

New Relief For Constipation, "LES FRUITS

(From the Boston Herald.) The dominion of civilization will be strengthened by the putting of the former German Emperor on trial as the person chiefly responsible for the making of the great war. Courage to respond to the clear demand of justice in a manner never before attempted is shown by the allied and associated nations in their momentcus decision. They create a mighty precedent. Peoples have iried their rulers and oftener removed them without trial for offences committed within their respective realms, but nations have had no judical means of redress or punishment when rulers of foreign nations made war against them. There was nothing for it but to wait and prepare and then, if possible, resort to war if wrong had been done. Looked at calmly and critically, with minds freed from the spell of custom, is not the old system vicious, deciding nothing except by force, and never carrying even with its final decision the certainty of justice? A step away from war as the arbiter cannot but be a step toward something better. National justice, as has been indicated, is sometimes truly administered when peoples are wronged by their rulers; but here is an order new and greater, this advance to the administration of international justice. It is the denial and destruction of the tenet of tyranny that might is right. We are not thinking se much of the punishment of William Hohenzollern as of the principle and plan which call him to account for the heinous moral offence of plunging the world into war. Let him have what he justly dserves, neither more or less, and let it end his career as a leader of men; but the great thing to consider is that after that, and after him, we shall have a judical system with an international tribunal competent to summon to its bar and subject to punishment any ruler who wantonly rushes his nation in arms against another. Surely the Hohenzollern trial will be a dread deterrent, a powerful prevention of war. It cannot be disregarded. For the interallied court represents the will of a world organization for the protection of the weak and the preservation of peace. The world does move. "Out of the dark the circling

Airplanes for Fire Patrol of the Forests.

After some preliminary reports concerning the possiblity of using airplanes as an auxiliary in the work of protecting forests from fire, it is now definitely announced by the U.S. Forest Service that the Air Service and the Forest Service will co-operate in work of this character during the coming summer in portions of the national forests of California, Arizona, New Mexico and other states. Army airdromes and bases will be used for the undertaking, which will be largely experimental during the coming season. Besides supplementing the work of the forest rangers in locating forest fires, attempts will be made to utilize aircraft in connection with firefighting. One plan to be tried is the use of bombs filled with suitable chemicals as a means of extinguishing fires from the air. It is also suggested that fire-fighters may be carried to the vicinity of fires in dirigibles, and lowered to the ground by means of ladders. Airplanes will use wireless in reporting the location of fires.



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

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
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
