May End Dispute.

Halifax, N.S., Dec. 28.—The first sign of a break of the deadlock which has existed for the past ten weeks between the Lunenburg bank fishermen and the exporters at Halifax occurred yesterday when dry cod sold at \$5.90 per quintal, a drop of ten cents per quintal. For two months the Lunenburg men have held from sale over \$500,000 of fish with the purpose of forcing the exporters to pay \$6.50 and \$6.75 per quintal. This the shippers refused to do, claiming they could not clear profit at that figure after sending the stock to Brazil and the West Indies, where the market is low, with still lower prices prevailing in the foreign markets. The buyers here show less eagerness to purchase at \$6.00 a quintal and a declining tendency is now evident. The exporters are waiting for \$5.00.

Discounting One's Own Opinion.

"If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you, But make allowance for their doubting too."



—Kipling.

Do you discount the value of your opinions? You don't know what I mean? Why just this—do you take your own peculiarities into consideration when you are reckoning the value of your own opinions?

Almost everyone discounts the value of other folk's opinions and advice by the temperament and peculiarities of these people. Not always consciously, perhaps, but with a swift subconscious process like the reckonings of a lightning calculator.

For instance, when Mr. H., who is well known to be of an exceedingly cautious temperament, says to you of some venture, which you are considering, "Don't do it. It's too risky. Put your money in the savings bank; it's the only safe way," you don't take that pessimistic point of view at its full face value. Possibly you discount it about fifty per cent. Possibly more.

Again, if Mr. E., who is equally well known to be a hopeless optimist, toots the investment to the skies and assures you, "Why, man, I wouldn't be afraid to put every cent I've got into it; what's the sense of taking two and a half per cent. from a savings bank when you can get eight here and be just as safe?" you do not accept his point of view either as the final and ultimate truth. Instead you consciously or subconsciously discount his statement by making allowance for

his honorably hopeful temperament. You simply have to discount people's opinions. If you don't do so to some extent you would be a fool. And an ability to discount quickly, accurately, and without prejudice is one of the surest foundation stones of success.

But do you carry this process one step further and discount the value of your own opinion? It is only one man out of a thousand who fails to discount other people's points of view. It is less than one in a thousand who remembers to discount his own.

And yet undoubtedly your own opinion, your own advice, to yourself, needs discounting just as much as other folk's—perhaps more.

Do you know a single person who is perfectly balanced, neither too hopeful nor too pessimistic, too cautious nor too radical, too conservative nor too quick to act—in short absolutely without a single overbalance which needs to be corrected? Probably not. I'm sure I don't. Then why take it for granted that you are such a person?

Why not use the same wisdom in dealing with yourself that you do in dealing with other people?

Study yourself. Find out where you are overbalanced, whether more cautious or more impulsive, more hopeful or more pessimistic, than the normal and then use your knowledge to discount the value of your own advice to yourself.

No, it's not the easiest thing in the world to do. Of course not. It is never easy to do great things. And according to the greatest race the world has ever known, to "know thyself" is the greatest thing man can ever do.

Echoes of Titanic Disaster.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.

The danger of the repetition of the Titanic disaster has led the Navy Department to begin preparations earlier than usual for an ice patrol and to warn of presence of icebergs in the track of the Atlantic. Scout cruisers will be sent out in April as an extra precaution. Much remedial legislation proposed after the Titanic disaster, will be enforced. The officials of the Naval Department believe that they regard by information being despatched by the Hydrographic offices the peril from icebergs will be minimized.

Here and There.

The Royal Gazette last night did not contain any announcement of the appointment of the three fish merchants to the Legislative Council. What is the cause of the delay?

The Evening Telegram, the greatest Home Paper among the greatest buying people of Newfoundland, is a practical proposition that no business man can resist.

The Turks appear to be at their last gasp in Adrianople. They have eighty thousand sick there. They are tightly besieged, with no hope of military relief, it is no wonder they are making overtures for capitulation.

Like the Turks in Thrace, the Morris Party is hoping against hope to retain power in Newfoundland. But the outlook is gloomy for both of them. The forces arranged against them are too powerful for them to hold on, when the time of reckoning comes.

The Council of the Fishermen's Union for the District of Port de Grave, will hold the annual meeting at Port de Grave on the 18th instant. A public meeting will be held there at night. The Local Council has passed a resolution inviting us to address that meeting. How does that agree with the Herald falsehood that out-port people avoid us?

The women who "keep the house" are the buyers for families, and they are readers of the Evening Telegram, the Home Paper of Newfoundland. Be sure you tell them through your Home Paper what you have to sell them and that you are ready to serve them with your goods.

The wives of the fishermen are the keenest supporters of the Fishermen's Union movement. And naturally so. A movement which makes for the material comfort of the home very properly appeals to them in these days of dear coal and high taxation on the prime necessities of life.

The trade of the United Kingdom for last year was enormous. The total trade was in the neighborhood

of 6,000 million dollars, and showed an increase for the year of nearly 500 million dollars. With such increase the Free Trade policy is not likely to be seriously shaken.

People who arrived here from Placentia to-day, say that for the past two weeks, herring of large size, have been very plentiful at Mussel Harbor and good catches have been made. The storms of Friday and Saturday last wrought havoc with the fishing gear set out to take the herring. At Mussel Harbor 16 feet of nets were swept away and a large number of boats burst their moorings and going on the rocks were dashed in pieces. The store of Jas. Adams, of Bordeaux, was blown down and destroyed with salt and other property. At Arnold's Cove, another premises was levelled with the gale and a lot of property destroyed. Wareham's schooner at Haystack, drove ashore with a lot of salt on board and will likely be a total wreck. The wind was the most severe ever felt in that section.

Libel Suit.

The Proprietor, Mr. W. J. Herder, and the Editor, Mr. W. F. Lloyd, of the Evening Telegram, have instructed Mr. A. J. Herder, B.A., to take a suit for \$10,000 damages each against the Evening Herald and the Managing Director and Editor, Hon. P. T. McGrath, for the publication yesterday of damaging reflections on the statements we issued last week and on Monday of this week, in regard to the circulation of the Evening Telegram. On January 2nd, 3rd and 4th, we published a statement which had been sworn to by Mr. W. J. Herder, before Judge Knight, showing the daily circulation of the Evening Telegram each day of issue in 1912, and pointing out that the average circulation per issue was 5,104 copies. On Monday we published a statement showing the circulation for January 2nd, 3rd and 4th of 5,564, 5,518 and 5,625 copies. The charge in the Evening Herald which exception is taken was as follows:—

"The claims of the Telegram's 'circulation liar' remind us strongly of its boast as to 'victory all along the line' in the late political campaign. The imputation is that we are endeavoring to obtain advertisements by false pretences, and that Mr. W. J. Herder has taken a false oath in furtherance of such a course. Mr. A. E. Morine, K.C., has been retained as Counsel in the suit.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.
 Kapamachian Effendi, the Armenian Prefect of Van, has been assassinated.

LAFAYETTE, Ind. To-day.
 One killed, three fatally injured, and thirty three slightly hurt, when six cars Cleveland Cincinnati Chicago and St. Louis railway, north bound from Cincinnati to Chicago, jumped track at Stockwell near here. Edwin Sumner Rochester of N. Y., was crushed to death.

NEW YORK, To-day.
 The Cruiser Natal, which brought over the body of the late Ambassador Reid, nearly went to Davy Jones on the passage. When two days from the Irish coast, she was struck by a gale of wind ninety miles an hour. Two guns broke loose, giving the ship a list of forty degrees to port. The main topmasts were broken off, the wireless carried away and a cutter blown from the davits.

LONDON, To-day.
 The record of increases in the trade of the United Kingdom of England and Ireland, shown by the Board of Trade figures for the year ending December 31st, show total imports of £744,896,514 and total exports of £487,434,962; the aggregate increase reached the enormous sum of £25,153,691; the respective increases were: Imports, £64,738,987. Exports, £33,314,704.

NEW YORK, To-day.
 Shrouded in one of the densest fogs in the memory of seafaring men, New York harbor was in a state of almost complete blockade. Two vessels which tried to nose their way out, met with mishap. The Adriatic, White Star Line, with J. P. Morgan among the passengers, grounded off Governor's Island shortly after noon and was not released until nearly 7 o'clock. The Hamilton, Old Dominion Line, ran ashore at Fort Wadsworth, and has her bows stove in above the water line by its impact with a stone pier.

MONTREAL, To-day.
 The utility of fire drill was demonstrated last night, when two hundred orphans were roused from sleep in the St. Vincent de Paul's Asylum, marched without disorder to safety. James were issuing from three floors of the Orphanage.

LOUISBURG, To-day.
 The American schooner Cavalier, arrived here with her flag flying at half mast, having lost two of her crew, James Cabiner and James Kenyon, both of Gloucester.

LONDON, To-day.
 The C. P. R. will shortly inaugurate an Austro-Canadian Steamship service, and having a direct line from Trieste to Canada.

LOS ANGELES, To-day.
 From San Bernardino to Los Angeles every acre of oranges and lemons have been frozen. The loss on 150,000 acres of fruit is forty million dollars.

 Weather calm and fine; the brig Dunure passed in at 11 a.m. yesterday, and an unknown schr west at 10 a.m. to-day. Bar. 29.78; ther. 19.

Death of Sir Edward Shea,

LATE PRESIDENT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

There passed peacefully away this morning, Sir Edward Shea, probably the oldest legislator in the British Empire. Sir Edward has been closely identified with the Legislature for a period which extends beyond the usual span of the average man's life. He lived through three reigns, having been born a little time after Queen Victoria, and the most active part of his life was contemporary with the middle Victorian period. He was born and educated in the city. He left school at the age of sixteen and commenced work and afterwards became the editor of the "Newfoundland" in 1872. He entered politics in 1855, and stood for Ferryland, which he represented in the House of Assembly, according to Judge Prowse's table, until 1865. In 1869 he stood as a candidate for the Conservative Party and some of the most exciting incidents of election times took place in that constituency during that election. He was not returned at that time. We understand, however, before that time he held his first ministerial office as Financial Secretary. When Sir Frederick Carter was returned in 1872, Mr. Shea was appointed to the Legislative Council and became Colonial Secretary, which office he retained under the Carter, Whiteway and the early days of the Thorburn Administration, until 1886 when he was appointed President of the Legislative Council. This office he retained until twelve months ago, when he asked to be relieved of it, as he felt, from old age, for he was in his 82nd year then, unable to stand the strain of the duties, the office called for. His wife, Gertrude Corbet, died in 1903. To the bereaved children, who survive, the Evening Telegram joins with the rest of the community in extending its sympathy. They are Mr. George Shea, M.H.A. for St. John's, East; Mrs. Jackson, wife of the late Sir H. M. Jackson, a former Governor of Turk's Island; Mrs. Mare, wife of the late Robert L. Mare; and Miss Ellen, his constant and devoted companion during his declining years. Sir Edward was knighted in 1902 and was in late years a venerable and stately figure reminding the younger generation of an old generation of statesmen, the counterparts of whom are today but few in number. His brother Sir Ambrose, who passed away a few years ago, also played a long part in the affairs of Newfoundland, and afterwards became Governor of the Bahamas. The funeral of Sir Edward will take place on Friday next from Cochrane House.


Dunure Arrives

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Jan. 7.
The Ambassador's office here held a long conference to-day at the Foreign Office. It is felt that in diplomatic circles that in the end they will force Turkey to accept the conditions that make necessary the new papers this morning call upon the Powers to prevent the resumption of war, and all insist that Adrianople is bound to fall, and should be given to Bulgaria. It is further added that the Islands captured by Greece should be restored to the Hellenic Kingdom.

The Standard voices the consensus of opinion of the British press in saying: "We look forward to the united action of the Powers, which will have the effect of removing the present deadlock, thus affording the Ottoman Government the necessary excuse for yielding to the inevitable."

M. Zenezaras, in a statement to the London Times, this morning, says: "No other solution is possible to peace, than the resession by Turkey of Adrianople and the Aegean Islands."

The Greek Prime Minister points out that the possession by Greece of all the Aegean Islands including those held by Italy will have fallen to the Greeks except for occupation by the Italians. He contends that the capture of the islands imposed great sacrifices in lives and money and was due to the efforts of the Army and Navy of Greece and were taken only after determined resistance by the enemy, and adds: "The Hellenic demands for the possession of the islands of Chios, Lesbos, Mytilene and Samos, but are superior rights acquired by Greece through conquest of war." He further declared that if the Powers granted the demands to the Allies they will ensure permanent peace in the near East with members of the Balkan Alliance living in perfect concord with their neighbors. He finally pledged the protection by Greece of all Mussulmans dwelling in the Aegean Islands, and assures them of equal standing and protection by law.

Special Evening Telegram.

PARIS, Jan. 7.
The death of air scout-Lieut. Toprakchieff, of the Bulgarian Army, at Adrianople, is the first occurrence of his kind in warfare to occupy a place in history. Eye witnesses say he was ordered to fly over the city to ascertain whether the Turks were preparing for a sortie. A division of the Turkish infantry, supported by artillery and cavalry, was in readiness. The waiting Turks saw the machine and used their guns. The watchmen, Bulgarians with field glasses saw a jet of flame and cloud of smoke enveloping the aviator, who tumbling around "aeroplaned" like lightning in the middle of the Turkish forces killing several. Evidently knowing he was doomed, he resolved to sell his life as dearly as possible. His body was recovered with a right hand, and blown out his brains a second before the crash.

Special Evening Telegram.

SAN FRANCISCO, To-day.

NEW YORK, To-day.

A personal visit campaign by fifty young women suffrage workers visit the author of the new Fifth Avenue for its first trial last night, and met with varying success. Thirty suffragette bellies reported disappointment, because they could not find their quarry. The Carnegie sent word to two women who visited his house, that he was strongly opposed to the movement, but not so strongly as to invite the visitors to personal interviews. They thrust a large amount of literature into the hands of the butler, suggesting that both he and his master read it carefully. Other wealthy people were reported "not at home," but in each instance plenty of literature was left.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.

The Panama Canal controversy with Great Britain will be advanced another stage within a few days, when the United States Government will reply to the note of protest by Sir Edward Grey. It is learned that the reply will probably be handed to Ambassador Bryce this week. The note will likely be an unqualified acceptance of Sir Edward's proposal that the matter be referred to arbitration. The chief purpose of the reply will be to reduce the controversy to the real issues of the question, and afford a basis for an agreement, as to what is exactly in dispute and what is conceded on each side.

LONDON, To-day.

A Sofia despatch gives reports from the invested city have been reduced to one-fourth of what it was. There are 80,000 persons ill, and without medical aid or means of obtaining warmth. On Monday, the Turkish and Bulgarian armies discussed the terms of capitulation, the Turkish commanding the garrison be allowed to retain arms. The Bulgarians refused to grant this.

VIENNA, To-day.

Diplomats here believe the Powers will not interfere in the peace negotiations while the present situation exists, but will continue to give friendly advice to both sides. The mediation will be undertaken only at both parties' request or when negotiations break down.

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
