The manufacturer of wooden spools has come to be very largely a New England industry, and Maine takes the lion's share. Factories there turn out about 1,000 million spools annually, which have a market value of about one and a half million dollars.

Only the best quality of timber i used in the manufacture of spools the white birch, used almost exclusively, reaching the factory in bars 1/2 to 2 9-16 inches square, and 31/4 to 4 feet long. These bars must be absolutely clear. The birch is cut in winter and sawed in small portable nills, which operate as near a rail-

About two and one-third cords of timber are required for one thousand


feet of bars. After sawing, the bars

are piled criss-cross, in order to facilitate seasoning and protected from the weather, are allowed to cure until June. About 15 million feet of bars are consumed by the spool factories, and an equal amount is exported to Scotland and England.

Speel making machines are complicated, and require skilled workers for their operation. The spools drop from the lathe one a second, and must when in final use.

So far, no equally good and cheap substitute for the wooden spool has been placed upon the market, but probably, as suitable spool timber grows scarcer, a composition spool


