, and escort the Pope when he drives out. They now number 69 all told, under the command of a lieutenant-general.

The Swiss Guards, who rank next in precedence, were first enrolled by the fighting Pope Julius II., and subsequently, during the 17th and 18th centuries, three companies were added to the original one. After many vicissitudes, they were finally reduced to one company, which musters 122 captains ranking as colonel. The other men of all ranks, commanded by a captain ranking as colonel. The other two corps of household troops—namely the Palatine or Palace Guards and Pontifical Gendarmes—are far more modern, and do not possess the same stirring traditions. They are chiefly

King's Birthday.

To-day the city is decorated with flags and bunting in honour of the birthday of our Gracious King George V., who to-day celebrates his forty-seventh birthday. The Government offices are also closed as it is an official holiday. It is a pity that the day is not also kept as a general holiday. We think it is a mistake to postpone the holiday and to keep it on a day which is in no way naturally connected with the event which all citizens desire to celebrate. This morning His Excellency the Governor held a levee, and this afternoon Sir Ralph and Lady Williams will hold a reception. Since His Majesty's last birthday, the august ceremony of the Coronation was celebrated at Westminster Abbey, and His Majesty has been able to carry out his intention of holding a Coronation Durbar at Delhi, the ancient capital of the Moguls, which has been reinstated by His Majesty to its old place of pride, by being made the Capital of British India. Their Majesties are the first monarchs of the British dynasty to hold such a Durbar at Delhi. The Durbar was a great success, spectacular, impressive, gorgeous. The inception was a happy idea, and its influence appears to have been benign in allaying much of the trouble that appeared to be brewing in India. The like happy influence is also being felt in Egypt, through the tact and powers of the King's representative there, Viscount Kitchener. At home the times have been anxious. There have been great doings in the political world, and great unrest in the industrial world. The times are pregnant with change which we believe will add much to the comfort and happiness of the millions. With a constitutional monarch on the Throne who has an eye for the times, and sympathy for the people, the change which is pending should reach fruition with comparatively little of the friction which has marked great changes in other epochs in the advance of civilization. With this firm belief in the future, and trust in the good influence of constitutional monarchy, we join in the millions of good wishes that are expressed for the King to-day.

Brought Back.

While the Pomeranian was on her way to Philadelphia a stowaway, who gave his name as George Chaplin, was found. He said he belonged to Halifax. After the steamer's arrival he was detained by the port authorities, and kept into custody, for re-shipment when the steamer returned. Whilst he was being taken back to the steamer he escaped from his two custodians. Jumping from a car going full tilt, the policemen took the next car back and captured him again and put him aboard. He was brought to St. John's.

Disgraceful Sight

At four o'clock yesterday afternoon two men while passing over Long's Hill, picked up a 16 year old boy in a stupor from alcohol and brought him to the police station. This morning the youth said he picked up a bottle in a cove and going countrywards drank the contents until he reached a state of collapse. The police are now investigating as to where the youngster got the liquor, he being of such tender years.

Watch Stolen.

During the progress of the fire at the Guards' Armoury on Saturday, a boy, 14 years old, entered the house of Stanley Abbott, which adjoins the barracks, while furniture was being removed for safety. Mr. Abbott afterwards missed a watch and chain, which he values at \$30. He communicated with the police, and Constable Tobin arrested a boy, who had the watch and chain on him. He will be brought up before the court to-morrow.

Supreme Court.

The first case that will come before the Supreme Court in June sittings will be the hearing of the appeal in the case of Mark Gibbons vs. Walter Crosbie and A. W. Piccott. The appeal will be heard before the three judges on Wednesday, June 5th. Mr. Mews represents the plaintiff and Mr. Howley, K.C., the defendants.

Importance of Malta.

MALTA, To-day.
The conference to decide Great Britain's future policy in the Mediterranean, which began here on May 29th, was concluded to-day. Among those who participated were Premier Asquith, Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, Viscount Kitchener and General Ian Hamilton. An official statement issued this evening says: "The Lords and Commissioners of the Admiralty having concluded the inspection of the Mediterranean fleet and naval establishments at Malta desire to express their satisfaction at the efficiency of the organization. Their intention is to make full use of the facilities of this important and complete naval base, the value of which to the British Navy is of a permanent character. They propose to assign such a proportion of the refitting and repairing work to the dockyard as will keep it in a normal condition of activity and capable at all times of attending to the needs of peace or war for the fleet cruising or operating in the Mediterranean. Submarines will play an increasingly important part in the defence of the island."

Champion Lazy Men.

County Clare Notice Went to Bed at Ten and Got Up Twenty-Nine Years Later.
The "won't works" many of whose careers of laziness have been revealed in the police courts during recent years, have achieved some remarkable records of idleness, says a London paper; but the case of a gardener who recently committed suicide out of sheer disinclination to go on working is surely unique.
This man did not mind starting a job, but he could never be induced to finish it, and he reminds one of the man about whom the wife recently complained to the magistrate at Wood Green Police Court. She described her husband as a piece-worker, and it seemed that he only worked on Wednesday, when it was his custom to put in two hours' toil.
Another case was that of a man sentenced to three years' penal servitude for theft. His age was 40, and it was stated that he had only done one day's work in his life. This was during the taxicab strike, when he wheeled a barrow of luggage from Charing Cross to Euston.
There are at least half a dozen claimants to the title of the laziest man in England. A good first would be the lazy man at Tottenham. Although he found it impossible to sleep all the 24 hours of the day, he tried very hard.
He was practically dragged from his bed to the police court by his indignant wife, but he promptly went back to bed again when he had been lectured by the magistrate and had paid the penalty of his idleness.
Then there was the County Clare man, who went to bed when he was 10 and did not get up until he was 39. Then for some mysterious reason he began to get bored. He rose from his couch in 1907, took to the strenuous life, and was last heard of escorting a coal truck.
One man, brought up at the Willesden Police Court charged with sleeping out, actually fell asleep in the dock while the magistrate was pronouncing sentence.
Another man, who had not worked for so long that he had forgotten whether he was a gardener or a printer, when asked by the magistrate whether he had anything to say, replied with a drawl, "Hardly worth while," and disappeared with a yawn into the cells below.
Yet another case was that of the man of 59 who, when the policeman said he had never done a day's work in his life, protested indignantly that "he once did a bit of 'oppin.'"

Will Be No National Strike.

LONDON, June 2.
The national executive council of the transport workers' federation have decided that there shall be no national strike pending the result of the meeting summoned by the Government for June 4th, to deal with the proposal for a joint Conciliation board. The council recommended the London strike committee to accept the Government's suggestion for a Conciliation Board if the employers are prepared to do likewise. Meanwhile preparations are being made for a meeting of delegates from all parts of the country to be held in London the afternoon of June 4th, to deal with the situation arising from the conference to which the Government has invited employers and men earlier in the day. Ochade, of Berlin, President of the General Council of the International Transport Workers' Federation, has been asked to attend the meeting of British transport workers.

Over 100 New Papers Started in 1911.

Annual Procession at Litledale.

Yesterday afternoon the annual procession took place at Litledale. This charming spot presented a most picturesque appearance with its rich and rare beauty, bathed in brilliant rays of brightest sunshine. The school children of St. Joseph's, (Kilbride), led the way followed by the Sodality of the Children of Mary, the pupils of the Academy, the Rev. Mother and Community, and Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan.

Quite a large gathering of visitors was present and were delighted with the beauty and order of everything. The singing of all was very fine, and indeed touching, appropriate hymns being rendered with perfect harmony and gaining feeling, as the procession wended its way around the exquisite grounds. Indeed a prettier picture it would be difficult to imagine than that presented by the appearance of the little ones in their snow white dresses moving so gently along beneath the shadows of the new-born foliage, and chanting sweet songs of joy in honor of Him who rules earth as well as heaven. After the procession Benediction of the most Blessed Sacrament was given by Fr. O'Callaghan in the beautiful Convent Chapel—a picture of neatness and rare taste—and an eloquent though silent testimony of the devotional care and painstaking efforts of the good sisters.

Not So Bad as Represented

Mr. F. Bursell, Captain for so many years of the Southside Fire Brigade, called in the office this morning to say that the hose in use at the fire on the Southside on Friday was not so bad as represented. Some twenty to twenty-five lengths were in use, and the pressure from the forcing pump in use there is comfortable, sufficient to drive a stream of water over the saddle of St. Mary's Church from the road. Of these lengths which are each about 25 feet, only three gave out. Altogether there is about 1000 feet of hose on the Southside, and some 700 feet was in use on Saturday at the fire at the Guards' Armoury. These lengths stood the pressure of the hydrants to which they are attached, which is less than that of the Southside pump. The whole of this hose is much lighter than that in use on this side the harbour and is by no means new, as it was purchased shortly after the great fire of 1892. In connection with the fire on the Southside, we learn that the hose was not the property of Mr. Kelly but of Mr. Haden, his father-in-law, but that considerable furniture and household effects were destroyed. Of that which was saved, some of it was taken away and according to Mr. Haden has not yet been returned. Mr. Haden had not a cent of insurance on his property and effects.

On Justifying One's Self

BY RUTH CAMERON.



A certain young woman who had been given a chance to make good in a very big position, lost this chance recently. And the reason, as expressed by her employers, who, by the way, were quite as disappointed as she, was simply that she didn't know how to receive criticism.

Whenever her employers criticized her, she always fought back. Instead of being grateful to them for giving time and energy to try to make her a successful business woman, she was angry and resentful at every criticism. Instead of profiting by their suggestions and corrections, she always tried to justify herself.

Now to try to vindicate one's self when one knows that a criticism is decidedly the opposite.

And yet there are a great many employees—and others—who always adopt this latter course. Even when they know in their hearts that they have made mistakes, they try to prove otherwise to those who criticize them.

Of course it is not at all easy to tell when a criticism is just. To be able to weigh a criticism of one's self calmly and dispassionately, and see where it is right and where it is wrong, is a fine art. Even a most upright judge finds it difficult to decide a case fairly when his own interests are involved. But one can at least make some effort to do this.

Mistakes make the greatest foundations in the world of success. But they should not be used for anything except the foundation. Once you try to incorporate them into the building itself, you make sure to build a failure which will come crumbling down about your ears sooner or later. Will you then argue and contest with the master builder who helps you to recognize these mistakes? Will you try to deceive him and incorporate some of them in the building in spite of him? Or will you listen to him calmly and thoughtfully, and thank him for his help?

According to which course you take, you will prove yourself a big or little man.

For it is only the little people who cannot endure criticism. Sir Walter Scott in his journal mentions an anonymous letter sent to him from Italy, full of acid and acute criticism on his "Life of Bonaparte," and instead of resenting it and justifying himself, he marks with consummate restraint and wisdom, "Its tone is decidedly hostile. But that shall not prevent me from making use of all its criticisms where just." If Scott had been a lesser man he would have scoffed at the criticism, and concluded that the anonymous writer was merely some disagreeable ignoramus.

Again, Epictetus, after hearing a scathing criticism of himself, comments gently, "He little knew my other shortcomings or he would not have mentioned these alone."

What a splendid watchword that would make for those of us who are inclined to be resentful of all criticism to remember when we open our mouths to justify ourselves.

How The Body Kills Germs.

Germs that get into the body are killed in two ways—by the white corpuscles of the blood, and by a germ-killing substance that is in the blood. Just what this substance is, we do not know. Household Notes.

The meats of pecan nuts may easily be removed if they are first placed in a pan and boiling water poured over them. Allow them to remain in the water for twenty or thirty minutes. When the nuts are cracked, the meats come out without trouble and are usually whole.

Cooking vegetables which disagreeably scent the entire house becomes an undesirable necessity at times. If a pan containing vinegar and spices (cinnamon and cloves) is placed on the stove to boil while the food is cooking, the odor will be absorbed by the vinegar and spices.

A glass water bottle when constantly used soon becomes discolored. This may be easily cleaned by pouring a little vinegar into the bottle and adding a pinch of salt. Allow this to stand for several hours, then rinse with clear water. The bottle will be perfectly clear and bright.

Mud stains on garments should be allowed to get thoroughly dry before attempting to remove. When perfectly dry, hang in the sun for a few hours, then brush out carefully. If the stains still appear, try rubbing with a flannel dipped in alcohol. Brush well before trying anything else.

When coal is dear, throw a pailful of strong salt and water over all you have in the cellar. Tar water or resin water will also help the coal to burn more slowly and give a better heat. Keep all your cinders and ashes and mix coal dust with sawdust and clay. The latter make excellent fireballs.

Glasses which are used for milk or any milky substances should always be washed in cold water in preference to hot, as the latter is apt to leave a cloudy appearance and necessitate a great deal more labor in the washing. The same rule applies to perfectly new glasses which have not been used.

Ink stains on garments can be soaked out in a mixture of salt and milk. A teaspoonful of salt to nearly a gill of milk is the right proportion. This answers for either white or colored fabrics; but if the ink has been allowed to dry, it will be necessary to soak the stained part in the milk for an hour or two.

To clean window shades, add two tablespoonfuls of benzine to a pint of hot water. Wet a cloth in this solution and clean a small space at a time. Dry thoroughly with a clean cloth. This is especially fine for shades of any light color, removing fly specks and the general accumulation of dirt that settles on a window shade.

Very frequently we desire to give that rich, old-ivory tone to white-laces. This may be accomplished by the following method: Place in a pan five cents' worth of yellow ochre. Mix with this sufficient rice powder to produce the desired shade. Shake the lace into this, and after removing, brush away all loose dust. The lace will retain the yellowish tint indefinitely.

It is not generally known that the ordinary brown kitchen soap is a strong disinfectant. A doctor who has spent most of his life in a laboratory succeeded in hatching out bacteria in every soap, except that which contained lye, in however small a quantity. Lye is an ingredient in all brown and yellow common soaps, and for this reason these soaps have a distinct disinfectant value.

Do not pad the ironing board with wool blankets, which hold moisture and make your clothes hard to iron dry. Cover the top with a thick layer of cotton batting—one pound will be sufficient—then cover with one thickness of cotton flannel, drawing the cloth tightly and sewing or tacking on under side. Cover this in the same way with one thickness of smooth

muslin, and you will find an excellent surface for ironing.
 Ugly cracks in furniture may be easily filled in with beeswax, so that the marks will hardly show. Slightly soften the beeswax until it becomes pliable, then press it firmly into the cracks and smooth the surface over with a thin knife. Sandpaper the surrounding wood, and work some dust into the beeswax. This gives a finish to the wood and when it is varnished the cracks will have disappeared.

Asparagus tips should be tied in bunches of equal length and stood in a kettle of boiling water, with the tips out of the water, which are thus cooked by steam, while the harder parts are cooked by the boiling water. If not separated in some such way, the tips will be boiled to a much, while the hard part is yet undone. A good way is to cut the stalks in two, boil the tender tips in one vessel and the hard parts in another, then when both are done mix and season.
