

> GERMAN FORCES BLOWN TO ATOMS.

Paris, Dec. 24.—General Joffre, the French Commander-in-Chief, said to Col. Ignatieff and Col. Yarde-Buller, the Russian and British military attaches at the field headquarters of the French army, three or four days ago: 'Come with me and you will see

something never seen before in war." The military attaches accompanied he general to a place near the lines not far from Arras. There 600 pieces of heavy artillery were placed in a position so as to bear upon a comparatively short plexus of German trenchments. The ranges already had been found.

Upon a word from General Joffre, peated by his aides telephonically, the 600 pieces opened a sustained fire upon the German works and the spaces just behind them.

After a quarter of an hour, the French infantry charged. Not a gleamed over the edge of the works. The trenches actually were torn to pieces as though by gigantic plough-

Dead and wounded men, half buried, littered the line where formerly had been the trenches. The few alive were struggling to free themselves from heaps of earth. Those who had tried to run were caught by the horrible spray of bursting shells in the rear of the German trenches. Probably not a man defending that part of





Southern Cross Enquiry.

(Before Judge Knight.)

Henry W. LeMessurier, sworn-I am Registrar of Shipping for St. John's, Newfoundland. The Southern Cross was registered at Glasgow in 1901 in the name of Murray and Crawford, College St., Glasgow; Daniel Murray of 12 College St., Glasgow and Thomas Crawford, Clyde Buildings, Greenock, Managing owners. Official number 109954; built at Arendel, Norway, 1886, of wood; length 146.5; width 30.7; depth 17.6; gross tonnage 537; net tonnage 325; 90 horse power. Captain who cleared for the Sealfishery in 1914, George Clarke, of Brigus. The Southern Cross cleared from this port for Channel on the 4th day of March last, with a crew of 173 men all told.

Walter Baine Grieve, Sworn.-I am a member of the firm of Baine Johnston of St. John's. The said firm are the agents of the Messrs, Murray and Crawford, Ltd., of Glasgow, who were the registered owners of the s.s. Southern Cross. Since the year 1901 the s.s. Southern Cross has been engaged in the sealfishery of Newfoundland. During that period the largest trip of seals brought in by the ship trip of seals brought in by the snip was in 1901 or 1902, amounting to 26,500. The weight of that cargo would be about 460 tons. In the spring of 1913 she brought in about 17,000 seals. I received advice that the ship left Channel for the Gulf the ship left Channel for the Gulf sealfishery on the 10th March past.
She did not take any additional men from Channel. We had no report from the ship herself, but about the 29th March a message was received from Cape Ray, that a loaded steamer supposed to be the Southern Cross, had passed out of the Gulf. I think there was a report of a steamer passing Galiantry Head received in St. John's, followed by a report sent by the coastal boat Portia, identifying the Southern Cross near Cape Pine. That was, I think, the morning of the 31st of March. The weather conditions on that day became very bad. It blew with unprecedented force from S.E., accompanied by heavy snow drift or blizzard. Since then we have had no report from the ship. No reports of any wreckage, nor any reperts of any indications that would point to the loss of the Southern Cross at any particular part of the coast. When the ship failed to arrive within reasonable time after the storm, I concluded that she had gone back to the ice in the Gulf, or as she had some St. Mary's men on board, that the captain had gone to St. Mary's, or that he tried to put his ship to sea with the result that she foundered. She had very high poop, top gallant forecastle and very high bulwarks, so that if she shipped a large quantity of water, she might have foundered before freeing herself have foundered before freeing herself have foundered before freeing herself of the water. None of the wooden sealers engaged in the sealfishery, as far as I know, have ever had a class at Lloyds. The firm of Baine Johnston and Co., in its connection with Murray and Crawford ships, bad the services of the late Capt. Thomas Linklater, whose duty it was to survey the ships to see that they were kept in first class condition, and effect all necessary repairs.





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


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
